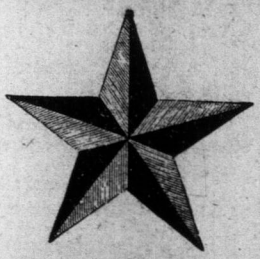

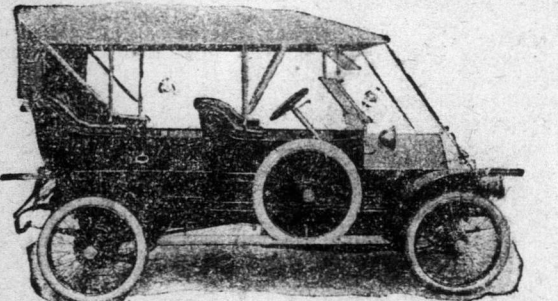

But wouldn't you like to have your children or grandchildren help constitute such a class in their day? If you would, I think one great step towards that end would be for you to try to have a home life, in which courtesy and good breeding are part of the atmosphere.

The Attitude of Farmers.

The farmers who supply the city with milk are displaying a most admirable spirit in relation to the fight against consumption and disease by co-operating in the enactment and enforcement of rules and regulations which will conduce to a pure supply of milk of good quality. Their suggestion that cattle should neither be imported nor sold without a veterinary certificate to insure they are free from consumption is well worthy of consideration, and it seems to us after the prohibition of the sale and importation of cattle affected with disease, it would be a wise and economical course for the Government to stand the reasonable cost of animals, that it is in the interest of the people to have destroyed. Of course precautions would have to be taken that only a fair value was paid, and that the proposition did not resolve itself into Government jobbing. The latter precautions is necessary in view of the reckless way agricultural matters have been administered the past three years. This criticism, however, only goes to the way in which the proposition is carried out. The proposition itself seems a fair and even economical one, when regard is paid to the terrible devastation of life, health and resources made by consumption, and the fact that our farmers are not a wealthy but a hard-working class of men, struggling to make ends meet, and to bring up their families respectably.

The suggestion as to the destruction of refuse by an incinerator is an admirable one and should be carefully considered, and their objection to the dumping of old clothes, mattresses and refuse in lanes adjoining farm lands is well taken. It seems incongruous for some authorities to be busying themselves with rules and regulations to insure sanitary conditions on farms, while the city sanitary authorities themselves are polluting the perils of farms by dumping all kinds of refuse in these places.

Milk Problem.

Yesterday a deputation of the St. John's Agricultural Society waited upon the Premier to lay before the Government their views in regard to the A. P. C. rules for milkmen and the Board of Health rules for Farm Inspection. They contend that the Board of Health should provide a Veterinary Surgeon for the examination of cows; that a District Veterinary Surgeon should report cases of tuberculosis in cattle to the Board of Health, and that in cases of cattle destroyed in the interest of public health, the Public

Health Department shall pay for them. They consider also that no cattle should be imported into the country or sold in the country unless the person importing or selling them produce a certificate, showing that the cattle are not infected with tuberculosis. The farmers also pointed out that the quality of milk is affected injuriously by retailers mixing new milk with old milk. They favour the idea of registration of milkmen, the rules relating to the cleanliness and quality of milk. They suggest that precautions should be taken about the places where milk is sold in the city, and that the custom of using the country roads as dumping grounds for dirt, old sacks and refuse should be discussed, and an incinerator procured for the city. The Society has retained Dr. Stewart to represent them at the test for tuberculosis which will take place at the Agricultural Stables and they will also confer with the A. P. C. as to the rules of the latter.

The executive of the Firemen's Union met last night to discuss their position in the matter, and it was decided that the men must join the local union after their month's service on the ship is concluded and when they will have the necessary money to do so.

Enquiry Into Barratry Case.

To-day at the Magistrates Court a preliminary enquiry was held into the loss of the schr. Annie C. Raymond, owing to which two men named Barrett of Spaniards Bay, were arrested on a charge of barratry. The proceedings were taken before Judge Knight and Messrs. Cyril Teasler, P. J. Shea and Inspector General Sullivan gave their evidence.

New Sealer in Collision.

