QUESTION IV.

What Ministers have died since the last Conference?

ANSWER.

1. WILLIAM SAMUEL SHENSTONE, who was born at Three Rivers, Canada East, in the year 1838. He feared the Lord from his youth. Amiability of disposition, dutifulness to his parents, fraternal affection, intense love of study, and aptness to accumulate mental stores, were marked elements in his character. At the age of sixteen he was convinced of the need of Divine forgiveness and a change of heart, and sought by humble confession of sin, and trust in the atonement of Christ the great salvation; and in him was fulfilled the promise, then shall they find when they search for me with their whole heart. He obtained peace through believing. At the Conference of 1858 he was accepted as a condidate for

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our Ministry, and was appointed to the Bonavista Circuit, where he labored with great acceptance and success. He was subsequently appointed to the Carbonear Circuit, where his Divine Master blessed him, and made him a blessing. He received such a baptism of the Holy Spirit, as to lead to a closer walk with God. At the Conference of 1861 he was appointed to the Hant's Harbour Circuit, where he entered upon his labors with much prayer, a deep sense of responsibility, and a holy resolution to consecrate his energies to the great work of seeking the salvation of souls, and the edi-But he had only labored about a fication of the Church. week, when he was stricken down by affliction, which baffled medical skill, and after about three weeks of severe suffering, during which his trust in Christ was firm and unshaken, God took him to an early rest in heaven. His last words were-"The best of all is God is with us." He died in peace, August 31st, 1861, in the 25th year of his age, and the fourth of his ministry.

2. Samuel Avery, who was born at Lower Horton, N. S. He was converted to God in early life, and being satisfied of his call to the work of the Christian Ministry, he conferred not with flesh and blood, but offered himself to the Church of his choice. That he might be fully prepared for this important work he spent some years at the Sackville Academy, which proved to him of great spiritual and educational advantake. His piety was deep and fervent, and his devotedness to his Divine Master steady and sincere. He loved the doctrines and discipline of the Wesleyan Church, and was especially attached to his brethren. His mental powers, which were cultivated by various and careful reading and study, were acute and vigorous, and his attainments were respectable and varied. He preached the Word with faithfulness and acceptability, and God owned his labors in the conversion of sinners, and in building up believers in the faith of On account of ill health he had for the last fifteen months of his life to retire from the actual work of the Ministry. Soon after the last Conference he was attacked by an alarming hemorrhage of the lungs, accompanied with intense and agonizing suffering, which he bore with resignation to the Divine will. During his illness he had a strong and

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unshaken confidence in God as his reconciled Father. A short time before death the Lord manifested Himself to him in a glorious and triumphant manner. He exclaimed, "Is this death? I have had a first view of the promised land. I am going home—going home, to die no more,—Hallelujah. Praise the Lord!" He died in great peace, at Liverpool, October 13th, 1861, in the 29th year of his age, and eighth of his ministry.

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3. HENRY HOLLAND, who was born of Weslevan Parents, in the year 1830. At the age of fifteen years he was unmistakably converted to God. Henceforth his piety was elevated, intelligent, and decided. He was affectionate and consistent in his friendship, while a noble disinterestedness very much adorned his Christian character. In the year 1851 he was placed in the Local Preachers' Plan of the Fifth Manchester Circuit, and, being subsequently convinced of his call to the regular work of the Ministry, he left England in 1856, and joined the E. B. A. Conference. On several of our Circuits he labored with great zeal and ability, and often with blessed success. At the close of the last Conference he obtained leave to visit his native land, with the hope that his health, which had been impaired during the previous winter, might be thereby restored. In this he was disappointed, as he gradually sank into weakness and death. Some of his last words were, "Christ is precious," "All is well," "Precious Jesus-Jesus!" He expired on the 24th December, 1861, in the 31st year of his age, and in the sixth year of his ministry.

4. WILLIAM C. McKinnon, who was born at Sydney, Cape Breton. He was brought to a saving knowledge of the truth soon after he arrived at the years of manhood. His conviction for sin and ultimate conversion were produced by the Spirit of God through the instrumentality of a watchnight service. He repaired to a Wesleyan place of worship, during the solemn services of that night. He entered the chapel as the congregation was engaged in silent prayer. There it was that the Divine Spirit awakened his mind, and finally by His influences he experienced redemption through the blood of Christ, even the forgiveness of sins. Shortly

after this he commenced to preach; and in the year 1853, entered the regular work of the ministry. His piety was deep and fervent, and his devotedness to his Master's service constant and entire. His mind, which was vigorous and active, was cultivated by careful reading and study. His preaching was clear, pointed, evangelical, and useful. His last sickness was painful and protracted, but he was graciously sustained and comforted with the religion of Jesus. His end was eminently peaceful. He died at Shelburne, N. S., March 26th, 1862, in the ninth year of his ministry.

MOUNT ALLISON ACADEMY.

QUESTION XII.

What are the Resolutions of the Conference in reference to the Mount Allison Wesleyan Academy?

ANSWER.

