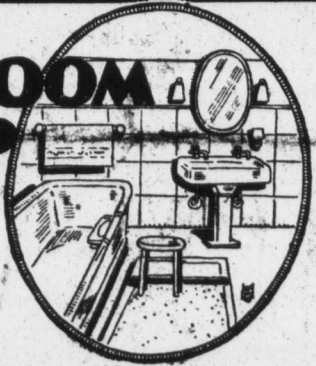

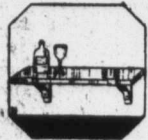

D. S. CREAGHAN IS ELECTED MAYOR OF NEWCASTLE

The civic election was held today in the Town Hall the polls being open from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. As last year—the Mayoralty contest was between D.P. Doyle and D.S. Creaghan. There were six candidates for aldermen with four to be elected. The election passed off quietly and the vote polled was small because of the many ratepayers who are in arrears with their taxes.

Only two of the retiring Aldermen were candidates this year viz:—A.H. MacKay and H.D. Atkinson the other four new candidates being K.H. Armstrong; H.H. Ritchie and J.D. Paulin and Stafford Dani.

Messrs. Armstrong and Ritchie have had experience on the council board in former years. D.S. Creaghan defeated D.P. Doyle for the Mayoralty by a majority of 52 votes. The aldermen elected today were: K.H. Armstrong; H.H. Ritchie; A.H. MacKay and H.D. Atkinson and this year's council will be composed of the four newly elected men along with Aldermen Dickison; Crocker; Russell and Morris who complete their two years service this year. In the Police Court, Newcastle, Thursday, the case against Thomas Ahearn, of Chatham, charged with the theft of ten cords of pulpwood from Daniel Casey, of Gleneg, was concluded and the Magistrate reserved his decision until Tuesday afternoon.

HANSON'S CASE AGAINST GLEANER

Fredericton April 14—R.D. Hanson M.P. was examined at length this morning in disclosure proceedings in connection with his libel suit against the Gleaner. The hearing was before Ernest Mackay, a commissioner. It is expected that Mr. Crocker will be examined later. Hon. Dr. Baxter and Dr. F. K. Taylor are in Fredericton today attending the hearing; Dr. Baxter for Hanson and Dr. Taylor for the Gleaner.

HOUSE MUST DECIDE CHURCH UNION MATTER

The House of Assembly must decide upon the Church Union Bill as the result of the decision of the Corporations committee when the members of the committee by unanimous vote declared in favor of reporting the bill without recommendation. Such a decision is unusual. It is practically passing the buck to the House. This decision was reached after a stormy session in private which has been held upon this particular bill. A motion to strike out Sections 3 and 4 which relate to church property was carried 11 to 8 in the committee and as such sections contain the contentious provisions relating to property the majority evidently was against the bill. Some members who were favorable to the bill were not present however so the balance in the committee which has been very even was destroyed.

Point of Procedure

It is possible that a point may be taken that the failure of the committee to report the bill for favorable consideration is equivalent to unfavorable report. In 1919 on a St. John bill relating to top-wharfage a point of that nature was taken and caused a lengthy debate in the House. The intention of the Corporations Committee evidently is to have the House pass upon the bill with the committee declaring neutrality as far as its own sessions are concerned.

Against Amendment

Amendment of the bill was refused by the promoter Mr. Bentley and others supporting it in committee and the opponents claim that the attitude was in their favor and almost resulted in the Corporations Committee failing to report it.

The reporting of the bill to the House will bring the discussion in public and will no doubt attract large numbers of interested people when discussion takes place in committee of the whole.

CHURCH UNION BILL WITHDRAWN

From the Ontario Legislature Today.

Toronto April 8—The Church Union Bill was withdrawn from the Private Bills Committee of the Ontario Legislature this morning. The motion for withdrawal was moved by C.R. McKeown the sponsor for the bill.

The motion was that on church union legislation will go through the Ontario Assembly at the present time.


Around 2,000,000 feet in all were cut, enough to make a quarter of a million wooden boxes for Matt's Chocolates and Biscuits.

