And may Thy Holy Spirit direct all our consultations to the advancement of Thy glory, and the good of Thy Church, through Jesus Christ our Lord.—Amen.

CONSTITUTION OF THE SOCIETY.

I.

The Society shall be called the **DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY OF NEW BRUNSWICK.**

II.

No alteration shall be made in the Constitution of this Society, nor shall any Bye-Law, Rule or Regulation of the Society be repealed, annulled or altered, except at a Meeting of the General Committee, by the vote of at least two-thirds of the members present, nor until it shall have received the sanction of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese, which sanction must be given in writing, and delivered to the Secretary within six months of the said Meeting.

III.

No alteration or amendment in the Constitution, nor any repeal, cancellation, alteration or amendment of any Bye-Law, Rule or Regulation of the Society, shall be proposed or made at any Meeting, unless notice shall have been given in writing at the next previous Anniversary Meeting of such proposed repeal or cancellation, nor unless the terms of such proposed alteration or amendment shall have been stated in writing at such previous Meeting; from which, without the unanimous consent of the members present, no deviation, except of a more formal nature, shall be permitted.

IV.

No repeal, cancellation, alteration, or amendment, shall be proposed, except by a member qualified to vote at the Anniversary Meeting, whose name shall be entered on the Minutes by the Secretary, together with the said proposition.

V.

The payment at any one time of a sum not less than Ten Pounds, shall constitute a Life Member; and the payment annually of any sum, however small, shall constitute the person paying the same, a Member of the Society. Provided that no member shall be qualified to vote at any General Meeting of the Society, unless of the full age of twenty-one years, nor unless he be a Life Member, or shall have subscribed and paid at least five shillings during the year preceding such Meeting.

VI.

Officers.

1. The Officers of the Society shall be a President, two or more Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, one or more Secretaries, and two Auditors of Accounts.

2. The Lord Bishop of the Diocese shall be the President of the Society, and the Archdeacon the Senior Vice-President; and any Life Member may, at any Anniversary Meeting, be elected a Vice-President of the Society.

3. The Treasurer, Secretary, or Secretaries, and the Auditors, shall be annually elected at the Anniversary Meeting; and in case of the death, resignation, or removal from the Province, of any such Officer, the vacancy shall be filled up by the Executive Committee, at its next or any subsequent Meeting within the year; and the Lord Bishop shall, if he see fit, call a Special Meeting of the Executive Committee, for the purpose of filling any such vacancy.

VII

(Executive Committee.)

1. There shall be also an Executive Committee, to be composed of the following Members, viz.:

The Officers of the Society as provided for in the next preceding Article.

All Clergymen resident in the Diocese, duly licensed by the Lord Bishop, and Subscribers to the Society.

And twenty-four Lay Members of the Society, being Life Members, or Annual Subscribers of at least One Pound; to be annually elected at the Anniversary Meeting, provided that no annual Subscriber shall be qualified to be elected, unless he shall, during the year preceding each Meeting, have paid his subscription of at least One Pound.

2. Five Members of the Executive Committee, three of whom to be Laymen, shall form a quorum.

3. The Executive Committee shall meet either at Fredericton or Saint John, on the first Wednesday in January, on the day next following the Annual Meeting, on the first Wednesday in March, on the first Wednesday in June, and on Wednesday after the first Tuesday in October.

VIII

(Objects.)

The Society shall embrace the following objects, and none other viz.:

1. Missionary Visits to places where there is no settled Clergyman, and aid to new and poor Missions.

2. The establishment of Divinity Scholarships at King's College, Fredericton; and assistance, where necessary, to those who may be under preparation for the Ministry, especially Sons of Clergymen.

3. Aid to Sunday and other Schools in which Church principles are taught, and the training and encouraging of Schoolmasters and Catholicists.

4. The supply of such Books and Tracts as are on the Catalogue of the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, and none other.

5. Aid to the building and enlarging of Churches and Chapels.

6. Aid to the building of Parsonage Houses.

7. The creation of a fund towards the augmentation of the stipends of Clergymen who are poor; and towards the education of the children of such Clergymen; and towards the making a provision for those who may be incapacitated by age or infirmity.

8. The creation of a fund for the Widows and Orphans of the Clergy.

9. Aid to the Endowment Fund in particular Parishes.

IX.

The Society will employ no Clergyman on Missionary services without the Bishop's license and appointment, and will submit its choice of Divinity Scholars to his Lordship's approbation.