1. That the comprehensive Report of the Trustees of Mount Allison Academy is completely satisfactory, and that the Conference gratefully acknowledges the Divine goodness, as manifested in the literary, the religious, and the financial condition of both branches of the Institution.

2. That the cordial thanks of the Conference be presented to the Rev. H. Pickard, D. D., to whose earnest and untiring devotion to the interests of the branch of the Institution for males its continued prosperity is to be largely attributed, for his faithful and efficient discharge of the various duties belonging to his responsible position during the past year.

3. That the cordial thanks of the Conference be also presented to the Rev. J. Allison, A. M., the Principal, and to Mrs. J. Allison, A. M., the Preceptress, for their zealous and highly acceptable labours in the Ladies' Branch of the Institution; and that the efficiency and prosperity of this Department of our Educational interests afford to the Conference much satisfaction.

4. That the Conference with great pleasure, and in the utmost confidence, would commend these institutions to our people, and to the public generally, for securing thereby to the youth under their charge the advantages of thorough literary training, on sound Christian principles—advantages there is reason to believe, not to be exceeded in any other institution in these Lower Provinces.

THEOLOGICAL INSTITUTION.

QUESTION XIII.

What are the Resolutions of the Conference respecting the Theological Institution?

Answer.

1. That the Conference has heard, with much pleasure, the Report of the Theological Department at Sackville under the direction of the Rev. C. DeWolfe, D. D., and desires to record its high appreciation of his very efficient and successful labours during the year.

2. It is a subject of deep regret to the Conference that Dr. DeWolfe feels it to be necessary to remove from Sack-ville to some more genial climate, at a time when the inception of such an important branch of our Educational schemes

seemed especially to demand his residence there.

3. In consequence of the removal of the Rev. C. DeWolfe, D. D., from Sackville, the Conference resolves that, for the present year, an arrangement be made by the President of the Conference, whereby the young men who are now recommended as Theological Students to attend the Institution, shall be enabled to pursue such courses of study as shall directly bear upon their preparation for the Christian Ministry.

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4. That a sum not exceeding two hundred dollars shall be appropriated to meet the expenses of such an arrangement, and that the balance of interest accruing from the fund, shall

be added to the stock.

5. It is earnestly requested that the Treasurer and Executive Committee will adopt such measures as may be necessary for the augmentation of the fund of the Professorship, to the amount originally designed.

6. That the following course of study be appointed for the Probationers for our Ministry, and that they be examined particularly upon it at the Annual District Meeting. The Chairman of each District is also required at the time of the Financial District, to make suitable arrangements for the examination of the young men at the ensuing District Committee Meeting.

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MOUNT ALLISON WESLEYAN COLLEGE.

QUESTION XIV.

What are the Resolutions of the Conference respecting Collegiate Education?

ANSWER.

Whereas the Conference last year did, after a long and thoroughly exhaustive discussion of the College Question in all its bearings, unanimously resolve as follows:-

"1. That in the opinion of this Conference the arrangements for the organization and systematic instruction of the regular classes for a full course of Collegiate study, in our Institution at Sackville, should be completed at the earliest

practicable period.

"2. That this Conference, fully concurring in the opinion that the establishment of a proper Provincial University, distinct from all teaching institutions, to be the sole source of university honors and degrees, upon the plan, essentially, of the London University in England, and the Queen's University in Ireland, would be of great and permanent advantage to the cause of liberal education, gladly complies with the request of the Board of Trustees of the Mount Allison Wesleyan Academy, and appoints the Rev. the President of the Conference and the Rev. the Secretary of the same, with the Superintendent of the Fredericton Circuit, to act with the Executive Committee of the Academy, as a joint Committee,

to bring the matter under the notice and consideration of the Government and Legislature of the Province of New Brunswick, in such a way as shall seem best calculated to secure

the establishment of such an institution.

"3. That the Conference is convinced that, in the event of a failure in the effort to secure the establishment of such an institution as is contemplated in the second resolution, it will be then expedient to fall back upon the Act of Legislature which authorizes the organization of a College proper at Mount Allison, upon certain conditions, which, it is believed, can be fulfilled without involving the necessity of any general appeal throughout the Circuits for additional Funds.

"4. That in the opinion of the Conference, the establishment of a College will give additional stability and influence to the C. F. Allison Theological Professorship, and that it should operate as a stimulus rather than a hindrance to the completion of the Endowment Fund for this Professorship."

And Whereas we have no reason to suppose that the views then taken were erroneous, or that the conclusions then reached and embodied in these resolutions were unwise and should now be reversed; and Whereas the application to the Government and Legislature, as ordered in the recent resolution, was unsuccessful; and Whereas the Board of Trustees of the Mount Allison Wesleyan Academy did, at its late Annual Meeting, make certain arrangements, which are now reported to this Conference, to give effect to the third resolution of the Conference last year, in regard to the organization of a College proper at Mount Allison; and Whereas these arrangements do not involve the necessity of any general appeal throughout the Circuits for additional funds:

Therefore Resolved—That the Conference hereby gives its sanction to these arrangements, and furthermore pledges its cordial sympathy to this forward movement in the Educational enterprise, to which, as we have before solemnly declared, it is our deliberate conviction that "God in His Pro-

vidence seems to be calling our Church."

