THE FIEWS OF LI HUNG CHANG. France's Ultimatum to China-Celestis

Rights in America.

SHANGHAI, June 18 .- Tricou, the special envoy of France, has delivered to Li Hung Chang the ultimatum respecting the Chinese suzerainty of Annam with the ultimatum of

war and has demanded an immediate answer. Should Chinese soldiers be found in Annam they will be shot as banditti by the French. Should Ohina make a movement of troops or ships to Annam it will be regarded as an act of war. He insists that China shall make instant and absolute withdrawal of her pretensions, France proposing to deal with Annam as an independent

to deal with Annam as an independent power, and intimates that France may de-mand of China the expenses of the expedi-tion because Chinese action rendered the expedition necessary. There is a rumor ex-citing alarm in Japan to the effect that Li Hung Chang means suddenly to arrange matters with France and throw his torces against Japan, with whom there is an an-cient griavance. Li Hung Chang denies sient grievance. Li Hung Chang denies such a purpose.

such a purpose. The American minister strennously urges settlement, regarding Li Hung Chang as the sole statesman favoring progress in China, and would regard his fall as throwing China N.P.P., and Mr. Bryson, M.P. for Pontiac, and would regard his fall as throwing China into the arms of the reactionary party, and gravely wounding foreign intersts. Li says he is very anxious to arrive at a settlement, but from time immemorial Tonquin and Annam had been Chinese tributaries. It has many times happened that the emperor of China sent armies to Annam during periods of disaffection to compel the return of the people to their allegiance. China mever interfered in their local affairs, but regards their provinces as the United States regards Texas or Ohio. It was the emperor of China who suppressed the rebellion