X.

It shall be competent to any member of the Society to limit his subscription to any one or more of the objects above recited, which he may be most anxious to promote.

XI.

(Local Committee.)

1. The Members of the Society in each Parish, or in each Mission, consisting of two or more Parishes, shall, at the discretion of the Missionary of such Mission, constitute a Local Committee; and so also the Members residing in any District of a Parish set off under the authority of the Lord Bishop, with the concurrence of the Rector and Church Corporation of such Parish, (there being in such District a Church duly consecrated, and a resident Clergyman licensed thereto by the Lord Bishop,) may, at the desire of such Clergyman, and with the approval of the Bishop and the Rector of the Parish, form a separate Local Committee; and in that case the District shall, for the purpose of the Society, be considered as a separate Parish.

2. Each Local Committee shall hold an Annual Meeting on some convenient day, previous to the Anniversary Meeting, when the recommendations to the General Committee of special objects shall be determined on.

3. Each Local Committee shall be empowered to depute two Lay Members of the Society to be elected at the Annual Meeting of the Committee, to assist the Missionary in submitting the recommendations of the Committee to the consideration of the General Committee.

4. It shall be competent to each Committee to recommend any of the above recited objects to the special consideration of the General Committee, in the appropriation of the funds of the Society.

XII.

1. The Society shall hold its Anniversary Meeting at Fredericton and Saint John alternately, on the first Thursday in July in each year.

VIII

2. A Special General Meeting may be called at any time by the President, or in his absence, by any two or more of the Vice-Presidents, four weeks notice being first given thereof by advertisement in one or more newspapers, published in Fredericton and Saint John respectively.

XIII.

(The General Committee.)

1. The General Committee of the Society shall be composed of the following Members, viz.: The Lord Bishop of the Diocese, who shall be the Chairman; but in the absence of the Lord Bishop, the Committee may elect a Chairman, the Secretary or Secretaries who shall also serve in that capacity at the Meeting of the General Committee, the Treasurer and the Auditors, the Rector or Missionary of each Parish, or of a Mission comprising two or more Parishes, and the Clergyman of any separate District of a Parish (provided that in the absence or sickness of the Rector of any Parish, the duly licensed Curate or Assistant Minister shall be considered *pro hac vice* a Member of the General Committee;) and the Lay Deputies elected by the Local Committees as before provided; all such persons being Subscribers to the Society.

Proof of the election of such Deputies by each Local Committee, to be the Certificate of the Chairman or Secretary thereof.

2. The General Committee shall meet on the two days next previous to the Anniversary Meeting, to make the Annual appropriation of the funds of the Society; and a report of the proceedings of such Meeting shall be made at the Anniversary Meeting.

3. The Order of Business in General Committee shall be as follows:

Firstly. Production of Certificate of Lay Deputies.

Secondly. Secretary's Report to be read, and also a Report of the proceedings of the Executive Committee for the past year.

Thirdly. Report of the Auditors to be read and laid before the General Committee.

Fourthly. Such appropriations or disposition of the funds to the objects of the Society as a majority of those present may determine.

XIV.

The Clergy are requested to preach annually two Sermons in their respective Churches, with a collection on each occasion for the General Purposes of the Society.

RESOLUTION OF THE SOCIETY.

That all future Grants, by this Society, for any purpose, may be re-appropriated as the Society shall think fit, if not claimed within three years from the date of the respective grants. (5th Report, page 8.)

RESOLUTIONS OF THE GENERAL COMMITTEE.

That the title to all Churches, towards the erection or completion of which any grant is made from the funds of this Society, be vested either in the Church Corporation of the Parish in which such Church is situated, or in some party or parties in trust to convey the site, as soon as practicable, of such Church to the Church Corporation as soon as the same may be legally constituted. (14th Report, page 24.)

That no grants from this Committee, subject to conditions, be paid until an order is issued from the Executive Committee, who will previously ascertain that the conditions of the grants have been fulfilled. (17th Report, page 21.)

That in future no application for grants shall be considered which are not made on the first day of the meeting of the General Committee, or previously. (18th Report, page 24.)

That each Missionary receiving a salary from this Society, be requested to make an annual return to the Secretary, to be handed in by him at the first meeting of the General Committee, as follows, viz.:

The number of Churches under his charge.

The number of weekly or other stated services held in such Churches or stations.