HOME MISSION AND CONTINGENT FUND.

QUESTION. XV.

What are the Resolutions of the Conference respecting the Home Mission and Contingent Fund?

ANSWER.

1. That the Rules respecting this Fund printed in the Minutes of 1856-57, continue in force.

2. That the objects contemplated in the formation of this Fund are so closely connected with the religious progress of our Church, and the welfare of souls, as to demonstrate the reasonableness of it upon the attention and liberality of our

church and congregations.

3. That the Conference cannot but regret the diminution of the amount of increase from the Districts during the year. It would earnestly call the attention of the Chairmen to this important subject (or painful fact); and enjoin on all its ministers the uniform carrying out of the plans already adopted for its support, by Public Collections and class contributions. The Conference cherishes the hope that in the ensuing year vigorous efforts will be made on every Circuit to secure to this Fund the universal sympathy and augmented pecuniary aid of our people.

Resolved,—That the cordial thanks of the Conference be presented to the Executors of the Estate of the late greatly lamented Martin Gay Black, Esq., for their kind and prompt payment to the Treasurer the sum of one thousand dollars—

the amount of his Legacy to this Fund.

5. Resolved,—That the respectful thanks of the Conference be presented to the Executors of the will of the late Mr. James N. Harris, of P. E. Island, for their immediate payment of his legacy to this Fund.

THE CHILDREN'S FUND.

QUESTION XVI.

What are the Resolutions of the Conference respecting the Children's Fund?

ANSWER.

1. That John Starr, Esq., and Rev. James Taylor are requested to act as General Treasurers of this Fund for the ensuing year; and the Rev. Jas. England as General Secretary; and the Rev. Duncan D. Currie as Assistant Secretary.

2. In conformity to the standing rule, which makes provision towards the support of the children of our Ministers, from a certain rate of contributions in proportion to the num-

QUESTION XVII.

What are the Resolutions of the Conference respecting the Educational Fund for Ministers' Children?

1. That every Minister in full connexion shall pay an annual subscription—to be, for the present, ten shillings—into this fund, and that private subscriptions and donations are to be solicited from our more opulent friends, to whom the Ministers are authorized to make application.

2. That a public collection shall be made annually, in all our Chapels and Sabbath preaching places, in the month of

April for this fund.

3. That the Rev. C. Stewart, of Lunenburg, and John Fraser, Esq., of St. John, N. B., are requested to act as Treasurers of this Fund. The Rev. Geo Johnson is appointed Secretary.

SUPERNUMERARY MINISTERS' AND MINISTERS' WIDOWS' FUND.

QUESTION XVIII.

What are the Resolutions of Conference respecting the Supernumerary Ministers' and Ministers' Widows' Fund?

ANSWER.

1. The Conference has ascertained, with approbation, that the Rules relating to this important fund have been observed in the Circuits generally; and it expects that from this time there will exist no exception to the fully carrying out the well-considered provisions for the due maintenance of the annual income of this Institution.

2. The District returns, however, show a less amount of Circuit contributions, this year, than last; which is doubtless owing to the recent extensive depression of business. On the return of prosperity, the Conference hopes that the claims of this fund, on the justice and liberality of our people, will be suitably remembered.

3. The cordial thanks of this Conference are presented to the executors of our late venerable friend Martin Gay Black, Esq., of Halifax, for the prompt payment of his legacy to this fund of one thousand dollars.

SABBATH SCHOOLS.

QUESTION XIX.

What are the Resolutions of Conference respecting our Sabbath Schools?

ANSWER.

1. That it affords the Conference much pleasure to observe that the general state of our Schools continues to be encouraging, and that the Divine blessing accompanies our labors in this important department of evangelic toil.

The Conference would earnestly recommend that increased attention be given by our ministers and people to the formation and efficient working of Bible Classes for the elder children, and adults, believing that a rich reward would accompany such efforts, in the increase of Biblical knowledge, and the extension of our branch of Christ's Church.

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WESLEYAN PARSONAGE AID FUND.

QUESTION XX.

What are the Resolutions of the Conference in regard to the creation and management of a Fund, to be known as the Wesleyan Parsonage Aid Fund.

ANSWER.

1. That, in the judgment of this Conference, it is highly desirable that every Circuit throughout the Connexion should be provided with a comfortable dwelling house for the minister and his family, and that such dwelling house should be entirely free from debt, in order that the Connexional Funds may not be burdened with charges for rent, from year to year.

2. That every preacher with a family, appointed to a Circuit destitute of such a house, shall, as soon as possible, call the attention of the friends of our Church on such Circuit to the importance of earnest efforts to remedy such deficiency,

at the earliest practicable period.

3. That, in order to encourage such efforts, a Wesleyan Parsonage Aid Fund shall be constituted, consisting for the present of the special grant of £250 sterling, made by the Parent Connexion to this Conference for the year now ending, and that to this the similar grant which we are authorized to expect for the year now commencing shall be added, and that the business of this Fund shall be managed under the direction of Conference, by a Committee appointed for the purpose.

