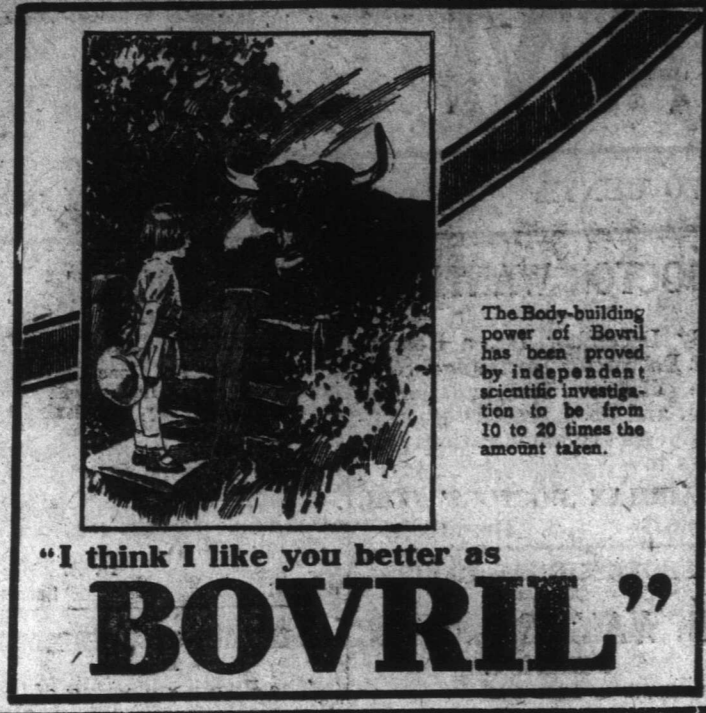

**Portuguese and Other Agreements.**

Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir—The amusing Advocate of Friday last, a leading editorial which I relish the making of a short reply, with your kind permission. I will deal with its points serially:

(1) "Mr. Coaker's Portuguese agreement for the sale of 300,000 quintals of fish at fixed prices" is the way the Advocate again refers to that abortive document. The said agreement was for a stated quantity, and contained no fixed prices. The Advocate is quite erroneously lying about the matter, after day, and lying for a purpose; and my object in repeating the details is, that I wish the public to very clearly comprehend how very desirably the Advocate gang desire the same.

(2) Referring to my advice to Mr. Herring that no law existed last year preventing shipments to Italy, the Advocate now says that "taking advantage of loop-holes in laws is not a general procedure." But I did not advise upon a "loop hole." A hole in a law pre-supposes the existence of a law. Whereas my point was, that in the Regulations were an anteceded fraud, made illegally, and legally enforced, by the audacity of great dividends. I venture to say that local investors have not made great average profits within the past ten years. Perhaps some investor will tell us the facts.

The Advocate, concluding his remarks, says: (1) "The local markets are glutted with fish; (2) the prices are low; (3) nobody is insisting on a higher price (abroad?); (4) thousands of quintals are being consigned for sale abroad, yet (5) not an article comes from abroad on consignment for sale here; and (6) the merchants are pleased with the prospect. Let me reply briefly: (1) The local markets are glutted with Labrador fish, but Coaker's Regulations are the chief cause of the glut, by destroying the market in Italy last year; (2) the present low prices are largely due to the quantity of old unsold fish in foreign markets which have been consumed last year if Coaker's Regulations had not delayed shipments; (3) everybody is insisting on higher prices abroad, but the prices are regulated by demand and supply, and the supply being great just now, for the reasons just given. Coaker is the chief cause of low prices; (4) many articles come here on consignment for sale. There's a lot of flour here now for such sale. Fruit, vegetables, cattle—these always come on consignment.

The Advocate is grossly ignorant of the ways of trade; (5) the merchants are the saddest men in the Colony at the prospect. They prosper when the Colony prospers; they suffer when the Colony suffers; their prosperity and the Colony's go hand in hand. **The Case for Foreign Shipping.**

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir,—I beg leave for space in your columns to comment on the leading article appearing in the issue of the Evening Telegram dated October 29th, under the heading of "Foreign Shipping Competition." May I state at the outset that I agree that the subject is one of more than ordinary importance, but I submit that it merits treatment on a broader basis and that certain erroneous deductions have been made, due to the somewhat narrow and particular point of view on which the arguments in the article referred to, were based. It is to correct these that I crave space to treat the subject anew.