The number of Communicants.

The average number of attendants.

The amount contributed in each Parish towards the support of such Missionary. (19th Report, page 24.)

That when a Missionary is absent from his Mission on account of ill health, with leave from the Lord Bishop, his Lordship be authorized, in his discretion, to pay to him the whole, or any part of the sum granted for such Mission. (23rd Report, page 33.)

That if any alterations shall be found necessary in the Schedule of Missionary Salaries, granted by this Committee, by reason of the death, absence, or removal of any Missionary named therein, the same shall be made by the Lord Bishop, with the concurrence of the Executive Committee.

That all grants by this Committee for Missionary salaries, and all sums placed at the disposal of the Lord Bishop, shall be for the service of the fiscal year in which the grants are made, and shall expire with it. (25th Report, page 30.)

That all vouchers for the payment of any sums of money whatever, must bear on the face of them, the authority under which they are paid, and the period for which they are claimed, together with the services performed.

That the Treasurer be directed not to pay any monies after the 1st day of May in each year, until authorized to do so by the General Committee at their meeting in July.

That the following be the form of draft for a Missionary's salary, to come into effect on the 1st October, 1861, and that no draft be paid by the Treasurer, unless presented in person, or endorsed by the person to whom it is made payable, the Treasurer to take a receipt from the party to whom the payment is made on the same.

The following are the conditions on which grants are made to Churches and Parsonage Houses, viz. :—

To the Rev. A. B. to assist in building a Church at C. D., the sum of \$—, to be paid on a certificate that the land on which the Church is built is held in fee simple by or for the use of the Church, and the external walls completed.

In the case of a second grant, for "the external walls completed" must be substituted "the building finished both externally and internally."

In the case of a grant to pay a debt on a Church, for the same words must be substituted "the Church made thereby free from debt."

REPORT.

In the usual yearly operations of this Society few marked changes or incidents are likely to call for notice. Untiring zeal and perseverance are required in procuring contributions to its funds; carefulness and punctuality in the management of all its financial concerns, and there must be the constant routine of labor, teaching and prayer, on the part of its Missionaries. These things generally go on here without observation, although well considered as most important with reference to a higher world.

In submitting the last annual report, it was feared that the contributions would be less than usual. By reference, however, to the Treasurer's accounts, the Society will be pleased to find that the receipts from all sources during the past year, were quite equal to, if they do not somewhat exceed, those of any former like period. This, it must be felt, is encouraging, when the unprecedented difficulty in raising money at the present time is taken into account. In many instances, it has unavoidably happened that the amount of subscriptions has not been paid into the hands of the Treasurer till later in the season than usual. Those who undertake the arduous task of collecting for the Society will, it is hoped, make their payments with as much punctuality as possible. There are few instances at the close of the year, of any discrepancy, comparing the payments acknowledged by the Treasurer with the sums at first reported. The difficulty alluded to can only be got over when every member of the Church acts upon a plain sense of duty, and sends in his offerings without delay or solicitation.

The balance in the Treasurer's hands, at the close of the fiscal year, exceeds considerably that of the past year. This balance in hand arises from the fact, which the Society cannot but deplore, that several Missions still are vacant. During the past year, the Lord Bishop has added four to the number of the Clergy in this Diocese, three of whom are actively engaged in Missionary work in connection with this Society. There is therefore good reason to trust that all vacancies will shortly be filled.

At a late meeting of the Executive Committee, it was

reported by one of the Executors, that the late S. Wiggins, Esquire, has made a bequest of \$2,000 to the fund of the Society for General Purposes.

An abstract of the report of the Missionaries and of the several Local Committees, is submitted as follows:

ANDOVER, GRAND FALLS, &c.—"I trust," Mr. Street writes, "that the time is not far distant, when two Missionaries may be employed in this extensive district. For I cannot but feel, as each year comes round, my inability to fulfil with satisfaction the increasing duties in a growing County like this. This truth, while it should urge each member of our church to do his utmost in support of the Society upon which we shall in future depend, should also lead us to thank the Almighty that our church, notwithstanding its difficulties, still holds the affections of those members who but seldom enjoy the privileges of her ministry and the means of grace.

"The Church at the Grand Falls has been so far finished that we are enabled to use it for Divine Service, and I trust the General Committee will allow the grant made last year to be paid in the present state of the building, which is very nearly completed."

