Teachers' Convention.

the Convention, Rev. Dr. Curtis spoke on the studies of teachers. Such topic is very important as study is necessary even after high grades have been secured. The necessity of teachers being great students is borne out by the fact that teachers are expected to be versed not only with al great modern achievements and movements but also with the chief events of the past. In so far as study affects the class-room it is im tive that the teacher know his ject fully, as a partial knowledge or confessed ignorance breeds contemp In order to keep in touch with grow ing knowledge one must study continually where possible. As far as the methods of teaching are concerned, there is always something new, and something debateable. A teacher who is satisfied to drift, without trying to keep himself up to the times, should be retired without pension. The study of the pupil is always bringing to light something new. One fact-viz. the following of the example of wandering Aristotle prevents the teachers from doing their best study. Our present training of teachers is too inadequate, but the normal school will remedy-in part, at least-much of this, but the normal school is not enough; we want a memorial college, and the abolition of the necessity of leaving the country in order to take an Arts

After Dr. Curtis had finished the Committee appointed at the previous night's session to formulate a salary basis, reported through its convenor, Mr. R. R. Wood, the following tentative outline, viz., that a minimum salary for 3rd grade teachers be, at the start, \$600 for male, \$500 for female. In addition the salary to be raised \$25 every additional year for three years, after which no increase be granted. A 2nd grade teacher, male, will as a start have \$700, female \$600, \$25 increase for first four years, after which no increase. A 1st grade teacher, male, will start at \$800, female \$700, \$25 per year for eight years. after which \$100 for every additional ten years. An. A.A. grade teacher, male, \$900, female, \$800, \$25 per year being granted for 8 years, and \$100 for every additional ten years. Such a scheme holds out every advantage for teachers to improve themselves, while even the lowest grades get enough to keep them in decency and comfort. It was moved and seconded that the above scheme, being impossible at the present, be postponed till later for discussion. The discussion of salaries, to meet the present needs, occupied the time of the ses-

sion until dinner hour. In the afternoon, Miss Collins, Inspector of R. C. Schools, gave a lecture on story writing, which was not only interesting, but very instructive. To be a successful story teller, as spoken by the lecturer, one must feel. To do this one must cultivate the art of feeling and also refrain from story telling when one is unable to enter into the spirit of the story. Simplicity of matter and manner, dramatic power and presentation without af fectation are essential points in the

success of this work. After Miss Collins, Miss Worrall, teacher in Bishop Spencer College. gave an exhibition of drill to the assembled teachers. She had ten or twelve pupils present and put them through the rudiments of drill in a manner that must have pleased every-

one present. Discussion of salaries again formed the all-important topic, and it was moved by Mr. Verge, seconded by Mr. Samson, that we ask the Government for an increase of 25% on the general grant to Boards, exclusive of the 40% increase on augmentation already granted. It was also moved by Mr. Whelan and seconded by Mr. Griffin that we ask the Government to make the recent 40% increase on augmentation retroactive to January 1, 1920. Both motions carried.

A deputation to wait on the Government will consist of the following: Messrs. Wood, Dwyer, Whiteway, Butt. Samson, Whelan, Griffin, Verge and Bro. Strapp. It was moved by Mr. House, seconded by Mr. Griffin. that the Government be also asked to make the augmentation payable terminally. Carried.

Woodford Enquiry.

COMMISSION NOT A JUDICIAL ONE. The Commission appointed to enquire into the Woodford charges met in the Tower Room at 11 a.m. to-day. Mr. Rendell, one of the Commissioners, pointed out that the Commission was not a judicial one and the members were only appointed to take any evidence given by the parties to the enquiry. The parties may be represented by counsel, but it is the intention of the Commission not to be hampered with the legal aspects of the case. They will examine into the mat-

ter from a business point of view. Mr. Howley, K.C., was present this morning, representing Mr. Woodford, who gave his evidence freely, stating all that transpired up to the Saturday after the Supreme Court refused to accept his resignation. According to Mr. cept his resignation. According to Mr. Woodford's statement, Mr. Gibbs statwoodford's statement, in this statement and the control of the con for him for over a half hour. The re-sult of the interview was that he (Woodford) should resign and the petition against him would be with-drawn. At 5 o'clock that evening he drawn. At 5 o'clock that evening he visited Gibbs' office and intimated that he wished another interview with the Premier. Gibbs stating that they were anxious that the resignation should be tendered that night, so that next

