RECIPROCITY

The Hon. Mr. Fielding has presented his proposition before Parliament, and they are as unexpected as they are revolutionary. The consensus of opinion seems to be that, taken over the whole of the Dominion the accepting of the proposals as laid down would be ruinous to the nation. It is much too early yet however, to say that it will or will not do for the country, and we are of opinion that such a drastic change in the fiscal system should be put before the selectors in a straight question, viz Free Trade or Protection. Never yet has there been a change but some prophets have arisen and told us the Country was going to the dogs, but we have always to bear in mind that it must be the greatest good for the greatest number. Until a trial is made (if even it should come to that which some doubt) we cannot speak with authority and can only hope and wait. All minds seem agreed that the Maritime Provinces will benefit by a greater extent than any other part of the Dominion. Speaking locally a greater market is opened up for us in Shingles alone. The proposed reduction of 20 cents will allow us to compete with the Western American Shingle not only compete but be able to dominate the market completely. In the clear shingles our price is always just about 5 cents more than what is being offered in the American market, so with the facilities we have for quick transport to the Eastern States, the trade and prosperity of Campbellton would be assured.

VICTIMS OF CONSUMPTION.

MOTHER AND TWO CHILDREN AT MUSKOKA FREE HOSPITAL.

Are Now Under Treatment—Husband, Too, Had Been a Patient—A Tragedy in Real Life—Heavy Debt on Institution.

A story from the Muskoka Free Hospital for Consumptives tells of a mother who, with her two children, is now under treatment in that institution. The husband had been a patient, but the case was an advanced one when the patient entered, and he has since passed away. There is little doubt but that the wife was infected as a result of caring for her husband, and now she is in the Muskoka Hospital. Her little girl, about five years of age, and a boy of ten years with her, both being afflicted with this dread disease. The words of the mother are pathetic. She writes: "I went to a doctor and got him to examine my lungs to see whether there was anything wrong with them, and he said that the right lung was affected. I have a little girl, about five years old, and the doctor says that if I could take her up with me it would do her ever so much good, as she is not very strong. I have three more children, and one of these, a boy of ten, seems also to be afflicted, and it is advisable that he should enter the hospital."

These three are of the 104 patients who are residents in this deserving institution and being cared for without money and without price. The sorry part of it is that the trustees are carrying a debt of something like \$40,000, incurred largely through the additions that have been made within the past year, and that have more than doubled the accommodation of the institution, together with the heavy cost of maintaining so large a number of free patients. SANTA CLAUS A STRANGER.

He is Officially Unknown to Uncle Sam's Mail Agents.

The postoffice department does not know Santa Claus. The old saint has no official existence so far as Uncle Sam's mail agents are concerned. This is due entirely to the fact that Santa Claus lives everywhere at the same time instead of having a single local habitation like other people. It is very sad, but it cannot be helped. Letters which children address to Santa Claus or Kris Kringle must go straight to the dead letter office.

Some time ago an effort on behalf of the children was made to induce the postoffice department to permit postmasters to open all letters addressed to Santa Claus and turn them over to the parents of the child correspondent or to some local organization having a Christmas fund to spend, but the attorney general for the department rendered an adverse decision, holding as follows:

If postmasters were granted authority to open all such letters and select those which they thought proper to deliver to persons applying for them, there would be temptation and opportunity for postmasters and other employees to open letters indiscriminately, some of which contain inclosures of value, and give us an excuse for such action the authority granted by the department.

The department's legal adviser also was of the opinion that if permission were granted to deliver such letters to benevolent societies and individuals, it would be difficult for the department to draw the line where benevolence ends and commercialism begins. Many persons desire such letters for use in newspapers and magazine stories, the name of the child of some prominent public man attached to such a letter making it especially valuable for that purpose and often correspondingly embarrassing to the parent of the child. Furthermore, the opinion states, such a practice would violate the principle of the sanctity of the seal, which is one of the best features of our postal system, and the department would continually be open to serious suspicion.

KING'S ACCUSER SILENCED

London, Feb. 1.—After brief proceedings today, a special jury before Lord Chief Justice Alverstone cleared King George of imputations against his personal character by finding Edward F. Mylius guilty of circulating a libel. Mylius was sentenced to one year's imprisonment.

