COLD COMFORT.

Fruitless Mission of Municipal Delegates to Ottawa.

Ontario Can Get Nothing for Hersel Alone-The Request of Her Repre-

OTTAWA, May 22.—About 150 delegates OTTAWA, May 22.—About 150 delegates from cities, towns, townships and counties of Ontario came here to ask the Government to recoup to them the railway bonuses granted prior to the adoption of the Dominion aid system. The delegation held a meeting and deputed Messrs. W. L. Walsh, Orangeville; Porter, Belleville; S. J. Parker, Owen Sound; J. Sissons, Sincoe, and Taylor, London, to address the Government on the questions they wished to discuss. Thomas Murray, M.P., Pembroke, and John McMillan, M.P., Huron, were appointed to put the arguments

At 3 o'clock the Railway Committee room of the House of Commons was crowded. There were 157 delegates, repre-senting over 100 municipalities. One hundred and forty municipalities are interested. The bonuses to railroads voted by them since Confederation amount to \$9,000,000. They were come to ask that those Ontario roads which had never re-

extent of the usual \$3,200 a mile, and that the sum thus ascertained be divided proportionately among the interested municipalities. Sir John A. Macdonald and Hon. C. E. Foster entered, and the delegates were introduced by Mr. White, M. P. for Cardwell.

Mayor Walsh, of Orangeville, reminded Sir John Macdonald that last session, when the subject was brought up by Mr. McMullen, of North Wellington, he had replied, "Let these municipalities bring up their case, and we will take it into consideration." In response to that invitation they had come will take it into consideration." In response to that invitation they had come down to present their case. Mr. Walsh informed the Ministers that at a time when railways were a necessity Ontario had, out of the pockets of her citizens, paid almost \$9,000,000 in bonuses before the Dominion had adopted a policy of assisting railway construction. They thought, therefore, they were entitled to the same consideration from the Dominion in respect to these roads as if they were being constructed now. The Government, he said, should grant \$3,200 a mile to the roads in Ontario which had never received Dominion aid, and the gross sum so arrived at should be which had never received Dominion aid, and the gross sum so arrived at should be divided among the municipalities granting bonuses, in proportion to the amount of bonuses granted by them. The Dominion had voted in bonuses, exclusive of the C. P. R. and Intercolonial, over \$20,000,000, of

R. and Intercolonial, over \$22,000,000, of which Ontario only received \$2,893,000.

S. J. Parker, of the county of Grey, said they had granted \$264,000 to the Toronto, Grey and Bruce Railway, which had become incorporated with the C. P. R.

Mayor Porter, of Belleville, set forth the osition of that city and adjoining muni-ipalities with reference to the Grand Junc-

cipalities with reference to the Grand Junction Railway.

Mayor Taylor, of London, represented that his city and the county of Middlesex were deeply interested.

Warden Sissons, of Simcoe, told Sir John that they had paid in the neighborhood of \$1,000,000 in railway bonuses, and had received little benefit, because of Dominion legislation. Ontario paid most of the taxes and had most at stake, and the Dominion policy of aiding railways should extend to

to one Frovince. He went on to tell them they should have come down before the ses-sion opened, but, like most pecuniary claims, they were pressed when Parlia-ment was sitting. "We cannot at all undertake," Sir John continued, "to give this our immediate consideration, but we

this our immediate consideration, but we will give it our consideration, and deal with it if we can do so consistently with the prestige and credit of the Dominion. There is not the slightest chance of members representing other Provinces voting 6d to any Ontario municipality unless the same thing is granted to other parts of the Dominion in the same position. Mr. Foster repeated the formula that for herself alone Ontario could get nothing. It was an important question as Ontario had 2,000 miles of railway which had never received Dominion aid, which, at \$3,200 a received Dominion aid, which, at \$3,200 a mile would mean over \$6,000,000. mile would mean over \$6,000,000. He was, however, prepared to consider the subject, always provided it was applied to other Provinces and not confined to Ontario.

