HARTLAND TO BE INCORPORATED

There was a large and enthusiastic attendance at the meeting of the "Booster's Club" in Pythian hall on Thursday evening last. S. S. Miller was in the chair, and, on motion, A. D. Colwell was appointed permanent secretary.

The advertising committee reported having seen Messrs. Stevens and Colwell in reference to a write-up to be published in The Observer and afterwards in pamphlet form.

M. L. Hayward reported that The Observer had a scheme for a special edition with a proper boom article, which would be illustrated. Action on this was deferred until the article had been written and submitted to the advertising committee.

From the committee on incorporation M. L. Hayward reported that there was no data available for use at that meeting, and stated that it rested with the people whether, under incorporation, the taxes would be higher or lower.

A general discussion followed, the trend of opinion being that with the town's taxes in its own hands for disbursement we would have better roads, sidewalks, etc., and in a short time a system of sewerage and electric lights.

On motion of M. L. Hayward, seconded by W. D. Keith, it was the opinion of the meeting that incorporation was advisable and that its accomplishment be proceeded with.

On motion of M. L. Hayward, seconded by Frank Hagerman, the committee on incorporation was authorized to proceed on the basis of the present school district, and report at a later meeting, when also a membership fee will be fixed for the Booster's Club.

Messrs. Hayward, Keith and E. C. Morgan were appointed as an incorporation committee.

Passing to the disposal of the machine gun fund now in the bank M. L. Hayward read the financial statement, which showed the sum of \$1,221.89 to the credit of the committee having the picnic in hand.

On motion of Dr. Curtis it was resolved that the tables, etc., on the picnic grounds be removed to the school grounds, the picnic committee to look after the matter.

M. L. Hayward explained the situation as regard machine guns and stated that the government favored building up the patriotic fund, on which there was now a severe drain.

On motion of J. T. G. Carr, seconded by E. C. Morgan, the secretary was instructed to write Hon. H. B. Ames for advice as to the disposal of the funds in hand; also that the outside members of the picnic committee be again notified to attend on Thursday evening, when the fund will finally be disposed of.

Adjournment was made until Thursday, Nov. 11.

WAR CONTRACTS GRAFTING MEANS GOVERNMENT'S DEFEAT

"The Ottawa Government intends to permit no more graft investigation and will endeavor to put the lid on tight in this respect. The exposures of graft of one kind or another in the various provinces have placed Tories in a decidedly bad light, particularly in war times," said Mr. F. B. Carvell, M.P. for Carleton, who was responsible for the revelations of Premier Flemming of New Brunswick and the unearthing of war supplies graft before the public accounts committee last session, to a Vancouver Sun reporter a few days ago. A deeper probe into the war materials would have been made had the public accounts committee had longer time in which to work, Mr. Carvell said, but as it was, the instances of graft unearthed extended to almost every sort of supplies needed for the military forces. As he expressed it, "they rolled up their sleeves and started after the fifty million dollars voted for war supplies." In the ten days in which the public accounts committee could get going well, the information which had been made public to date was all brought out, even to the McBride submarine suspicions, and had the government not prorogued parliament when it did other revelations could have been expected.

The result of the unearthing of such graft, Mr. Carvell asserts, has been a body blow to the Conservative-Nationalist government and the graft brought to light, and other things, means the certain overthrow of the government next election, no matter when it is brought on. With the possible exception of Ontario, every province will go Liberal.

The New Brunswick member thinks the government will try to compel an election but he believes that the same forces which protested, and thus prevented, the other two attempts, will prove strong again and the government will not dare bring on a contest during the war.

"It has been suggested," said Mr. Carvell, "that the government will demand an extension of the parliament term for three years, and if it is refused, will make the refusal a pretext to go to the country and to prevent further investigations into their conduct. Personally, I do not believe they will dare go to the country during the war. They tried twice before. They had an election staged for November, 1914, and one for June, 1915. Public sentiment was so strong they did not dare do it. Protests came from all over Canada. I have no doubt the same people, headed by Bob Rogers, will try for an election again, but it is my judgment that the forces which held them back before are twenty times stronger than at that time.

"But, no matter whether an election comes in December, in January, or two years hence, nothing awaits them but defeat. I do not believe there is a province except Ontario, in which the governments can get a majority and in Ontario its strength will be greatly reduced.

"The Prince Edward Island government was in power four years and had no sins to answer for such as have the respective cabinets of New Brunswick, Manitoba and British Columbia, and notwithstanding the unlimited use of whiskey and money, twenty-four votes properly placed, would put the Tory government out of power in the island.

"In Nova Scotia there are not

more than two fairly safe Conservative seats. New Brunswick will give a Liberal majority and the Conservatives themselves only claim fifteen seats as their possible maximum in Quebec.

"The abolition of the machine in Manitoba, the provision of clean election lists there, honest magistrates and impartial provincial police, will make the election of a single Tory in that province very problematical. Saskatchewan and Alberta will continue to remain solidly Liberal.

"Liberals cannot get less than twenty-five seats in Ontario and if they can remove the lid from the political pot in British Columbia, it would seem to the ordinary onlooker there can only be one result here.

"The day parliament prorogued Sir Robert Borden stated 'the doors of the penitentiary are yawning for these people who have been defrauding the government.' Since then Borden resigned and says he will be nominated again by the Tories of King's county, N. S. Garland confessed his guilt and resigned; Flemming has been driven from the premiership of New Brunswick and is the present Conservative-Nationalist candidate in Carleton. All these men are walking around as far away from the penitentiary as ever."

