Buenos Ayres, Thursday, Dec. 11.—The bill granting a credit of 200,000,000 posso to Great Britain, France and Italy to facilitate the purchase of Argentine products, was reported to the Chamber of Commerce by the financial committee tonight, the report being approved by a vote of 37 to 35. The credit will be guaranteed by deposit of 60,000,000 gold pessos in the bank of the Argentine nation. The measure now goes to the senate.





London and the Western Fair were signally honored at the convention of American fairs and expositions, when A. M. Hunt, secretary of the local exhibition, was chosen to deliver one of the leading papers and elected second vice-president for the coming year.

R. A. Brown of Birmingham, Ala., who visited the Western Fair this year, made the complimentary reference to who visited the Western Fair this year, made the complimentary reference to Canada's second exhibition and described Mr. Hunt as the man who could "pack a bigger fair into 35 acres than any other man in America."

Mr. Hunt found that the Canadian fairs were regarded as pioneer fairs, and the fact that London was self-sustaining was a matter of great surprise to the secretaries and presidents of many American state fairs, which are being yearly developed by their parent cities and states by expenditures ranging from hundreds of thousands to a million dollars.

What Canada Does.

The subject of the paper given by Mr. Hunt was "What Canadian Fairs Have Done To Build Up the Dominion of Canada." His reference to international relations on this continent and the common sacrifice of the two countries was greeted with applause. He gave a brief history of Canadian fairs, and pointed out that the Dominion Government had recognized the value of the Canadian fair by making an annual grant of \$50,000 to some one exhibition which had later been changed to a yearly payment to each of ten fairs of \$5,000. Manufacturers were helping to build up their businesses by placing their goods before the people at every large exhibition, and with the agricultural and other exhibits, the necessity for expansion was being brought home to the Canadian fairs, particularly the Western.

Building Up.

Mr. Hunt said the Canadian fair had helped to build up Canada by providing education, instruction and amusement for the tollers, who were lifted up by their annual period of relaxation provided by the exhibitions.

The greatest benefit to the whole country was the improvement of the live stock industry.

MRS. C. DRAISEY NOT TO BLAME FOR FATAL ACCIDENT, SAYS JURY

A. M. Hunt Given Warm Wel- Driver of Auto Completely Exonerated At Inquest.

DEATH INSTANTANEOUS

Mrs. Draisey Testifies That Late Mrs. Sullivan Ran in Front of Car.

"That Mrs. Leo Sullivan came to her death by being struck by a motor car driven by Mrs. Cecile Draisey of Wardsville, and that from the evidence placed before us we exonerate the said Mrs. Draisey from any blame in connection with the unfortunate accident," was the verdict of the jury sitting at the inquest on the death of Mrs. Sullivan. The inquest was held in the police station last night.

Dr. J. S. Wilson, who conducted the post-mortem, said that death was due to multiple fracture of the skull and concussion and laceration of the brain. Every bone of the skull and the lower nine ribs were fractured. Death would be, he believed, instantaneous from such injuries.

Answers Questions.

Mrs. Draisey, who has practically recovered from the nervous shock brought on by the accident, when on the witness stand told a simple and, in Coroner McLaren's opinion, straightforward story. She answered all questions in a quiet and composed manner. She said that she had come west on Dundas from Wellington street after having visited her father's home on the asylum side road. She was traveling on Dundas street at a speed of not more than ten miles an hour. It was her intention to park her car on Clarence street, just south of Dundas, so that her niece, who accompanied her, could do some shopping, and turned the corner for this purpose.





CHISTMAS DINNER.

Some Indians set great store by the Feast of the White Dogs. A number of guests are invited by a tribal chief to eat what is set before them, asking no questions for conscience sake. After they have given the chief their presents, the hors d'oeuvre is a whiff of tobacco. The soup, fish, entree, punch, joint, sweets and dessert are combined in seven courses of roast dog, and every one is under obligation to eat all he can hold. It is a great

occasion. If the main dish were turkey instead of dog, the feast would have similarities to our Christmas dinner. Perhaps, the chief ambition of the Indians could be paralleled in Christian Canada. There have been persons-not all are little boys, either-who have counted the dinner as the true splendor, the radiant crown of Christmas Day.

