### Burton L. Bentley is Reported in Hospital in France Was in Battle of

Halifax, Nov. 26th.—Word has been received by J. H. Bentley, of Bentley and Layton, that his son Burton L. was admitted to a military hospital, France, suffering from cordite poisoning. Young Bentley is a former well known Halifax County Academy student, and is only in his 20th year, but he has seen a lot of active fighting and so far got through all right till poisoned by cordite fumes. He originally enlisted in the 210th battalion, but was later transferred to the cyclists' corps with which unit he went overseas. In England he was again transferred to the motor machine gun corps in April 1917. He has been in France with that corps for over a year and took part in the great Cambrai drive, when that stronghold was captured by the Canadians. From Cambrai onwards till November 1st, he was steadily in the fighting. When he was poisoned his crew of motor machine gunners were driving back a detachment of Hunns from a village and the fighting took the form of a huc to huc "scrapping". The crew had rushed into one house thinking to "net" a band of Hunns, but the latter had "beat it" leaving the building filled with cordite fumes. Young Bentley and the whole crew, having rushed on sightly into the fumes, fell victims to the poison in them. It is encouraging to know that cordite poisoning is not as dangerous as the regular gas poisoning and the Halifax soldier's recovery is expected.

### Cuban Prices for Canadian Products.

Trade Commissioner J. C. MANZER

**POTATOES**  
Large quantities of Early Rose and Bliss Triumph potatoes are wanted in Cuba for seed within the next six weeks and the supply offering is not nearly equal to the demand at \$8 per barrel of Havana. The demand continues good for white table stock and sales are being made by Canadian dealers at \$6.75 for barrels of 160 and sacks of 180 pounds of Havana. Cuba's potato supply at present is coming entirely from the United States and Canada. Canada commenced shipping new crop potatoes about the middle of September.

**CODFISH**  
There is a good demand for the best grades of codfish and sales are being made at \$20 per cwt. of Havana. The poorer grades are not in great demand. Considerable quantities are coming forward from Nova Scotia weekly by way of Boston.

**HAY**  
With small arrivals the hay market continues firm at \$60 per ton for a good grade. At present it is almost impossible to secure transportation for hay from Canada.

### Germany Will Not Get Back Her Colonies

London, 26.—Winston Churchill, Minister of Munitions, speaking at Dundee, said he would do everything in his power to make a League of Nations a practical and powerful reality. But a League of Nations he contended was no substitute for the supremacy of the British Fleet. The Minister declared that none of the German Colonies would ever be restored to Germany and none of the conquered part of Turkey would ever be restored to Turkey.

### The Beaten German Soldiers Eager to Return to Work

American Army of Occupation, Nov. 25th.—Most of the Germans in the retiring army have shown keen eagerness on reaching German soil to return to their homes immediately and engage again in their civilian occupations according to reports. A movement of the other way by Aleutians and Lorrainers who have been in the German army, is in progress. Many of them have been released by the Germans or given passes by soldiers' and sailors' committees and have reached the American lines.

Not a great deal of discipline among the German troops moving along the roads is reported. They are doing much as they please when the officers are not attempting to take severe measure because of the feeling of the men against them. Instances of petty looting in various regions are occurring according to accounts coming in.

The German commanders continue to communicate with the third army by wireless informing them of the Germans progress each day.

### Visit to France This Week By the King of England

Paris, Nov. 24.—Great preparations are being made for the visit of King George to France this week. President Poincare and members of the French government will meet the king at the railway station whence a procession will drive to the foreign office where a suite of rooms has been reserved for the use of the king and his party during their stay in Paris.

The official object of the king's visit is to convey personally to the president his congratulations on the successful termination of the war. King George will pay an official visit to the president on Thursday, the day of his arrival, and in the evening a dinner will be given by the president at the Elysee palace. On Friday there will be a reception at the British embassy and on Saturday the king will leave Paris to visit the armies.

United States has a wheat crop of about 919,000,000 bushels, which is some 100,000,000 bushels more than the average of the last five years.

On an average there is a war every ten years. There were eleven great wars in the last century, the most costly in men and money being the American civil war.

Prospects are bright that the Eastern S. S. Co. will be able to resume operation of the St. John Boston service next spring. Commissioner Bullock has been advised by A. C. Currie, local manager.—St. John Globe.

The annual meeting of the Provincial Exhibition Commission was held in Halifax. It was decided that it would be impossible to hold an Exhibition next year, but that the Annual Fair be re-established in 1920.

A company, one of whose members is S. E. Elkin, M. P. of St. John, is preparing to start airplane manufacture in that city, and to operate an air transport service between the Maritime Provinces and Upper Canada and the United States.