4. That applications for assistance in support of local efforts from Circuits in New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, and P. E. Island, proposing to erect suitable dwelling houses, or to liquidate debts thereupon, may be sent to this committee; such applications, however, to be approved by the District Meetings, either Financial or Regular.

5. That the Grant to aid in the erection of any house, or in the removal of debt from it, shall in no case exceed \$200; and that no grant shall be paid from this Fund until the Committee shall receive satisfactory evidence that a sum, amounting to at least three times that of the grant, has been, by local efforts, secured towards the accomplishment of the object proposed.

6. The first meeting of the Committee to consider applications for grants shall be held, at the call of the President, at Sackville, as soon after the ensuing Financial District Meet-

ings may have been held as may be convenient.

That the kindest thanks of this Conference be presented to our esteemed brother, the Rev. Charles DeWolfe, D. D., for his attention to the duties of his position as Co-Delegate,

during this Conference.

That the cordial thanks of the Conference be presented to the Rev. John McMurray, Secretary of the Conference, to the Rev. James Taylor, Journal Secretary, to the Revds. H. Pope, 2nd, R. A. Temple, George S. Milligan, A. M., and D. D. Currie, Assistant Secretaries, and to the Conference Letter Writers.

That the Conference gratefully appreciates the kindness and hospitality of the numerous friends in Halifax, shown by them to the Ministers during this session, and that the same be appropriately expressed from the pulpits of our Churches

in this city on Sabbath next.

That the thanks of the Conference be presented to the resident Ministers of this Circuit, the Rev. Messrs. Addy and Brewster, for their considerate regard for the comfort and accommodation of the ministers attending this Conference.

III.-DONATION VISITS.

It was Resolved,—That the Conference having considered the subject of Donation visits, are of opinion that the better way for raising the necessary receipts of Circuits, is by the time-honored system adopted from the beginning. It would not depreciate the kindness, nor check the flow of the benevolence of such of our friends as desire to help the cause of God in this more novel way. It would yet seek to turn the stream of their contributions into the more ordinary channel,

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and advises that, for the future, the real cash value of such donations shall be returned in the account of the Circuits where they occur, as a part of their receipts, but under the designation of "Special Efforts."

IV .- CLASS AND TICKET MONEY.

The Conference, still admiring the wisdom which originated the system of raising a portion of the income required for the work of God in our Church by "Class and Ticket Money," would express its regret that the method has not been more generally observed, and would make an affectionate appeal to the members of our Church on its behalf, under the conviction that the reasonableness of the Rule will secure their intelligent approval, and that practical sympathy by which the supposed difficulties of its general observance will be greatly moderated, if not altogether overcome, and its principle extensively carried out.

V .- CLASSIFICATION OF CIRCUITS.

Resolved,—That a special Committee, to consist of not less than five, be appointed, more fully to consider the subject of the Classification of Circuits, according to some general principle, and to report through this Committee at the Conference, at its next session.

VI .- MISSIONARY LISTS.

Resolved,—That the Chairmen of each District shall be required to bring to the Conference a perfect list of all the Subscriptions and Donations to the Wesleyan Missionary Society, made in the respective Circuits of his District. Such list to be prepared on foolscap paper, and to be made up in decimal currency, as used in Nova Scotia.

VII .- PROVINCIAL WESLEYAN.

That in consequence of the annually increasing arrearages of the subscription for the *Provincial Wesleyan*, enquiry be instituted in the District Committees respectively, as to the fidelity of each brother responsible for the collection of such monies—the accounts previously being sent to the Chairmen, and distributed at the Financial District Meetings.

Dr. Forrester is devoting himself, with so much zeal, is one which should command the best attention of all our ministers and members; and we take this mode of assuring the Rev. Superintendent, that he may rely upon our carnest sympathy with all wisely directed efforts to advance the cause of education upon Christian principles.

X.

Whereas,—The beloved wife of the Rev. W. Temple, having deceased during the past year, this Conference would respectfully present to their venerable brother the assurance of their deep Christian sympathy with him, on account of his irreparable loss. His grief has, no doubt, been mellowed and moderated by the consideration of the long series of years through which Mrs. Temple and he have travelled the journey of life harmoniously together. We rejoice to believe that our sorrowing friend has been well sustained by the grace of God hitherto; and this Conference would assure him of our fervent prayers that to the end of his pilgrimage he may continue to find that as his day, so his strength may be.

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Whereas, it has pleased the Almighty to remove from earth the wife of the Rev. C. Churchill, A. M.,

Resolved,—This Conference beg to assure our beloved Brother of our deep and fraternal interest in the trial which he and his children have been recently called to endure, in the almost sudden decease of Mrs. Churchill. This affliction

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must surely have been aggravated by the prospect of their approaching return to her native home in England. Our earnest prayer is that our bereaved brother may be enabled ever to consider and feel that the Great Father of our spirits is also the God of our life, who may end it at *His own* pleasure. We trust that Brother Churchill and his family may continue to experience the guidance of Divine Providence, and the abundant supports of Divine grace.

