a dying condition. As they heard the roar of the hurricane some of them actually died of fright. The terrible noise of the approaching storm was followed by the storm itself, which crushed in a large part of the cholera hospital like an eggshell, hurling the beds and wooden walls into a mass of ruin. From the debris came the shricks and groans of the victims, a number of whom died while the work of rescue was going on.

Other buildings were also crushed, and the tents of the traders who had remained, notwithstanding the cholera, were scattered, with their contents, in all directions. The wretched people of Novgorod have had all the courage driven out of them by this latest visitation, and many of the superstitious declared that the Almighty had determined to destroy the city on account of the wickedness of the people. Those who could fly have deserted the place, while the people who remain can be seen in crowds at the shrines and in the churches praying for the mercy of heaven.

The cholera epidemic appears now to be assuming a milder character throughout the affected region. A telegram from Nijni Novgorod received by the Nevosti states that the number of patients there is decreasing rather than growing, while the convalescents are more numerous. Prof. Anrep, who was sent to report upon the outbreak, declares that the cholera has generally appeared in a mild form, and is each day becoming less malignant.

### "I'M THE MURDERER!"

Charles Peckham States He Did the Deed "Out of Pure Love for Bleed."

FALL RIVER, Mass., Aug. 18.—Charles H. Peckham, of Central Village, Westport Mass., walked into the central police station this morning and said to Assistant Marshal Fleet:

"Well Mr. Marshal, I killed Mr. and Mrs. Andrew J. Borden, and I have come from home to give myself up. I went over the back fence and through the rear door of the Borden house two weeks ago to-day and killed both of these people out of pure LOVE FOR BLOOD.

I went out the rear door and over the back fence and I walked over the New Bedford road home. I'm the murderer and I want to be locked up."

THE WEST SHORE MEN STRIKE.

BUFFALO, N. Y., Aug. 17.—The day shift of the West Shore switchmen struck this morning. Their demands are similar to those of the Central men. The day force of the Central are out as well as the night men. This is the opening day of the fair, and every road coming into the Union depot has fromone to five specials scheduled. There seems little doubt that a strike among the lecomotive firemen is imminent. The firemen are said to be in sympathy with the switchmen, and if the firemen strike the engineers will refuse to go out with green firemen. Two THOUSAND MILITIA ON GUARD.

The Fourth Brigade New York National Guard, numbering 2,000 men, are on duty here.

A DEMAND FOR MORE SOLDIERS.

After consulting with prominent railroad officials here, including Vice-President Webb, of the Central, Sheriff Beck decided to call on the Government for the entire National Guard of this State. It is said that this call is based on information that a strike of trainmen in sympathy with the the switchmen is impending.

GETTING TROOPS TO BUFFALO.

BUFFALO, N. Y., Aug. 18.—The Lake Shore and West Shore switchmen went out at midnight. The Nickel Plate and Lackawanna switchmen were expected to go out at daybreak, but are still at work.

Governor Fowler has ordered all the troops in the State (over 13,000 in all), to Buffalo on the call of the sheriff and Mayor Bishop. Regulars on Governor's Island are under orders awaiting a call here. Troops are being mobilized at Poughkeepsie, Brooklyn, Albany and New York. Soon Buffalo will be little more than a huge barracks. The cost will be something enormous, but it is deemed better to adopt this course now rather than take chances later.

TROOPS ROUTED BY MINERS. NASHVILLE, Tenn., Aug. 17.—A telegram fight at Oliver Springs between the troops and miners the former were forced to retreat, and now have 200 convicts bringing them to this race.

A late dispatch says: About 1,700 miners attacked the stockade at Oliver Springs last night, overpowered the guards and zent the convicts to Knoxville, from which place they were brought to this city.

A BIG CALL FOR TROOPS.

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Aug. 18.—Late last night, after consultation with Adjutant-General Norman and his attorneys, Gov. Buchanan ordered all the organized militia in the State to the scene of the tromble in the mining regions. He then made requisitions on the sheriffs of Davidson, Palmer and Knox counties for possess of 1,000 men cach, and to the sheriffs of Anderson, Roane, Morgan and Marion for 500 men or more if they can raise them. The penalty for any sheriff refusing to obey this order is a term of imprisonment and a fine. All the troops will mass at Chatanooga this morning. The brigadier-general will command them. They will proceed at once to Knoxville and from there to Coal Creek. The possess armed themselves with all sorts of pistols and guns. Nancy Hanks Assumes the Preud Pre-Eminence, Having Trotted a Mile in 2:67 1-4.

