LIVERPOOL, May 14.—A special meeting of the Holyhead local board was held to consider what steps should be taken with regard to the offer of the London & North-western Railway Company to remove the Platts Road in Holyhead harbor. The company offers to spend £200,000 to remove the 10 to 25 feet below low water mark, and also to build a deep water wharf. A portion of the harbor is at present worthless on account of the presence of the rocks. Great opposition has been raised in Liverpool to the scheme, as it is feared that Holyhead will not probably be made the port for Atlantic steamers, and the result will be a saving of ten hours to both the passenger and mail service. A resolution was passed asking the government to accept the offer, pointing out the natural advantages of Holyhead.

NEW ORLEANS, May 13.—The Louisiana Lottery Company has doubled its offer to the State, and now offers \$1,000,000 per annum for the privilege of maintaining a lottery.

NEW ORLEANS, La., May 13.—The Governor, in a message to the Legislature says: "I foresee the most direful consequences if the Lottery Company persists in its scheme to foist itself upon the people. I foresee that this State will be deemed a menace to the future of the people's dearest rights, and I consider it my solemn duty to warn this general assembly, for I feel deeply what I say is true. And for whom and for what is all this to be occasioned, for the personal interests of a handful of men, many of them connected with the darkest days of the reconstruction period, and it is for them and to them that we are asked to sell out our birthright for a mess of pottage. As the Governor of this State and the head of the present administration and representing the conditions of common wealth who believe the only legitimate end of Government is enjoyment of liberty and property, all three, I will never consent, so far as I am concerned, that the destiny of this great State shall be placed under the control and dominion of any corporation whatever, and especially that it shall pass under control of a gambling institution, and I shall exercise all the influence of my official position at all times to avert and avoid what I would consider a disastrous as well as a disgraceful event."

ST. PETERSBURG, May 27.—Horrible scenes are reported as having occurred during the burning of Tonsil, the capital of Western Siberia. The place was visited by a conflagration and a cyclone, the result of the combine disasters being the destruction of three quarters of the buildings, which were of wood and the loss of hundreds of lives. The Cathedral, situated in the High Town, is in ashes, the walls falling, crushed an adjacent hospital by being the inmates who were roasted alive. The people have been forced to render the least assistance in saving lives and property, on the plea that they had nothing to do in protecting their barracks and other Government buildings. They also added that they had no time to assist "worthless cities." In strong contrast to this action of the troops was that of the Bishop and his assistant priests, who went about the streets succoring the wounded and blessing the dead. Much of the suffering might have been averted had there been the slightest effort at organized relief. The storm was followed by a sudden fall in the temperature, and soon the devastated city was buried beneath a mantle of snow that added stinging cold to the sufferings of the thousands of men, women and children that were without shelter.

WOOLEN MILLS BURNED. CHARLOTTE TOWN SUFFERS A GREAT LOSS BY HAVING ONE OF ITS INDUSTRIES CRIPPLED BY FIRE.

CHARLOTTE TOWN, May 17.—The main building of the Charlotte town woolen mills was burned to the ground shortly after noon today. Preparatory to leaving for dinner at 12, Engineer Clarke looked about the engine room to see if all was right and noticed a reflection of fire on some of the polished parts of the engine. Looking upwards he perceived a part of the carillon on fire. Owing to the oily and dry nature of the room the fire spread rapidly and by the time the department got to the place which is situated in the extreme northern part of the city, the fire was beyond control. The building was 60 by 90 feet and it was the most valuable part of the machinery. The spinning and weaving rooms in the new building to the south were saved. It will throw some 60 or 70 hands out of employment. The loss is estimated at \$40,000; insurance \$20,000 in the following companies: Eastern, \$3,000; Western, \$2,000; Guardian, \$5,000; Queen, \$5,000; Commercial Union, \$3,000; Lancashire, \$2,000.

EVERY THING GONE. FAILURE OF THE BIGGEST BECKETT SHOP IN THE COUNTRY.

NEW YORK, May 17.—One of the biggest brokerage firms outside the New York Stock Exchange will to-day announce its failure for \$300,000 or \$400,000. The suspension will be a big surprise on the street, and will involve the ruin of a Boston brokerage firm and will to a greater or less extent affect scores of brokers throughout the country. The concern in question is known as the Burton & Wright Company (limited) of 10 Wall Street, and is one of the biggest, if not the biggest, bucket shop in the country. The directors of the company held a protracted session, and after this meeting the usual "daily statement" of the company was prepared and mailed to the company's 100 correspondents, leading cities from Atlanta to St. John.

