EDITORIAL Bosnitch ruins credibility of students

Administration takeover sets alarming precedent

The students should have total control over the Student Union Building. The students should be free to run a variety of enterprises for the benefit of all at UNB. The students should have more influence when major decisions are made. on and off campus.

All these statements reflect the goals of Student Union president John Bosnitch and of many students. The Brunswickan wholeheartedly endorses these objectives.

The problem is the key word in all these statements: "should." The power students seek, to determine their own destiny is not a God-given right. Such rights can only be gained by violent revolution or by gaining the respect of those who may grant such rights. Since violent revolution is not condoned by our society the students must prove they are capable of taking on the responsibilities associated with these rights, while at the same time asserting their desires. Student Union President John Bosnitch has made great strides for the students and has accomplished much. His failing though has been disastrous: instead of proving that students are capable of managing their own affairs, he has proved that from time-to-time students are not able to manage effectively and thus has ruined the credibility arguments which propose more student rights.

Although many questions remain about the nature of the Downey takeover of the S.U.B., The Brunswickan supports the UNB president's actions because the SUB was being managed atrociously.

The old board, with Bosnitch as chairman, spent its time arguing procedure and accomplishing virtually nothing. Critical issues such as leases for the tenants were not dealt with. Hiring and firing were haphasard causing staff morale to hit rock bottom; employees did not know whether or when they were working, turnover was high and training was lacking. No minutes for



SUB Board or its twin SUB Holdings were produced for months. Finances were being handled in a careless manner—money was being left lying around. THe final straw came when the director was fired and no replacement was named. The list goes on...

LIBERALITY Bosnitch's running of the SUB was coupled with other bodies he runs or is involved with. The Brunswickan is especially critical of his tendancy towards politically-motivated appointments. When the Downey takeover was announced, Bosnitch attempted to maintain legitimacy of the old SUB board while at the same time destroying the credibility of the press-he tried to convince the Brunswickan to appoint a staff member to one of the vacant UNB student positions.

The new board of trustees, composed mostly of students, seems to have the interests of the students at heart. Although the student trustees share a general pro-administration, anti-Bosnitch bias; Downey was smart to make the choices he did because renewed political infighting had to be prevented at all costs.

The trustees, most of whom were contacted individually by Brunswickan, share a common view that the board is temporary. After restoring functionality to the SUB they will work towards restoring a student-appointed board. It is critical that they do this with student input, and the willingness of the trustees to talk to students this week inspires confidence.

Although in favour of the takeover, the Brunswickan urges the administration not to consider their actions a precedent. Might the Student Union or the CSL exchange be next? The steamroller effect must be prevented. An important step would be to require that any change of an administrative structure be explicitly approved by the board of governors. The carte-blanche for Downey was dangerous, and many still question whether the actions taken were legal.

Now is the time for student administrators, like Bosnitch, to learn their lesson and start placing good management as a priority. The road to renewed respect from the administration a long one—it is time the trip is started.

By SHELLY NELSON **Brunswickan Staff** In response to the call for higher Student Union Fees, the Student Union President, John Bosnitch, has announced that he continues to oppose any proposal for increased fees. Bosnitch took this stand cuts from Student Union financial administrators.

Bosnitch said supporters of the hike consistently "forget" to mention that the UNB Student Union had the largest surplus in it's history in the fiscal year 1982-83. He further declared that the "Student Union has a massive capacity to generate money through the establishment of commercial enterprises and the streamlining of it's service operations.

When asked about alternative income from the Student Union, President Bosnitch made specific reference to government grants and university support transfers.

This summer the UNB Stu-

dent Union received the highest federal funding in the constituency of York-Sunbury, and sponsored a total of more than 40 full time jobs for students. Applications are now in progress for extended year round grants from federal and provincial departments despite warnings of budget amounting to approximately one hundred thousand dollars annually.

> Claiming that university support for union finances at UNB is lagging behind that of other schools, Bosnitch indicated his desire to obtain an unrestricted annual operating grant from the administration of at least \$25,00 in return for services rendered to the university community. He cited the case at the University of Alberta where the Student Union receives a 'no-strings attached' grant from the university.