Mylius was charged with distributing in England copies of the Liberator a Paris publication, edited by Edward H. James, and in which it was alleged that His Majesty, while Prince of Wales, had contracted a morganatic marriage with the elder daughter of Admiral Sir Michael Seymour at Malta in 1800. The prosecution was conducted by Sir Rufus Isaacs, the Attorney General, assisted by Sir John A. Simon, Solicitor General, and Attorneys Rorlatt and Muir. Mylius had no counsel, looking after his own defence. Mylius has appealed.

A MIGHTY DRAFT.

The Great Drink That Saved the Town of Rottenburg.

Whitsuntide of each year witnesses in the historic town of Rottenburg, on the Tauber, the acting of a drama which recalls a deliverance in the Thirty Years' War, when the victories of Gustavus Adolphus had endangered the Catholic league.

Tilly came to besiege Rottenburg, which was in league with the Swedes. The town was at that time wealthy and well fortified, standing upon steep cliffs above the Tauber and having massive tower-crowned walls.

Against this town came Tilly with great guns that soon put fortune on his side. The defenders of the place, however, contested every inch of ground. Not until the powder tower exploded, through a grenade of the enemy, did the Swedish garrison and citizens reluctantly hang out the white flag after a fight of thirty hours.

Tilly would hear nothing of terms of capitulation. The Swedes might withdraw, but unconditional surrender was demanded of the town. When he had taken possession of the beautiful Rathaus he sent for the senate, with Burgomaster Bezold at their head, and announced their condemnation to death for their obstinate resistance and their disobedience to the imperial commanders.

In vain did the women and children crowd into the market place, throwing themselves at the feet of the victors and begging for mercy. Tilly had already summoned the executioner when some of the wives succeeded in penetrating into the council hall.

The conqueror at last allowed himself to be softened, but he coupled his clemency with a clause that apparently made it of no avail. The senators should be spared if one of their number could empty at a draft the great loving cup of Tauber wine presented to the victor.

Hopeless as the case seemed, the condition was fulfilled by ex-Burgomaster Nusch, who thus saved his own life and the lives of his colleagues.

The cup, which is of glass and holds about three quarts, is to this day in the possession of one of the lineal descendants of the mighty drinker.

Duty of Christian Nations.

The work of bearing the white man's burden has too often taken the form of filling the white man's pocket. Is it any wonder that the behavior of men who are nominally Christians, Christians in profession if not practice, has checked the spread of Christianity? The missionary comes preaching a gospel of justice and love and peace. But when the natives see how men behave who profess the religion which the missionary preaches the preaching loses their value. An African chief is said to have described the process of the contact of civilized men with his people in these words, "First missionary, then trader, then army." It is not much to say that the lives of men nominally Christians have been the greatest of all hindrances to the spread of the gospel.

What, then, is our duty as citizens of Christian nations who desire to see the light of the gospel illumine the world?

The force of public opinion ought to support Governments in keeping a strict watch upon all those who try to exploit the native, either by getting hold of his land or by trading with him. It ought to insist on the absolute prohibition of the sale of drink to natives.

It ought to secure full justice for the native when he brings complaints against those who try to injure him by force or fraud. It ought to punish severely those who abuse the power of a superior race and, above all, those who demoralize it by the sale of liquor or who, as sometimes happens, behave ill to native women. It ought to be our aim to compel those who go forth from among us into non-Christian races to set a better example of conduct worthy of civilized men than many have done. The time in which we live is a critical time, not only critical for ourselves, but critical for the relations of the advanced to the semi-civilized peoples.—By James Bryce, British Ambassador.

Candles For Christmas.

Christmas candlemakers are busy for many months in the year. It would be impossible to estimate how many hundreds of thousands of dozens of pretty little colored wax candles are required for Christmas trees all over Europe and America. There are also candles for church decoration at Christmastide. Whereas the Christmas tree tapers are, some of them, so tiny as to require seventy-two to make a pound, the great altar shafts of pure beeswax will sometimes stand six feet and weigh forty pounds apiece.—Tit-Bits.

Avoiding Temptation.

Hammett—Stingham has never bought a Christmas tree for his children.

Callahan—Probably he is afraid of temptation.

Hammett—Temptation? Callahan—I mean that he is afraid that if he did buy a tree he would be tempted to buy something to hang on it.—Town and Country.

A Wet Harvest Relic.

A curious token has just been found at Barton, inscribed "Tunstead and Happing, 1812. One Halfpenny. Payable at the Corporation House." This was the year of the wet harvest, the worst ever known. It rained incessantly all September, October, and during most of November, and on November 29 farmers were carting barley, a sharp wind frost prevailing. Wheat was 63 shillings a comb, and so bad was it in quality that dough made from the flour resembled slime. Every Monday morning the overseers and church warden met at the parish church to discuss the weather.