N.B. The firm say they have lost all the money they had. The board of directors in the New York house comprised the president of the company, his brother, general manager, William, the secretary, treasurer and assistant secretary. The company was capitalized at \$100,000.

As to the amount of the present indebtedness Mr. Doran said it would be difficult to estimate it exactly before the clerk in the office had finished up the statement, which would probably be made public to-day. "I judge," he said, "that the liabilities are between \$300,000 and \$400,000. The assets are small and nominal. The Boston house will probably go under to-morrow morning as soon as our failure is known."

The losses consequent upon the big failure will fall upon those living outside New York, a good many it is believed being maintained in Boston and throughout New England.

The cause of the collapse was, Mr. Doran says, a combination of circumstances. There was a full market, and besides a desire on the part of southerners, notably a broker in Syracuse, who attached his bank account in that city, to hurt the credit of the New York house. The collapsed concern did a "carrying business," jobbing heavily in grain, stocks, oil and cotton.

MURDER MOST FOUL. A MAN BEATES TO DEATH AT NEW GLASGOW, N. S., REM THE CAUSE.

NEW GLASGOW, N. S., May 16.—Between 24 and 1 o'clock this morning D. Sutherland was called upon by three young men, who said that a man was lying dead in the street. The man proved to be William Robertson, a respectable citizen of Westville. Sutherland's murderer caused Daniel Robertson, livery stable keeper, of Westville, to be arrested for the murder. Daniel Robertson, the accused, had been down town, where he was drinking. He came up between 23 and 24 o'clock in company with three or four young men. When they were opposite William Robertson's place, Dan beckoned them to come over and it appears some hot words passed between them. William Robertson, who, it is said, had also been drinking, followed these men up nearly to Dan Robertson's livery yard and here the row began again and Dan and William were seen to clinch and Dan william were seen to clinch and Dan and William were seen to clinch in a pool of blood. Blood was also spat on the side of the sidewalk. Robertson's face and face presented a horrible appearance, there being a deep gash on the top of his head several other gashes about his head and his face, nose and lips much lacerated and the blood oozing from his mouth, ears and nose. The jury rendered a verdict to the effect that deceased came to his death from injuries received at the hands of Dan Robertson. The deceased was a widower of 37 years of age. He leaves two children of three years and one year respectively.

THE TOUR OF CONNAUGHT. OTTAWA, May 13.—It has been definitely settled that the Duke of Connaught will visit Ottawa on June 5. The party, which includes the duke and duchess, Sir John McNeill, Colonel and Mrs. Cavage and Dr. Kilkelly with the usual retinue, are expected to arrive at Victoria, B. C., on the 23rd inst, and will leave the coast for the east on the 25th. On the way they will be made at Banff and Winnipeg. From the latter city they proceed to Toronto by rail, thence to Niagara and back by rail to Kingston, where the steamer will be taken for Montreal. From Montreal, where they will be the guests of Sir George Stephen, the party proceed to Ottawa, where they will lunch with Sir John Macdonald. Leaving Ottawa they go to the lower St. Lawrence for a few days fishing. At Quebec on the 11th they will be the guests of the Governor-General and will rail on the Alton steamer Sardinian on the 12th of June. It is to be regretted that the circumstance of the duke's visit to Canada do not permit of any extended official courtesies. Duty requires that his royal highness shall be in England on June 21, and all his arrangements have to be governed by this fact. There will therefore be little opportunity for extended official courtesies or public demonstrations of welcome at any of the points the distinguished party stop at. To-day Mayor Erratt conferred with Hon. Edward Stanley in reference to the presentation of a civic address of welcome from the corporation of Ottawa, and it was decided to endeavor to secure the use of the Senate chamber for that purpose.

MORE HONORS TO STANLEY. LONDON, May 13.—An enthusiastic reception was given to Stanley at the Guildhall to-day by 2,000 people. He was presented with a gold casket containing an address from the corporation of London. Stanley made a speech in which he said that if Englishmen had listened to him England to-day might have had the Congo Free state and East Africa. He said Quakerism, peace societies and namby-pamby journalism were clogs to every hearty endeavor made by England.