Chicago, Ill., Aug. 17.—Maud S. is no longer queen of the trotting turf. The position which she has held so long has been wrested from her, and Nancy Hanks reigns in her stead.

This alternoon at Washington Park in the presence of 10,000 spectators Budd Doble drove his mare to beat her record of 2:09. She not only beat her own record, but lowered the world's trotting record from 2:08\frac{3}{2}—the time of Maud S.—to 2:07\frac{1}{2}.

The track was a trifle dusty in places, but as fast as it could well be. The mare was in excellent condition. There was nothing to prevent her from doing her best. The official time for the mile, which was as honest a mile as was ever trotted, is 31\hat{1}.103\hat{2}, 1:36\hat{3}, 2:07\hat{4}. The last quarter was trotted in 30\hat{2} seconds.

At the end of her great exploit the mare did not appear disturbed in the least degree. She had finished fresh and strong. Doble weighed 150 pounds and the suiky 62 pounds. Nancy is a bay, 6 years old, 15\hat{2} hands high. She was sired by Happy Medium out of a Dictator mare.

The School Question in the Northwest. Winnipeg, Aug. 17.—In the Northwest Assembly at Regina Monday night, Mr. Mowat moved the second reading of the School Bill. He explained that it replaces the board of education with a council of public instruction, composed of the executive committee, that it is modeled mainly on the British Columbia Act, recognizing only the English language, bars clergymen from holding office as trustees, teachers or inspectors, provides for uniform text-books for all schools, and introduces kindergarten and night schools. The bill passed its second reading 15 to 8.

Boware of Summer Colds.

"Beware of Summer Colds." warns a physician. The moment the surrounding air becomes cooler than the skin, as it often will when the dew falls or after a sudden rainstorm, it steals heat from the body which is needed. A fresh supply must be had, and this taxation of the system in a delicate person, or even in strong one, sometimes brings about a local congestion or 'cold,' all of which might have been prevented with woolen underclothing, however light and fine."

The Cow Horn Fly.

To the Editor of the ADVERTISER:

I read your report on the "Cow Horn Fly' this week; also Mr. Brodie's appeal, and as the first was of great benefit to me from its informing me what the new swarms of flies on my cows' horns and shoulders, meant, I hope to help the second by my experience. Acting at once on the suggestions, I made an ointment consisting of a pound of lard, a tablespoonful of insect powder, and a small teaspoonful of rende carbolic acid, thoroughly mixed, and immediately applied it to the horns, shoulders and other parts inaccessible to the cow, rubbing well into the skin and hair so the animals should not get the stuff on the tongue where the ointment was accessible, and the effect was magical. The poor creatures have peace and comfort once more, and began grazing in a half-starved manner, as the torment of this new pest had prevented them feeding properly and thus caused them to lose flesh and milk, making an added worry to the aiready troubled farmer, who watches the rainy harvest with gloomy eyes. I hope my experience may help fellow-sufferers, and if we also sprinkle some strong lime or like material on the manure of these tormented animals, thus destroying insect eggs, we may, perhaps, nearly exterminate the pest. They are all over our fair Province, and no doubt many like me air Province, and no doubt many like me air ewondering why the cows get poor and fail so in milk, when the frequentrains keep the grass better than for years. FISHERY BOUNTY FRAUDS.

How the Bounties Were Distributed—Charges of Boodling in Cape Breton.

HALIFAX, N.S., Aug. 18.—The Chronicle publishes an expose of the fishery bounty frauds in Victoria county, B.C. In one section, where about 60 fishing boats could come in under the act, no less than 170 boats drew bounties.

It has been ascertained that in the vicinity of Grand Harrows ten persons who never lived in the country drew bounties, that three persons who had been dead for some years drew bounties, and that bounties were drawn in the names of four persons who never applied for or received them.

Peter McNeil, Iona Rear, drew bounties, though the only person of that name known is a boy 10 years of age, and the bounty was drawn in the name of Alex. McNeil, who left the country five years ago.

An investigation was ordered in May last into these senadels, and a day was actually fixed and people summoned to attend the Fishery Court, by Mr. Bertram, fishery overseer for Cape Breton. On receipt of a telegram from somewhere the investigation was summarily dropped, and Mr. John R. Macdonald, M. P. for Victoria, hurried down from Ottawa to fix up things. A hole-and-corner meeting was held and strenuous efforts made to hush up the scandal. The Chronicle's investigation has let in some light on the affair which will create a sensation. There is said to be more to follow.


