

Clerk of London Presbytery Quits :: No Action Taken On Guarantee to Immigrant

DR. M'NAIR QUILTS AS CLERK TO HEAL PRESBYTERY SPLIT

Agrees To Give Up Books On Recall of Censure Motion.

VOTE IS UNANIMOUS Resignation of Pastor of Chalmers Church Is Accepted.

Rev. John McNair, D.D., has resigned as clerk of London presbytery, the resignation to take effect March 31.

Dr. McNair has tendered his resignation at the special meeting of presbytery called yesterday afternoon to deal with the resignation of Rev. John Richardson, B.A., as pastor of Chalmers Presbyterian church.

Dr. McNair's offer to resign, providing presbytery withdrew the motion requesting his resignation on the score of "manifest inefficiency," came as the climax of the meeting and completely overshadowed consideration of Mr. Richardson's resignation as pastor of Chalmers church, which was accepted by presbytery after representatives from his congregation had been heard.

In voting unanimously to accept Dr. McNair's offer, which he himself said was made "in the interests of harmony and for the good of the presbytery," it was made quite clear by Rev. George Gilmore of Delaware that the presbytery was neither "swallowing itself" nor "admitting it had made a mistake."

Dr. McNair then read the following letter addressed to the presbytery, and dated March 23: "Without prejudice to my appeal against the action of presbytery in requesting my resignation, I wish respectfully to submit the following proposal: If presbytery will secure the withdrawal of the motion made by Dr. Beattie I will withdraw my appeal to the synod and will resign from the position of clerk and treasurer of the presbytery, such resignation to take place at the end of March."

Rev. Wm. Beattie, D.D., having moved the original motion requesting Dr. McNair's resignation, then rose to address the court. Commenting upon the "conciliatory and manly way" in which Dr. McNair had made his proposal to presbytery, Dr. Beattie spoke his appreciation of Dr. McNair's action. "Of his Christian spirit, and of the same, good common sense of the proposal," and moved that the offer of resignation be accepted and the original motion expunged from the minutes.

Dr. Beattie's motion was seconded by Rev. W. R. McIntosh, D.D., who remarked that the members of the presbytery were "fundamentally Christians," and that Dr. McNair's offer to resign and presbytery's acceptance of that offer constituted "a real Christian attitude" toward the whole matter.

Not Backing Down. "That does not mean, however, that presbytery is swallowing itself," asked Mr. Gilmore, "and admitting it made a mistake? If it does I must certainly oppose Dr. Beattie's motion to accept Dr. McNair's offer."

"Oh no," replied Dr. Beattie, "I think Dr. McNair understands that we are consenting to accept his offer in the interests of harmony and because he wishes to take such action."

Dr. Beattie then renewed his motion to read that "in the interests of harmony and good will, and appreciating the spirit in which Dr. McNair addressed the presbytery, the congregation having voted to stay out of union and the minister being in favor of union, that the resignation should be accepted."

It was stated of Mr. Richardson that congregational relationships with him had been of the friendliest and singularly happy. That "his had been a four-square" with his preaching "that he was the most

conscientious minister Chalmers church ever had in visiting his people and in visiting the sick," that "he preached the straight gospel," and that "he was second to none of the ministers Chalmers church ever had."

Mr. Dickinson emphatically asserted that everything had been all right in the congregation until "a wolf had come amongst the sheep in the form of a minister and preached sedition and treason against the preacher and against the church, with the result that there had been a division in the congregation."

Accept Resignation. Mr. Richardson expressed his appreciation of the kind words spoken of him, and adhered to his resignation. It was then moved by Rev. James Anthony, Fingal, and Dr. McIntosh that the resignation be accepted "with very great regret and with a high sense of appreciation of the work Mr. Richardson had done in Chalmers church."

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In accepting the resignation, the presbytery named Rev. James McKay, New St. James' church, as moderator of the church, with instructions to declare the pulpit vacant the first Sunday in April and to moderate the charge for a call.

Julia Keely, a songster of good voice and personality, steps out of musical comedy for a turn that went wonderfully last night.