THE PASTORAL ADDRESS.

TO THE MEMBERS OF THE WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH IN EASTERN BRITISH AMERICA.

DEARLY BELOVED BRETHREN,-

Assembled once more in Conferential deliberation, we gladly avail ourselves of this opportunity of addresing you, in our collective capacity, assuring you of our continued interest in your welfare, and beseeching, in your behalf, that grace, mercy and peace may be multiplied from God our Father and from the Lord Jesus Christ.

With mingled feeling we are called to contemplate the results of another year's toil in the vineyard of the Lord. Though in some circuits the work of God has been graciously revived. souls have been saved, and congregations have been gathered. and our interests generally, sustained and strengthened; yet we are under the painful necessity of reporting a slight decrease in the actual number returned as full and accredited members of our church. Owing to the peculiarities of our financial system. the pressure of the times and the interruption of commerce, resulting from the unhappy strife in the neighbouring Republic. have in some places seriously affected the membership of the church, and the numerical returns which have been made. Humbled, in view of the past, yet hopeful for the future, as we have received mercy we faint not, but have resolved to give ourselves more fully to prayer and to the ministry of the word, and to God, who is our strength and sufficiency, and who alone giveth the increase to him that planteth and to him that watereth.

Brethren pray for us. Pray that we may so labour and serve, in the Gospel of Jesus, that the word may have free course, that the redeeming purposes of the Lord Jesus Christ may be more rapidly advanced, that we may witness in our sanctuaries still more triumphal scenes of saving mercy, and that our Gospel may come unto you, not in word only, but also in power, and in the Holy Ghost, and in much assurance.

We have presented no new Truths. We have preached no other Gospel. We have unshaken confidence in the instrumentality, divinely appointed, for the moral regeneration of our world. We believe in the power of God, in the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, in the promise of the Holy Ghost, in the efficacy of the cross, in the mission of the Church, in the tongue of fire, in the omnipotence of faith, in the prevalency of prayer, and in the adaptation and sufficiency of the glorious Gospel of the blessed God.

We need no new agencies or appliances; but there is one thing we do need—power from on high—soul-converting power.

We may have oratory in the pulpit, melody in the choir, decorum in the pew, and multitudes thronging to the ministry of the word; the means for calling out all the varied gifts and graces of the membership; our ecclesiastical organization well adapted to all the purposes for which it was framed; but our trust is not in these: "Not by might nor by power, but by my Spirit, saith the Lord." Join with us then, we entreat you, beloved Brethren, in wrestling faith and in agonizing prayer for this soul-converting power, and for the promised out-pouring of the Holy Spirit. O! for the baptism of fire—God's holy fire, kindled in many hearts and burning from many lips; for the richer unction and plenitude of His blessing accompanying our ministrations; and for a renewal of all the substantial blessings which crowned the Pentecostal Church.

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Deeply solicitous for your welfare, we address you on mattera of practical importance, not as a mere ecclesiastical usage; but with the hope that the counsels and administrations thus conveyed may have greater weight and impressiveness, emanating as they do from the collective Pasterate of the Church.

Cultivate Personal Piety.—For this there can be no substitute. Sabbath-keeping, psalm-singing, sanctuary attendance, sacramental communion, deeds of charity, paying tythes and giving alms can never be accepted in the place of pure, vital, personal godliness; "Neither circumcision availeth anything, nor uncircumcision, but a new creature in Christ Jesus.."

Aim high in your Standard of Consecration. Look above all creeds and confessions, above all theories and forms of professional or practical religion which may surround you. Look to the Life of Jesus, to the Sermon on the Mount, to the Epistles of the New Testament, to the great evangelical commands on which hang all the Law and the Prophets, to the standard of consecration in the Primitive Church; and to the patterns of piety which have been bequeathed to us in the memories of many sainted ones, whose lives have adorned, and whose biographies will enrich our own Church.

Be Conscientiously Consistent. There is an attempt in our times to bring down the Church nearer to a level with the world; and to compromise the consistency of christian character, and the principles of our holy religion, by the introduction, into religious circles, of dissipating pleasures and fashionable amusements. Without referring at present, more specifically to this subject, we would only remind you of the incompatibility of one with the other; and of the imperative obligation under which you are placed as the friends and followers of the Redeemer, to relinquish whatever may assume any attitude of hostility to His will. Ever bear in mind that the character you have assumed, the exalted motives under the influence of which you act, the great central aims and aspirations of your life, the sources of your joy, and the grandeur and dignity of those immortal destinies which await you, are as diverse and as distinct from those of men unsaved and unregenerate, as light is from darkness, and as life is from death. By every consideration of consistency and of covenant-engagement, you are called upon to maintain and preserve in all their sacredness and in all their integrity, those great moral distinctions which constitute the separation of the Church, and which, in the sight of God are of supreme importance, assured that from the solemn and authoritative announcement of Inspiration, there can be no appeal: "If any man love the world, the love of the Father is not in him."

