

Never before has so much freight been handled on the I. C. R., as at the present time, for despite the fact that the Allan liners do not land as much freight here as they did . last year, other lines more than making up the defiency, while the exports from Cape Breton are away ahead of any previous year. That the Nova Scotia division originates more freight than any other on the road is not disputed. Seven hundred cars of freight are hauled out of Halifax by the I. C. R. every week on the average, while the H. and S. W. and the D. A. R. handle about three hundred between them. The export freight is even greater alen the import, for the freight for export the I. C. R. amounts to three time the import freight the road receives
