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Victor Glad, who was elected two weeks ago to the Quebec Legislature as a member of the Liberal party, died Wednesday afternoon at St. Francois du Lac of paralysis.

December 15 is the day of nomination, and December 22nd is the day for the election in Lewis and Bonaventure counties.

The family of the late Mr. W. C. Anslow wish to return their sincere and heartfelt thanks to the citizens of Newcastle as well as the public generally for the sympathy and kindness extended to them in their terrible affliction.

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The Hon. Mr. Blair was at Chatham yesterday and was interviewed by a large number of his citizens. From what we can learn, railway freight and other matters in which the citizens of Chatham are interested, but we have not learned what decision was arrived at. We have also heard that a joint address from the Town Council and Board of Trade was presented to him.

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The late English despatches announce that the terrific storm which swept the English coast on the 28th and 29th of last month was one of the severest that has been felt for many years. Scarcely a tree on the coast escaped without more or less injury and the loss of life and destruction to shipping has been fearful.

Three topics promise to absorb the attention of the United States Congress during the present session: the Cuban question, the tariff, and the Panama canal. Judging from what we see and read in the American papers, the volume of talk will greatly exceed the amount of action from the assembled wisdom of the country.

An epidemic of crime seems to have been sweeping over Canada. At the present time Mrs. Stierman, the Union Advocate's head, is in Ontario for poisoning her husband. Lyman Darr is on trial at Toronto charged with the murder of a woman, and a pedlar, while four self-confessed murderers are awaiting trial in Quebec, their crimes involving the deaths of six persons. The record is not a pleasant one.

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At the commencement of the present month of December, the Union Advocate went under a new management. For the past thirty years, under the management of its late Editor, the Advocate was a consistent supporter of the Liberal-Conservative party. For this it gained nothing but a bitter political foe. From this time forward, it will take an independent political course, upholding what it considers to be the right and in the interests of the country and opposing those measures that it considers to be inimical to the property and advancement of the country.

With respect to the local affairs of Newcastle, it will do all it can to advance their interests, and we earnestly hope that its merchants and business men will extend to the same generous support in the future as they have done in the past. In the future we solicit a continuance of their advertising and job printing patronage which will enable us to make a number of improvements in the office which we deem necessary to turn out all classes of Job Work in the best and most improved styles.

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The Emmerson Banquet.

Our St. John exchanges are filled with reports of the splendid banquet at the banquet tendered by the friends of Premier Emmerson in that city on the 30th November.

There were about 1100 present. Among these were the Hon. Mr. Blair as well as all Mr. Emmerson's colleagues in the government, together with a large number of the friends of the Government from every quarter of the Province. The chairman was Dr. John Bryerman.

Letters of regret were read from Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Lieut.-Gov. McEwen and a number of others, their inability to be present.

After the toasts of the Queen, Governor General, Lieut.-Governor and United States President, the chairman proposed "Our host." The customary salute was given by a jolly good fellow and Hon. Mr. Emmerson got a very enthusiastic reception.

After thanking those present for the enthusiastic reception they had given him, Mr. Emmerson referred to the painful circumstances which necessitated a change in the New Brunswick government and paid a high tribute to the integrity and ability of Mr. Mitchell, the late Premier.

After some further commendations he said that the commercial enterprise of the Province and severely censured the action of a corrupt and unscrupulous political party.