> Bosnitch stated his determination to see his policy on lower fees continue exclaiming,"When I was first elected as Engineering Representative to the Student Council, I pro-

There is still a reduced surplus carried over from two years ago, but the A.B. spokesman said that it is a good policy to not spend retained earnings on day-to-day

expenses because some years will have surplusses and others will have deficits -- these should be allowed to naturally even themselves out. He said increased fixed costs and an increase in the number of sponsored organizations will result in many budgets be ing cut this year to less than forty percent of what was re quested.

CSL Vs. SMOKE SHOPPE: A Consumers Comparison

The CSL exchange has now become quite an issue on campus, and is in direct competition with the well established Smoke Shoppe.

But aside from the fact that the CSL Exchange is student run, how do the two stores compare from a consumer's point of view? Which serves the students' need's the best?

Of course, we need a set of criteria by which to compare the two stores. Prices are obviously important, as are the range of stock, hours of operation, and the speed of service. But employee courtesy and the size and location of the store is also a factor.

In the price category, the

In defining the outline of the 3CF funding, Bosnitch stated that \$65,540 was collected last September, 1983 from students, minus the rebates, to be included in the 3CF Fund. Return of the 'Smoker'

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This year, the Engineers are bringing back "The Smoker", a tradition that had been lost for several years. In its true form "The Smoker" is a road trip to who knows where?! Only a handful of people know where the buses are going.

Once on the buses, the party begins and upon arrival at the destination, the party accelerates with movies and music. Sometime later the buses load up again with their weary Engineers and return them to Head Hall.

"The Smoker" is on Tuesday night of Engineering Week, October 9, 1984. Look for posters in Head Hall for further information.

CSL definitely comes out the winner. Virtually every common item is priced lower at the CSL Exchange, ranging upward from 5¢; discounts are usually 10 or 15 percent. For example, cigarettes are \$2.30 at the Smoke Shoppe and \$1.95 at the CSL Exchange. Also important is the fact that the Smoke Shoppe does not competively price many items that are not sold at the CSL Exchange. For example, 1 litre of homogenized milk is \$1.20, compared to \$.97 at the grocery store. The CSL Exchange however, sells all of its items at a minimum markup to the consumer: although CSL is registered as a profit making corporation its student management does not have profit-making goals.

The ranges of stock of the two stores vary greatly. The Smoke Shoppe carries far more items than the CSL, and of the items that both stores carry, the Smoke Shoppe generally has a far greater variety. Examples of this are cigarettes and school supplies. The CSL Exchange has photocopiers, textbooks, cups of coffee, and a few other

things the Smoke Shoppe does not, but the Smoke Shoppe's list of exclusives is far greater; magazines, shirts, grocery items, and beer mugs to name a few.

The CSL Exchange asserts itself with its hours of operation: 126 hours per week compared to only 76 hours for the Smoke Shoppe. It is open from 8a.m. - 2 a.m. daily and the Smoke Shoppe from 9 - 9 Monday to Friday, and 1 - 9 on Saturday and Sunday. CSL however, is not always very punctual in the mornings. It is sometimes not open until 8:15 a.m. or 8:30 a.m., something which is annoying if you want to buy cigarettes, or a pen for your morning classes.

The two stores ranked closely with respect to their speed of service. Neither store is very crowded in the morning or evening: the busiest time is at noon-hour Monday to Friday. The Smoke Shoppe was usually faster at this time, so it gains a marginal edge in this category.

Again, the stores ranked

closely when comparing the courtesy of their employees. Neither store had employees that were downright rude, but the service was not always very friendly at either store. There are, of course, employees at both stores who were very polite and helpful; so I will have to rate both stores about equal.

With regards to the size and location of both stores, the Smoke Shoppe is the obvious winner. It is closer to the blue lounge, the Social Club, and the Cafeteria, and this is where most students spend time in the SUB. It is also far larger than the CSL, a place that can get very cramped, especially at the noon-hour.

Overall, a rating would depend on the value of each of these categories. If price is the most important thing to you, and the CSL carries what you want, then go there. But if you want to shop around for your school supplies, or cigarettes then go to the Smoke Shoppe. The choice is up to you.

Self-disciplinary model aids justice

On November 18, 1980 the Board of Governors of the University of New Brunswick approved a Student Disciplinary Code, the provi-

sions of which established a mechanism for self-discipline among students. The very concept of self-discipline reveals a philosophy held by

the administrators at this University. They recognize that university life creates a special environment and that student discipline should be

Student Disciplinary Code

Sections A, B, C, and D provide the machinery for the Student Disciplinary Committee and the Supervisory Board. Sections F, G, H, I, J and K deal with procedures for the conduct of the committee, laying and disposal of charges, appeals, etc. Section E is as follows:

OFFENCES AND SANC-E. TIONS

NOTE: Sanctions are expressed as a percentage of the current regular tuition fee for a full time student (i.e. \$1365 1984-85).