Whether it be to our own individual disadvantage or not, the question must be regarded from the point of view of the greatest good to the greatest number, and we should for the moment forget the narrower aspect of the vessel owner. It is, of course, beyond dispute that our main staple industry lies in the fisheries, and that the great

of fish, all of which fish will have gone into consumption before the arrival of the balance of the catch in sailing vessels.

Of course, shipments by steamer must be properly regulated to prevent flooding the market, but this is not inherent with steamers and the remark is equally true in connection with vessels. Moreover shipments by steamer can be more easily distributed between two or more ports than can cargoes by sailing vessels. The writer is speaking within the facts when he states that the blame rests on local shoulders that our fish is being shipped away on steamers built by and flying the flag of our competitors, instead of on steamers flying the red ensign and registered in Newfoundland. A number of years ago, (but within the memories of most of us) the head of one of our oldest firms considered that St. John's by reason of its strategic position on the mouth of the St. Lawrence and its close proximity to New York, Boston and other U.S. ports, was by nature well adapted and situated as a headquarters for a large fleet of tramp or freight steamers. A start was made and several steamers purchased with a view ultimately to creating a large fleet of tramps which would carry not only our own produce, but that of Canada and the United States to foreign ports. After some years the scheme was abandoned, after a fair trial had been given on business lines, owing to regulations, mainly affecting Bremen, which were imposed by Trade Union authority at that time. The regulations compelled among other things, the employment of twice the number of crews as is required on English and foreign steamers, and were in other respects so numerous and vexatious that competition was rendered impossible with freighters of other nations, even allowing for our strategically superior geographical situation. And seemingly inherent with such restrictions, strikes were so numerous, steamers held up so often, that the head of this firm, who was the pioneer of what might have been a great Newfoundland industry, was reluctantly compelled to abandon the enterprise.

That the incident is not generally known is perhaps displayed by your leading article, and that the lesson was not fully learned was shown in the attempt this past summer by some members of the L.S.P.U. (against their own constitution, we believe) to impose such restrictions on the fish and steamer work, and to maintain such a level of wages as would have strained those industries to breaking point and would have inevitably diverted the handling and shipping of fish from St. John's to the outports.

It is to the credit of Trade Unionism in St. John's to-day and contrary to what happened in the past in the case above cited, that common sense won out and vexatious restrictions were abolished and wages reduced. It need not be pointed out that those who have benefited most are the members of the Unions themselves, who, as a result, have had much employment in fish and steamer work in the very recent past. I must apologize for having trespassed on so much of your space, but my excuse must be the importance and the necessity of the fair exposition of the subject matter. It seemed to the writer, that in putting forward the case of the local vessel owner, the case of the great majority, namely the processors of our fishing industry, was inadvertently or perhaps inevitably suppressed or omitted. ## A Perilous Journey.

### DEVASTATION BY STORM—MAIN ROADS WASHED AWAY.

Main roads gone, bridges destroyed, the road-bed of the railway washed away in many places, telegraph poles, broken like matchwood and strewn along the road; this is the picture of the devastation caused by Friday night's storm, which a gentleman who motored from Carbonear to town on Saturday, painted to the Telegram to-day. In the words of the narrator of the story, the scene all along the route was indescribable and would almost have to be seen, to be believed. In company with three others, he began his perilous journey at 10 a.m. Saturday and it was not until twelve hours later that St. John's was reached. At Carbonear, the main road was completely ruined in parts by the tremendous seas and the bed of the railway was completely washed away. The only way of getting out of the town was to take the New Harbor road to Saddle Hill which led out to Harbor Grace. By those who know this road, the difficulties experienced in passing over it will readily be recognized, for it is little better than a path through the woods. Harbor Grace, from outward appearances, did not seem to have suffered much damage, but at Spaniard's Bay an astounding sight was met. The "Lassie" Road, which is that usually taken by motorists on the way around the Bay, had completely disappeared and the seas were pounding against the steep hill which overhangs it. Not a vestige of the old road was to be seen and it seemed as if it had never been there. The beach road at Spaniard's Bay was also destroyed and the main road and railway track had gone in the general destruction caused by the sea. To get through to Bay Roberts, the travellers had to take another country circuit, going by way of Gosse's Mill and Shearstown.