THE POLICY OF PERMANENT ROADS

The Provincial Government's policy for a continuation of construction for the permanent roads in New Brunswick with the discontinuation of federal aid in highway construction calls for an expenditure of \$750,000 spread over a period of three years. With this expenditure the engineers report says the missing links in the present system of trunk highways can be completed. These missing links are spread over the different sections of the province; one of the largest is on the main highway between Fredericton and St. John north of Westfield.

Some time ago it was said that Premier Veniot would bring down a bill during the present session of the Legislature embodying the government's policy for a continuation of construction work. The matter was reported to be the subject of animated discussion at the last caucus of the government supporters and it may be that the bill will be referred to another caucus before it is presented to the House. At present however the government's proposals are substantially as outlined above. It has been an open secret for some time that the road engineers of the public works department have been preparing for a programme which would entail an expenditure of between \$200,000 and \$250,000 this year on permanent construction work. But that is as far as they have gotten along so far. Locations for this year's work have not been determined as yet it was learned today.

'FOREFATHERS HAD TO EAT WITH KNIFE'

Cincinnati, O.—April 5—Modern society gazes aghast at the man who eats with a knife; but 300 years ago man either ate with a knife or starved.

The authority for this statement is Joseph D. Little, Manager of the sterling silver galleries of the International Silver Company of New York; who spoke on the Evolution of the Knife, Fork and Spoon" at a meeting of the Kiwanis Club at the chamber of commerce.

Little, who did not eat with a knife; himself, admitted that his forefathers had used a knife almost exclusively at meal times; and then told his audience that their ancestors, despite their titles or crests, had done the same.

That is; if they were fortunate enough to own knives," he qualified. "not they doubtless placed their faith in their fingers."

The first fork" Little said was introduced into England during the reign of the high and mighty Elizabeth the maiden Queen. The Queen had several of the implements brought to her but promptly cast them aside as too finicky and utterly unworthy of her attention. Scores of years passed before the fork finally came into its own. Those who used forks like those who purchased the first automobiles were not considered violent enough for an institution but would bear watching.

He traced the evolution of the spoon from the clamshell picked up by the earliest human progenitors and showed how it had become the spoon of today. He also showed a knife apparently designed for nervous individuals which was rounded at the business end and had the edges dulled.

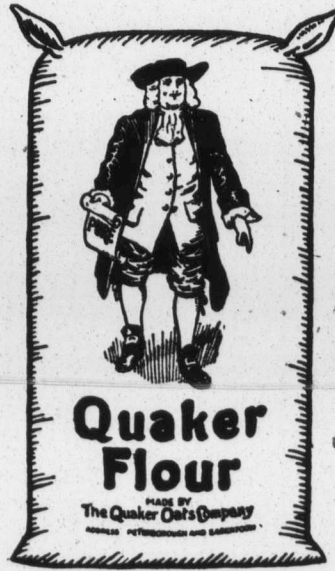

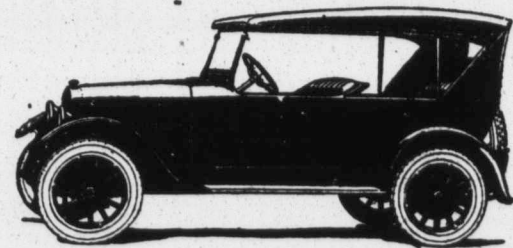

Mr. Morrissy on the House resuming at eight p.m. said that he had not previously taken up much time and coming from the grand old county of Northumberland which had contributed so many able men to the public life of the country he thought he might crave the indulgence of the House for a short time. He wished to congratulate the hon. member for Queens (King) on his return to the House and trust that his health had greatly improved. The hon. member who had last spoken (Tracey) had complained of the cost of administering the Workmen's Compensation Act. With reference to that act a conference had been held at St. John in January; and while there had been general criticism the large lumber operators had expressed the opinion that if the smaller operators were taxed as they should be there would be no difficulty in carrying on the work of the Board. The hon. member (Tracey) had referred to the troubles of the farmers of his county but he (Morrissy) would remind him that last year there were thousands of automobiles operated in that county by farmers and they paid into the revenue \$23,085 in license fees. The only county that surpassed Carleton in the number of autos was the county represented by the hon. Farmer leader who had complained that the roads were so bad that the farmers of his section were unable to market their produce.

