





Many person who would not be seen laboring on the field or in the shop seem to have no scruples about performing a journey in order to be read for the transaction of business on Monday morning. Some endeavo to compromise matters by starting in the morning and attenting some place of worship on the way, and finishing the journey in the evening. Many use the day for the interchange of social visit which they regard as harmless, and visiting the sick likewise, which indeed has the semblance of well-doing, but very often the sick-room is crowded to suffocation on that day, while for the next six days the patient is left to suffer for want of proper attendance. And by fa too common is the practice of standing around the place of worshi discussing all kinds of worldly subjects, making bargains, raving debts, and such like business transactions, but for which, some least, would seldom be seen at the house of God. These and simi lar engagements on the Lord's Day by professing christians go ver far to lessen the respect for the day among the ungodly, and ten greatly to the hindrance of the cause of truth in the world.

That reformation in this respect is necessary needs no argumen Your Committee would most urgently press home upon all heads families the importance of maintaining in their households the Scriptural observance of the day. It is thus seen that the labors of our Agent are not to be mured, in estimating their utility, by the immediate pecuniary resthat have been secured. He has done valuable work as a mission He has, after careful personal inspection, given judicious advia our Board in reference to the allocation of fields, and appointment of missionaries; and he has been by no means uncessful in raising funds. We strongly advise the Board who is succeed us to continue his services.

MISSIONARY WORK UNDERTAKEN.

As already intimated, your Board have made comparatively missionary appointments during the year. Earnest and w appeals for assistance came to us from many destitute places. large number of applications for appointments were made by wo missionaries, both young and old. Every legitimate effort was to introduce unemployed ministers to unoccupied fields; simply recommendation, but beyond this it was deemed inexpedient venture until our treasury should assume a more hopeful appear It was thought advisable to disburse the limited funds at our dis in the form of small subsidies to such missionary churches stations as we have had reason to fear might be abandoned aided by our treasury. Towards the close of the year, how when our financial prospects seemed to brighten in some we felt constrained to yield to the pressing appeal of several me ed stations, and to send missionaries to labor therein for months. Ignoring sectional distinctions, your Board have oured to secure missionary laborers for such fields as appeared most in need of assistance. Although aware of the general ten to dissatisfaction in cases where some missionaries are assistant others refused, we have had no alternative but simply to a our best judgement in sending our funds where they seemed most imperatively demanded or where the interests of or might be best subserved.

THE BOOK DEPARTMENT.

In the opinion of your Board there is as much need of Baptist iterature in our Sunday-Schools as there is of Baptist preaching our churches. There would be as much propriety in securing tour pulpits ministers who systematically avoid any reference to a distinctive doctrines, as there is in obtaining books the teachings which are guided by that principle. The introduction of such book into our Sunday Schools is a concession to other denominating that is operating disastrously against our own interests.

During the past year your Board have distributed upwards 1540 volumes of such literature as we could heartily recommen About 13,800 pages of religious and temperance tracts were a gratuitously circulated. The cost of these books and tracts did exceed \$600,00; whilst the receipts arising from volumes a amounted to \$630.00. The balance of books on hand may estimated at about \$200.00 in value. It gives us much satisfact to state that during the past four years more than \$3,600.00 wo of wholesome Baptist literature has been spread abroad through our land by means of our Book Department. In order to les the expense of this department it was thought desirable to disper with the services of colporteurs. Dr. Day has, without remuneration, and at the cost of much labor, received the be into his own house, unpacked them, re-packed and forwarded the according to order. This has materiallly lessened our expenditu and, as a result, the Book Department is not only wholly sustained, but it is of some financial advantage to the II Mission treasury.

Your Board earnestly recommend the immediate establishm of a Book Room for the benefit of the Baptists of the Mari Provinces. It will be for the wisdom of our denominated decide upon the location of such a Room, and upon the practicable method of conducting and superintending its but

arrangements.

FINANCES.

The present condition of our treasury is very satisfactory, heavy debt of \$3457.44 which encumbered your Board at beginning of the year has been gradually paid off; and at this there are funds in hand not only to entirely liquidate that but also to meet all our liabilities up to the present made leaving a considerable balance in our favor. This balance was largely increased by the contributions from the Eastern and Island Associations. 

