





But the belief is often expressed that the institution of an unrestricted submarine campaign may perhaps, after the resent peace discussions, not lead to a break with the United States—a consummation which would be halled with joy by an ovewhelming majority in the nation.

Discussions in the Reichstag committee revolve largely around the question of the prospective result of a campaign based on the number and efficiency of submarines.

BUYING TO ADVANTAGE.

"I believe if the city housewives realized that summer and fall are our harvest time as well as the farmers, there would be less to say about the high cost of living. I've seen the farmers going home with half their load of vegetables and fruit as late as 6 o'clock, and one wonders what becomes of these products. Certainly they wouldn't he fit to sell next market day.

"Having settled the sums one has to spend on the different items, the next thing is to get out after the best values. It takes experience—long experience to be able to decide at sight what is real economy. I believe in buying ahead and storing une everything that will keep—\$50 or \$60 spent in the fall on food gives good dividends—also in co-operative buying—direct from the farmer. I know what can be done by three families clubbing to buy fruit by the crate, or in 10-basket lots: butter in 100-bound bulk: eggs in 30-dozen lots, and potatoas in large quantities. These may seem small savings, but are really more than bank interest, and the businessman thinks it worth while to take all han bank interest, and the businessman thinks it worth while to take all

"In the matter of clothing this year's buying should help out next year We're a fairly large family (six). I'd consider it noor management if we all required overcoats and underwear at one time. Those articles last more than one season, and one can arrange it so that they are required on alternat School clothes and shoes wear out every season, so one cannot do

much there.

"In regard to buying out of season: Strawberr'es in January and oranges in July are an extravagance. But I need not tell you that cottons in January, next winter's underwear in February, prints and muslins in August are a decided economy. I would not recommend buying gowns or hats out of season, unless one is as strong-minded as the late Mrs. Hetty Green, who wore the one hat

VACANT LOTS, SCHOOL GARDENS, ETC.

It is encouraging to know that the council's committee, appointed to investigate the high cost of living, is still doing business and intent upon solving five problem of the cultivation of vacant city lots. This is solendid! But does the committee realize that London already has a flourishing Women's Gardening Association, formed for the purpose of encouraging backyard gardening, and through this, patriotic service? That, further, the women's organization has been glad to accept offers of land for community gardens, and that a community store, for disposal of surplus vegetables will be opened in the summer? Why not take at least the executive of the Women's Cardening Association into consultation?

Again, the school principals have referred to vacant lots as a possible solution for the difficulty of lack of ground for school gardens.

Why can't all three, the council's committee, Women's Gardening Association and Principals' Association, put their heads together and arrive at some co-operative working plan?

An il'uminating publication, "Club Women's Records of Edmonton." has reached the editor of this department. One feether is a report of the Vacant Lots Garden Club, which has both men and worsen on the executive. Before beginning operations a year ago, twenty public meetings were held in various parts of Edmonton. Ilsts of vacant lots available were secured, and arrangements made for having them plowed at a special rate. As a result of the work of the club, nineteen of the city schools secured twenty-two lots and made school gardens. An instance is cited of a lot on Jasper avenue (the main street), covered with broken-down vehicles, as well as debris of all k'nds. Cleaned up, plawed and planted with potatoes, it yielded 83 bushels of choice tubers last season. No wonder the citizens of Edmonton's club in a later issue.

Inspector C. B. Edwards has sent in the following letter after reading the surgestions in regard to vacant lots for school gardens, etc., contained in Our Consumers' League of last week:

Dear Miss Armstrong,—Some seven or eight vears ago the pupils of the public schools in London were enabled through the kind offices of the London Horticultural Society to procure 5-cent packages of seeds (both vegetable and flower) for 2 cents each. The result was that large number of children bought seeds, which they took home and planted in their gardens.

In many cases the results were highly satisfactory, and I have a distinct recollection of hearing of some splendid results in the shape of large potators, tasty radi

by the boys and girls, planted with care and fended with patience and industry.

One thing that must not be overlooked in any scheme to utilize either the garden plots or vacant spaces of land, is the fact that there must be in the soil selected the proper elements required to grow the different vegetables. And when these elements are acking, fertilizers must be procured to supply the defects. The question that now confronts us is what fertilizers are needed, and here we must call in the advice of the soil experts who are to be found in or near the Ontario Agricultural College. A description of the soil will have to be sent to the college, and the expert will no doubt select and send out for distribution either a bulletin describing how this kind of soil is to be treated or will "prescribe" the proper method of treatment.

One more observation: Success can only be secured by the whole-hearted co-operation of pupils, parents and teachers. Yours very truly,





COMMISSIONERS WILL RAISE FUNDS BY AN ISSUE OF DEBENTURES

Utilities Board Plan Many Improvements This Year.

WILL GET MORE WATER

Contract for the New Hydro Building Not Awarded Yesterday.

At the meeting of the utilities commission yesterday afternoon debentures amounting to \$110,000 were decided upon for capital expenditure during the war. The sum of \$60,000 will be for the waterworks and \$50,000 for the hydro. The debentures will be authorized in the City of London bill.

The hydro will spend \$197,000 during the year. The sum of \$122,000 will be for extensions, wires, additions, etc The balance, \$75,000, will be for th hydro shop, the debentures for which were authorized last year. This will bring the total capital expenditure to \$1,022,350.68. Of this amount \$441,000 habeen provided for by debentures. Th balance will be cared for out of depre 356.04, and the balance, \$106,063.63, out of surplus earnings. This will give a cash account of something like \$17,000, there being a total of \$123,507.97 to the

revenue account.
Will Spend \$60,000. The sum of \$40,000 will be required for waterworks, to be expended as follows: Service \$12,000, service claims equipment \$2,000, additional water supply and pumping machinery \$28,500, overwraft from 1910 on capital account \$6,000, and \$3,500 for water and fire protection for the Byron Sanator-fum. in 1910 the board expended \$47,-643.17, or \$6,303.38 more than was pro Mueu for. There was an item of \$3,000 for a big main on kidout street, which was not expended last year. It will be

built this year.

Must Have Water. The water supply was discussed at some length. General Manager Buchanan reported that the wells at the roster property gave promise of yielding considerable water. Commissioner Antthen insisted that experiments be continued until at least a million gallons of water were in sight.