TERRIER THRIVES ON POISON.

Revels In Strychnine and Prussic Acid Doses.

There is a dog in Bedminster, near Bristol, which will not die. It thrives on poisons. Prussic acid is quite a delicacy to this canine freak, and it is rather fond of strychnine.

The dog's name is Smut, and it is Irish—a terrier, to be exact. Smut was condemned to death by its master for biting a child. But death is not for Smut—just yet.

Mr. Morris, who owns the dog, took it to a chemist and bought a dose of prussic acid. Two minutes is the allotted time for dogs which take that medicine for their sins; but at the end of half an hour Smut was still lively. In fact, he looked rather pleased. Mr. Morris bought another dose, slightly stronger.

This looked as if it would do too much for even an Irish terrier. Smut became drowsy, and Mr. Morris and the chemist thought at last that he was about to leave the world. But he soon woke up again and wagged his tail merrily at his master.

Mr. Morris took him home, bewildered and promised to call again. The next morning the third attempt at execution took place. Mr. Morris led his faithful and persistent little friend to the chemist's once more, and this time the dose was strychnine spread on steak. Smut was given a nice basket to die in, and was left to end his minutes in peace. When the chemist walked up again to take away the corpse for burial, however, Smut jumped up and kicked his hand as merrily as ever, asking as plainly as a dog could for another dinner just like the last.

The chemist thought of dynamite, but Mr. Morris convinced that his dog was either immortal or innocent, relieved him. Smut did not know his master's intentions, and greeted him with the usual kindly wag of the tail—and almost a smile.

Smut will probably live to be quite an old dog.

Changes In Boston.

In 1630 one of the suburbs of Boston was Neve Towne, which in 1638 was changed to Cambridge and as the seat of Harvard university has an international reputation today. Since the early lines were fixed Cambridge obtained by annexation a part of Charlestown, but has ceded land to the towns of Waltham, Brighton, Watertown, Belmont and West Cambridge, the latter now known as Arlington.

The Boston of 1630, called Tri-Mountain, was very different from the Boston of today. Its area was not extensive, although it included the larger portion of Quincy, out of which the town of Braintree was made at a later period. The first annexations to Boston were Noddles Island (East Boston) and the territory now covered by Chelsea.

In 1640 Boston lost its rights in Quinoy, which were acquired by the town of Braintree. Subsequent additions to Boston have been Roxbury, Dorchester, West Roxbury, Brighton, Charlestown and a part of Brookline.

As an independent municipality Charlestown, which was settled as early as Boston, gave birth to Somerville, Woburn, Malden, Stoneham and Milford and furnished land to Cambridge.—Boston Post.

Value of the Architect.

The members of a country club, the building and decoration of whose clubhouse had been placed entirely in the hands of the architect, even to the minutest furnishings, found themselves in need of new window shades and a few other small household necessities. Instead of buying the things themselves, they sent for the architect to come out and look things over and order appropriate fittings.

"That is not at all an unusual case," said the architect. "I can show you houses that I planned more than twenty-five years ago that have never been furnished with so much as a new chair without my being consulted first. Having deferred entirely to my judgment in the first place, those confiding patrons are afraid to trust their own taste in the smallest matter, and they will probably continue to ask my advice in every little detail of decoration as long as they occupy the house."—New York Globe.

King Edward and Elman.

Mischa Elman had no greater admirers in all Europe than King Edward and the Queen Mother Alexandra, they being among the first to recognize the great genius of the young Russian and command that he appear before them. Mementoes from the late King, now highly prized by young Elman, are a scarf pin, presented to him three years ago, and on an earlier occasion, when he was presented with a ring in the form of a lion's head, the eyes being diamonds. The presentation of the latter was after Elman had appeared at Buckingham Palace at a musicale given in honor of the present King of Spain, who was at the time visiting the English Metropolis. Elman's first series of recitals in London were given under royal patronage, and his audiences are the most fashionable to be seen at any artist recital. Twenty-one shillings, a little over five dollars, is the fee for the best seat to hear Elman when he gives a recital in London.

At the fire brigade conference in Melbourne, the chief officer of the Melbourne Brigade, said it sometimes happened when the alarm of fire was given the night watchman of the burning buildings was asleep, and had to be rescued by the firemen.
