

### Llewellyn Club.

At Llewellyn Club last night the ubject of address was "Nehemiah the patriot, and the patriotism that pays." Rev. Dr. Jones told of the life of the Jews in Babylon in the reign of Cyrus and of how the latter city, and of the trouble the Jews had, city walls, but the enemies of the Jews demolished the same, and it was tidings of this disaster that caused Nehemiah, at that time cup bearer to the King, to try and go to the relief of his Hebrew kinsmen, and so having obtained a commission from the King to the Governor over Jerusalem for 12 years, he went up and built the walls.

There were many enemies but Nehemiah conquered them, and in aftvtwo days the walls were built and kept repaired. When his 12 years of office had expired he returned to Babylon, but the King permitted him to again return to Jerusalem, but even in his short absence he found that his enemies had caused much damage, so he went throughout the country persuading the Jews to give up their heathen wives, and to keep the Sabbath. (He was especially successful in the latter undertaking). Nehemiah was successful in his undertakings because he was a deeply religious man and a true patriot, for true patriotism finds its beginning in religion, and true patriots guard their religion. As with religion, so with patriotism, if worth anything it will make for bettermen of country as instanced by Nehemiah.

Mr. I. C. Morris then addressed the audience, and congratulated the Llewellyn Club on the influence it was wielding, and stated that straightforward talking to citizens was better than party fighting.

He quoted the words of Carlyle: "The trouble with many is that they are leaving God out of it." Relative to the lives of Ezra and Nehemiah the speaker asserted that even as with them so in many cases, difficulties serve to bring out the capabilities of a man. Nehemiah was a true patriot because of his religion, and in spite of social prestige in a foreign land he went to Jerusalem and built her walls, so that they stood in the time of Christ 444 years afterwards.

Nehemiah saw ris duty and went forth to do the same. He heard the call of God, and as a monument to him it is stated that portions of the wall built under his direction are intact to-day. Here the speaker urged the listeners to be sincere and faithful; to be true to their duty as that was the patriotism that pays.

The speaker referred to our own Island, asserting that we did not know our Island, and regretting that so the country. Instead of the present population it ought to be two million had the right opportunities been seized, and here he eulogized the scenery and grandeur of Terra Nova. The patriotism that pays, declared the speaker, is that which comes from reliance on God, and church laws (he paid a tribute to patriotic clergymen of 50 and 70 years ago). He further stated that St. John's to-day was equal to any town of its size in general education and morals and the credit was due to its patriots. Now was the time of reconstruction, continued the speaker, and we are the reconstructionists, and if we are godly and patriotic then our labours shall not have been in vain. Referring to the Council he said he was ashamed to be a Councillor as there was no money to even clean the streets. He concluded by reciting the following verses of his own composition.

THE PATRIOTISM THAT PAYS.

Not that which seeks for power for selfish ends. Nor that which when in power forgets its friends.

Not that which shouts aloud for bet-But places self before the peoples'