1. OFFENCE: (a) Any student who is in possession of, or consumes alcoholic beverages at any events sponsored by the University, or anyone of its duly constituted or recognized bodies, when events are designated as "dry events" is guilty of an offence;

(b) Any student whilst acting as a bartender who, after having been ordered otherwise by an on-duty University Security or Student Police Officer, serves liquor to a person who appears to be intoxicated (to the on-duty Officer) is guilty of an offence;

(c) Any student who consumes alcoholic beverages at any events sponsored by the Unversity, or any of its duly constituted or recognized bodies, following an order to the contrary by an on-duty Unviersity Security or Student Police Officer, is guilty of an offence;

(d) Any student sponsor of an event who knowingly permits

event is guilty of an offence. SANCTIONS: (a) Fine up to a maximum of 6%; AND/OR (b) Restriction of student social privileges.

DEFINITION: For the purpose of subsection 1 (d) "student sponsor" shall be defined as a student who signs the contract of services with the Physcial Plant and/or identifies himself/herself as such to the University Security or Student Police Officers assigned to the event.

E. OFFENCES AND SANCTIONS (cont'd)

2. OFFENCE: Any student who:

(a) assaults any person; (b)assaults an on-duty Campus Security or Campus Police Officer;

(c) acts in a manner which does harm to persons or property or threatens harm to persons or property;

(d)acts in a disorderly manner which does harm to person or property or threatens harm to persons or property;

(e) acts in an indecent manner which does harm to persons or property or threatens harm to persons or property; is guilty of an offence.

SANCTIONS:

(a) Fineup to maximum of 12% AND/OR

(b) Restrictions of student social privileges; OR (c) Recommendation that the

student be suspended or dismissed from the University.

SECTIONS: (a) Restitution for the property damage suffered;

AND/OR (c) Restriction of student social privileges; OR

(d) Recommendation that the student be suspended or dismissed from the University.

4. OFFENCE: Any student who commits or attempts to commit theft either on University of New Brunswick property or at an event to which Student Police have been assigned is guilty of an offence.

SANCTIONS:

(a) Fine up to a maximum of 12% and restitution;

AND/OR (b) Restriction of student social privileges; OR

(c) Recommendation of suspension or dismissal from the University.

E. OFFENCES AND SANCTIONS

5. OFFENCE: Any student who willfully obstructs a Student Police Officer or a University Security Officer in the performance of his duties is guilty of an offence.

SANCTIONS:

(a) Fine up to a maximum of 12%; AND/OR

(b) Restriction of student social privileges.

6. OFFENCE: Any on-duty Student Police Force personnel who fails to wear the required form of external identification identifying him or herself as a member of the Student Police Force at a function to which he or she is assigned is guilty of an offence.

The merits of a selfdiscipline approach are most evident when one considers as an alternative the criminal or civil justice system. Judges apply a community rather than a university standard of behaviour. The impact of a court ruling often involves jail terms, a criminal record, adverse publicity and in-

Quite simply, the selfdisciplinary model allows a student charged under our code to be charged, judged and sentenced by his peers in a speedy, informal and inexpensive fashion.

The most lenient sanction which the Committee could impose is the levying of a \$20.00 fine which is common in a case where the accused party pleads guilty to a minor offence. The most stringent sanction available to the Committee is that of a recommendation for suspension or expulsion to the Board of Deans.

OPTOMETRISTS

Further provisions in the Student Disciplinary Code outline that the structure of the Student Disciplinary Committee is to be composed of eight individuals representing collective interests of students from across campus. The Code specifies that the positions of Chairperson and Vice-Chairperson be occupied by a third year and a second year law student respectively. In addition, there is one faculty member sitting on the Committee, Professor Peter Kent of the History Department. The recording secretary of the SRC sits as a non-voting member of the Committee. The other four individuals are selected in accordance with the "Appointment of Officers" sections of the Code. All appointments to the Committee are ratified by the University's Board of Governors.