Bay Roberts had not escaped the devastating waves, and there, as elsewhere, roads had been damaged whilst large quantities of fish which planters had left in bulk, on the beach, had been washed away, and the water had penetrated to a fish in a store, and had ruined it. A schooner loaded with fish, had gone ashore, but there was hope of salvaging her cargo. From Clarke's Beach to Brigus, scarcely a trace of the main road was to be seen, and again, a circuit had to be taken, and Brigus was made by way of South River. This town had not suffered to any extent from the storm and no difficulties were experienced until the Barrens had been passed. The approaches to the Harbor, Main Bridge, however, were found to be gone, and the Bridge was careening over and awash. The travellers had to stop here and build up a way with flat stones to get to the bridge and after a trying time successfully accomplished the crossing. At Collier's a new difficulty presented itself, for here, snow to a depth of eighteen inches was found on nearly 100 yards and through this a way had to be digged. After passing this, everything went well until near Holyrood, where it was found that the main road west of the station was destroyed and it was necessary to take the Salmonier line and go around. After passing Holyrood the only difficulty experienced was in moving the innumerable telegraph poles which, broken like so much matchwood, lay strewn across the road. Particularly was this so between Topsail and town. The party arrived in town at 10 p.m. none the worse for their trying experience, but nevertheless, with signs of thankfulness that it was over. It will take thousands of dollars to rebuild the ruined roads and in any case, it could not be accomplished this year. Men were attempting to effect repairs to the railway on Saturday but heavy seas were still raging and nothing could be accomplished. The motorists who managed to make the journey around the bay under such adverse circumstances deserve great credit for their hardihood and their success in the face of such tremendous difficulties.

## Rushing Ocean Mails by Air.

### Aeroplane Tenders on the Liners of the Future.

The announcement in The Evening News recently, the opinion that such a mails may be expedited shortly by means of aeroplanes carried by the large ocean liners, has attracted much attention, especially among people interested in the Dominion. Lord Morris, ex-Premier of Newfoundland, expressed to The Evening News to-day, the opinion that such a delivery system was not only practicable but held great possibilities.

"The advantage would lie not in the aeroplane flying on ahead to the port of destination," he said, "but in the delivery of mails to places passed on the route. For instance, the air tenders of the great liners on the way to America could drop the Newfoundland mails at St. John's, and thus prevent the delay caused by the bags going on to New York."

"I feel sure the Newfoundland Government would subsidize any shipping company which adopted such a system."

### The Incoming Mails.

"In the same way the mails could be taken direct from the ship to Boston or to Halifax (for Canada). As it is, the Boston mails are carried to New York and have to go back to Boston by rail."

"There is no end to the development of such a mail distribution if one considers the long voyages out East."

"It would quicken communication with all countries, and I think that there would be no difficulty in getting the aeroplanes back to the ships after they had made their deliveries."

"The British Isles would also benefit by an air tender service. Boats coming in could despatch their mail flyers to Dublin or Belfast or Glasgow."



