Should the voter be unable to read, he must take an oath to that effect. Then he will be accompanied by the presiding officer to the compartment, and in the presence of the candidates' representatives (who are sworn to secrecy), his ballot will be placed alongside the name of the candidate for whom the elector desires to vote.