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Prize the Means of Grace. The ministry of the word and the meeting for social worship are privileges of which we can only show our appreciation by habitual attendance. Remember that God is to be worshipped in the assemblies of His saints. The sermon may be a prominent, but is not the only important part of Divine Service. Waft up, in spiritual response, to the Throne of the heavenly grace, the confessions which may be made, the thanksgivings which may be presented, and the supplications which may be poured forth in the great congregation.

We have observed with much regret, the habit rapidly growing in our Sabbath services, of leaving all the praise to be offered by the Choir. The interest of congregational singing—once a marvellous power, and a great attraction in Methodism,—is well nigh lost in many congregations; and it is to be feared that we have hereby suffered serious declension in devotional feeling. Never are saints upon earth, spirits in glory, and seraphs before the throne, more in unison than when hymning the praises of Jehovah. And nothing can be more appropriate in the earthly sanctuary, than for the voices of all true worshippers to mingle and blend in the rapture and melody of holy song: "Let the people praise Thee O God, let all the people praise Thee."

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Cultivate a line of Christian fellowship, not merely as a beautiful theory, or for repetition in our creed, but as a practical necessity, called for by the whole life experience. Do we believe in the Communion of Saints? Ample provision is made in our Class-meetings for that interchange of sympathy and fraternal feeling so necessary to our comfort and edification, enabling us to bear each other's burdens, so fulfilling the love of Christ. Of the value of this means of grace, either viewed in its theoretical or practical aspects, for its adaptation as an organized system of Christian testimony, or for its soul-training capabilities, it is scarcely possible to think or speak too highly. We do not claim for the Class-meeting an essentially Divine origin; but we do claim that it is Scriptural in its character, sanctioned by Divine blessing, and fully in accordance with the usage of the primitive Apostolical Church—one constituent of which was fellowship. Defective must be that organization which makes

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no provision for fellowship corresponding to that of the first Christian Church. In Methodism that want is supplied in the weekly Class-meeting. Forsake not, then, the assembling of yourselves together, as the manner of some is, and so much the more as ye see that day approaching when the Lord's book of remembrance shall bear its testimony, and each one shall be rewarded as his work shall be.

Give your support as far as possible to the Sabbath School. Pre-eminent among those auxiliary agencies by which the Church of Christ is rendered effective for the conversion of the world, is this Institution; yet many a Superintendent is discouraged, many a Sabbath School languishes, and many children are neglected, for lack of that sympathy and support which you are well able to give. In obedience to the Chief Shepherd, who gathereth the lambs in his arms, and carrieth them in his bosom—the nearest place to whose heart, and whose tenderest sympathies are for the little ones—who saith to every loving disciple: "Feed my lambs," go into the nursery of the Church, there to labor in love and to toil without weariness.

In these days of cheap literature, and of teeming periodicals, so often the vehicle of influences relaxing and polluting to the moral energies, and of scepticism and secularism, with their affected pomp and parade of science and scholarship, it is necessary to exercise much discrimination in the selection of books for family reading. We recommend the Provincial Wesleyan, with its well-filled columns of literary and religious intelligence, to your continued patronage, as well adapted to gratify and instruct the members of your home circle. The Book-Room in Halifax will afford you an opportunity of obtaining our Connexional literature, which ought to have a place in the libraries of all Wesleyan families.

Regarding thorough intellectual training, combined with healthy moral culture, as of the highest importance, and the best heritage you can bequeath to your sons and your daughters, we have much pleasure, and the utmost confidence, in recommending to your cordial support, our own Educational Establishment at Mount Allison. We have been favored with the most satisfactory evidences of their efficiency, and believe that

in no similar Institutions can you secure advantages superior to those which are now offered at Sackville.

In addition to the Academic Schools which have been for many years in successful operation, and the Theological Institution, for the training of ministerial candidates, which we desire to make as efficient as possible, we have made arrangements for the establishment, by Provincial Charter, of a College proper, in which young men can be conducted through an entire Collegiate course, and graduate in the usual way.

To all thoughtful Methodists of these Eastern Provinces, and to all those who desire to secure Collegiate Education accompanied by those religious safeguards, which by Christian parents are deemed indispensable to the safety of young men, at a time when their minds are most susceptible to, and their character stamped for life by, the moral influences by which they are surrounded; we commend this new enterprise of our Church.

Starting, as it does, under favorable auspices, and with an efficient staff of Professors, we trust that it will yet win for itself a high place, and an honorable name among the Colleges of North America; and that it will become the loved and revered Alma-mater of hundreds of young men, who shall creditably fill, and honorably distinguish themselves in the various Professions and vocations of life.

Our ministerial ranks have been thinned during the year. Some of our beloved Fathers and Brethren are compelled, through advancing years and wasted strength, to retire from the active duties of the Itinerancy. Some of our most talented young men have ceased from their labors and have entered into their rest during the year. The names of Samuel Avery, pure and transparent in mind and purpose, of William McKinnon, honorably distinguished by his fervent piety and scholarly attainments, of Henry Holland, eminent for fidelity in labor and for success in winning souls, and of Wm. S. Shenstone, whose career, full of promise for a brilliant future, so soon closed, are monitory to us all. Being dead they yet speak. They bid us gird ourselves anew for earnest toil; seeing the night cometh when no man can work.