BLACKVILLE AND NELSON.—Rev. W. Cruden writes that the contributions from this Mission will amount in all to about \$16 for the current year. He has about 40 children and young people attending his Sunday School.

CAMBRIDGE.—Rev. J. Neales has forwarded the sum of \$6 05 from this Mission.

CAMPOBELLA.—Rev. J. S. Williams reports that at the annual meeting of this Committee, the following resolutions were passed unanimously:

1. That this Committee, while assuring the General Committee of their continued interest in the operations of the Society, respectfully requests a renewal of the grants to this Mission.

2. That whereas the General Committee has for two years last past made a grant of \$40 towards the support of a day School in this place, in which the principles of the Church of England are inculcated, the Local Committee desires to express its conviction that good is being accomplished by the said School, and that the money granted for its support by the General Committee is well bestowed, and judiciously applied.

Contributions will probably amount to \$60.

CANTERSBURY.—Rev. T. Hartin reports contributions to the amount of \$30 88.

CARLETON.—Rev. F. Coster reports that the contributions will be about \$30.

CHATHAM.—Rev. S. Bacon writes that at the annual meeting of the Chatham Local Committee, the following resolutions were passed:—

1. That this Committee view the Diocesan Church Society of paramount importance to the interests of the Colonial Church, especially as connected with the contemplated Endowment Fund, and it is their firm conviction that the future prosperity of the Church would be materially promoted by allowing the contemplated Endowment to form one of the objects of the Society, which they humbly conceive might easily be effected by altering the present constitution so as to appropriate a larger portion of the funds to the maintenance of the clergy. And, this Committee are moreover of opinion that, by additional legacies, occasional donations, and enlarged annual contributions, the Church in this Province would, under the Divine blessing, speedily become self-supporting.

2. That this Committee return their best thanks for the annual grant of books to the Chatham Local Committee, which are duly appreciated,

and trust they will not be overlooked in the appropriations for the present year.

Contributions are \$116 18.

COCAIGNE AND BUCTOUCHE.—Rev. A. H. Weeks has inclosed his annual return. From the report of the Rev. Dr. Jarvis, it appears that the sum of \$9 30 was collected in this Mission for the Society.

DOUGLAS.—Rev. Theodore E. Dowling writes as follows:—"The Society will be pleased to hear that instead of occasional week day services at All Saints' Church, Crock's Point, I am now enabled to hold regular Sunday services once a fortnight. The congregation appreciates this change, and have erected a neat fence round the new burying ground. A small library has been commenced, and the books are eagerly read.

"As the winter was favorable for travelling, the number of week-day services has increased during the past year. During Lent a series of lectures were delivered in the Stone Church, by clergy of the deanery of Fredericton, on the Book of Common Prayer. I have reason to know, not only from the interest taken in them at the time, but from subsequent conversation, that they were listened to by many with profit.

"In three districts the work of Foreign Missions has been prominently brought before the people. Contributions have been sent to the Central African Mission. But I much regret that very little interest is shown towards the Diocesan Endowment Fund; perhaps this apathy might be removed if the Diocesan Church Society would send an influential speaker to address the Church people on this important subject.

"It has been my privilege to commence a series of week-day services in a distant settlement where no public ministrations of any kind have ever taken place. The congregations are large and attentive.

"At Tay Creek the laity are beginning to take a more lively interest in Church matters. The Diocesan book hawker sold books to the value of eight dollars, and I am very thankful for his visit. A new library supplied by the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge has been long looked for, and at last heartily welcomed.

"A lay reader or catechist would be of great service in Douglas."

FREDERICTON.—Rev. C. Lee reports amount of contributions \$773 70, and he adds, "some few subscriptions have not yet been paid, but it is hoped they will be forwarded next year."

GASTOWN.—Rev. J. Neales writes that frequent illness has prevented him from completing the collection from this Parish, which, however, he is thankful to say, will be a little more than last year, say \$80. He has also forwarded \$6 05 from Cambridge.

Mr. Neales calls the attention of the Society to the necessity of making present provision for the Mission of Cambridge, now vacant.

"I have worked," he says, "beyond my strength, since Mr. Wood resigned, and I am willing to do so as long as I am able, which, however, I feel is not a very hopeful prospect. I give them a weekly service, and once a fortnight on Sunday evening at the Jemseg Church, and have endeavoured to hold service once a fortnight at the other Churches, in which there have sometimes been unavoidable interruptions; but all that I can do is as nothing compared with the earnest pastorate of a resident clergyman."

