London, July 23 .- The trial of the action for divorce brought by John R. Rogers against his wife, Minnie Palmer, the actress, was resumed in divorce division of High Court of Justice today. Miss Palmer was called to the witness stand. She testified that she and her husband were American citizens. They were not domiciled in England, but were wanderers, living in hotels. She had quarreled with her husband in 1890 while she was living with him in & Gramercy Park, N. Y. As the result of the quarrel she left her husband and went to live with her mother. When she left her husband she assigned to him her furniture, half her diamonds and her carriage for the consideration of £300. She also gave him 25 per cent of her earnings from certain plays. She thought she had got rid of him cheaply. She said she left the Gramercy Park house because her husband one night while he was drunk tried to cut her throat. She came to England in 1891, and Rogers followed her. She foolishly consented to live with him again, but at the end of 1891 he left her. Subsequently he had tried to make up with per, but she declared to him that she never would be reconciled to him again, but would apply for a divorce.

John R. Rogers, the respondent, testified that his flat in the Marlborough mansion in London was taken as a permanent residence. His motto, he said, was "America for money; England for home." His flat in Gramercy Park, New York, was a mere speculation which had proven unsuccessful. The court adjourned after

Rogers' testimony.

The Oriental Warcloud. LONDON, July 23 .-- The Central News says it has been learned from a high source in London that the relations between China and Japan have grown much more serious within the last 48 hours. Japan insists emphatically upon certain reforms of Corea's internal administration, while China resists Japan's demands with equal desermination. Under no circumstances will China allow Japan's claim of the right to intertere. The Earl of Kimberley, Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, hed a long conference today with the inese and Japanese Ministers. He urged upon each the great need of

countries. His representations, while received with great courtesy and expressions of satisfaction by both ministers, failed to elicit an affirmative response from either of

The Central News received this dispatch from Shanghai this evening: "The telegraph between Pekin and Shanghai has been restored. The rumor that war has been declared is denied officially, but there seems to be no hope of a pacific settlement. Apparently war can be averted only by the interference of European powers to protect their commerce and the lives of their subjects from the injury which Japan's action threatens to cause them. It has been reported that Japanese gunboats have been bombarding the Corean coast towns." BERLIN, July 23.—The Vossische

Zeitung expresses confidence in the belief that Japan will be backed up by the European powers in her dispute with China. War between the two countries, the Zeitung predicts, will inevitably result in the extinction of Corea as a State. In view of the increasing complications, the German gunboat Wolf has been ordered to sail north to Che Foo, which is directly east of Seoul.

General Secretary rear. Hayes says the committee is in favor of asking a boycott on every Chicago newspaper advertiser who patronizes Pullman.

The 400 employes of the Duluth Manufacturing Company at West Duluth, which makes all kinds of freight cars, struck this morning. The company has been paying the men only a small portion of their wages, giving the difficulty of making collections as an excuse. The men are all heavily in debt and can get no further credit. The company has several good sized orders on hand.

CHICAGO, Ill., July 23 .- The hearing of

the contempt proceedings against President Debs, Vice-President Howard, Secretary Keliher and Director Rogers, of the American Railway Union, was the special order in the United States Circuit Court today. Defendants denied every allegation made against them, and insisted that they had in no way placed themselves in contempt of court. Debs and his associates, in fact, claimed to have no knowledge of the telegrams which it is charged they sent, with one exception. They approval of the men interested. ## LONDONERS IN A GALE.

A Yachting Party's Experience in a Lake Erie Storm.

Newspaper Accounts Exaggerated\_Dr. Hutchinson Tells What Really Did Happen-Three of the Collegiate Institute Staff in the Party.

A Chatham dispatch says: "Particulars of the saving of a yacht and all on board from going down in Lake Erie's depths came to hand tonight. The vessel was one sailed by a London gentleman, Mr. J. W. Merchant. It was making the trip from Loraine to Port Stanley on Friday night, when she encountered a squall, and had to take in every stitch of canvas. The tug Juno found the little craft under bare poles in the trough of the sea, and drifting for the shore, where she would have gone to pieces in the gale. She towed the luckless yacht into Rond Eau harbor. The only one of the party, besides the captain, whose name could be learned, was

Dr. Hutchinson, of London. Dr. Hutchinson returned from the Eau on Saturday afternoon. He was shown the above item by an ADVERTISER reporter this morning and was not a little amused at the serious aspect placed upon the affair.