CONSTITUTION

OF THE

N. S. Baptist Home Missionary Union

1. The consolidation of our Home Missionary organizations, be English and French' would in the estimation of this Convention, to the more rapid advancement of the Redeemer's Kingdom in the Province;—the French Mission to considered a separate Department and all gifts bequests, &c., made to the French Mission to go to the Department.

2. This Convention shall be called the Nova Scotia Baptist Ho

Missionary Union.

3. The object of this Union shall be to promote the spread of gospel throughout the Provines of Nova Scotia, P. E. Island, a the Island of Newfoundland, the fostering of feeble Churches, planting of new ones, and the dissemination of denominational I rature.

4. This Union shall be composed of ordained Baptist minister good standing with their respective churches in the Province, delegates appointed by the Churches, each Church in good stand with its respective Association sending not more than three delegate together with the President of Acadia College, the Principal of Theological Institute, and the Principal of Horton Academy, same being members of Baptist Churches in good standing.

5. The officers of the Union shall be a President, who shall elected annually by ballot; four Vice-Presidents, one from Association, two Secretaries, and an Auditor, all of whom shall

appointed by open vote.

6. The Union shall annually appoint and locate an Exer Board of thirteen suitable men, seven of whom shall form a quer and every Baptist Pastor in the Province shall have the privile meeting with the Board, and taking part in its deliberations; but yoting; the officers of the Society named above to be exercised members of the Board.

CONSTITUTION

S. Central Auptist Association.

ARTICLE 1st.—This Association shall consist of Delegates representing Churches of which it is composed, each of whom shall be a member of of those Churches, together with Delegates from Corresponding Associa 8, not exceeding five from any one Association, and such other brethren sent as the Association may see fit to invite to sit in Council.

er. 2nd.—This Association shall meet at such time and place as may be ed upon by the body.

ar. 3rd—Each Church shall have the privilege of sending one Delegate pore, but no Church shall be entitled to send more than five in addition

RT. 4th.- At each meeting of the Association the Moderator of the preg year shall preside till his successor is chosen. The choice of Modera-hall take place by ballet, as soon as a list of Delegates has been prepared, reinafter provided. No brother shall be chosen Moderator two years in ession. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to preside in all the transns, maintain due order, and nominate Committees, unless otherwise red by the Association. A Secretary shall be chosen, whose duty it shall record the transactions of the Association, and to furnish a correct copy same for the press; he is also to remain in office till his successor is

7. 5th. -It shall be the duty of each Church to send by its messengers er to the Association giving an account of its state, particularly of the ons and diminutions within the last year, and generally of whatsoever s to its peace and prosperity.

r. 6th.—At each annual Meeting the letters from the Churches shall be anded in, from which the Secretary shall immediately make out a list legates. The election of Moderator and Secret aryshall then take place, which the letters shall be read. Committees nominated by the Moderator not consist of more than five brethren, of whom three shall constitute um. When large committees are judged desirable they shall be nted by the Association, and two-thirds of the members appointed shall

.7th.—When any Church shall desire admittance into this body, apon must be made by letter, and satisfactory evidence furnished of its nd order; this being done and a vote of acceptance taken, the Modern-Il, in behalf of the Association, give to one of its messengers present ht-hand of fellowship.

.8th.—When any Church shall neglect to make communication for ears successively it shall be considered as having withdrawn from us, all be dropped from the Minutes, unless two or more members shall is continuance and shall engage to enquire into its standing, and at the next meeting of the Association.

9th.—Although as an Association all power over the Churches is ned, so far as respects any interference with their independence and net yet it is deemed a privilege belonging to the Association to judge of the propriety of receiving or retaining any Church in its

ART 10th.—The religious sentiments of this body are those expressed the "Articles of the Faith and Practice of the Baptist Churches in No. Scotia."

ART. 11th.—That the Moderator be authorized at any time during year, to call a special meeting of the Association in pursuance of a requising signed by ten members thereof.

Aut. 12th.—Alterations and amendments may be made to this Constitute by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at any of its regular meeting

RULES OF ORDER.

RULE 1st.—At every sitting, business shall be opened and closed a prayer; and immediately after the opening, the Minutes of the precedenceting shall be read and corrected.

RULE 2nd:—No member of the Association shall leave the Session be the business is concluded, without permission of the Association.

Rule 3rd.—No subject shall be discussed without a motion first made seconded.

Rule 4th,—No person shall speak oftener than twice on the same sub unless by permission of the body.

RULE 5th.—Brethren invited to a seat with us may speak on all subunder consideration, but vote on none.