As an Independent member he did not propose to give the government too much praise nor was it his intention to criticize it unduly. Hon. members opposite had charged the Hon. Minister of Public Works with being extravagant but at the same time they had admitted an improvement in the roads. He wished to tell those hon. members that the roads could not be improved without an expenditure of money. The Hon. Minister of Lands and Mines had said that he was desirous of having the young men remain in the pro-



vince instead of migrating to the United States. In that connection he wanted to remind the hon. Minister of his action in 1922 after overtures had been made by him (Morrissy) in setting aside ten lots of land for settlement in the county of Northumberland. Because of his activity in the matter they had been kind enough to give it the name of Morrissy Settlement. Ten young men had operated upon that land; had cleared a portion of it and had erected a number of camps. Their application had been approved and the lease held by the lumbering concern should have ceased August 1st 1923 but his information was that it had never been cancelled. That lease was held by Clark Skillings & Co. and the Fraser Lumber company and the boys who had

worked the land knew nothing about it. The law allowed the lumbering concerns only one complete winter's operation after the lots had been approved for settlement yet the Hon. Minister of Lands and Mines for some unknown reason had not cancelled the licenses. It was true that the settlers had hauled some wood to Newcastle and disposed of it but what else could they do with it? A bill now before the House set forth that lumber cut from road wood should be the property of the applicant and surely the young men had done nothing wrong when they cut that kind of wood. He held that if those boys were to be retained in the country they had a right to be treated like men. The land granted them was well adapted for agricultural purposes and they cleared six or seven acres.

He wished to also say a word in regard to the Vanterbeck Settlement where 22 lots of land had been taken up. The applicants had paid in \$48 to the Crown Land office and it had been retained. He did not think that the applicants had received the right kind of treatment from the Department of Lands and Mines. He had no complaint to make concerning the Department of Agriculture and with regard to the Hon. Attorney General he believed him to be one of the most capable men who ever filled that office. In regard to the Hon. Provincial Secretary he could thank the four members for Northumberland for his promotion as at the last election they had defeated his predecessor. With reference to the hon. Leader of the Opposition it was to be regretted that he was not the real leader of his party. He had filled his present position since 1922 and had conducted himself as well as any of his predecessors. He (Morrissy) wished that before the next election he would become the real leader of the Conservative opposition and after that election would continue to grace the seat he now occupied. The Department of Health had been criticized but he believed it deserved the commendation of the people. He knew of a case in the county of Kent where a man named Kelly and his whole family had been stricken down with typhoid fever. The district nurse had gone from Chatham and had looked after them with the result

that all recovered. Surely that was worth the nineteen cents per capita which the Department cost the people of the province. He heartily approved of the medical inspection of school children. Children in his own family had been found with defects which he did not know existed and being warned he had provided the proper treatment. Complaints were made as to the cost of administering the Act but the administration of every new law was expensive during the first few years. Clinics had been held in Chatham and had resulted in much good. He had one suggestion to make to the hon. Minister of Health and that was that he endeavor to arrange that when a doctor called at a house to treat a case of sickness he examine the children of the household and if operations should be needed arrangements should be made through the department to have the same performed. He wished to thank hon. members on both sides for the attentive hearing they had given him.

The late Mr. Williamson was twice married. He leaves his wife three sons and four daughters, Edward W., Moncton; J. Stafford St. John; G. Winfield manager of the Bank of Nova Scotia, East Florenceville, N. B.; Miss Olive at home; Mrs. J. D. MacMillan and Mrs. Clifford Allison, Newcastle; Mrs. Charles A. Jewett, Kamloops, B. C.; also, one brother, Oliver, of Chicago, Ills. Mrs. W. Dell Hart, Fredericton, is a niece of deceased.

Mr Williamson was an active worker in Church and Sunday School, being an elder of St. James Church, and was one of the outstanding members of No. 47 L. O. Lodge. The funeral was held at 3.30 o'clock Friday afternoon Rev. L. H. MacLean officiating. Service was held at the home at 3 o'clock. The funeral was attended by the Orange Order and a large number of citizens. The floral offerings were many and beautiful. Interment is St. James' Cemetery.