GLENELG, NEWCASTLE, &c.—The Rev. James Hudson states that the annual meeting of the Glenelg Committee, was held on the 30th May last; only a few persons were present, as the weather was cold and unseasonable, but those who did attend the meeting expressed by resolution, their heartiest wishes for the prosperity of all the Society's designs; and their sincere regret that the hardness of the times does not permit them to send larger offerings to its Treasury.

The Missionary adds, that he "celebrates Divine Service as regularly as pos-

sible in the Free Churches at Newcastle and Glenoig, as well as in School houses and private dwellings, in other parts of this extensive Mission, and nowhere with more pleasure than in the settlement of Ludlow, distant from his "hired house" about sixty miles. In every place he takes some pains to impress upon the minds of his fellow Churchmen (whether they like to hear it or not), that it is their bounden duty to help on the various good works in which the Church Society is now engaged."

Since February last, contributions from this Mission have been forwarded to the amount of £21, part of which, £2 17s. 8d., has been realised from the sale of the Society's Books.

GRAND MANAN.—Rev. G. T. Carey has inclosed a list of contributions amounting to \$14. The amount would have been more were it not, Mr. Carey writes, for the difficulty regarding American money, which the Islanders chiefly receive in payment for their fish, &c.

There is the same good will towards the Church, and in a short time he hopes to make a further remittance.

GREENWICH AND WICKHAM.—Rev. D. W. Pickett writes that a comparison of the returns with those of last year, will show that the average attendance and the number of communicants in the Parish of Greenwich, which the Islanders chiefly receive in payment for their fish, &c. The Services have been regularly supplied, except when the impassable state of the river or roads prevented.

The Station at Tibbey's was given up on the appointment of Mr. Richey to the Parish of Petersville, but that at the Menzie's Settlement has, at his desire, been retained, as being more accessible from the Greenwich side. The attendance has been regular, and the services well appreciated. The people have contributed this year a small sum to the Society.

In Wickham the Parish Church has been opened every Sunday as before, and the fortnightly service on Saturday at the Shannon Settlement, has been continued, with few exceptions, caused by the impossibility in crossing the river. The erection of the little Church, which it was proposed to build at the latter place, has, from various causes, been delayed, but it is earnestly hoped that much will be done during the present summer for its advancement. A Sunday Service once a month has been recently appointed here, which, I trust will, by God's blessing, repay the additional labor.

The contributions in both Parishes will, it is hoped, equal those of last year. They are from Greenwich, \$50, from Wickham, \$16.

HAMILTON.—Rev. W. Walker reports contributions to the amount of £26.

Rev. D. J. Wetmore, as Assistant Minister, has forwarded a report of his labors for the past year, which will be found in the usual place.

KINGSCLEAR.—Rev. J. Black reports contributions to the amount of £12 4s.

KINGSTON.—Rev. W. E. Scovill writes as follows:—"I have remitted to the Treasurer \$114 for the General Purposes of the Society, since its last Anniversary. If this amount is less than could be wished, it is not less than I anticipated, considering the sums required for local objects, more particularly for completing the Parish Church. In repairing, remodelling and enlarging it, we have expended since the beginning of 1857, upwards of \$5,000, and have met this large expenditure for a country parish, not partly by calling for extraneous aid, or soliciting, as we fairly might, a grant from the Society, but by our own subscriptions, payable in such small annual sums as persons in somewhat straitened circumstances might reasonably hope to liquidate. In this way we have at last completed the work, and made our Parish Church, what the house of God ought every where to be, the best house in the Parish.

At the meeting of our Local Committee, we passed the following resolution:—"That, though the times are hard, we are sensible that we have great reason to lift up our hearts in thankfulness to the Giver of all good, that He has not required of us such sacrifices as our neighbours in the United States have been subjected to, by the wasting and calamitous war now raging among them;

and we recognise the duty of proving our gratitude for his sparing mercies by making liberal contributions and earnest efforts to extend, through the instrumentality of our church, the blessings of the Gospel of Peace."

LANCASTER.—Rev. W. S. Covert, in inclosing the report of the work in his Mission, remarks that he has baptised 3 adults during the year, and that 21 young persons were confirmed by the Bishop on the 16th May.

