



The biggest task before the council, and an immediate one, is the power problem. There is first the working out of the local end of the Niagara scheme, preparatory to assuming obligations to the hydro-electric commission. The council must decide whether it will purchase the distributing plant of the London Electric Company, or compete with that concern by building one. Obviously the businesslike course will be to buy off competition if the local company will sell out on reasonable terms, and if its plant is adapted to the city's purpose. A canvass also must be made of power-users, so as to ascertain approximately the extent of the market for Niagara power, before entering into a contract with the power commission. The whole problem bristles with difficulties, and will require the most painstaking attention. The financial-consequences to the city, whether

for better or worse, will be enormous. One gratifying feature of the inaugural meeting of the council was the absence of partisanship. Whether this or that person is elected to this or that chairmanship, or board, or committee is of more importance to himself than to the public, but when a party majority is used to monopolize these appointments it creates a sore feeling in one section of the community. It is to be hoped the conduct of the council in this respect at its first meeting will be an inviolable precedent. The mayor and aldermen have recognized the fact that the late mupicipal election was a non-party one.

CANADA'S FISHERIES.

Once again the people of Canada are reminded of the importance of the pearance of the annual report of the department, which has been laid before Parliament. The report shows the value of Canada's fisheries in 1906 to have been \$26,279,485. The larger part of this is credited to the maritime provinces-\$16,000,000 worth. British Columbia comes next, with \$7,799,000 worth, the remainder being distributed among Ontario, Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta.

As compared with the preceding wear, when the season was unusually good, there was a falling off, for which the short sockeve salmon run in British Columbia rivers is held these rivers have been largely overfished, and the natural habits of the salmon, which come from the sea every fourth year also had something leads in value, accounting for \$5.856,760 of the total, the other kinds being valued as follows: Cod, \$3,471,186; lobsters, \$3,422,927; herring, \$2,704.596; mackerel, \$1,369,728; whitefish, \$906,-759; trout, \$791,467; haddock, which reach this part of the country in the form of finnan haddies, \$766,896; pickere!, \$713,437; halibut, \$683,840; sardines. \$514.916; pollock, \$430.980; smelts, \$425,631. 

JAPAN AND U.S. FOR A MILLION DRIFTING APART

The Montreal Street Railway The Negotiations On Emigration Plans To Wipe Out Its Floating Debt.

Montreal, Jan. 13. - The directors of the Montreal Street Railway Company have decided to ask the authorization of the shareholders to issue \$1,000,000 new stock, and a special meeting of the shareholders has been called for Wednesday, Jan. 29, at noon, for that purpose. This was the important announcement made tonight by Hon. Senator Forget, president of the company. It is proposed to issue the new stock at 125, or at a premium of 25 per centum over the par value, and the stock will be allotted pro rata to shareholders of record at a date to be hereafter decided. It is also announced that the directors have sold in London \$2,-300,000 41/2 per cent debenture bonds, due in 1922, at 92 7-8, and the shareholders will also be asked at the special meeting to authorize the issue and sale of these bonds.

It is the intention of the directors to use the proceeds to extinguish the amounting to some \$1,800,000, which, according to the last annual statement, includes \$300,000 of bonds due on March 1, \$1,000,000 notes sold in England last June, and \$500,000 owing the Bank of Montreal. After the paying off of the floating indebtedness, there will be a balance of some \$500,000, which will be available for the improvement and extension of the system. The authorized capital of the company is \$18,000,000, of which \$9,000,000 has been issued, so that, including the new issue, the paid-up


