

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre :

Duties-Must reside upon the homestead or pre-empfion six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cal.ivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has oxhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties .- Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.