Mr. Tasker Cook had a message to-day saying that his new sealing steamer, the Lloydson, had arrived at Grangemouth, Scotland, for repairs, necessitated from the fact that the ship had a collision with another vessel, and received some damage. 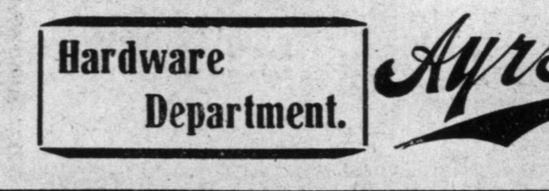

Farmer Writes on Milk Question

Editor Evening Telegram.
 Dear Sir.—Allow me space in your widely circulated paper to make a few comments on the Rules and Regulations brought before the farmers of the Association for the Prevention of Consumption.
 There is no farmer around the skirts of the city, so ignorant as to know that it pays him to keep his cattle in the best possible condition that he can, and like-wise, he knows it pays him to keep his production of milk as clean and pure as he can for if not, either he loses his customer or he will not get the regular price for it.
 Allowing that milk and the cream that produce it should be kept clean as possible, I turn to the A. P. C. rules which the poor farmers of this country could not live and ex-out by any means. Do these mean to put the small struggling farmers of Newfoundland on a par with the wealthy farmers of the United States and Canada, who by every encouragement given them by their respective governments, in shape of large county Agricultural Colleges, and the best breeding stock that can be procured in the world? Farming in this country is only in infancy as yet, all for the want of encouragement and fair play, and can very much of the wisdom that will remain, if the farmers are to be dictated to by every Tom, Dick and Harry, and if the Government tends to waste the public money such as these in preference to children of the old pioneers that created here over a hundred years ago, and strove to make a home, the wild forests, under the most trying circumstances without roads, machinery of any kind to work land. Then we farmers will come

Yesterday the caretaker of St. Patrick's Hall discovered that the door leading into the Reading Room of the B. I. S. had been smashed in. Who ever forced it broke the lock, and what his intentions were when he thus opened the door is not known. When Mr. Seneer, the caretaker, left the place at 9 a.m. the door was intact. Who broke it is not known, but the matter will be reported to the police.

Silent Men.

George Washington's reserve made him stiff, formal, and ill at ease in company, but it also prevented his plans from being betrayed to the enemy and the country from being deceived by his promises. William the Silent was frugal of words, because a reserve that concealed his designs, even from those acting with him, was necessary to the independence of the Netherlands.

The most dramatic of silent men was Wallenstein, the antagonist of Gustavus Adolphus, army commander of the Emperor's army in the Thirty Years' War. He insisted that the deepest silence should reign around him. His officers took care that no loud conversation should disturb their general. They knew a chamberlain had been hanged for waking him without orders, and an officer who would wear clanking spurs in the commander's presence had been secretly put to death. In the rooms of Wallenstein's palace the servant girls glided as if phantoms, and a dozen sentinels moved around his tent charged to secure the silence the general demanded. Chains were stretched across the streets and roads in order to guard him against the disturbance of sounds. Wallenstein's taciturnity and love of silence that caused him to be irritated at the slightest noise were due to his constitutional temperament.

He never smiled, he never asked advice from anyone, and he could not endure to be gazed at, even when giving an order. The soldiers, when they crossed the camp, pretended not to see him, knowing that a curious look would bring them punishment.

Dress Details That Count.

Careful grooming is essential to a well-dressed appearance. Buttons, hooks and eyes need to be looked after often and kept properly sewed.


Florizel Here.

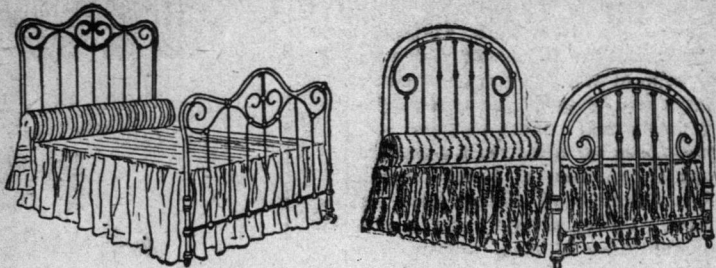