"The account is greatly exaggerated,' he told the reporter. "That is sheer nonsense." Then he stated the case as it a pleasant visit with friends in Forest and really was. It appears that Dr. Hutchinson, medical health officer, Principal Merchant, R. A. Gray and C. B. Edwards, of the Collegiate Institute staff here, Mr. Robert Robertson, of Ingersoll, and John Somerville, Owen Sound, left the latter place on July 9 for a 600-mile voyage on the sailing yacht Anemonane. Principal Merchant was skipper and the party had a jolly time in Lake Huron, the River and Lake St. Clair and the Detroit River, sail-

ing, fishing and shooting.
"On Friday last," said the doctor, "we encountered a gale in Lake Erie. We were making for Port Stanley and were about twenty miles off Rond Eau. The gale kept increasing in violence, and everyting in sight was putting for the shelter of the Eau. At 5 o'clock we had to take all sail in, and we were preparing to throw out a sea anchor or rig up a storm trysail to keep the vessel's head on and endeavor to weather the gale. Then the Juno hove in sight, and, although her destination was Port Stanley, she was running for the Eau. She kindly offered us a tow and we accepted."

"We were not in any danger of being lost at all," added the doctor. "And we had plenty of good sailors on board. If the worst had come we could have put for the American side."

Dr. Hutchinson and Mr. Edwards left the party at the Eau, the former to resume his duties here, and Mr. Edwards to meet his wife at Dutton. The rest of the party went on to Port Dover.

A Greenland Exploring Party Come to Grief-May Try It Again. St. Johns, Nfld., July 24.—The steamer Miranda, Capt. Farrell, carrying the Cook Arctic expedition to Greenland, consisting of 54 persons, professors, scientists, university students and others, for the purpose of exploring West Greenland, which left there

Sunday, July 15, returned here this morn-

ing, having collided with an iceberg at the entrance of the Straits of Belle Isle. The accident occurred at 8 o'clock Tuesday morning last, when the ship was about eight miles north of Belle Isle, during a thick fog. The ship was going at full speed. Suddenly a huge iceberg was sighted by the seamen on watch. Engines were reversed and the speed of the ship was partly checked just as she struck the iceberg. She struck with her bow and the force of the collision drove in three plates on the starboard bow, destroyed about twenty feet of her deck rail and completely smashed the hawser pipe, rendering the starboard anchor helpless. The captain decided that it was not safe to venture farther north with only one anchor. Some of the passengers contemplate abandoning the trip, and will return to New York. The great majority, however, will continue the voyage.

Close of the Jourth Session of the Seventh Deminion Parliament.

(Special to the ADVERTISER.) OTTAWA, July 23 .- When the House assembled today the Premier, Mr. Foster, Mr. Costigan, Sir Adolphe Caron and half a dezen supporters represented the Conservatives. The Opposition was represented by one solitary member, Devlin, of Ottawa county.

Mr. Speaker went through the form of ealling for petitions, motions and orders of

the day. The clerk at the table produced one petition praying that the Insolvency Bill may not become law. This superfluous prayer caused a smile of amusement to cross the face of the Premier, and some cried carried.

Messages from the Senate agreeing with the royal address of congratulation were received, and the Speaker left the chair until 3 o'clock, at which hour the House reassembled, and on receiving the summons of Black Rod proceeded to the Senate Chamber, where his Excellency was seated on the throne.

After assenting to all the bills passed during the session save one (respecting the Speaker of the Senate, which was reserved for the signification of her Majesty's pleasure) the Governor-General prorogued Parliament by delivering the following SPEECH FROM THE THRONE.

Honorable Gentlemen of the Senate, Gentlemen of the House of Commons: In bring to a conclusion this laborious session of Parliament I have to thank you for the assiduity and zeal with which you have attended the various matters which have been brought before you.

I congratulate you upon the notable fact that the invitation which my Government extended to the governments of the other colonies to send representatives to Canada to confer on matters affecting their mutual interests was so promptly accepted, and that her Majesty's Government also enhanced the dignity and usefulness of the conference by sending a representative to assist at its deliberations. It is confidently hoped that the results of the conference will be found beneficial to the colonies and

to the empire generally. The ratification of the treaty of commerce with France will lead, I hope, to a large increase in our exports and an exten-



#### LONDON AND THE CENSUS FRAUDS.

A week or two after the member for Bothwell called Sir John Thompson's attention to the fact that the London return had not yet been brought down. Once more it was promised. Parliament has been prorogued, and the return, which could have been compiled by a fairly expert clerk, such as crowd the Ottawa offices, in half a day, was not presented. Why this suppression? Is the return an honest one? Will it bear the light of day? If so, surely it should have been laid on the table over a year ago.

