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



Montreal Stirred by Dark Tragedy.

Westmount Victim a Young Girl Two Men Under Arrest Chargee With Foul Crime-Were Held for Abduction and a Worse Offence Against Child, but Finding of Body Causes Charge of Murder to be Made.

Montreal, Oct. 24 .- Sensational de elopments in the Westmount mysery occurred to-day, when the body o he girl discovered in a vacant lot vas postively identified by the cloth ng as that of Cecile Michaud, a gir f thirteen years.

It was immediately remembere that two men, Albert Cheverier, a bar ender, and Ludger Perrault, a saloon ceeper, had a short time ago beer committed for trial on a charge of ab luction, and a still more serious charge against Cecile Michaud, and nother girl of sixteen named Barn lette Dagenais. Shortly after the Michaud girl dis unpeared in August, the father and lawyer started an investigation with he result that they learned from Baradette Dagenais that early in Augus: he two men had met and induced hem to take an automobile ride promising to bring them back in ar our. But Bernadette said that in stead they were driven to a resor just outside the city and plied with irink while Cheverier induced the Michaud girl to stay. Bernadette hen left and apparently Cheverie was left alone with Miss Michaud who was never seen again. This led to the arrest of Cheverier and Pierrault and they were committed for trial on two charges. Now they are held for murder, and will probably be so charged at the coroner's inquest The lower jawbone of the girl was liscovered to-day with several teeth apparently knocked out. Two teeth were ilso missing from the upper front while the father states that the child had a perfect set of teeth when h last saw her. He thinks the child was drugged and abused and that





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
