can coast. Another dispatch says: The navy department has advices from Europe that the blockading squadron under Capt. Sampson will be attacked by the Spanish fleet now at Cape Verde Islands. This may be a ruse purposely advanced by the Spanish. The note of warning has been sounded to the commanding officers of all the ships comprising the North Atlantic fleet. The first news of the departure of the fleet from Cape Verde Islands will be the occasion of sailing toward the east of the flying squadron. The commander-in-chief's orders are largely discretionary.

Guns for Gomez. ARMS AND AMMUNITION FOR THE

INSURGENTS. New York, April 26.-A dispatch from Washington says: Arrangements have been completed by this government to supply the Cuban insurgents with arms and ammunition. The government is preparing now to land in Cuba from 25,000 to 30,000 stands of improved Springfield rifles, a number of artillery batteries, rapid-fire Maxim guns and an abundance of ammunition. When the proper time arrives for the 35,000 armed Cubans to co-operate with the American forces, they will be thoroughly armed and equipped for battle. When Etrada Palma and Brigadier-Gen. Castillo visited the war department last week, the plans for deliver-

ing the arms were adopted. Gen. Miles believes that if the insurgents are properly armed and supplied with the artillery they have so long needed they can do most effective work and render the American troops invaluable aid in driving the Spaniards rom the island.

Canadian Feeling.

The feeling of Canadians with respect to the war will vary somewhat, according to individual standpoint, but the average opinion we take to be somewhat as follows:

(1) That it had become necessary, from the standpoint of humanity, that the state of savagery in Cuba should be brought to a termination. As an English paper puts it, it was a necessary piece of scavenging.

(2) That the Spaniards had been at work for three year's, endeavoring to one firm reaching out about 100 miles, "pacify" the unhappy island by fire and sword, and had utterly failed, as might have been expected.

(3) That the suppression of such a neighborhood danger and nuisance naturally fell to the great country within 100 miles of Cuba.

(4) That interference at some time by the United States was inevitable, as well as necessary, and, if inevitable, that it might as well come now as at

(6) That doubtless it is sentimentally rather hard on poor old Spain to lose Cuba; but only sentimentally: as Spain will be better off every way without Cuba than with it.

(6) That nothing is to be gained from eanting against the United States because of her possibly mixed motives in entering into and prosecuting the determination that Cuba must be freed from Spanish domination. No nation, no individual, not Great Britain, not Canada, is exempt from mixture of

(7) That the Providential outcome of the present friendliness between Great Britain and the United States seems likely to be an eventual Anglo-American alliance, which would dominate the world in the interests of civilization

(8) For these reasons-though not without a passing tear for Spain as a picturesque survival of an irretrievable past-Canadians, as part of the great English-speaking world, heartily desire the success of the United States in the present contest.

Ontario Government Should do Something.

The Farmers' Advocate urges the awakening of a live interest in forest preservation, as an instance of the rapid denudation of this neighborhood, it points out that four of the largest concerns, viz., those of Mr. Adam Beck, the Columbia Handle Co., Gillean & Sons, and the London and Petrolia Barrel Co., situated in the city of London, work up annually from logs cut within a radius of some 40 miles, with about 1,890,000 feet (board measure) of oak, ash, elm, maple, butternut, birch. basswood, etc., for the maunfacture of boxes, barrels, handles, and other purposes.. The Advocate also says that within 40 miles of London there are four other similar mill that together cut annually about 2,100,000 feet of timber. Besides there there are a large number of smaller mills sawing up to 150,000 feet annually. "When it is remembered," continues the Advocate, "that this entire amount, besides the thousands of cords of firewood, is being taken each year from the farms of so small an area of Ontario, while practically nothing is being done to counteract the destroying influence, surely it is time to wake up to the gravity of the situation and endeavor to preserve what still remains, and to systematically make a move in the direction of reforesting."

Similar regulations to those which prevail in the Ottawa Normal School will doubtless be applied to the new Normal School in London. There are two sessions each year. The first opens on the third Tuesday in January, and the second on the third Tuesday in August. The sessions close in June and December, at dates fixed from time to time by the Minister. It will thus be seen that in point of attendance outside pupils remain in the city for a much longer period than pupils attending universities. There is a model school connected with the Ottawa Normal School. It was opened a number of years after the institution was built, and it is conducted with so much success by the expert educationist in charge that there is always a rivalry by parents to get their children admitted to it. I was particularly interested in the kindergarten department. Miss Eliza Boulton, the teacher in charge. is a lady of strong sympathy and affection, and the result of her work is everywhere apparent. 

By the Railway Committee of the House -The Windsor and Detroit Bridge.