The Student Disciplinary Code provides for a Supervisory Board which is composed of seven members appointed by the Board of Governors. The Supervisory Board works in conjunction with a Commissioner of Student Discipline (Dr. Woodfield), also appointed by the Board of Governors, to achieve and maintain efficiency in the carrying out of the Code's objectives. The Supervisory Board also accepts and considers recommendations for both student and faculty members. Professor David Townsend of the Faculty of Law sits as a member of the Supervisory Board and serves as a technical advisor to the Chairperson on legal and procedural matters.

(a) Fine up to a maximum of 6% AND/OR (b) Dismissal from the Studen Police Force.

7. OFFENCE: Any student who violates the 'NO SMOKING' restrictions in effect in a building in which an event is being held to which Student Police have been assigned is guilty of an offence.

SANCTION:

Fine up to a maximum of 6%.

8. OFFENCE:

(a) Any student who knowingly allows his/her I.D. card to be used by another is guilty of an offence; OR (b) Any student who wrongfully uses or falsifies an I.D. card is guilty of an offence.

Praxis

In a 1982 communique received from the Chair of the Student Disciplinary Committee the following was stated:

> "On November 18, 1980, the Board of Governors of the University of New Brunswick approved a Student Disciplinary Code, the provisions of which established a mechanism for self-discipline among students. The very concept of self-discilpine reveals a philosophy held by the administrators at this University. They recognize that university life creates a special environment and that student discipline should be administered by individuals who are the most familiar with this environment—the students themselves."

Reassuring words these; presumably stated with the basic tenet of Common Law in mind: that people should be judged by their peers. Unfortunately, however, the administration merely pays lip service to the ideals stated therein. In the past academic year a disciplinary case involving the UNB Campus and a UNB student was taken before the Board of Deans rather than the Student Disciplinary Committee. The explanation was that this particular case should be heard by the Board of Deans for "the best interests of all parties", a decision reached after discussions between the Commissioner of Student Discipline, the Chairman of the SDC, the Dean of Students and the technical legal advisor as well as the complainants. The question that comes immediately to mind is why establish a policy and procedures if they are going to be followed only at the whim of the administration in its increasingly arbitrary fashion? The action taken by the Board of Deans runs counter to the above quoted philosophy.

Simply stated, disciplinary cases involving students should be heard by the SDC, particularly if the charges are brought under the Student Disciplinary Code (as they were in the aforementioned case), as the SDC better understands the Code and is in a better position to judge the actions of students. The Board of Deans should act instead as an appellate body (body of appeal) as is established in the Code. Had the case mentioned above been heard before the SDC a more appropriate decision would likely have been made and we would be well on our way to regulating the actions of the Campus Police. As it now stands, we are back to square one with no worthwhile precedent upon which to rely.

The administration must recognize the fact that students do have rights and these rights must be respected. Just treatment of students in disciplinary matters is long overdue. In the now familiar words of Lord Heward ''It is not merely of some importance, but is of fundamental importance that justice should not only be done, but should manifestly and undoubtedly be seen to be done.'' (Rex v. Sussex Justices, Ex parte McCarthy (1924, 1 KB 256).

This week's Political Perspectives column was meant to be published two weeks ago. It was not however, due to pressing deadlines, hair pulling, and lack of staff. (Hint, hint. Oh, well. Hi-yo, Silver, away! The Lone Ed.)

All last week, I watched the C.B.C. with keen interest, hoping to receive some visionary insight from the Pope's historic visit. I was amazed at the pontiff's patience and stamina in the face of such an exhausting itinerary. It struck me as ironic that so much fanfare would accompany such a simple and patient man (especially considering some of the other figure-heads we aspire to see). Canadians definitely arose to the occasion with passion, tenderness and reverance, exhibiting a faith seldom seen in our day to day lives. Although I was impressed and at times touched by the Pope's sensativity to modern issues, I was also distraught by the media's use of him as a figure, an image to be idolized and commercially packaged.