Fishermen are still salvaging flour from the wrecked steamer Alcor, which went ashore early last summer near Seal Island, and yesterday morning the steamer Bruce Cann arrived from south shore ports with 130 bags as part of her cargo.—Yarmouth Herald.

The automobile owners formed a Provincial Association at Halifax on Tuesday Nov. 19th, merging itself into the Nova Scotia Automobile League. A director from each County was nominated, but Yarmouth's was not published.

The influenza total in New Brunswick is placed at 1,000 deaths and it was epidemic all over that Province. It was the most severe malady ever experienced there.

Jose Inez Garcia, Mexican rebel leader, died of Spanish influenza at Purepero, State of Michoacan recently, if reports are to be relied upon.

Health Commissioner Copeland of New York city, estimates that there are about 21,000 children in the city who have been made full or half orphans by Spanish influenza. In response to an appeal for foster parents to care for children made orphans by the epidemic, fifty or sixty persons have asked for permission to adopt one or more children.

Drastic Reconstruction of the Union Government is Under Consideration

One Change Will be the Placing of a Captain of Industry at Head of Trade and Commerce Department—Parliament to Meet First Week in January.

Ottawa, Nov. 26.—Parliament, according to present intentions, will meet on or about January 6th. The government is already engaged on a legislative slate and the estimates are under preparation. The session is expected to be long and interesting, demobilization and reconstruction problems demanding solution, with Laurierites and "Ginger group" anti-Unionists working to embarrass and impede the work of the government.

The dinner to Hon. Robert Rogers in Toronto tomorrow night is expected to disclose the strength of this so-called "Ginger group." The banquet itself is a sort of free-for-all, every one with a grievance being welcome, and for that reason is likely to attract a large crowd, but few figures of national prestige are expected to attend.

Sir Robert Borden may not return to Canada until near the end of the session. His return is almost certain to be signalled by an important reconstruction of his cabinet. This reconstruction plan was at the point of consummation when Sir Robert was suddenly called to England. It can be stated now that this reorganization was of a much more drastic character than was hinted at the time, involving the retirement of at least three ministers, one of whom has been for years outstanding national figure, and the placing at the head of the trade and commerce department of one of the country's leading captains of industry.

### Campaign in Kings County For Support of Navy and Merchant Marine

Kings County has done a noble work in the different Campaigns carried on here for Y. M. C. A. Red Cross, Knights of Columbus etc as well as the Victory Loan which produced money to bring our boys home and carry on the trade of the country.

Another campaign is now being launched and it is just as important as any other one which has been completed, in fact it is more necessary. This campaign is to raise funds so that we may provide comforts for the men of our fleet and help the dependents of the officers and men of the Navy and Mercantile Marine who have lost their lives during the war, and that we may support hospitals, orphanages, school and convalescent homes for our disabled seamen.

For this purpose a Sailor's Week has been inaugurated and an appeal is made throughout Canada. Nova Scotia is only asked to raise \$100,000 for this fund, and the amount apportioned to Kings County is only \$3000. The date of the campaign is December 9th to 14th inclusive.

To provide for this campaign the Kentville Branch of the Navy League of Canada has arranged for an organization meeting in PASTIME HALL, KENTVILLE, Saturday, Nov. 30th. Luncheon will be served in the Hall at 12.30 o'clock to which representative men and women from all parts of the County are invited.

Addresses will be given at 1.30 by Mr. Percy Strong, Secretary of the League, Halifax; Rev. Harold T. Roe, organizer, of Halifax; a representative of the Navy and others at which plans for organization of the County for the week's Campaign will be completed.

The public is specially invited to attend the meeting at the close of the luncheon and assist in the work of organization.

### Tragic Death at Cansan

The body was brought to Leslie Aalders and authorities notified. It seems strange that such a long time elapsed before his absence was known and search made.

**Hindenburg Throws up the Sponge Absolutely**

**He Says the Germans Could Not Now Carry On Operations Even Against the French Army Alone**

Bern, Switzerland, Saturday, Nov. 23.—Field Marshal Von Hindenburg, according to the semi-official Wola agency, has telegraphed the Berlin government, asserting categorically that the German army, because of the hard terms of the armistice and of the internal situation, is in no position to renew fighting. The German military leader, added that even operations against the French army alone would be impossible.

Amsterdam, November 24.—Field Marshal Von Mackensen, the former German Commander in Rumania arrived in Berlin Thursday with his staff, according to a Berlin despatch to the Rheinisch Westphalian Gazette. The German troops returning with him met Czechoslovak forces at Silein, Moravia, and were unable

to continue the journey by way of Oderberg and were forced to withdraw from Austria by way of Vienna and Passau.