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We cannot but express our gratitude to Almighty God who has preserved us from the affliction and distressing agitation of civil war now felt so severely in the United States. Though we have suffered commercially, and have had complaining in our streets, yet we have peace in our borders, and as brethren dwell

together in unity.

The bereavement of our beloved Sovereign has not appealed in vain to our sympathies. Earnestly would we implore in her behalf the consolations of true religion, that she may be enriched with grace and heavenly wisdom, that her throne may be estab-

lished in righteousness and in mercy.

"And now, beloved Brethren, we commend you to God and the Word of His grace; to the communion and fellowship of the Holy Spirit; and unto Him that is able to keep you from falling, and to present you faultless in the presence of His glory with exceeding joy: To the only wise God our Saviour, be glory and majesty and dominion and power, both now and ever, Amen."

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THE ANSWER

OF THE BRITISH CONFERENCE TO THE ADDRESS OF THE CONFERENCE OF THE WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH IN EASTERN BRITISH AMERICA. (1861.)

REV. AND DEAR BRETHREN:

Accept the renewed assurance of our fraternal affection of our deep sympathy with you in all your trials and labours, and of our devout thankfulness to God for the gratifying success with which it has pleased him to crown the ordinances and

agencies of your Church during the past year.

It is by no means the least important and interesting part of the proceedings of our annual Assembly, to welcome the Representatives, and to listen to the Addresses of the Affiliated Conferences. We are thus supplied with manifold and encouraging evidences that our common Methodism, in the purity of its doctrines, in the simplicity of its worship in the efficiency of its organization, and in the undiminished energy of its spiritual life, possesses a power of adaptation and development which seems to guarantee alike its stability and its further extension.

You will rejoice with us, to learn that the Great Head of the Church continues to vouchsafe to us many tokens of His special favour. The accession of nearly ten thousand members to our Society, the large number of candidates for our Ministry, the erection and enlarg ement of Chapels, the extension and prosperity of our Home-Missions, the steady increase and thorough efficiency of our Connexional Day-Schools, and the opening of a very important Mission, under auspicious circumstances, in Italy,—are among the most noticeable and prominent indications that the God of our fathers is still with us, and condescends to employ us for the advancement of His own cause.

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We regret to learn that the political tumults and complications which are distracting the Western world, and especially the commercial depression which has overtaken some of our own Colonies, have combined to retard the progress of the Gospel, and to hinder the prosperity of Zion. But remembering that times of chastening and tribulation have oftenbeen signalized by special displays of the Divine power and glory, we would join with you in the devout prayer of the Prophet:—"O Lord, revive Thy work in the midst of the years, in the midst of the years make known; in wrath re-

member mercy."

In these times of rebuke and blasphemy, when a false and flippant philosophy is attempting to degrade the Bible from its own pre-eminence, and to eliminate from Christianity some of its fundamental doctrines, we are thankful to receive from you so explicit an avowal of your attachment to the inspired Word of God, and of your determination to glory in the cross of Christ. It is also very gratifying to us to mark your high appreciation of those facilities for Christian fellowship which are furnished by the institutions of Methodism. They have eminently contributed to conserve and promote Scriptural Godliness, both at home and abroad; and we are increasingly persuaded that they can never be neglected without impairing the life, and endangering even the existence, of our beloved Methodism.

We heartily congratulate you on the establishment of a Theological Institution, and on the appointment of the Rev. Charles De Wolfe, M. A., as Professor of Theology. When educational facilities are so rapidly multiplied, and when the resources of literature are so widely diffused, the Church cannot be too anxious to secure a godly, well-trained, and

thoroughly efficient ministry.

Your appropriate and ardent tribute of respect to the character of the late Thomas Farmer, Esq., elicited a deep response in this Conference, where his personal excellencies and distinguished services were best known, and where his

ADDRESS

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CONFERENCE OF THE WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH OF EASTERN BRITISH AMERICA,

TO THE BRITISH CONFERENCE.

REVEREND AND BELOVED FATHERS AND BRETHREN,-

We hail with delight the return of the period of mutual salutation.

We still entertain towards the Parent Body those sentiments of veneration which the reflection of the image of Christ, and the beautiful imitation of his inimitable example, on the part of the founders of Methodism and their sons, have ever induced us to cherish.

The Christian affection, deep sympathy, and undiminished confidence which your last Address breathes towards us, have rendered it doubly welcome.

In your benevolent schemes and operations in regard to the world's conversion you have our most hearty sympathy. Your correspondingly large successes in the various departments of benevolent enterprise, both at hote and abroad, thrill our hearts with inexpressible joy. They are the more cheering, inasmuch as in them we have pledge of the ushering in of that period when "Christ shall reign from the river to the ends of the earth." We join with you in expressions of unfeigned thanksgiving and ascriptions of praise to our Heavenly Father, whose purposes of mercy in Christ are thus being accomplished.

