#### N. B. Teachers' Association

A meeting of the executive of the N. B. T. A. was held in Fredericton on April 2 and 3. Rooms which have been unoccupied for years are being put into a habitable condition, though this is being effected under considerable difficulties, owing to a local strike in the building trade. Considerable additions were made to college buildings just before the war, notably at Emmanuel, Pembroke, King's Magdalene, and Sidney, but these are all proving inadequate. College officers have been touring the fown to obtain rooms ou' of college, and are still conducting their canvass, with indifferent success.

The University Lodging House Syndicate have been appealed to for help and have consented to grant licenses for rooms in houses situated within two and a half miles of Great St. Mary's Church, measur-

The effect of this concession will be to bring in wide areas which have hitherto been out of bounds for university lodging purposes. The collegate authorities are now trying again what can be dose, but it appears that even under these changed circumstances many hundreds of would-be Cambridge freshmen will be unable to obtain admission to the university this October.

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