Only in a society such as ours can a religious pilgrimmage, designed to renew faith, strengthen church unity, moral values, and belief in God be used as a forum for issues too often neglected by our media. The messages carried by the pope were all important issues in modern society, yet ones neglected too often for the sake of placidity and conformity. 250,000 people will assemble to hear the pope speak of the evils of nuclear war and the perils of immorality yet very few will carry his message further than the stadium or church they have assembled in. Our own press would prefer to present the image of the Pope 12 hours a day for 12 days instead of carrying his much needed message all year long! The Pope is only a man, a representative of the church, although reveared and symbolic his job is to present the word of God as a messenger of God, not an idol, or star, but a prophet and medium to the people. I think this intention is overlooked and not emphasized enough by the society he is trying to communicate with. Although I am not a religious person, I see the value of the Pope's message and realize the importance of action in the face of an ominous future. We must perceive him as a medium for our unity, and continue to press for social justice and peace. I think this message moves beyond a question of faith in God, it moves to a belief in principals that should govern a civil society. Now that the pope has left Canada and the fanfare subsided, will Canadians have a renewed energy and desire to deal with such prevailing issues that he touched upon, or do we need an image to show us the way, a figure to be used as an excuse for our own weakness? I think the Pope himself would be happy if we forgot his image long enough to remember his message.

This column, back for its third year of publication in the Brunswickan, is sponsored by Counselling Services and aims at familiarizing UNB - STU students facing similar choices and dilemmas with the avenues of assistance that are offered.

The core of these services is the Career Center of Counselling Services in the Alumni Memorial Building on campus. Expanded three years ago on a grant from the Counselling Foundation of Canada, the expansion has proved its worth and has recently become the financial responsibility of UNB.

At Counselling Services Career Center, experiencec personal and career counsellors are available for confidential assistance. lin career Counselling, an expert does not tell you what work you should be doing or use a career test for a quick and sometimes irrelevant answer. Instead, advanced selfdiscovery procedures are used to help you see more clearly your orientations, options and priorties, laying the ground work for an informed decision. Setting upon a career path may very well be one of the most challenging - and frightening - things we ever have to do. And although it is a decision no one can make for us, the aim of this column is to introduce and outline services, programmes and career information that can help untangle the choices. AN OPEN LETTER TO STUDENTS FROM THE TRUSTEES OF THE SUB

"The students are running the SUB with the help of the administration. Operations are under the direction of a student board. This is set down in the constitution and everyone seems to be in agreement."

So said Gary Davis -- a UNB graduate and Acting Director of the SUB Board when it was first constituted--in the December 3, 1968 edition of The Brunswickan.

Since student leaders first made known the need for a new student facility in 1962, the University has advocated student involvement. Students voted in 1964 to increase SRC fees by \$10 in order to pay for half the cost of construction. So in 1969 it seemed only fitting for the UNB Board of Governors to delegate the responsibility of running the building to a predominently student board.

The University still believes in student management of the SUB even though the SUB Board has been dissolved for the present. Four students--three from UNB and one from St. Thomas--serve on the newly-appointed Board of Trustees. True, we are appointed by the University and not the Student Union executive, but we are students with proven records of involvement in student activities and student affairs: Larry Fox as Orientation Chairman; Suzanne Currie as a Student Representative to the Senate; Gordon Loane as a long-time broadcaster on CHSR; and Joel Leger as a former Chairman of the SUB Board.

Audio-Visual Services Director John Webster, who chairs the Trustees, and Intercollegiate Co-ordinator Jim Born, in particular, have also worked with students in a number of capacities.

And we are here to serve you now.

The Board of Trustees is not a permanent organization. We are here to get the affairs of the SUB running smoothly and in a business-like manner. These are our objectives:

- •to appoint a permanent Director of the SUB by December 1. 1984:
- •to finalize the leases with commercial tenants;
- •to establish an annual budget for the operation of the building;
- •to negotiate terms for the existence of the Campus Services Ltd. store;
- •to determine staffing requirements of the SUB;
- •to develop hiring procedures and staffing policies;
- •to draft suitable job descriptions for the Director and Assistant Director of the SUB;
- •to authorize immediately necessary building maintenance and renovations;
- •to conduct a building inventory;
- •to evaluate and standardize hours of operation and building security;
- •to produce an events manual with procedures and policies for use of the building by student and off-campus groups.

NOTE:

The views expressed within are my own and not necessarily those of the Brunswickan.

We have already appointed UNB graduate Kim Norris as Interim Director of the SUB. As we do, he welcomes your suggestions and recommendations for the operation of the building. Please submit them in writing to:

Office of the Director Room 104-105 Student Union Building

The UNB Board of Governors, who, in fact, owns and maintains the SUB, will be monitoring our activities. President James Downey has said publicly that the Board will be asked to review the question of appropriate longer-term arrangements for the administration of the SUB, after the Trustees have restored normal operations and there has been adequate opportunity for consultation with various interested student groups.