Originally the measure applied £30,000,000 advanced from the Imperial Exchequer on the lines of the Ashbourne Act, to enable the transfer of larger holdings to the advantage of the great landlords and well-to-do farmers. Mr. Balfour's new clause at first proposed that the greater part of the purchase money Mr. Balfour's new clause at first proposed that the greater part of the purchase money be advanced on holdings under £30. Mr. Parnell estimated that the alteration would enable 150,000 tenants to come under the provisions of the bill who would otherwise have been excluded. NO RELIEF FROM OTTAWA. Mayor Taylor and his fellow-delegates to Ottawa on the railway bonusing question have received cold comfort from Sir John Macdonald. Briefly stated, they requested that a policy of fair play should guide the distribution of bonuses to railway lines. London, for example, gave a bonus to the London, Huron and Bruce Railway of \$100,-000. Neighboring municipalities also gave Then other municipalities in the Province followed suit. they have done this, the Dominion Government has bonused new lines in other Provinces out of all proportion to the bonuses recently granted to railways in Ontario. The Government's own return, brought down last session, showed the sums voted to the four chief Provinces, including the expenditures on the main lines of the Intercolonial and Canadian ific, were as follows:

New Brunswick, \$4,262,072, Nova Scotia, \$8,936,883. Quebec, \$7,948,667. Ontario, \$1,970,000.

The demand of the enterprising Ontari municipalities in that they shall be recouped the sums they expended on railways built without Dominion aid. If that were done they would but start even with the people of the other Provinces, who have not put their hands in their but have their railways bonused by the Ottawa authorities out of money the greater portion of which is paid into the treasury by Ontario. GROCERS AND CREDIT.

London grocers take a proper step when they resolve, as far as possible, to curtail the credit system. Very few people ever need credit for food supplies. It is simply a badlhabit which householders get into, and like all bad habits it grows by cultivation. Traders suffer by it, and only exer cise proper precaution when they take ans to combat it, but the cash-paying customer is also a loser, while the per sistent receiver of credit too often, unin tentionally, degenerates into the deadbeat Thus the system is an evil no matter how it is taken. Mr. Gladstone, writing recently to a dealer who asked for his opinion on the subject, said:

"I do not hesitate to say that, in my judgment, the system of dealing upon long sredit, which so widely prevails in London, has every fault which a system of trade can have, and no merit whatever to redeem it. Every trader who deals for ready money, I hope, serves himself, and most certainly confers a great born upon the public."

THE PROHIBITION SHUFFLE. It was made apparent by the shufflin attitude of the Conservative members a Ottawa yesterday that they desire, if possible, not to have a straight, open above-board declaration on the question of prohibition of the liquor traffic. The Conservative whips ranged their supporters or the side of a motion for the adjournment of the debate, though the hour was early, and though not one member of the Government had exhibited enough courage to say a word on the subject. There sat Mr. Foster, erstwhile the prohibition leader, but the sweets of office were too dear to him, and ne preferred to play the game of the tillers and brewers who have the ear of the Administration, to that of the independent

members of Parliament who are pledged by their constituents to promote tempernce views by every means in their power The argument of those who were opposed o prohibition was that the country was no ready for the change, and that an educa-tive campaign should now be under-To forward this, the shirkers proposed the appointment of a select committee of the House, the principal duty of which was stated to be the devising of ways to make up the revenues now derived from liquor-making. Not a single Minister was placed on this make-shift committee

object was most transparent. The Finance Minister, in former days, again and again proved that the alleged loss of revenue was no bugbear to him, yet it was not proposed that he should grace the com mittee with his presence, and he sat like a mummy while this view of the matter was impressed upon the House by Mr.

The Liberals to a man voted for the fair assion and disposal of the subject, defeated the Government on one motion to adjourn, and came near to defeating it on the second motion to lay the question away indefinitely, only eighteen majority being recorded for that view.

Mr. Mills and others favored the refer ence of the question to a plebiscite of the people, not five years from now, or at some ar away time, as indicated in the resolution put up from the Conservative side, but at as early a date as possible. That is the proper course. If the House refuses to affirm itself favorable to prohibition now, it should at least be prepared to give the people the earliest opportunity to instruct it as to its desires. Some members have already received their instructions. There are others like Mr. Coatsworth, who need to hear the public voice calling more loudly than the party leader's coxing tones, and they should be given a chance. Mr. Charlton's motion should become the finding of Parliament.



The first thing which impresses me in reading this account is the simple truthfulness of the historian. He is not a misanthrope. He does not wish to depreciate his nation. But he is not a sulogist. A Jew, writing of Jews, possessed, presumptively, of all the pride of the proudest nation on the face of the globe, he abates not one jot or tittle of the just condemnation which the misdeeds of his nation merit; extenuates nothing; utters no condemnation of the attacking and enslaving Assyrians. Does ancient history afford any other illustration of an annalist so fair, so impartial, so severe in his judgments of his own people? Does even modern history? Individual men and individual epochs have been condemned, but I do not recall in ancient or modern literature the parallel to the historical books of the Bible in this respect. The impartiality of the historians is one of the incidental and not insignificant evidences of their divine inspiration; of the fact that they were actuated by a spirit higher than their own, that enabled them to see and to write in the light of God's truth.

