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SACKVILLE ACADEMY .- We learn from the Annual Catalogue of this popular Institution (which has lately issued from our press, orna mented by a beautiful copperplate print, exhibiting a view of the Academy Building and the adjacent grounds,) that, during the year 1847, the total number of Students was 144-namely, in the Classical Department, 60; in the Literary and Scientific Department, 46; and in the Primary Department, 35. The numbers in the different classes were as follows :- In Greek, 36 : Latin, 59; French, 63; Mental Philosophy, 9; Logic, 9; Astronomy, 25; Natural Philoso-phy, 9; Chemistry, 16; Surveying and Navigation, 25; Geometry, 42; Algebra, 35; English Grammar, 84; Arithmetic, 91; Geography, 70; History, 17; Book-keeping, 14. At the close of the term which has just ended, seventyfive of the Students were boarders in the Aca demy.

The educational charge of the Institution still continues under the management of the Reverend Humphley Pickard, as Principal, with Mr. Joseph R. Hea, as Classical and French Tutor; Thomas W. Wood, Esq. English Master, and Mr. George Milligan and Mr. John T Outhouse, assistant teachers. The patronage bestowed upon the Academy shews the estimation in which their labours are held in various parts of these Provinces, and says much for their zeal and ability, as well for the manner in which the other officers of the Institution discharge the duties with which they are en-

trusted.

The next term will begin on Thursday the oth of January. The charges for tuition, beard &c., in no case exceed £30 per annum.—St. tohn Courier.

#### EXPLANATION OF SIGNS.

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## GENERAL INFORMATION.

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### THE COURSE OF STUDY.

This is extensive, systematic, and thorough. For the purpose of securing the advantages of method and regularity, and at the same time accommodating different Classes of Students, there are Four Courses of Instruction.

#### PRIMARY COURSE.

The First, or Primary Course, includes

Geography, Parsing, English Grammar, History,

Arithmetic, First Lessons in Composition and Penmanship.

### LITERARY AND ECIENTIFIC COURSE.

The Studies in the Second, or Literary and Scientific Course, are arranged to occupy a period of Two Years.

#### FIRST YEAR.

First Term—Algebra, Geometry, Chemistry, and French.

Second Term—Algebra, Geometry, Natural Philosophy, and French.

#### SECOND YEAR.

First Term.—Trigonometry,
Mensuration,
And French—or Mineralogy and Geology.

Second Term.—Rhetoric,
Logic,
Moral Philosophy, and Astronomy,
Political Economy.

#### CLASSICAL COURSE.

The Third, or Classical Course, includes, in addition to all the Studies of the First and Second Courses,

Latin Grammar and Exercises, Greek Lessons,

Latin Reader, Greek Grammar and Exercises.

Cæsar, or Sallust, Jacob's Greek Reader,

Virgil's Æneid and Bucolics, Greek Testament,
Cicero's Select Orations, Homer's Iliad, &c. &c.

Roman and Grecian Antiquities and History, Ancient Geography, &c. &c.

#### COLLEGIATE COURSE.

The Fourth, or Collegiate Course, includes such Studies, in addition to those of the preceding Courses, as will prepare Students for the successive Annual Examinations, requisite for admission to the Degree of Bachelor of Arts, at King's College. Fredericton.

#### GENERAL EXERCISES.

Public Declamation from all the Students once in two weeks.

A portion of every Sunday is devoted to the united Study of the Sacred Scriptures, under the direction of the Chaplain.

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#### TERMS.

The next Term will begin on Thursday the 7th January, 1847, and continuing Twenty-four Weeks, end on Wednesday, the 23d June. The Second Term will begin on Thursday, the 5th of August, and continuing Nineteen Weeks, end on Wednesday, 15th December.

#### VACATIONS.

Six Weeks preceding the first Thursday in August, and Three Weeks preceding the first Thursday after the first day of January.

#### EXAMINATIONS.

At the end of each Term, to commence on the last Monday, at Nine o'clock, A. M.

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Additional Charges will be made for Tuition in the higher Departments, but the expense for Board, &c. and Tuition, will in no case exceed - - - - - £30 per annum.

Ten Shillings per week will be charged to those who remain during the Vacations.

The amount of the ordinary expenses must be paid in advance one half at the beginning, and the remainder at the middle of each Term.

Each Pupil should bring with him:—Not less than three suits of clothes; eight day and three night shirts; six pairs of stockings; two or three pairs of shoes; two hats or caps; also, a cloak, or overcoat; an umbrella; combs and brushes; and a Bible, with marginal references.

Parents are particularly requested to send every Article marked with the name of the Pupil in full.

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#### REMARKS.

All who design to become Students in this Institution, should enter, if at all possible, at the commencement of a Term, as the regular Classes are then organized; pupils, however, will be received at any time.

The only pre-requisites for admission into the Primary Department are a good moral character, ability to read and spell, and age sufficient to enable the Pupil to prepare regularly for recitation.

The time which will be occupied in the First and Third Courses will depend upon the capacity and industry of the Student.

Certificates will be given, at the close of each Academical Year, to such Students as may have passed satisfactory examinations in all the studies of either Course.

Persons who may not wish to pursue either Course regularly, will be allowed to enter any of the Classes in order for which they are qualified.

Whenever it may be requested by a sufficient number of Students. Classes will be instructed in French, Book-Keeping, Land Surveying, Navigation, Analytical Geometry, Calculus, &c. &c.

The Institution is furnished with Maps, Globes, Chemical and Philosophical Apparatus, &c. &c.

Lectures will be delivered upon the different branches of Natural Science, &c.

Every effort will be made to secure cheerful diligence in application to study. The object will be not only to instruct, but to educate; not only to impart useful knowledge, but to fix good habits. No reasonable exertions will be spared in giving a thorough and symmetrical training to all the mental and moral powers, and in avoiding the too common error of cultivating the intellect at the expense of the heart. The course of training will be directed, as far as possible, to the formation of an intelligent, efficient, and manly character, suited to the duties and responsibilities of active life.

Every reasonable precaution will be used to preserve a healthy state of moral feeling. It is determined that no one shall continue in the Academy whose character and habits are found to exert an influence unfavourable to good morals or good order.

The government will be strictly parental. The Governor and Principal will reside in the same Building with the Students.— Daily records of scholarship and conduct will be made with great care.

Parents and Guardians are carnestly advised that lads should be furnished very sparingly, if at all, with spending money. Money sufficient to meet incidental expenses should be lodged with the Governor and Chaplain of the Institution, or with some other responsible person.

Sackville is a retired country village, pleasant and healthy, and easy of access from all parts of the Lower Provinces.

The Academical Building is elegant, spacious, and comfortable, and delightfully situated.