Inconsistencies In **MacKenzie House** Affair

Larry Long, ousted MacKenzie House President photo: John Bosnitch This summer, the residents of Mackenzie House received letters from the Men's residence office that MacKenzie House was being turned into a guiet house. The residents had to accept accommodation in another residence or else they had to appeal to get back into MacKenzie.

This action, undertaken by former Dean of Men's Residences Bob Smith in the waning days of his term (which ended July 1,1984), was meant to calm down MacKenzie House, which had a reputation as a "rowdy house." To this end, Dean Smith also told all members of third floor they would not be readmitted.

The third floor of MacKenzie was the scene of some rather wild times last year; however, there are always exceptions in a group, and some third floor residents were never discipline problems.

Dean Smith arbitrarily kicked out a whole floor, and when Dr. Reavley Gair became the new Dean later in the summer, he refused to go back on the previous Dean's decision.

MacKenzie went through substantial changes. In all, only 22 out of 105 residents were readmitted to the house. The men of MacKenzie basically had three conditions:

1) if they lived on third floor, they were kicked out.

2) if they had a grade point average blow 3.5, they were kicked out.

3) if they didn't want to live in a quiet house, they were kicked out.

One student, Larry Long, was the Vice-President of the House Committe e last year. Mr. Long was not allowed back into MacKenzie, nor in fact, allowed into the residence system at all. No sufficient reason was ever given, as Long never had any in-house disciplinary actions taken against him, and he had a G.P.A. as high or higher than some who were readmitted. Mr. Long did circulate a petition last year expressing disapproval of Reavley Gair being named new Dean of Men's Residences. The petition was signed by approximately 80

A committee will be meeting to give Larry Long the reason(s) he was cast out of the residence system. Members include Dean of Students Don Eagle, Don of MacKenzie Regeev Mathur, and the present and former Dean of Men's Residences, Reavley Gair and Robert Smith.

There are many inconsistencies in this affair. Some people were readmitted even though they had had charges against them for house rule infractions and/or damages; some even though their G.P.A's were not up to requirement. Jim Arsenault, who helped Larry Long circulate the petition, was not let back into MacKenzie, but was made a Proctor at Rosary Hall. Julius Csabai, who was from third floor, was readmitted. In fact, he was the only member of his floor let back in. The reasons? He was on the House Committee, and was needed to organize the incoming committee, since President Long was now persona non grata. He was also cited by the residence administration as showing valuable leadership qualities. The third reason he was readmitted, the administrators later revealed, was that he was in fact let in by mistake, but it was to late to do anything about it.

This is a very odd situation. The Brunswickan calls for a restructuring of appeal and grievance procedures in the residence administration, and for some kind of board (rather like a SUB Board that works) to be developed, with students and administrators both. As it stands now, the residence system is arguably the least democratic administration on campus.

Speaking of the SUB Board case: Is the tide of opinion turning? Is the Daily Gleaner going to retract the mistakes made in their editorial of Monday? Is the Alumni Association going to come out in Bosnitch's favor? Stay tuned, campers, stay tuned!

gems for World Shut Your Kilimanjaro and Wilder, but Mouth, Cope does all the vocals and plays rhythm guitar, bass guitar, and atmosphere-rich Casio organ. This Cope solo album bears resemblances to his work with

the Teardrop Explodes, through it is certainly not alone. Cope has come up with material that is more commercial at times, but by no means has he sold out. "Greatness and Perfection", "Strasbourg", and "Sunshine Playroom" are all well thought-out songs which have hit written all over them. "Pussyface" conjures up early Bowie images, while "Elegant Chaos" is quite a bit like the recent subdued strains of The Psychedelic Furs. Melodically, Cope continues along his oft-psychedelic way in parts of such songs as "Kolly Kibbers' Birthday", whose title just invites one to listen further, "Metranil Vavin", with its intriguing and beautifullyfused tempo change from stanza to chorus, "Elegant Chaos", and the moody album closer "Lunatic and Fire Piston", with its dischordant Casio organ conclusion. As well, atmospheric and arguably psychedelic interjections appear betwixt and between various songs on the album.

Cope has an interesting way of putting things, and that is the essence of much of his In music's charm. "Strasbourg", he metaphorically sums up a relationship with the line "If I was France and you were Germany/What an alliance that would be", while in "Kolly Kibbers' Birthday", he sings "My life is a delicate balance/The distance between Time A and Time B".

