JAPAN AND COREA. London, Nov. 5 .- Regarding the offi-

cial statement from the Japanese Government, as to the position of Japan towards Corea, which has been communicated to Secretary Olney, according to dispatches from Washington, by the Japanese Minister there, Mr. Kurino, it is authoritatively explained that after the evacuation of the Liao Tung peninsula some Japanese troops will be left in Corea in order to protect the Japanese and maintain order. From this it is inferred that Japan may pursue the same course in Corea as Great Britain is pursuing in Egypt.

The German official papers, when they mention England at all, do so slightingly. This may signify duly that Germany is holding out for a price. If so, England desires only to know what it is to pay, because the terror of the present isolation is getting into the marrow of her bones.

RAILWAY MEN ON STRIKE.

Trouble on the Great Northern -A Number of Employes Quit Work.

Klaispell, Mont., Nov. 5.-After a session lasting until 2 o'clock this morning the local branch of the A. R. passed a resolution to call out the men on the mountain division of the Great Northern Railroad. Under the leadership of Roy Godwin, director of the union, six or eight members took possession of the roundhouse and ditched and "killed" several engines and ran several cars into the turntable. Godwin and his men soon got into collision with the police, and six of them, including the leader, were placed under arrest. The engineers and firemen who are not mem bers of the A. R. U. remained at their posts and took out trains both ways Spokane, Wash., Nov. 5.—A strike has been ordered by the A. R. U. on this division of the Great Northern. A force of 25 men employed in the machine shops and a score of carpenters walked out. The trainmen, however, stuck to their places, and trains were running last night, although somewhat delayed.

A DRAMATIC SCENE.

Corporals' Guards Placed on the Drill Shed Doors,

While the Colonel Reads an Impre At-4 Lecture to the "Striking" Bugle Boys - Only One Drummer Left With the Battalion.

There was a dramatic scene at the drill sheds last night. It was chapter two of the strike of the Seventh Bugle Band, and matters were extremely interesting for a while. Readers of the 'Advertiser' will remember that a week ago the bugle band struck, or, probably what would convey the meaning more actually in a military sensemutinied. They wanted their pay. The Empire, and the disputes between colonel refused their request, insisting Great Britain and Venezuela and Brathat the band, like the other companthat the band, like the other companies of the battalion, the buglers and drummers would have to pool their pay, for the good of the entire battalion. The lads then left their instruments and belts, and quit the drill shed, stating that they would bring in their clothes on the following drill night. Last night was the next drill night, and when the time came for the battalion to fall in there was no bugler present to give the signal. When the companies had fallen in, numbered and been inspected, the members of the late bugie band walked in in a body, wearing mufti, and bringing in their habiliments of war. Then the fun commenced. A corporal's guard was placed over each of the two main doors of the shed, so that none of the boys could escape. The colonel ordered them to fall in, which they did. Then the battalion was formed into a hollow square, and the bugle boys and drummers marched to a position in the center, when the colonel proceeded to deliver a very impressive lecture. He called on the battalion to witness the degradation of youths who had been misled by the bugle sergeant and bass drummer, and held them up as a terrible example. The lecture was intended to have an annihilating effect, but almost everybody in the battalion, including the young men on the "carpet," joined in a general laugh. Then the colonel warned the boys that they were yet amenable to military discipline, and told the sergeants still held them responsible for the efficiency of the band.

The ordeal was then over, the boys were dismissed, and the sentries taken

off the doors. Last week Col. Lindsay blamed Bugle Sergeant Chamberlain for being the ringleader of the trouble. "I wish to ringleader of the trouble. "I v state," said Mr. Chamberlain, "Advertiser" last night, "that I knew nothing about the disaffection until the night that the band boys informed the colonel of their intention to quit unless paid. The colonel says I was discharged for insubordination. That is not correct. I was merely suspended because I ventured to have an opinion of my own, and the colonel sent after me to come back, although he states that I made the first overtures.'

Bass Drummer Frank Taylor also denied either endeavoring to lead of mislead the boys, and both the young men complained of discrimination against the bugle band in favor of the brass band.







The State Veterinarian of Wisconsin has made the discovery that under the ragged vellow blossom of the golden rod there is hidden the germs of one of the most dangerous diseases to horses ever known. The disease which afflicts a horse inoculated with the poison resembles consumption in a man. It is incurable. The horses which eat the tempting plant go into a decline; their blood is destroyed; the tissue lose their strength and waste away. In from three weeks to three months after the disease attacks the animal is dead. The disease has attracted much attention in Michigan, Minnesota and Wisconsin, where thousands of horses have perished from its work.