Good food has its place in every celebration. It is the beginning of a civilized feast. A wedding breakfast is generally a satisfying portion, but one fancies that to the bride it is a minor feature of the party. The ceremony, the love that makes it possible, the beauties of hope and graces of happiness-these are the bride's most lasting memories.

Perhaps some of us who sit down at Christmas, grasping our knives and forks with intensity, and leering at the "stuffing" that gushes forth from the first cut of the carver, might pay our intellects a compliment by remembering "the day we celebrate." We cannot taste the true flavor of a Christmas dinner until we have fed the poor, clothed the naked, and comforted the sick. Tiny Tim's prayer, "God, bless us every one," has lived all these years because of the circumstances attending the Cratchit's dinner. That was a prayer of gratitude for kindness of the rich man who had remembered his obligation.

Christmas is an occasion to make our Christianity something more than a theory. A good many churchmen are beginning to believe that if the theory is worth while it might be applied not only on Christmas Day, but all the year round. The comfortable fullness which the Cratchits experienced as they drew up around

the fireside after the dismemberment of the goose did not last long. They were hungry again on the following day. "Bob" had to hustle for himself then and he was lucky to get even sausages.

Is there some way of intensifying Christian beliefs so that the great gap between the rich and the poor might be lessened? The Anglicans, Baptists. Congregationalists. Methodists and Presbyterians, believe that the remedy may be found by a concerted search. Accordingly, they are appealing to their own constituencies and to the nation at large to take religion more seriously, to apply it in every activity of life, and to inject a little charity into word and deed. Christmas, if it is merely another expression of selfishness and greed. may be a pagan festival in no sense more alluring than Indian potlatch.

BUILDING UP GOOD CITIZENSHIP.

be pertified sea foam, and has been discovered floating on the Black Sea. Apart from the Eski Scheir mines, it occurs in Greece, Samoa, Spain, Moravia Utah, Pennsylvania, and, in conjunction with serpentine, in Norway and South Carolina, The ancients are said to have used it as a decora-

tive stone in buildings, and this seems to have been confirmed by the recent excavations in Corfu. It is soft and whitish, and becomes malleable like clay when soaked in water.

THE LATE SIR EVELYN WOOD. [Quebec Telegraph.]

A singularly romantic and picturesque career has just closed in London by the death of that remarkable soldier and sailor, Sir Evelyn Wood, field marshal of the Empire. A contemporary of Lord Roberts and Sir Garnet Wolseley, of Red River fame, Sir Evelyn, who entered the navy when he was about 14 years of age, experienced his first taste of war in the campaign in the Crimea, where he was eriously wounded in the attack on the Redan at Sebastopol. He was mentioned in Lord Raglan's dispatches, and received the Legion of Honor as well as a number of British decorations. Leaving the navy in 1855, he entered the army, and from that time down to 1901-5, when he filled his last active command, he saw a great deal of fighting and won many promotions, until finally becoming field marshal. He earned his Victoria Cross in the Indian Mutiny, and subsequently took part in the Ashanti, Kaffir, Zulu, Transvaal and Egyptian wars, and in the Nile expedition of 1894-5. A well-known student of and authority upon military systems and tactics, he has left a number of interesting contributions to our biographical and military literature, the best known of his books being a partial story of his own life, entitled "From Midshipman to Field Marshal."

Lake Huron Steel Corporation to Buy 1,200 Acres of Indian Reserve.

CAPITAL IS \$15,000,000

New Model City To Spring Up -Expects To Employ 5.000 Men.

SARNIA, Dec. 11.—The Lake Huron
Steel Corporation, a \$15,000,000 concern, tonight closed the details for the
purchase of 1.148 acres of the Sarnia
reserve on which to erect a mammoth
alloy steel plant for about \$200,000. Of
this amount the Indians will apportion
about \$100,000 among themselves and
claim fund of the Canadian Government.

Howard, Detroit; G. H. McCreath, Goderich, Ont., and J. J. Mann of New Jersey. The latter is chief inspector of the Canadian Munitions Board.

The company proposes to employ between 4,000 and 5,000 men. The wage The Canadian Munitions Board.
The company proposes to employ between 4,000 and 5,000 men. The wage scale will run from \$5 to \$12 a day.
It will manufacture alloy steel for Dodge, Studebaker. Wills-Lee and other companies. The output of steel is expected to be 100,000 tons annually at the start.