be tendered that night, so that next day at court the proceedings could be withdrawn. Gibbs then wrote out the resignation which gave as excuse for it that, owing to ill health and the necessity of going to Canada to consult a specialist, he (Woodford) was advised by his solicitor not to put the resignation in the wording used. The whole proposition came from the Government. After a consultation with the acting leader of the Opposition (Sir John Crosbie) he went to Gibbs and a meeting was arranged to take and a meeting was arranged to take place at Squires' officee at 9 a.m. on the 18th. At that meeting the three were present and it was agreed the resignation should be tendered before 11 o'clock, both Squires and Gibbs guaranteeing him a position worth \$2,000 per annum and emoluments. On being questioned, Mr. Woodford said the position was to be the Superintendent of the Poor Asylum at the salary stated and \$500 perquisites. When he rendered his resignation he told

His Excellency that he was taking a rest from politics. The refusal of the Supreme Court to consent to the withdrawal of the pettion nullified the agreement. It was understood at that time by all the parties to the agreement that the court would consent to the withdrawal of the petition. The Prime Minister and Mr. Gibbs were summoned to appear this morn-ing but satisfied the Commission that they would give their evidence when caled upon to do so. The enquiry here adjourned until Monday.



Codfish Standardization Commission

TO THE FISHERMEN OF NEWFOUNDLAND.

PROPOSAL REGARDING THE METHODS TO BE ADOPTED TO IMPROVE THE CURE OF NEWFOUNDLAND CODFISH.

1. That the position of the Newfoundland Fisheries in relation to those of Norway. Iceland and Britain be placed before the fishermen and the public through the Press, and in any other manner that will illustrate the necessity for improving our cure of fish if we are to successfully market our fish in competition without that from

2. That a full and complete statement of the essential features of curing that must be adopted by all fishermen if the cure is to be improved shall be published and circulated throughout Newfoundland and Labrador.

3. That Inspectors shall be appointed whose duty it shall be to examine and inspect all fishery and curing stages, boats, etc., throughout Newfoundland and the Labrador with a view to-

(a) Explaining the methods to be adopted to improve the cure;

(b) Bringing about an improvement in the construction of sanitary conditions of Fishing Stages;

(c) To collect and distribute information as to catch of fish or other matters affecting the interests of the fishermen and the country generally. NOTE:-The Inspectors should eventually be given authority to condemn stages

that are unfit for the sanitary curing of fish. 4. That fish purchased from the fishermen by exporters, whether in St. John's

or in outports, shall be bought subject to a cull. 5. That all exports of fish from Newfoundland and the Labrador shall be inspected by duly qualified inspectors and certificates issued specifying the nature, style, cure and quality of the fish, and that specific standards shall, if possible, be laid down for the guidance of the Inspectors.

SUMMARISED, THE REQUIREMENTS MOST ESSENTIAL FOR IMPROVED CURING ARE:

(1) Clean boats, stages and splitting tables.

(2) Well split fish.

(3) Fish to be well washed from knife—all blood, liver and gut to be removed.

(4) Clean stage for curing fish.

(5) Regularity in salting.(6) Fish to be washed thoroughly on back and face when taken from salt bulk.

(7) Fish to be bled as soon as taken from the water when possible.

LABRADOR.

Same qualities for all markets.

No. 1 FISH.

Fish to be split to the crux of the tail, washed from the knife, free from blood stains, clots, liver and gut. To be firm, thoroughly salted and well pressed. To be washed out of salt bulk by hand. All slub and slime removed from back. To be dried sufficiently to stand shipment without loss in weight. Fish not complying with these requirements to be classed as No. 2 quality and to be stowed in such a manner in the vessel as to form a distinct part of the cargo.

SHORE FISH CURED LABRADOR STY LE

To be known as Imitation Labrador. All Shore Fish cured Labrador style will be graded as such and not as Labrador, and must be cured as above. The making of this quality of Imitation Labrador is not encouraged as the demand will be very limited.

