TORONTO MARKETS. Toronto, March 7.—Lower prices and a general lack of interest obtained this morning on the local live stock market. No export business was transacted, there being no shipping cattle on offer and no buyers had there been—and only to a very limited extent was there any buying of butcher stocks. Practically no cattle has so far this week been shipped to Eastern points. Montreal buyers have withdrawn from the market on account of the effect Lent is having on the trade in that city, and they are not expected to return until after Easter. This leaves only Toronto, Hamilton and London as consuming centres, and even from these places there is so weak an enquiry that about 2000 head of cattle a week would be sufficient to meet all demands.

The receipts to-day were 58 cars, containing 935 cattle, 720 sheep and lambs, 300 hogs and 70 calves. On the whole the quality of this offering was fair, and the latter part of the offering was sold. Not one sale of bees was reported at yesterday's top level of \$6 a cwt. The greater part of the offering was disposed of at prices ranging from \$5.35 to \$5.90, and only in a very few instances were the latter price paid.

A NATION OF MARKSMEN.

In Switzerland Rifle Shooting is Fostered as a Sport.

Every man in the peaceful and democratic country of Switzerland is a soldier in a modest way. The able-bodied Swiss enters the army at twenty years of age and serves sixty-five days in his first year.

It is not too much to call the Swiss a nation of marksmen. The training periods are occupied only with drill and tactics; the all important matter of shooting is left to the individual soldier to carry out at other times.

Every man between the ages of 20 and 32 must fire thirty-two shots in four compulsory exercises every year, and the societies receive a grant of 2 francs for every soldier shooting this course on their ranges.

In addition to these exercises, many competitions are held between different villages, towns and cantons. The whole system of Swiss shooting is a good example of co-operation between Government and individual.
