Winston Churchill Speaks to 6,000 People in Belfast Unmolested

HISSES, BOOS AND HURRAHS AND HIS FIGURE IN EFFIGY MINISTER'S MIXED WELCOME

Hearty Cheers of Liberals and Nationalists Drowns Demonstration of Hostile Crowd at Belfast Station, But Large Force of Police Prevents Disturbance.

CHURCHILL AND JOHN REDMOND ASK UNIONISTS FOR FAIR PLAY

Declare That the Home Rule Measure Will Be a Boon to Ireland and Empire, Protecting All Classes, and That It Will Wipe Out Source of Hatred.

Belfast, Ireland, Feb. 8.-Winston Spencer Churchill, first lord of the admiralty, the chief figure in today's home rule demonstration, arrived this morning with his wife at the Central Station, and was given a somewhat mixed reception.

A number of Orangemen who had gathered at the station greeted him with groans and boos, but these were drowned in the Brought the Woman Back to London and hearty cheers of the large crowd of Liberals and Nationalists. There was no disturbance, and the large force of police on duty in the station had a very easy task to perform.

CHURCHILL IN EFFIGY.

In the course of the morning a crowd of Unionists paraded the streets carrying an effigy of Mr. Churchill, to which was attached a placard bearing the words "Down With Churchill," "No Home Rule." They proceeded to the hotel where Mr. and Mrs. Churchill are staying, and sang the National Anthem. Then they dispersed without

NO MARKED EXCITEMENT.

There was no marked excitement among the workers of the city today. The tens of thousands of men and women engaged in the shipyards and the linen factories, proceeded to work as though the question of home rule had not been mooted. A few small crowds, however, were scattered here and there, anxious to see the first lord of the admiralty, and watching the movements of the military.

The football grounds were surrounded from an early hour by troops so as to guard against an invasion by the Unionists. Only ticket-holders were admitted.

The surroundings of the football ground, which is known locally as "Paradise," were desolate. The rain was incessant and the approaches to the marquee were a sea of black ooze. The supports and ropes holding up the marquee were strained with the weight of the sodden canvas, through which the water dripped like a shower-

EFFIGY OF CARSON.

Effigies bearing the labels "Carson and Londonderry, Turncoats and Traitors," swayed from poles inside the marquee, looking all the world like corpses hanging from the gallows.

Bodies of infantry and dragoons were stationed a short distance from the marquee in readiness for emergencies. The police challenged everyone who tried to pass through the entry into the grounds. Occasional bands of rowdy youths marched by with banners bearing the words "No Home Rule! Down With Churchill!"

A ROUSING RECEPTION.

Mr. Churchill was greeted with a rousing reception from the 6,000 people gathered within the tent, whose enthusiasm not even the depressing surroundings were able entirely to quench. A steady shower poured through the canvas, making the floor an incipient

The meeting, presided over by Hamilton Wright Mabie, was addressed by John H. Finley, president of the College of the City of New York, August Thomas, and others distinguished in literary circles.

William Watson, the English poet, compared Dickens to a fighter who was "perhaps the greatest warrior of them all."

A feature of the celebration was the reading of eulogistic letters, telegrams and cablegrams from wellknown authors, publicists and other prominent persons, both in this country and Europe.

"I greatly regret that the absence through illness, of our president," said Col. Little, "places upon me the duty of moving the adoption of the report which has just been read. I am sure that I voice the sentiments of all the members when I say that I trust th president may soon be restored to perfect health, and be able to resume

his place as our chief officer. "With regard to the financial statement I do not propose to offer any extended remarks. The report prepare by the president deals with most of the important points. I can only emphasize what he says about what bad wea. ther can do for us. Our gates and tickets receipts for 1911 were about \$4,000 less than in 1910, all or nearly all of this deficiency being due to one wet day. Had it not been for this, and an unusually heavy expenditure for lighting and repairs to buildings, our finances would have been in much bet

"Whilst this is the case, it must be porne in mind that our expenditure for repairs to buildings will probabl Some other large items appear to be now beyond the control of the directors-for example, the prize list (which has been increased about \$7,000 since 1903), cannot easily be reduced in view of competition from other fairs, and the heavy item of attractions seems to be almost unavoidable if the public are to be satisfied

"It will be necessary, therefore, for the new board to exercise the greatest possible economy in dealing with such items as are controllable and to make every effort to induce the citizens and our friends in the adjoining counties to give the Western Fair their generous support in order that it may continue to prosper and be a credit to Western Ontario as it has been in the past."
Supporting the Fair.

In discussing the report, Mr. William McNeil declared that the citizens did ot support the fair as it should be upported. It was a great attraction, pringing in thousands of people to London, and the citizens should stand ehind it. Mr. McNeil suggested that the city take care of the buildings and maintain them. If that were done, the directors could increase the prize list, and bring many attractions to the fair now impossible to obtain owing to the lack of funds.

Col. Little declared that the fair had not received the Government aid or municipal aid that it should. However, the city council had treated the fair board quite generously during the past few years, and he hoped that it would

The dates of the fair were settled at Sept. 6 to Sept. 14. This follows immediately after Toronto.

On motion of Mr. William McNell a vote of thanks was tendered the president, Mr. Reid, and the hope was expressed that he would soon be restored