In this account it seems to me easy to trace some lessons illustrated in other histories than that of Israel; pre-eminently the truth that is a right theology—a right conception, that is, of God and of his government and law—really underlies the welfare of the State and the community, and so the temporal as well as the eternal welfare of the individual.

This was the beginning of their degeneracy; just as the creeping in of image-worship into the primitive church was the commencement of the corruption which made the middle ages also dark ages; justs as the Mahometan conception of God as a being only of might and of narrow-minded partiality has made the Mahometan religion always one of cruelty and hardness. A traveler newly returned from the Pacific Ocean tells pleasant stories of the Patagonians. As the steamer he was in was passing through Magellan's Straits some natives came out to her in boats. They wore no clothes at all, though there was snow in the air. A baby that came along with them made some demonstration that displeased its mother, who took it by thefoot, as Thetis took Achilles, and soused it over the side of the-boat into the cold seawater. When she pulled it in, it lay a moment whimpering in the bottom of the boat, and then curled up and went to sleep. The missionaries there have tried to teach the natives to wear clothes, and to sleep in the natives to wear clothes, and to sleep in the natives to wear clothes, and to steep in huts; but, so far, the traveler says, with very limited success. The most shelter a Patsgonian can endure is a little heap of rocks, or a log to the windward of him; as for clothes, he despises them, and he is in-

To many of us, groaning under the oppression of modern conveniences, it seems lamentably meddlesome to undermine the pression in meddlesome to undermine the simplicity of such people, and enervate them with the luxuries of civilization. To be able to sleep out-of-doors, and go naked, and take sea-baths on wintry days with impunity, would seem a most alluring emancipation. No rent to pay, no tailor, no plumber, no newspaper to be read on pain of getting behind the times; no regularity in anything, not even meals; nothing to do except to find food, and no expenses for undertakers or physicians, even if we fail; what a fine, untrammeled life it would be! It takes occasional contact with such people as the Patagonians to with such people as the Patagonians to keep us in mind that civilization is the

with such sections and that elvilization is the mere cultivation of our wants, and that the higher it is the more our necessities are multiplied, until, if we are rich enough, we get enervated by luxury, and the young men come in and carry us out.

We want so many, many things; it seems a pity that those simple Patagonians could not send missionaries to us to show us how to do without. Must the wants of the body—shelter, clothing and food—be cultivated first, before the capacities of the soul can be developed and gratified? Doubtless the missionaries know their business, and are going about it the right way; yet and are going about it the right way; yet all the same it seems odd that the rudiall the same it seems odd that the rudi-ments of a taste for brown-stone fronts and brocade and terrapin should be cultivated as a fit preliminary to Christianity. Count Tolstoi is the man for the Patagonians. Their attitude toward luxury seems to be almost identical with his, and they would have scarcely anything to unlearn before accepting his teaching.

On one occasion one of his officers proposed to tell an indecent story, and prefaced his attempt by the remark: "I believe there are no ladies present—" General Grant at once interposed these memorable words: "No, sir, but there are gentlemen present!" and did it in such a toae of disapproval that the story remained untold. Reverence for God in not allowing his holy name to be blasphemed, and reverence for human purity in thought and language always marks an exalted soul. Profanity is really as vulgar and ill-bred, betraying a lack of a true gentlemen, as it is sinful. No man who respects himself or has a due regard for the sentiments of refined and oultured people will descend to the utterance of oaths. Our Lord said, "By their fruits shall we know them," and the fruit of a man's lips reveal the nature of the mind and heart out of which it comes.







Bark Louse and Pear Tree Slug. Professor Panton, of the Agricultural College, Guelph, Bulletin No. 52, suggests the following remedies for the oyster shell bark louse which is found on the apple tree

Examine infested trees carefully during May and the beginning of June, and as soon as the tiny lice are seen crawling about spray the tree with the following about spray of the control of th about spray the tree with the following kerosene emulsion: One-half pound of hard soap in one gallon of boiling water; to this add two gallons coal oil and thoroughly mix. This on cooling, if well mixed, will form a jelly-like substance. When about to use, add nine parts cold water and spray upon the trees. Thorough mixing can be effected by forcing the mixture through a force pump with a small nozzle until the whole forms a greamy mass.

2. In the winter and spring scrape off the trunk and larger tranches as many of the scales as possible, and then thoroughly scrab, with a scrubbing-brush or broom dipped in the following solution: One quart of soft soap, or one-quarter pound hard joap, in two quarts of boiling water. To seven parts of this add one part of crude carbolic acid.

3. Soft soap made about as thick as paint by adding a strong solution of washing whole forms a creamy mass.