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Recruiting Meeting at Victoria

B. N. Shaw, in the capacity of chairman, opened a largely attended recruiting meeting in the U. B. church, Victoria, on Monday evening with a brief portrayal of conditions that made rapid recruiting imperative.

Fred Mooers, Woodstock then sang Rule Britannia with good effect, and the school children sang "The Maple Leaf Forever."

Geo. Balmain, the first speaker of the evening, introduced himself rather as a man of business experience than one of a public speaker. However he felt that the terrible conditions of world matters were sufficient excuse for any man taking hold and making an endeavor to do his "bit."

The speaker in making a direct appeal particularly to the young unmarried men stated that so far this class had not made the creditable average that it should. "Young men," he said, "don't you want to be in at the finish? Fathers and mothers give your boys the right encouragement and get them into the trenches and hurry along the grand finish."

Rev. A. S. Hazel spoke of the embarrassing position of a civilian speaker who could only say "go" and not "come", as one who had been to the front could do. He advanced the thought that young men should enlist with an idea to hurry the end of the terrible conflict. "This war," he continued, "is on behalf of the British Empire, and in case Germany wins the British Empire would of necessity be weakened to a deplorable extent. In any event the result of this struggle will entail great hardships, but with Germany predominating, what a terrible situation we would be in!" The brutal atrocities of the Teuton were graphically pictured and the speaker concluded with the assertion that the cause of the allies must be a winning one, because it was a cause that humanity could not lose.

Fred Mooers followed with a few well chosen remarks and rounded out a sensible and telling speech with a song at once appropriate and well rendered.

The presence of Lieut. W. B. Shaw, just from the trenches, was a pleasant feature of this meeting and the large number present were eager to meet the affable young Carleton county officer who comes to us with definite and vivid knowledge of war as it actually is.

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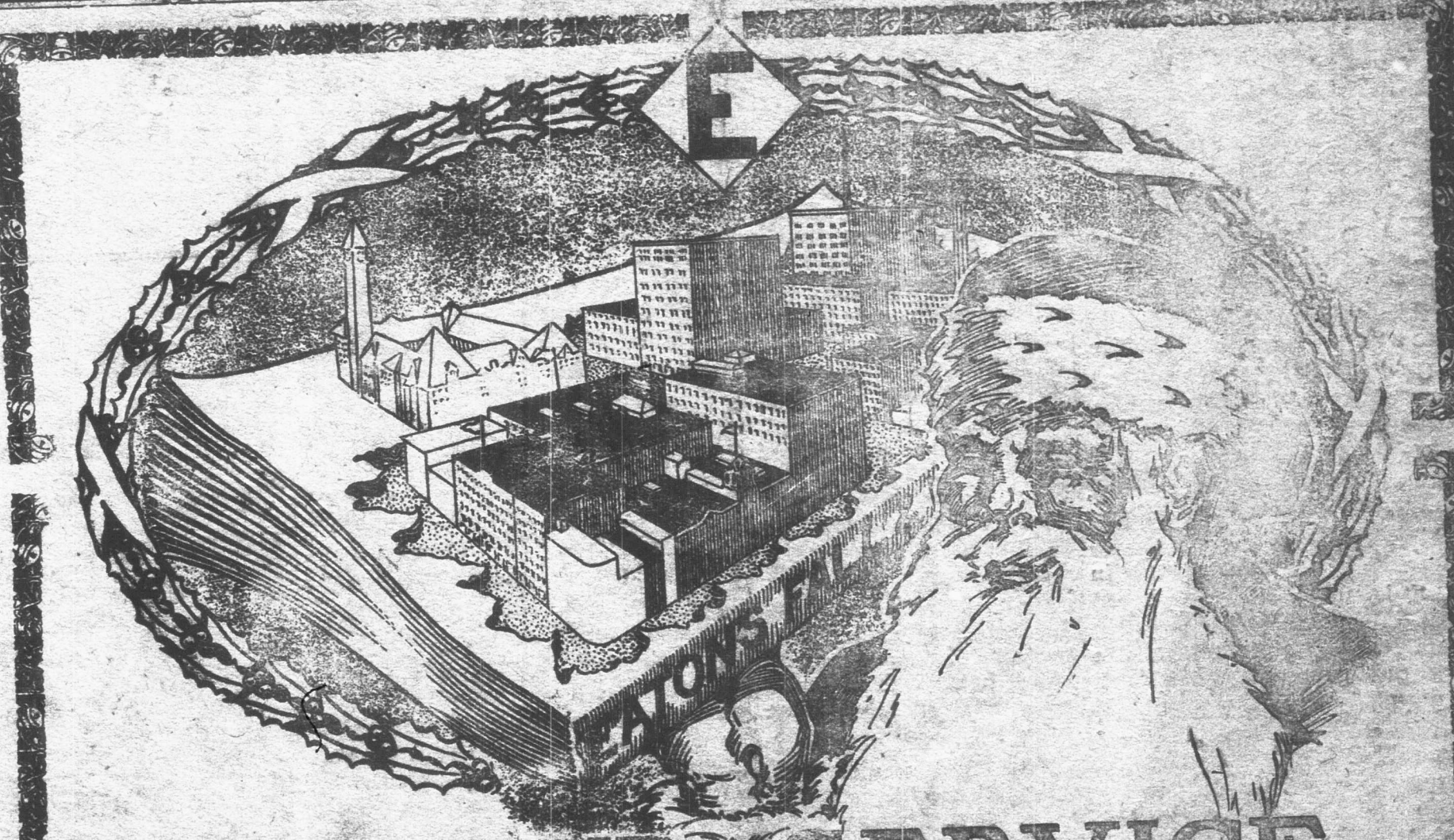