The biting cynicism of Cope's lyrics is particularly striking in "Elegant Chaos". Right off the bat, he puts it on the line, saying "I was happy for a while but the joke is over", and then bemoaning "the rotten core of man" and "(his) cool cool attitude to ignorance". He stands alone, proclaiming "Sanity is - it's neither one thing or the other/My bit fear is to dig it at last and have it taken away". The alientation contiues in the song's final stanza, as he sings:

Man & Myth By RICHARD K. ANDERSON

"Dramatically Forever"

I recognize you! You read "Man and Myth" last week, right? I thought so — I have a thing for faces. Actually I have a thing for entire bodies, but faces have always held a special place for me: right up there on the front of the head.

Last week my co-columnist and I promised to entice you each week with excruciatingly orgasmic mind-blowing concepts. We figured you couldn't ask for much more. That, a bowl of Heavenly Hash, and a stack of completed assignments are as close to nirvana as you or I are likely to get.

This week I have written the column, Morgan J. takes over the next. The following week I will cover a concept that will eradicate boredom from your life forever and is true to boot: the left and right side of your brain have independent streams of consciousness. You never again will find yourself alone. Intriguing huh?

This week I will offer less intriguing but more fascinating fare: a method that will add 12 to 18 years to the life of an average person and decrease the amount of their illness by 35%. I am convinced that once you read this column and the book I mention that your life will be changed dramatically forever.

Why should you care? Because one day you will stop, call it die if you prefer, and I don't think you like the idea of stopping. I can think of two or three incredibly enjoyable things I could be doing during an extra 12 to 18 years.

You could exercise regularly, which once you appreciate getting high on endorphins is a real joy. You can reduce the in take of drugs (alcohol, nicotine, THC, and more nasty varieties) which involves a trade-off of pleasure now for pleasure later -always a difficult decision. Or you can keep your body as finely tuned as possible by ingesting the optimum dosages of nutrients. For most people this last method gives by far the best ratio of greatest gain for least cost.

Linus Pauling defined in 1968 (what was your state in 68?) the beautiful science of Orthomolecular Medicine: "The preservation of good health in the human body of substances that are normally present in the body and are required for health".

Linus Pauling (1954 Nobel Prize in Chemistry, 1962 Nobel Peace Prize, publisher of over 400 papers) published for the public in 1970 "Vitamin C and The Common Cold", which was awarded the Phi Betta Kappa award for best scientific book of the year. Although five excellent blind and double-blind studies since 1942 had conclusively demonstated that Vitamin C had value in controlling the Common Cold and reducing iliness, nine more were carried out between 1972 and 1975 to prove Pauling wrong. They proved him right. He therefore published "Vitamin C, the Common Cold and the Flu" for the public in 1976. This book my friends, will change your life, dramatically, and forever, because it will convince you to supplement your diet with ascorbic acid (Vitamin C), and convince you to take full advantage of the state of the art in health today: Orthomolecular Medicine. I can not convince you of this in a single column. I hope to convince you to read "Vitamin C, the Common Cold, and the Flu", which Phil 1053 taught me is good enough. Linus Pauling estimates that the improvement in health caused by the optimum ingestion of ascorbic acid will cause an increase in the life-span of the average person of between 12 and 18 years. A measure of the increase of quality of life can be found in the discovery that the - × studies carried out on Vitamin C and the Common Cold - three at the University of Toronto - showed an average decrease in illness of 35 . What other benefits can we get from Orthomolecular Medicine? A strong association between reduced incidence of heart disease and the regular ingestion of tocopherol (vitamin E) was shown by a survey of 17, 884 peopole between 50 and 98 by Richard Passwater Ph.d. The survey included 2,508 people between 50 and 98 that had taken 400 IU of tocopherol daily for 10 years or more. Although based on U.S. Dept. of Heath, Education, and Welfare figures (HRS 74--222) you would expect to find 836 of these having heart disease there were only 4. A second group of 1,038 had taken 1,200 IU or more of tocopherol daily for 4 years or more. Although you would expect 323 of these to be suffering from heart disease there were only 7. The optimum dosage of Vitamin C lies probably somewhere between 1 and 10 grams for most people. You may regularly be able to get one quarter of a gram in your diet if you eat very well. The Psychedelic Furs - Mirror Moves

We're still experimenting. We're trying to get over to some people who might not otherwise be listening to us.

