For his weekly wage the British textile worker could purchase 184 pounds of bread, while the same in Canada would cost \$7.56. Are there men in the textile or cotton trades in St. John working for \$7.56 per week. It is hardly likely.

The people of St. John are probably more familiar with conditions in the building and woodworking trades. The Daily Mail year book shows that in Great Britain there are 1,200,000 men engaged in those trades earning thirty-two shillings per week, an equivalent of \$8 per week in Canada. COMMERCIAL NEWS AND COMMENT

ON COTTON MARKET

(F. B. MCCURDY & CO.)

New York, Jan. 3.—The census report published this morning showed such an unprecedented falling off in ginning for the last half of December as compared with the preceding period that it revived confidence in the smaller estimates of the crop, and led to a very sharp advance in prices. The opening was firm at an advance of 16 to 24 points, and while there was enough realizing to cause more or less irregularity, prices gradually worked up until active months were 36 to 38 points above the closing figures of last night, during the afternoon. Buying on the bullish ginning report as a compared with the content of steader southers spot markets, and rather more favorable weekend figures than had been expected. The census report showed 13,333,000 bates ginned to January 1st, comparing with 12,907,000 last year, and 14,317, 600 two years ago. The total ginning for January 1st is therefore a little more than 400,000 bales bare in excess of last year, and last year's commercial crop was about 14,100,000 bales but people have recently been talking of a crop of around 14 34 million this season, and the remarkable falling off in the returns for the last half of December has led many to believe that the amount of cotton remaining to be ginned to less than last year, and that the (otal ginning may not covered 13,800,000 bales. Linters and re-packs might bring up the count to 14,400,000 bales. This bullish swing in crop views comes at a time when sentiment is becoming a little more optimistic as to the general trade outlook, and when exporters seem to be a little more active in the south and while today's covering movement has corobably weakened the technical





The Assessors shall ascertain, as nearly as possible, the partilurs of the real estate, the personal property, and the income of any person, who has not brought in a statement in accordance with their notion and as required by this law, and shall make an estimate thereof at the true value and amount, to the best of their information and belief; and such estimate shall be conclusive upon all persons who have not filed their statements in due time, unless they can show a reasonable excuse for the omission."
"Sec. 43. 