Deeply impressed with the conviction that the doctrines of Methodism are purely Scriptural, and that its means of grace are not only compatible with high spiritual developments, but pre-eminently conducive thereto, we have clung to it in affec-

tion, and sought to exemplify it in conduct.

The exhibition of the great central doctrine of our holy religion—" Christ crucified"—has enlisted all our energy. And as we have been pointing sinners to the "Lamb of God which taketh away the sins of the world," exclaiming "God forbid that I should glory save in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ," this Divinely instituted means of saving the race has been shown to be the power of God and the wisdom of God.

To the glory of Infinite Grace be it said that scores and hundreds of new-born souls have been enabled to testify to the efficacy of the atonement during the year. Nevertheless it becomes our painful duty to report a small decrease in the membership of our Church; owing, perhaps, to the extreme financial depression prevailing throughout the country, and increased strictness on the part of the brethren in making up their annual returns.

The reports of the agencies which the Church has employed—the Mount Allison Literary and Theological Institutions, the Sabbath Schools, the Book Room and Provincial Wesleyan—have been, upon the whole, gratifying. The comparative circulation of our valuable literature, through the medium of the Book Room and Provincial Wesleyan has been materially diminished, through the prostration of provincial trade; yet, confident of the Divine blessing, we propose prosecuting our labors in this important sphere with increased energy.

The Rev. C. Churchill, A. M, retires from this department of our Connexional enterprise, and is to be succeeded by the Rev. John McMurray, whom we have appointed as our Book Steward and Editor.

Our Educational Institutions, despite the uparalleled financial pressure of those troublous times, have been largely patronized during the past year; and their prospects for future usefulness are in the highest degree encouraging. They fully realize the expectations, so fondly cherished by the now sainted Allison, of their being a means of widely extended usefulness, in promoting education upon Christian principles. We have resolved, with the assurance of the Divine approbation, to elaborate our hitherto incipient operations in the Collegiate department to the proportions of systematic Collegiate training, and propose introducing to the public an organization

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College.

The labors of our beloved brother, the Rev. C. DeWolfe, as Theological Professor during the past year, have been in the highest degree acceptable. We regret that considerations of a prudential character seem to render it expedient for him to leave this position for a time at least; although he nominally retains the office. The supervision of the studies of the young men who can be allowed to pursue a course of preparatory training for our ministry, is for the time being entrusted to the President of the Conference. Such is the pressing call for Preachers on our Circuits, that only two of the candidates for our work this year can be placed as students in our Institution at Sackville.

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With chastened feelings, it becomes our duty to record the death of four of our most promising young men: the Brethren Avery, McKinnon, Holland, and Shenstone. Their loss, in the present exigencies of our work, is deeply lamented. In their lives, the graces of the Christian character shone with undimmed lustre. They have left to the Church, in their consistent piety, and deaths of great triumph, an invaluable legacy. By the aid of an intelligent faith, and with an unquestioning submission, we say, "It is the Lord, let Him do as it seemeth Him good." Our deep sorrow has been assuaged by satisfactory evidence that the Lord of the harvest is sending forth laborers to gather in the expanding harvest. Thirteen candidates have been received upon probation; and eight probationers, by solemn consecration, have been devoted to the office and work of the Christian ministry.

We request, with much pleasure and great unanimity, the appointment of the Rev. Charles DeWolfe, D. D., to fill the office of President, and the Rev. T. H. Davies that of Co-

Delegate, for the next year.

We have appointed our valued President, the Rev. H. Pickard, D. D., to represent us at your approaching Conference, and we have also appointed with him, in discharging this duty, our esteemed brother the Rev. C. Churchill, A.M., who returns to the work in Great Britain, and our esteemed brother the Rev. J. England, who pays a short visit to his native country. We commend them to your cordial sympathy.

We cannot permit our beloved brother, the Rev. Chas. Churchill, A. M., to leave our Conference—for so many years the scene of his earnest and successful labor—without mentioning our high appreciation of his abilities; and while we can but regret his departure from our youthful Conference, we are confident that the Parent Body will afford him a field of usefulness corresponding with his ministerial standing and experience.

You will rejoice to learn that throughout the present Conference all our discussions and deliberations have been marked by the manifestation of at least the usual brotherly confidence and affection, and by great unanimity in the conclu-

sions to which they have generally led.

We turn from the survey of the important features of Methodistic operations and progress, more deeply convinced that Methodism is the child of Providence, and the most efficient instrumentality for spreading Scriptural holiness, and bringing glory to our Redeemer.

To an enterprise of such surpassing grandeur—that which proposes investing the world with the blessings which Infinite Love proffers—we, nerved by holy resolve, and sanctified by grace, cheerfully consecrate anew all our blood-bought

energies.

In conclusion, Reverend Fathers and Brethren, we would again earnestly bespeak from you continued remembrance, that we may still share in your much-needed, highly-prized parental sympathy, counsel, prayers and assistance; and in return we will ever offer in your behalf the unfeigned prayer that the God of all grace, in the riches of his glory in Christ, may invest you with all needful blessings and ultimate glory.