A model village is to be erected, modeled after plans outlined for Marysville. The plant is to be brought into the Sarnia city limits. The company had already expended \$100,000 at Goderich, Ont., when the decision was made to locate at Sarnia. The company will bring its iron ore to Sarnia docks by a fleet of steamers. It is to be capitalized at \$15,000,000.

MILLIONS OF GALLONS OF SPIRITS MADE IN CANADA LAST YEAR

Production Increased Over Preceding Year by Nearly 1,000,000 Gallons.

OTTAWA, Dec. 11.—That 4,187,109 proof gallons of spirits were produced in Canada during the fiscal year which closed on March 31, 1919, as compared with 3,566,955 proof gallons in the previous year is the statement made in the annual report of the inland revenue department just out. The raw material taken for the production of spirits during the year included over fifteen million bushels of Indian corn and nearly ten million bushels of rye.

The revenue of the department for the year exceeded \$30,000,600 as compared with approximately twenty-seven million dollars during the previous year. Revenue from war taxes almost touched Revenue from war taxes almost touched the twelve-million mark, as against a little over two millions during the previous twelve months.



BALFOUR EXPRESSES KEENEST REGRET AT ATTITUDE OF U.S.

Future of World Would Be a Benefit If America Co-operated to Greater Extent.

LONDON, Dec. 11.-Arthur J. Balfour, lors president of the council, in a speech today in London on world reconstruction said: "One of the greatest of our allies one of the greatest of our allies feels that she cannot go through with us to the end in this process of reconstruction. I am not going to criticize, because I think it out of place for anyone to criticize any foreign power; but it would be a very poor compliment to my American friends to say that we regard with friends to say that we regard with indifference the fact that they have not seen their way to co-operate with us in this work of international reconstruction to the end."

Mr. Balfour described the part America played in the way as poble and ica played in the war as noble and disinterested, with no thought of nadisinterested, with no thought of national ambition.

"We are grateful." he continued, "but, I confess, I had dreams that a work so nobly begun would be effectively carried through."

Mr. Balfour expresed the opinion that the future of the world would be assisted incalculably if the great English-speaking nations worked together in the cause of liberty and peace. "I know well that in the cause of liberty and peace American cooperation will be still for chcoming," he said. "I know they are not going to abandon as a nation, and that no party in America is going to abandon these great ideals."

The speaker said he was bound to admit, however, that it seemed more than likely that "we cannot count to the full on direct action, which would make the assistance of the great American democracy of ten-fold value should it be forthcoming.



FEAR FALLING EXCHANGE MAY AFFECT U.S. EXPORTS

NEW YORK, Dec. 11.—The stock market was visibly affected, and financial circles were gravely worried today by another violent decline

International bankers expressed their discouragement at the situation, and declared that un'ess remedial measures were soon forthcoming serious curtailment of this country's exports would inevitably result British remittances or demand bills on London fell to \$3.67 1-4 to the pound sterling against the normal or pre-war rate of \$4.86 5-8. This is an overnight loss of nine cents, and represents a discount of almost 25 per cent on what for generations has been regarded as the basis of international exchange.

Other foreign rates were very unsettled. The Italian lire, however, was the only other foreign rate to establish a new minimum. ordinarily worth about 20 1-4 cents in this market, dwindled to where it required 13 5-8 lires to purchase an American dollar.

CANADIAN EXCHANGE | Profiteering Is OFFERED AT A TEN PER CENT DISCOUNT

NEW YORK, Dec. 11 .- As a result of the heavy balance of trade in favor of this country against Canada the mark for Canadian exchange is completely demoralized. It was learned today tha there were no buyers in the market to take care of the large offerings of commercial bills which were being offered at a discount of ten per cent.

For a long time past Canada's pur chases in this country have been far in excess of her sales to us. In September the United States sold to Canada \$77,-980,468 worth of goods, while our pur-chases in that country amounted to only \$42,643,583. In the first nine months of this year the balance of trade against Canada totalled approximately \$108,000,-

This condition is having a serious This condition is having a serious effect on trade between the two countries, and is viewed with alarm by American exporters. Our trade with Canada is equal to the trade with all South America and Asia combined. Canadian bankers interviewed today said that there was only one remedy for the present exchange situation, and that the present exchange situation, and that was for Canada to buy less here and produce more goods for export. If the Canadian wheat embargo were lifted shortly it would help materially in wiping out the unfavorable trade balance, the bankers.