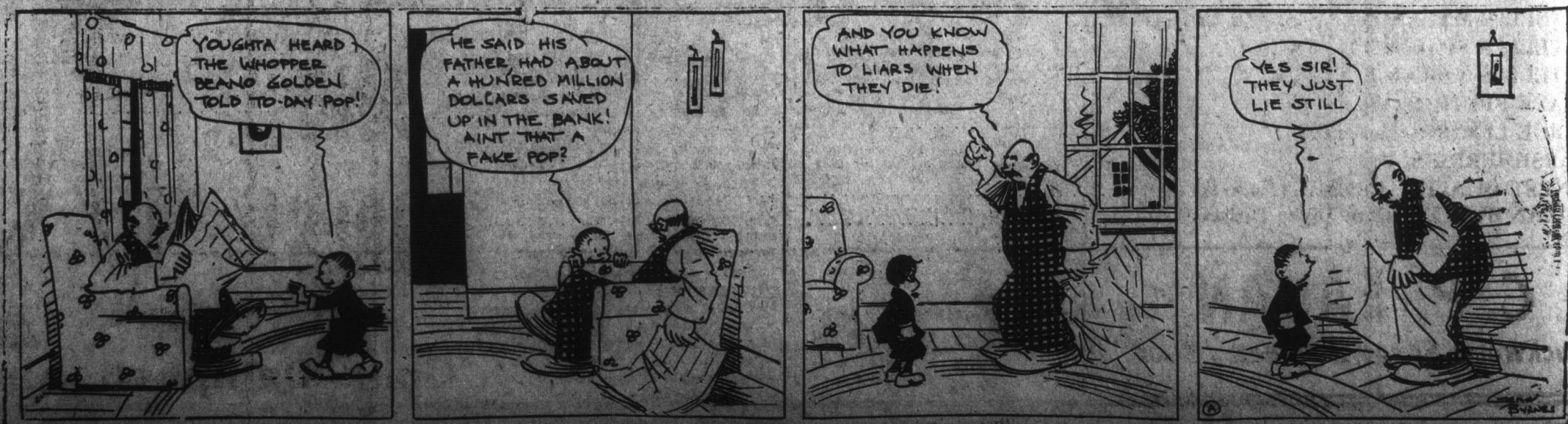

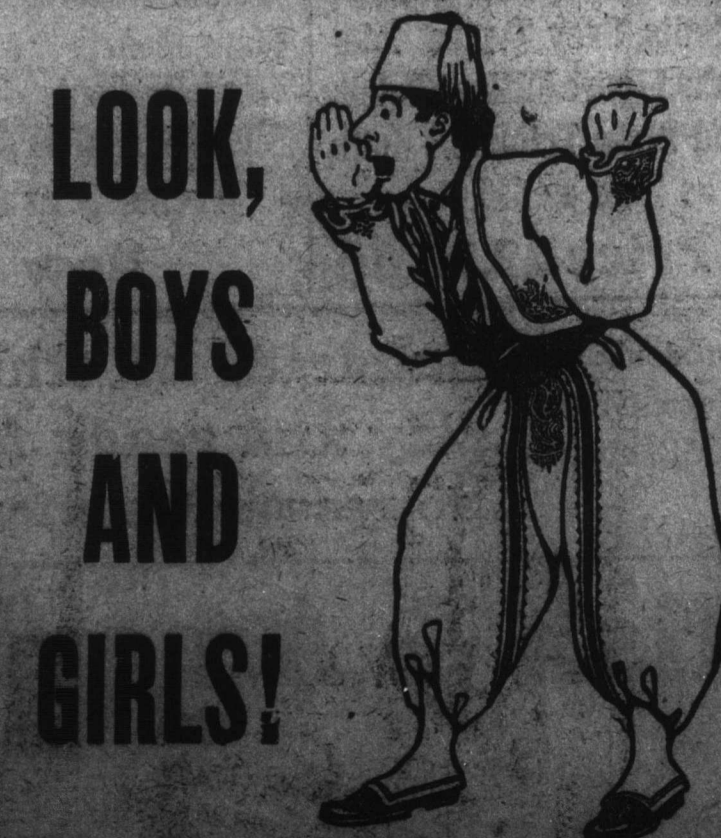

**Cod Oil**—The market continues firm. A considerable advance is expected in the near future. Already sales have been made at \$105.00 per ton. There are very small supplies on the spot and there are very limited lots to come forward. We therefore look for steady advance. There has recently been heavy buying in all fish oils in both England and America, and a genuine campaign of buying for commercial requirements seems to be under way. This is one of the best signs of reviving trade that we have seen for many a day. Increasing firmness in prices of all fish oils at the primary markets is chronicled this week by the New York Trade Journals.