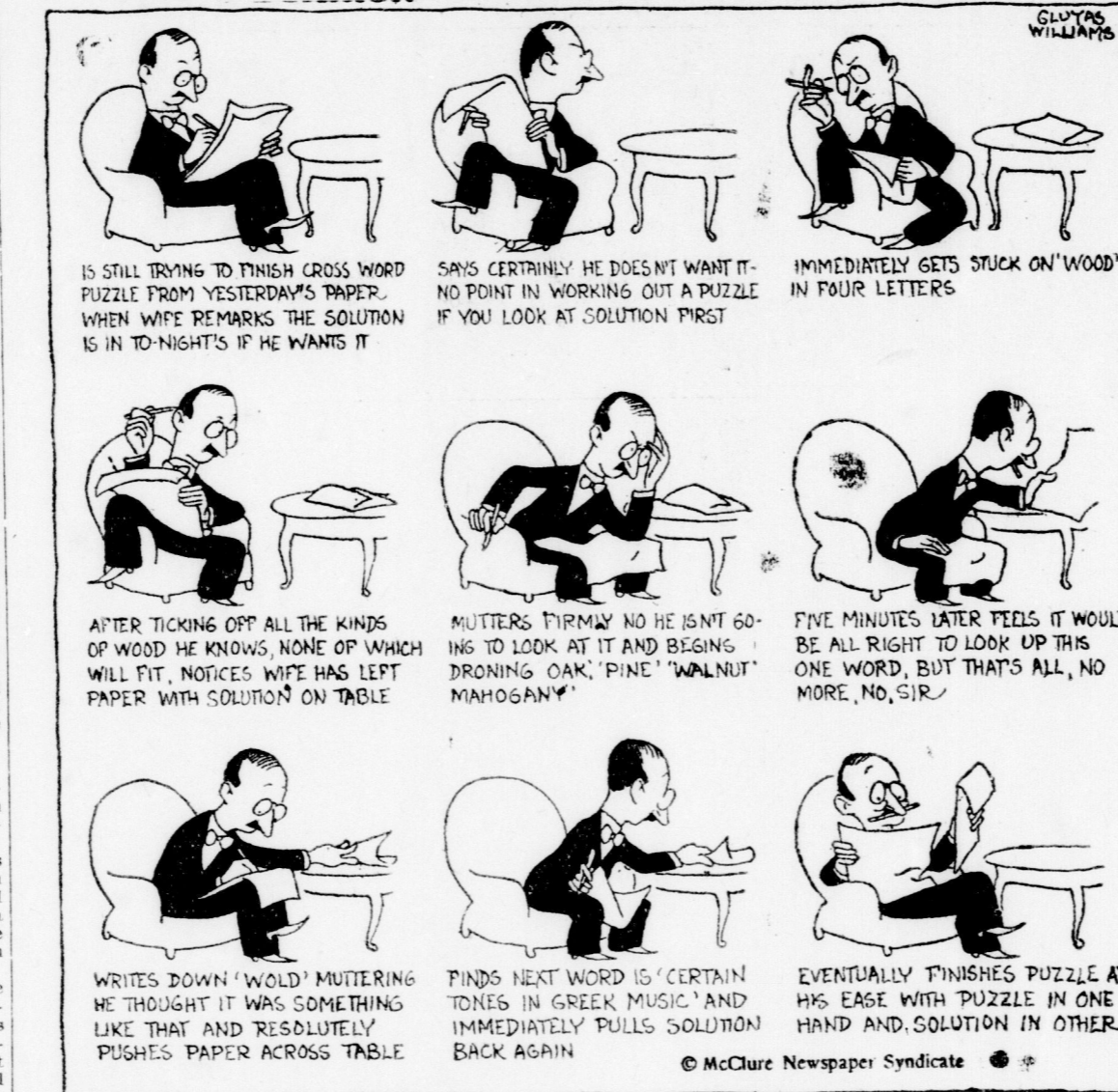

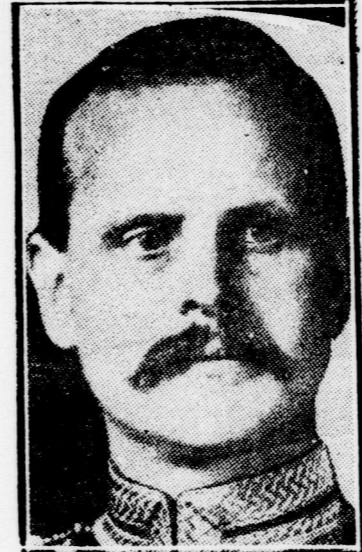

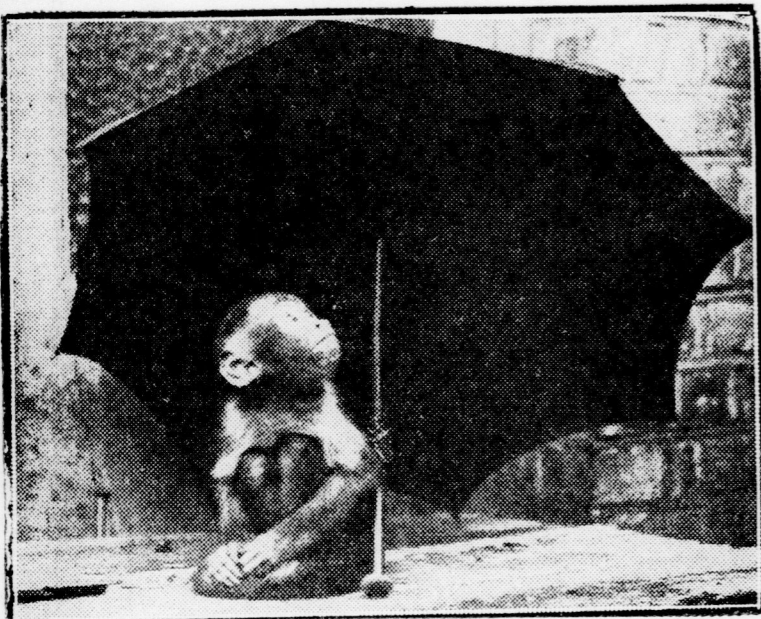

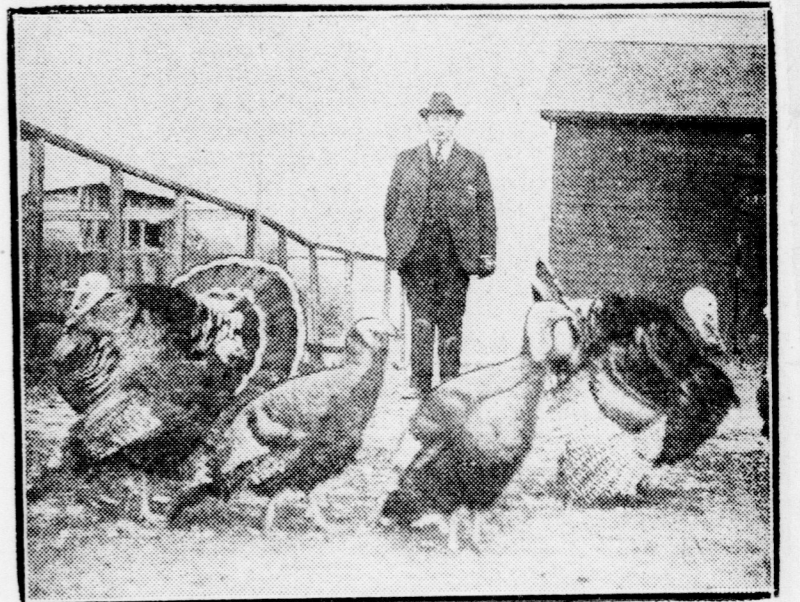

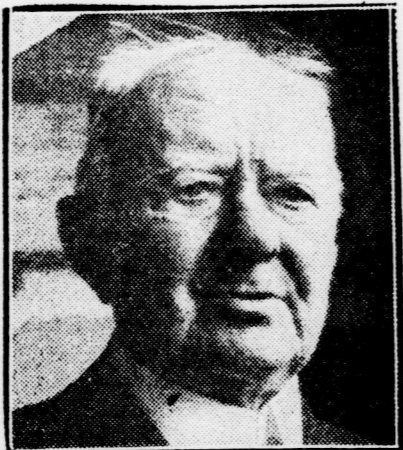

The Province Loses \$300,000.

Peter Smith and Amelius Jarvis were sentenced some months ago to prison terms, three years for Smith and six months for Jarvis. They had been judged guilty of turning to their own advantage funds that belonged to the people of Ontario.

The appellate court has handed out a decision that changes this very materially. The fine of \$600,000 is cut in two. Mr. Jarvis to pay \$300,000 and Peter Smith \$100,000.

It is very difficult to see why there was any change made in the original sentence imposed by Chief Justice Meredith, for it was a document that seemed to admirably suit the case, placing responsibility for payment where it could best be carried.

Ald. Neely May Not Get It.

Ald. Homer Neely has intimated that he will allow his name to stand as Conservative candidate for East Middlesex for the federal house.

On the wholesale price of domestic water meters renewed every 25 years, the city getting money at 5 per cent, according to the office account, \$1.05 a year instead of \$7.50 pays the shot. Is this right?