BRANCH BANKS

In the interests of economy spectrally to reduce overhead; a scheme is said to have been adopted by Canadian banks whereby the branch banks will be reduced in number where conditions permit of curtailing that detail of bank operation. It has been pointed out that in some cities there are a great many branch banks and that while this situation is of considerable convenience to the neighborhood wherein the branch is located the cost of such ramified functioning is appreciable; hence economy calls for centralization. While a bank closing a branch in a district might lose some business to a competitor whose central bank was closer to the neighborhood affected than the central bank of the institution curtailing; in the general putting in force of a scheme of reduction in overhead there would be a fair distribution of loss and gain.

Large Herds of Caribou Seen in New Brunswick

Fredericton Gleaner:—Two large caribou herds which were sighted last week by game wardens making a tour of the game areas on the headwaters of the Tobique, Nepisiquit and Miramichi rivers have caused provincial officials to believe that these game animals have been returning to New Brunswick in greater numbers than had supposed. In New Brunswick caribou are now protected by a closed season which is being continued by an amendment to the Game Act now before the Legislature.

The game wardens who reported having sighted the two herds of caribou were engaged in a general survey of what is considered one of the provinces' best game areas and also reported that from all indications the big game had wintered well in that section of the province. There was little indication of the presence of wild cats in the area traversed.

To Increase Exemption on Income Tax For Each Child

When the budget resolutions are considered in detail in committee it is thought probable that Hon. J. A. Robb, Acting Minister of Finance will have some modification of his proposals to submit. Gossip has it that Mr. Robb is likely to move for an amendment to the income tax which will increase from \$300 to \$500 the exemption grant for every child. J.A. Archambault Liberal member for Chambly-Verdieres has a motion on the order paper urging the Government to take this course.

COMPENSATION B. D. AND BATHURST CO. IN SETTLEMENT

By an agreement of settlement the Bathurst Co. Ltd. agreed to make the payrolls according to the terms of the Compensation Act to pay their arrears in assessments; to abandon their appeal from the decision of the Supreme Court of Canada to the Privy Council; to pay the costs of the appeal; to pay the costs of the four cases between themselves and the Workmen's Compensation Board as between Attorney and client; the Workmen's Compensation Board agreed to abandon their claim against the company for at least \$25,000 penalties and withdraw their cases when they came up for hearing before chief Justice McKeown in Supreme Court Chambers. The company was represented by M.G. Teed K.C. while Dr. W.B. Wallace K.C. appeared for the Board. By the unanimous finding of the Supreme Court of Canada the Bathurst Co. were found liable for all arrears in assessments as well for the penalties imposed by the act and the costs of all litigation in the four cases between themselves and the Workmen's Compensation Board.

B. F. KEITH COMPANY OF CANADA ORGANIZED

The formation of \$5,000,000 corporation to take over theatres in Montreal, Toronto, Hamilton, Ottawa and London has been announced by E.F. Albee head of the Keith vaudeville organization. The new concern is to be known as the B.F. Keith Co. of Canada Ltd. It will operate in conjunction with the Keith circuit in the United States. The following companies are now amalgamated: The Montreal Operating Co. Ltd; The Canadian United Theatres Limited; the Lyric Theatre; Hamilton and the Hippodrome and Show's theatre Montreal and the Franklyn Theatre Ottawa. W.H. Golding manager of the Imperial theatre; St. John announced on Monday that Amalgamation would tend to give better programmes to the Canadian theatre going public. He had not been informed as yet just what effect the new policy would have on the local playhouse and did not know if vaudeville would be substituted for motion pictures.

C. N. R. Baggage Men Averts Disaster

In a letter to Sir Henry L. Thornton President of the Canadian National Railways a passenger draws attention to the dangers incurred by suburban travellers heedlessly ignoring the regulations devised for their safety and the presence of mind displayed by an employee whereby a tragedy was averted.

Baggage man Fred Binette of the Canadian National Railways proved a friend indeed to seven venturesome passengers on the 5:45 train out of Montreal to Vaudreuil. As the train pulled into Dominion station a party of seven passengers anxious to clip a few minutes by leaving the train on the wrong side and crossing the tracks hurried through the baggage compartment of the combination car. They had about to jump to the ground when Baggage man Binette caught the sound of an approaching train. He rushed forward and thrust himself in front of the men. They resisted his action but he pushed them back forcibly. At that moment the fast freight thundered by. The passengers blanched at their narrow escape; but for the baggage man's prompt action they would have been run down.

