





Advocates Swedish System of Prohibition.

Dear Sir,-In the autumn of 1915 contributed some articles to your

we been the benefits of Prohibition, ere have nevertheless, been wrongs ne and hardships caused by the enement of the so-called Prohibition The law is unfair and, in some too stringent. In some nilst in others the paint itself has een scrubbed away. This is the way

The pendulum now begins to swing ack. I am just as anxious that it hould not swing too far back as I vas to restrain it two years ago. Now hat the reaction has begun, it is the duty of every right-thinking man to save the good that has been gained while rejecting the bad. In my letter of Nov. 2nd, 1915, I stated that I was no champion of the liquor dealers.' the drinking saloon again, with it reating, its foulness and drunke ess. In the same letter I suggeste that the "Swedish system" be given fair trial with the necessary alteraons to make it applicable to this

The Swedish system, with necessary dification, would eliminate the runkard since he could not obtain ntoxicating liquors. It would not nake drunkards, since it would be no one's interest to push sales. The youth would not be subject to temptaion. Prohibition would be applied only to the persons to whom it should

apply, namely, those who are unable to drink without getting drunk.

The system I advocated would do away with a great deal of deceit. It would not be necessary, under that ystem, to pretend to be ill in order obtain sufficient alcohol for real eed. There is another phase of the ubject to which I referred in my leters two years ago and against which protested so strongly. All that aid about the rich man being allowed o have quantities of liquor, while the oor man has to go short, has been orne out by the experience of the past year. It is common knowledge hat two persons, at least, who were cominent in their advocacy of Proibition, have now their cellars well tocked with intoxicating liquors. with the consistent prohibitionist I have no quarrel. I recognize that he has been true to principle, and for whatever of good may have been brought about by his efforts the community should be grateful. But I have no use for the man who makes have no use for the man who makes a law which permits him to indulge his appetite but forbids his poorer neighbour lawfully to obtain a single