The fourth and latest album by the English group The Psychedelic Furs, Mirror Moves, is certainly their most subdued effort yet. As such, it has elicited a mixed response worldwide, though several British publications have been lavish in their praises.

Particularly when one recalls with fondness the past music of the Psychedelic Furs, Mirror Moves comes off as a rather blah product on a first listen. However, it is truly an album which grows on you. In fact, it could be said that it is. their most easily understood album to date. Agreed, it was clear that the Furs were opinionated young men on their marvellous 1980 self-titled debut, but the thread tying things together was often rather flimsy. The same thing could be said, albeit to a lesser extent, for their next two albums Talk, Talk, Talk and Forever Now.

Today, the Furs are essentially a trio — vocalist Richard Butler, who writes all of the group's lyrics, giving their material a distinctive personality with his sneering Cockney-inflected voice, bassist Tim Butler, and guitarist John Ashton. Mirror Moves producer Keith Forsey serves as drummer and percussionist on the album and saxophonist Mars Williams makes occasional contributions. The textured instrumentation still revolves around Butler's vocals. Richard Butler remains as intriguing a lyricist as ever, such as in "Alice's House" "High Wire Days", which rank among the album's prime cuts. All of the tracks are perfect for ADR radio stations, and there might be a singles chart hit in the sax-rich "Heartbeat". However, the cream of the album is "The Ghost In You". The lyrics are superb, and Butler peaks vocally in a song awash with a glorious instrumental background, including flutes. Overall, I personally preferred the earlier work of the Psychedelic Furs. However, it is nothing short of closedminded to dismiss Mirror Moves as a dud simply because it is not in fact a mirror move.

UNB Vs. Toronto

The hockey Red Devils start their season off with a bang tonight when University of Toronto Blues invade the Aitken Centre for the first two weekend games.

The Blues, who eliminated the Red Devils' last March on the way to the national title, are here for an 8 p.m. start tonight and a 2 p.m. encounter Saturday afternoon. Reserved tickets for the game cost students \$3 and adults \$4. It is the first set in a tough preseason schedule the Devils have, with Concordia Stingers here next Saturday and Three Rivers, P.Z. here on October 19. The top flight competition will give the Devils something they didn't have a year ago, according to Coach Don MacAdam.

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"We were having a good season last year within our conference, but we didn't have any games against outside teams that gave us a chance to compare ourselves against the top teams," MacAdam said. 'Going into the playoffs against Toronto, we really didn't know how we stacked up against top teams from the other conferences."

Of course, the Devils played Toronto tough in both games at the Aitken Centre, and actually gave the Blues the toughest competition they received on the way to the national title. That fact, plus the A.U.A.A. championship, UNB won, is one of the reasons

Clements, who is back with the Devils after a tryout with the Toronto Maple Leafs. He and Paul Murphy are the only returning blue-liners from a year ago.

"Scott is the best defenceman in the Atlantic Conference," MacAdam said. "We're going to rely on Scott and Paul a lot this season to steady things for us on the blue-line."

In goal, the Devils have lost all star Kevin Rochford, but appear to be sold with second year man Jamie Frizzell and newcomer David Lutes.

MacAdam foresees a big difference in Frizzell this year now that he is established as the No. 1 man between the pipes.

"Jamie can certainly do the job for us," MacAdam said. "He and David Lutes are both very competent goaltenders. Jamis is not one to the No. 2 goaltender, although in actual fact both he and Kevin shared the job last year. Jamie isn't content just to be on the team; he wants to play a big role in how the team does."

The Devils of a year ago were awfully strangly defensively, with the club capable of closing the door on almost any team in the league after it got by a couple of goals. In contrast, UNB was in a lot of trouble last year if it got behind by a goal or two, no matter how weak the opposition. That should be all different this season.

"We should have a lot of people this year who will be able to score on a consistent basis, and that means if we fall behind by a goal or two it won't be the end of the world. Last year we found it very difficult to play catch-up hockey. We still don't want to, but I think this year we will be more successful when that situation arises," MacAdam said.

By the same token, however, the Devils may not be able to close the door on other teams as effectively as they did a year ago. "It's important to play sound defensive hockey, because as you advance and play the better teams, the defence is what makes you or breaks you," MacAdam said. "It's going to be awfully important this year for our forwards to do the job defensively, to be good twoway hockey players."