**Cod Liver Oil**—There has been a healthy revival of demand lately in the foreign markets. The druggists have become active and are laying in their stocks for winter requirements. All the past season they have been able to buy Norwegian oil at such ridiculously low prices that there was no money in refined oil for the Newfoundland manufacturer, and but a beggarly margin for the Norwegian with his low freight rates. The market was demoralized in consequence all the summer by the excessive Norwegian supply manufactured last winter, but this condition of affairs is about over and the druggists are looking for the good Newfoundland cod liver oil.

**Whale Oil**—There have been some very heavy purchases of whale oil reported from London this week. The supply of Norwegian whale oil which has had such a depressing effect on the market during the past twelve months is now about gone into consumption with the demand not nearly satisfied. Newfoundland's outlook for an active resumption of this industry next year looks good.

**Pork**—Advices from Chicago this week indicate that the pork market is moving in a narrow range without much change in quotations. The extremely low price of corn is having an abnormal weakening influence in pork prices. This condition is likely to continue for some months. There is, however, a possible factor that may alter the situation, viz. in the prairie provinces corn is now cheaper than coal and farmers may use their surplus for fuel. This will reduce the crop. The local prices are: \$28.00 for Mess, \$28.50 Short Cut, \$24.50 Fat Back, \$35.50 Ham Butt, and \$25.00 for Spare Ribs, wholesale. The week's imports are 1,050 barrels.

**Beef**—The market is dull but steadily held. There has been an active local demand this week which it is expected, will improve further and continue till the end of the year when most of the outport orders will have been filled. The run in Beef, especially Boneless, is good this fall owing to the comparative cheapness as compared with pork. Beef prices are down to about pre-war rates. The quotations here this week are: \$26.00 for Bos Flank, \$22.00 for Family, and \$21.55 for Boneless. The imports this week were only 100 barrels by the Sable I.

**Molasses**—There is nothing new to report in the molasses situation as far as the local market is concerned. Practically all of last season's crop that was to come here has arrived, making a total for St. John's of 6,400 puncheons as against 7,121 at same date last year. A few small lots from Halifax between now and New Year will probably bring the total up to 6,500. The present price of 30 and 35 cents will likely advance to 32.00 and 31.05 by New Year.

**Sugar**—For the first time since last February the sugar market registered an advance of 20 cents per 100 lbs. this week for American Granulated, following a long sustained decline in sugar prices this would seem to warrant the belief that the market has at last reached a point where

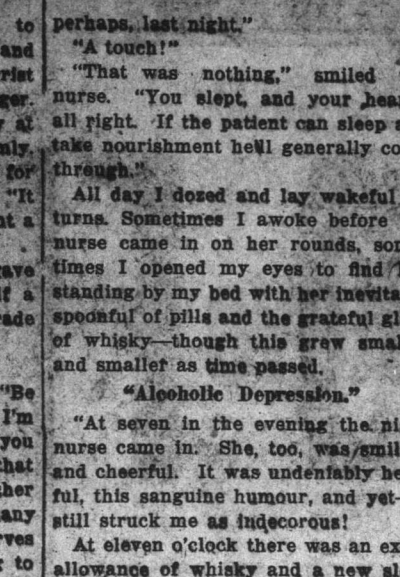

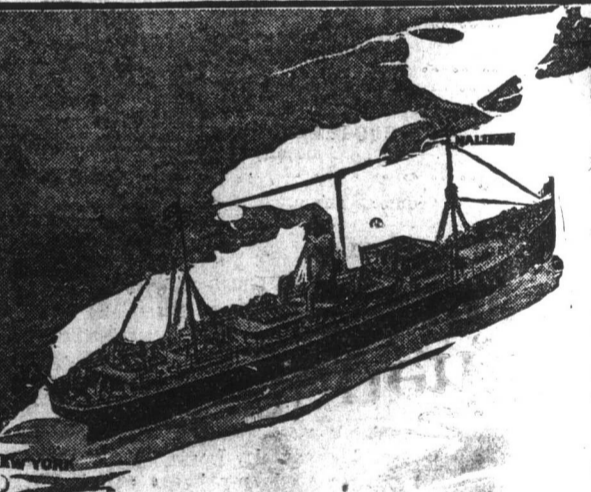
