

The mutiny on board the armored cruiser Pamyat Azova, off the Esthonian coast, is fraught with enormous possibilities. The crew of this vessel rose and killed the commander and four officers. Ambassador Meyer has received a despatch from the American consul at Reval, saying that the Pamyat Azova entered that port this afternoon with the red flag at her masthead. Should this cruiser under the flag of the mutineers sail to the northward and appear before the main squadron in the Gulf of Finland, the loyalty of the crews of the vessels would perhaps be put to a stronger test than they could stand. Although the admiralty claims that the squadron off Sveabors did not waver in its allegiance, there is something mysterious about the reports of the ship's actions which warrants the suspicion that all is not right aboard. CZAR FLEES FROM PETERHOF.

When the firing began at Cronstad Wednesday night there ensued a wild panic in the imperial palace at Peterhof, as the palace lies under the guns of the fortress. All preparations had been made in advance to fiee to Tsarskoe Selo, but the report affoat yesterday afternoon that the emperor and his family actually had fied in the middle of the night was denied. Later, at the chancellery of the imperial household, it was explained, however, that in account of "dampness" at Peterhof, arrangements had been made for the return of the imperial family to Tsarskoe Selo.

Meetical leave reas proclaimed at Cronstantine offered no resistance. The artillerymen remained neutral and submitted to imprisonment in the casemates.

Martial law was proclaimed at Cronstad during the day, and all day long reinforcements have been landing there from the mainland.