The Ontario Travelers' Association has come nobly and generously to its assistance, and on Saturday will leave at every house in London an envelope in which donations for the kiddies may be placed. Sunday the envelopes will be collected by the travelers.

V. C. WINNER TELLS OF MISTREATMENT AT STRIKERS' HANDS

Testifies At Trial of R. B. Russell in Winnipeg.

WINNIPEG, Dec. 11.-Sergeant F. G. Coppins, who won the Victoria Cros in the great war, and who got two ribs broken in the course of the riot at the corner of Portage avenue and Main street, June 10, was one of the wit-nesses called by the crown at the trial today of R. B. Russell, charged with seditious conspiracy.

Sergeant Coppins told the court that bottles and stones were thrown by per-

bottles and stones were thrown by persons in the crowd, that he was hit in the ribs and that his horse was hit by something and ran away. Under cross-examination he asserted that an evening newspaper's report of the affair, so far as he was concerned, was false, and that he had not been pulled down at all

down at all.

Captain Dunwoody of Calgary, who Captain Dunwoody of Calgary, who was in charge of the squadron of mounted special police detailed to keep order on the streets, spoke of the crowd at the corner of Portage avenue and Main street as being extremely hostile, of the missiles that were thrown, and of what he claimed to be the necessity for charging through the throng as the only means of clearing the streets for traffic.

The statement in the Strike Bulletin that "the police had been replaced by 'thugs,'" he stigmatized as a "damned lie." pointing out that the specials were

lie," pointing out that the specials were returned soldiers, who had been in the infantry, artillery and cavalry, and tha they included majors, staff captains and

lieutenants.

Regulations May Be Made Less Stringent When Resumption Is General.

REPUDIATE AGREEMENT. PEORIA, III., Dec. 11 .- Miners of Peorla sub-district No. 2, repudiated the Indianapolis agreement for settling the nation-wide strike of miners at a meeting held tonight, according to a statement made by W. E. Sherwood, member of the Illinois State Board of the United Mine Workers of America. 8,000 men are affected.

CHICAGO, Dec. 11.-Work was resumed today in the mines in several states as a result of the settlement yesterday in Indianapolis of the strike of bituminous coal miners, but little relaxation in fuel restrictions followed. Plans for a return to normal of the passenger train schedules were under passenger train schedules were under consideration tonight. Retail stores throughout the country were made free to keep open three ad-ditional hours on Saturday nights until Christmas to take care of holiday

There were indications that with general resumption of mining by Mon-day some lessening of regulations might be expected next week Mining is expected to be largely increased throughout the country tomorrow, while in some states increased operations will not get under way before Monday.

Nearly everywhere, except in Kansas and Washington, miners were preparing to return to work at once. In Kansas preparations were stopped by a telegram from Alexander Howat, district president of the miners' union, who asked that his arrival tomorrow be awaited. In Washington union leaders of two mining fields asked for a state convention in Seattle on Saturday urday to act on the strike settlement, Volunteers Still On. Volunteer miners were still working today in Kansas, Oklahoma and Mon-

Many Indiana and Michigan miners returned to work today, as did a goodly number in West Virginia and a few in Illinois, Texas and some other Askansas coal mines will require from one to two weeks before they are again producing coal at nor-mal capacity, F. W. Luckins, president of the Inter-state Coal Operators' As-sociation, announced at the close of an all day session of coal miners from those states. Kansas miners, he said, would continue to operate under the state receivership for some weeks at least. He stated that the fourteen per cent increase in wages to miners would result in the shutting down of some mines.

RESUMPTION IS PRETTY GENERAL IN INDIANA

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Dec. 11. -Mining in the bituminous coal fields of Indiana was started today after a fiveweeks' strike. Reports from all the belts indicated that the resumption was pretty general. Mines at Newburg, Port Branch, and Blackburn, in the southern part of the state, were operating, about 1,000 men having resumed Other mining propert near Evansville was still inactive, but it was expected that nearly all the men would be back by tomorrow. No reports had been received today international headquarters of the United Mine Workers from the coal mining districts, and officials said they expected little notification of resumption of work by the men. They maintain their attitude of confidence of full acceptance by the men of the agreement reached yesterday and expected that by Monday every miner would be back at his place.
