TOKIO. May 27.

At a prominent dinner last night urgent, calm, patient efforts were suggested for a friendly solution of the difficulty with the United States. 



The demonstrations were made the large room of the Institute at St Andrew's Dock, where J. McCann, President of the Hull Fishing Vessel Owners' Association, presided over a very large gathering of owners and merchants. Three processes of fish preservation were described in detail by Professor Danilevsky, who claim ed that by their use vessels might be in the White Sea for a month or six weeks and yet bring their fish to market in an absolutely fresh con-

The ingredients used were neither drugs nor antiseptics, but a food which was used in everyday life. All that had to be done was to immerse that had to be done was to infine the the fish in the solutions, and all that was needed was a moderate cool temperature. Fish, he claimed, might be preserved for months, and by one process it could be kept in shop or market uncovered for a considerable time. Quantities of fish were then placed in tubs and will remain undisplaced in the solution for about three turbed in the solution for about three weeks on the premises of the St. Andrew's Club. At the end of that time the Professor and his colleagues will return to Hull and the result of the experiment will be announced.—From The Fish Trade Gazette of London.

Murray and Crawford, for the ourpose of being converted into a sealer. The price paid was £14,500. The vessel was classed 100 A1 at Lloyd's, the date of her last survey being Feb. 24, 1912. Extensive alterabeing Feb. 24, 1912. Extensive alterations and repairs were carried out on the ship, and on Feb. 14, 1912, she was taken to her loading berth, where she shipped 2,440 tons of coal. On her last voyage she was commanded by Captain T. M. Linklater, and carried a crew all told of 39. Mr. R. A. Jones, the late chief officer, who left the ship for private reasons on the day she for private reasons on the day she sailed from Glasgow, stated in his evidence that the crew were nearly all specially selected men, and highly skilled in the handling and managethe men belonged to St. John's, N.F.