THE DECREASE IN IMMIGRATION. Returns of emigration from Great Britain, made up by the British Board of Trade, show a remarkable decrease in departures the end drew near peacefully and painably the malady from which Sir John from that country for the six months ending on June 30 last. The departures from British ports to Canada numbered 12,846, as against 34,273 in the first half of 1893, or a decline of 62 per cent. No other country receiving European emigrants shows quite so large a decrease. In all 96,377 emigrants left British ports during the past six months, and that represents a falling away of 47 per cent. Of these 65,033 went to the United States, a decrease of 48 per cent; 4,376 to Australasia, a decrease of 11 per cent; 7,789 to the Cape of Good Hope and Natal, an increase of 18 per cent, and 6,335 to "other places," a decrease of 16 per cent. South Africa alone has secured more emigrants than last year, a fact due to the attractions of the new country opened up in the interior of the African continent. Australasia comes next, with a decline of only 11 per cent, and here again gold discoveries have no doubt had their influence; the United States third, and a decline of 48 per cent, had been stuffed, in order to buttress the and Canada last, with a decline of 62 per

#### THE PROSPECTS.

Farmers in Western Ontario are far advanced in the work of saving their cereal crops. With few exceptions their entire crop of hay was harvested some time ago. The quantity is not as great as last year, but owing to the more favorable season it is much better in quality.

The crop of wheat is a fair average. A good deal of it was saved in excellent shape before the fall of rain on Tuesday, and what is out will not be harmed by the wet. as it was in fine, ripe condition. Farmers do no grow much barley in this district, but what there is of ait is this year good. Oats are an excellent yield, except on light lands, where they have suffered from drought, or where sown late in the season. The corn area of the West increases in size yearly as the dairy business develops. Corn has suffered but it will be much revived by the rain and may yet

prove a fair crop. Roots have suffered through the lack of rain. Up to Tuesday night but a few light showers have fallen in this district for the last six weeks, and turnips and potatoes have both been set back. Farmers with potatoes on dry lands almost despaired of a

night downpour of Tuesday came. Pasture has suffered more from the dry weather than anything else. The effect has been to cut down the supply of milk, increasing the price of butter, and curtailing the output of cheese. A good many farmers have been compelled to feed their cows with green food. 

DEADLY DUEL Between Kentuckians on a Railway

There's nothing doubtful about it. It is as sure as any other business transaction. The funny part of it is that it is generally given less attention than any other department of a business.

The contract once made and the space decided upon, the advertiser's interest seems to die. Even a neglected ad. in a good paper will do some good in spite of the advertiser's apathy. A good advertisement will always bring profitable returns if it is placed in a paper whose price for space is based on an honest circulation.

HENRY YATES DEAD,

Demise of a Noted Engineer and Inventor at Brantford.

BRANTFORD, July 22 .- Henry Yates, the eminent engineer, inventor and contractor, died here this evening, aged 74. He was born in England, and when a young man was engaged in the construction of the Paris and Rouen Railway, remaining there until 1846. On his return to England he was engaged in the service of the London and Southwestern Railway until 1853. At this period he was engaged by the late C. J. Brydges, the then managing director of the Great Western Railway of Canada, to proceed to Canada as chief mechanical engineer of that line. In 1857 he entered into an agreement with the late Capt. Barlow, who was sent by the English directors, to complete the Buffalo and Lake Huron Railway from Goderich to Buffalo. In 1861 Mr. Yates was offered and accepted the position of chief engineer of the whole of the Grand Trunk Railway system of Canada, which position he held until 1866. He was afterwards engaged on various large contracts for the Grand Trunk Railway, the Michigan Air Line having been constructed under his supervision. He amassed a fortune.

Sensation at a Wedding in Montreal. MONTREAL, July 23. - A sensational scene took place at St. Patrick's Roman Catholic Church this morning. The marriage was being celebrated of two young Irish people, John Riley and Maggie Baker. The young man's family objected to the marriage, and after the ceremony, as the couple were leaving the church, one of Riley's sisters appeared on the scene, and with shrieks caught hold of the bride and endeavored to stop her. After considerable difficulty she was taken away, and the couple hurriedly left. The scene created quite a sensation I is the seighborhood.




