

Toronto, May II.—The board of railway commissioners yesterday afternoon arrived at an understanding more or less satisfactory to both parties in the application of the eleven rural telephone companies which ask for an order directing the Bell Telephone Company to provide them with long distance connection; and an order will be drafted providing a provisional arrangement between nine of the companies and the Bell, which is to be tried out for the next twelve months, purely as an experiment. In the case of the Herrietsville and Port Hope Telephone Companies, which do not at present operate in competition with the Bell, judgment is reserved, as Mr. H. D. Gamble, their counsel, apparently falled to convince the board parently failed to convince the board that their cases were such as should be brought before the tribunal at

be brought before the tribunal at all.

In announcing judgment regarding the nine competitive companies, Chairman Mabee said: "Competition has never appealed to me as against one company, where you have a public service commission to control the rates and see that the service is adequate. The establishment of a rival company to the Bell in any town seems to me to be a mere fifth wheel, a waste of capital, and a constant cause of irritation to the citizens of these municipalities. I lived in a place once where there were three telephone systems—the Bell, a local company, and an 'automatic'—and of all the curses that ever blasted a municipality, this was the worst. The reason for competition is that it brings about better service and normal rates; but the existence of a controlling commission, such as the Ontation realizer, beard makes it un-



Mr. W. G. Wright strenuously objected to the practice among some insurance companies of demanding a discount for prompt settlement. He instanced one case where a discount of \$560 was demanded by a company for prompt settlement of insurance of \$15,000. This was the general practice, he declared, but other insurance companies were very careful in writing fire insurance. In many cases, he said, foreigners came to this country and took on fire insurance more as investment, and despite the prenautions taken by the companies, these foreigners set fire to their promises, and upon producing proofs of loss, received the insurance.

Variety has not been lacking, and the tale of his past life, as unfolded by the police, reads more like part of a sensational novel than real life.

As a boy of 17 he was publicly whipped by his father for having insulted a young girl, and in a fit of rage and desperation left home. After some few years of honest existence as a clerk in France he went to Monte Carlo, where he won \$5,000, with which he travelled through Italy and afterward Spain, gaining considerable fluency in the language of both countries. Tired of this humdrum existence, he then journeyed to Africa, where he made more money by trading in ivory and also — a more remunerative department — in slaves.