Newcastle Boy Become Member Stock Exchange

Announcement was made by the Montreal Stock Exchange on Saturday of the election as a member of Allan A. Aitken. It is understood that he is planning to form a partnership with Victor Drury formerly of the Royal Securities Corporation. Mr. Aitken is a brother of Lord Beaverbrook.

VOCATIONAL SCHOOL QUESTION

Conference to be Held in August Next.

A provincial conference of Vocational Directors and Instructors will be held during the latter part of August. This announcement was made at the conclusion of the morning's meeting of the New Brunswick Vocational Board when it was stated that the board had approved of plans for the holding of the conference in Fredericton. It will last for three days and will cover practically all phases of the provincial programme.

It was also decided to continue the present arrangements for the training vocational teachers in summer schools conducted outside of the Province. Vocational teachers will thus continue to have their tuition and travelling expenses defrayed by the Board for the purpose of attending these summer schools. Edmundston was selected as the location of the provincial summer school for 1924.

CANADA IMPORTS BIG QUANTITY OF EGGS

There is something wrong with the Canadian hen, that is if the trade returns tell the truth. These show that during the 12 months ending February over two and one-half times as many eggs were imported as were exported.

The number imported during these 12 months was 7,752,033 dozen more than during the preceding period, while the number exported was 2,890,132 dozen, or 738,000 dozen less than during the preceding year.

The United States evidently supplies Canada with a considerable proportion of its hen fruit. During February, Uncle Sam shipped us 1,872,426 dozen of eggs while in return he took from Canada only 287 dozen. These imports from across the line were 609,000 dozen greater than they were in January, and about 500,000 dozen more than in February of last year. The imports in January of this year from the United States were double those for the same month in 1923. Hong Kong has also sent us over 50,000 dozen during the last 12 months.

Canadians are evidently using many more eggs than they formerly did, for last year the total production was given as 202,180,000 dozen, an increase of 8,100,000 during the year, and an increase of 34,000,000 dozen over that for 1921.

Eggs may seem to be a rather small matter, but the value of the production last year, is estimated at \$48,000,000. As this was probably \$8,000,000 more than the value of the production of the fisheries, it was something to crow over.

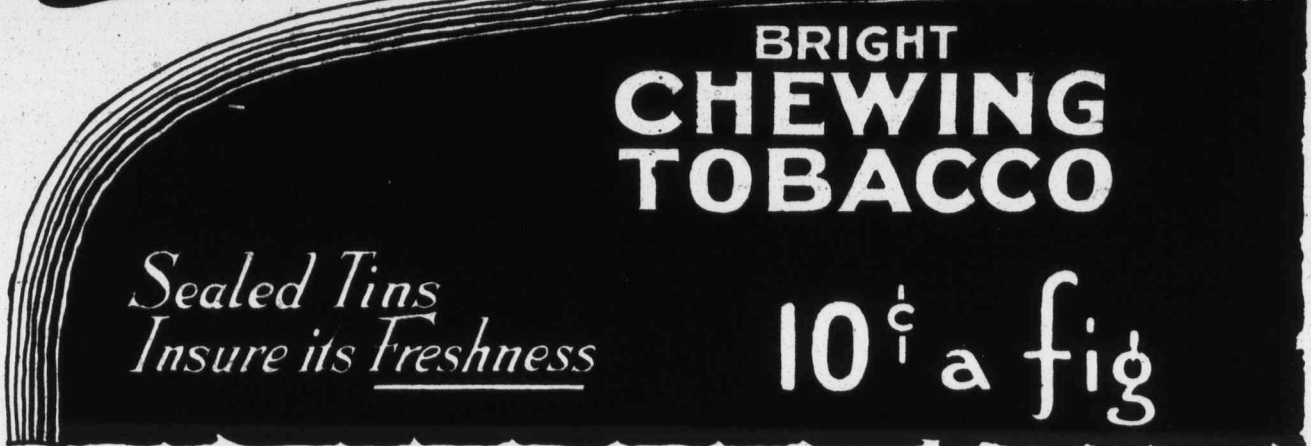

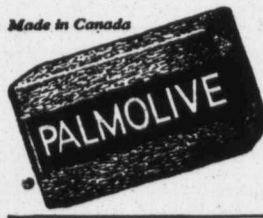