The black should be removed from the fins of Shore and Bank Fish from 18 inches up. Such fish when well cured will be classed Extra No. 1 and will command the highest price.

CURING OF FISH.

Fish is an article of food, and this fact must be kept clearly before all those who have the handling of it from the time it is caught until it reaches the consumers' table. Unfortunately, this fact is lost sight of by nearly all those who are occupied in the Fisheries of Newfoundland, whether they be the catchers, curers or exporters. There is not sufficient care exercised by any one of the several classes of handlers. The fishermen in their anxiety to get their catch under salt forget the fact that the fish they are curing is to be eaten by some person many thousands of miles away possibly many months hence. The exporters in their desire to, first: secure a large stock, and second: to send it to market quickly, also lose sight of the same fact. This must change, and in future all interested in the fisheries must always remember that they are handling an article of food, and treat it accordingly.

The first essential feature of all processes for handling food products is cleanliness. The boats into which the live fish are thrown from trap or hook must be clean, sweet and free from gurry of past catches. The stage upon which the fish are thrown from the boat must be clean. The splitting tables must be clean and kept clean throughout the whole time that the fish is passing over it. The curing stages must be thoroughly cleansed before the season opens, and kept clean during the whole season. Pound boards should be well washed frequently. Water is plentiful and cheap and should be used without stint. Stages should be limed at least once every year,

With thoroughly clean boats, stage heads, splitting tables and stages, the first step towards good fish is secured. The next is cleanliness in handling the fish. All blood, livers and gut should be removed; all slime and gurry thoroughly washed off before the fish is put under salt. This can only be done by well washing the fish when split in plenty of clean water.

The fish should be split to the crux of the tail and laid open evenly without pock-The sound bone should be removed to about half an inch beyond the end of the sound, to allow the blood in the bone to drain out. If this is done the fish, on going to salt, will have every chance of turning out of salt bulk or pickle a perfect fish. Salting should be done with care. Much fish is spoiled by irregular salting and

by careless packing in bulks. Salting should be completed without delay. Fish should not be laid away to be salted at convenience. Washing out from salt bulk should be done by hand—every fish being washed back and face separately. Eighteen hhds. Cadiz salt should be used in salting Labrador cure. Shore cure should not be bulked higher than three feet and from ten to twelve hhds. Cadiz salt to the

The length of time for remaining in salt bulk or pickle is a matter for the judgment of the person in charge of the curing, as also in the curing once the fish has

In some cases it is thought advisable that hook and line men should throat their fish immediately they are removed from the hook. This permits the fish to bleed, and not only insure a whiter fish but retards decay of the fish.

It is a common belief that a lette written by a typewriter cannot be identified. That this idea is ill-founded was proved in the recent "£6 a minute" case. It will be remembered that this case collapsed with dramatic suddenness when certain annoymous typewritten letters were traced to a witness who had denied all knowledge

This startling revelation was brought about by the managing director of a well-known typewriter company, who is an expert typewriter

"Despite the supposed standardization of machines," said this unconventional sleuth to the T. B. man. "there are really no two machines in the world which are exactly alike.

"The cause of this individuality among typewriters is that the type is not engraven-which would be a far too laborious and costly task-but goes through a process called 'rolling up,' in which it is struck out by a revolving stamp. This produces irregularities obvious to an expert eye. In fact, when a typewriter leaves the factory, a specimen of its writing is always retained and signed by the adjuster. Should any complaint arise, letter written upon the machine will always enable us to trace it back

Forest Fires!

The Attention of the Public is called to the following provisions of the FOREST FIRE ACT:

1.—Any person who sets out, makes or starts a FIRE for any purpose whatever, between the Fifteenth Day of April and the First Day of December, in or near woods, or without selecting a place free from dry trees, underbrush or other inflammable material in which to make or start such FIRE, or fails to remove all such dry wood, brushwood or inflammable material within a distance of ten feet from such fire in every direction, or fails to completely extinguish the same before leav-

2.—Throws or Drops any Burning Match, Ashes of a Pipe, Lighted Cigar or any other burning substance.

3.—Or fails to totally extinguish any camp fire before breaking camp, shall be liable to a Penalty of not less than \$50 nor more than \$400, or imprisonment for a period of twelve months.