4. You know the total consumption of water in a given time and the total cost of running and sinking fund charges. Then can't your officers charge metered water at cost?

Old Method of Rule Ends As Western Pupils Vote For Parliamentary Plan

Present Student Government Will Be Replaced by Modern Assembly.

IS STEP FORWARD

By a sweeping majority of 210 votes to 9, the students of the University of Western Ontario yesterday decided to abandon the old method of student government and replace it with a parliamentary plan.

The new constitution was passed upon by the students. To be applicable it remains to have the approval of Dean W. Sherwood Fox of the college of arts.

The new idea is considered one of the greatest forward movements in student circles this year. The constitution, which is now in the hands of the dean, provides for the administration of students' affairs by an assembly patterned after that of the provincial government.

Keen interest was taken in the voting, which came to a close at 2 p.m. The election of the prefect and sub-prefect was one of the vital sub-questions before the students.

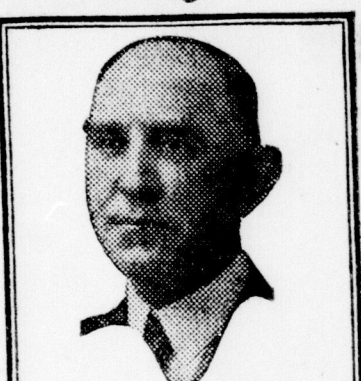
