

Montreal, June 26.—There died last night a veteran of 83 years of age whose case was referred to in this Gazette lately on account of the fact that, through the efforts of the "Last Post" fund, a pension of one shilling a day had been secured for him from the Imperial Government. This was to date from the 17th April last, but the inevitable War Office delays re-suited in the first cheque only coming to hand as the worn out warrior passed beyond mortal need. He was a sol-der with the 60th Rifles of General Buller at Red River and was entitled to a pension of a shilling a day from the time he was discharged in 1871, but for some reason he never claimed this. That is a sum of about \$625 was doen and came just at a time when the Imperial War Pension list was the heaviest in history and the pension was made payable from three montas ago. The old man was looked atter in his declining days in one of the city hypitals, and he will be buried to morned the the stat Post' fund.
