

GRAPHIC COMPARISON OF COSTS



The above interesting diagrammatic presentation of the percentage increase of costs of operation of the five principal public services of the city—the water, electric, police, fire and school departments, since 1912, is of special interest at the present time. In a study of the figures, it is necessary to appreciate that the figures for the two departments under the control of the public utilities commission, shown by shaded columns, are based on a perconsumer basis, while the other three departments, shown by black columns, are calculated upon a per-capita basis.

The greatest increase in the cost of operation is shown by the school department, the cost of which to the citizens of London has leaped upwards annually, till in 1920 it was nearly 125 per cent over that of 1912. The next two big increases are shown by the fire department, which in 1919 ran neck and neck with the schools to close on 100 per cent over the 1912 figures.

In connection with the two public utilities, water and electricity, the highest increases, in both cases about 23 per cent, were in the years 1914 and 1919. After dropping for two years, these departments showed a slight increase in 1920, when the figures were about 18 per cent over the 1912 standard.

Vienna. March 11.—Three reservations have been made by the Government of the Austrian Republic in accepting the Entente demand for the surrender of military material. 



Noting that three outstanding figures, Mr. Hughes as secretary of state, Mr. Hoover as secretary of commerce, and Mr. Wallace as secretary of agriculture, were chosen in the face of formidable opposition, the independent New York Weekly Review thinks that "the time has come when one may regard the charge that Mr. Harding was a mere puppet in the hands of the 'senatorial clique' as definitely disproved." New York, March 10.—A new use has been found for the talking machine. As an implement of warfare and a weapon of diplomacy it rivals the punch of Big Bertha and the wiles of Lloyd George. Such was the discovery made by six American relief workers besieged in the little town of Hadjin, Turkey, who arrived recently from the scene of the Turkish Nationalist uprising in Asia Minor.

When the Turkish troops occupied the hills surrounding Hadjin and opened fire on the little town, the Americans in the near east relief compound, just a mile out, raised the Stars and Stripes, and beside it was a white flag for neutrality, and hoped for the best. The worst happened. The Turkis fired. For a whole afternoon they proceeded to fire, and then made a call. Their call was in the nature of an occupation and it lasted for something over nine weeks. The Americans were ordered to give up all their firearms—which was easy, as they hadn't any. They had only "Arabella," the talking machine. Hears American Music.

\$2,085,000. They also left a legacy of unpaid debts incurred during ehe previous, year \$308,000 for the general election and we had to assume an obligation of \$460,000 to the teachers' superannuation fund, which had been ored by the retiring administration. In addition to this the cost of every-thing reached the highest peak in 1920. We had to pay about 15 per cent more for all supplies than was paid in 1919 and the cost of living rose in the same

Government.

"In 1919 the ordinary revenue, including the war tax was \$19,904,772 and in 1920 we raised a revenue of \$25,078,094, or an increase of \$5,173,322 over the receipts of 1919. Not one dollar of this money was levied in direct taxation upon the people. The bulk of the increased revenue was brought in by means of taxes on amusements, luxuries, corporations, estates passing at uries, corporations, estates passing at death and receipts from mines and

"The expenditure during the year increased from \$21,404,574, in 1919 to \$25,creased from \$21,404,574, In 1919 to \$25,580,843 in 1920. The actual increase was \$4,416,269 which was \$757,053 less than the increased revenue. We find that the result of the year's operations is a deficit of \$802,749.

is a deficit of \$802,749.

"Last year our capital expenditure reached a total figure of \$56,963,946.

Of that sum, however, \$22,313,208 was used to pay off maturing debts. We have, therefore, to account for the balance, which amounted to \$34,846,402. The greater portion of this was used in what may be described as self-sustaining investments. We advanced \$18,076,500 to the Hydro-Electric Commission to carry on works begun be-fore we assumed office and which must necessarily be completed in order that the investment already made may be made productive. We advanced to municipalities under the hous ing act, \$4,236,708, which comes mainly from a Dominion loan for housing pur-poses, and which will be repaid with interest. These two sums account for \$22,313,208 of our capital expenditure. Of the balance, \$10,882,296, we spent \$1,607,005 for Northern Ontario pur poses, which included advances for per-manent improvements of the Temiskaming & Northern Ontario Railway, for colonization roads and for northern and northwestern development.

For Returned Soldiers.

"The interests of returned soldiers called for a capital expenditure of \$445.-844. We provided \$655,000 for educaional buildings and \$910,000 for public pulldings. Our capital expenditure on highways was \$6,664,989, but of this sum \$1,500,000 was spent on behalf of the Dominion Government and will be returned to the province. 



In determining the number of circles in each section count the last circle in one section as the first in the next. 