MAUGERVILLE AND BURTON.—Rev. H. Pollard writes as follows:—"There is but little to report concerning this Mission of the events of the past year. The Services of the three Churches have been kept up with regularity, excepting, of course, a few Sundays in the spring and fall, when the state of the ice prevented my crossing. For the year ending last Easter Day, 106 services have been held in the Churches, besides the monthly services at the two stations. The offertory collections in Burton realised nearly the whole amount required for their part of the Rector's salary; but in Maugerville a considerable sum had to be raised by subscription. The congregations in the latter Church during the winter, were very large, whilst there has been no decrease in any of the others.

"In February, at the request of some Church people, I visited Newcastle for a few days. From Saturday to Monday, I held five services in the village and neighborhood, apparently to the great comfort of the people, who have been deprived of the regular services of the Church, and indeed of any services, for a long time. There was an universal regret, that the parish could not be supplied with a Clergyman, and an expressed determination to do all they could for his support, should any be sent to them.

"Last March, it was determined to commence a new Church at the Oromocto village, in spite of the great difficulty in procuring funds at the present time. Plans were obtained from Mr. Mitchell, of Fredericton, the site chosen, the frame contracted for, and a large portion of the lumber is now on the ground. The parishioners have hauled the stone for the foundation, and it is expected that the frame will be raised in July, with the hope of completing the external walls this year. The Church will be smaller than the one at Lower Burton, and much less expensive. The building Committee desire to make an application for a grant towards this Church.

"The collections for the Society, not yet completed, will probably amount to the sum forwarded last year."

MONCTON.—Rev. W. N. Boyer reports contributions to the amount of \$32 25. Mr. Boyer hopes to remit a further sum, and also to gain some subscriptions from the Parish of Salisbury.

NEW MARYLAND.—Rev. C. S. Medley writes as follows:—"I am thankful to be able to make, on the whole, a satisfactory report of the work of the Church in this Mission. Although a great number of the young men have been absent since October last on lumbering business, and only a few have as yet returned, the average number of attendants at the Services of the Church have increased from 34 to 43. This will be thought, I trust, a fair growth, when the size of the Mission, and the scarcity of church people is considered. The Church building in this Mission is in a very poor condition, and we are hoping to complete a new Church this year. About £100 has already been collected by the late Missionary, the Rev. John Medley. The total cost of the Church will be at least £300. We respectfully hope that the Diocesan Church Society will make us a grant to aid in this good and necessary work.

"The Sunday Services have been kept up very regularly during the past year; and I have also, since Lent, held one Service during the week, which has greatly improved the musical part of our Services.

"I regret to say that the number of baptisms, during the past year, has not equalled the number of births, nor have I succeeded so far in increasing the number of communicants as much as I would wish, but I hope some of those

who are about to offer themselves for confirmation, will join our small but faithful band.

"A monthly service is still held as regularly as possible at the Rusigornis, but during the winter and spring months the congregations are small. I have only been able to fulfil my promise to those people to have a Sunday Service twice, owing to the state of the roads; four times in six months I have been obliged to turn back, after having driven half way; and once I left my horse and sleigh and walked six miles in snow up to my knees.

"There is not a single Church in the Parish of Lincoln, of which this district forms a part. I heartily wish that this stain upon our body might be wiped out, for meeting houses of every species of sect may be seen here in great numbers; the monthly Service which I hold in a private house, is the only Church Service in this large Parish

"The gross amount of the contributions will be \$35 61."

PETERSVILLE.—Rev. Theophilus Richey has forwarded a return of Missionary work in this Parish, for the past year, during a great portion of which, he was engaged as a Lay Reader.

The contributions amount to \$47 76.

"During the past year," Mr. Richey writes, "we have had cause to thank God that the use of the means has not been unaccompanied with the Divine blessing.

"The congregations have been generally good, and notwithstanding the almost impassable state of the roads throughout a great part of last winter, and the number of stormy Sundays, only three Lord's days have passed without service during the entire year.

"During my experience as a Catechist, I must say that the people flocked round me and notwithstanding the inconvenience they felt from the restrained character of my duties, seemed to anticipate any of my discouragements, and did all they could to make me feel happy in my work. Since my return to the Parish, after ordination, no less than nine children have been presented for Baptism during the short time of a fortnight or three weeks.

"The Parish had long felt very severely the want of a Sabbath School. The establishment of one has been attempted, I believe, by all the former Clergymen in charge of the Parish, but owing to the extensive character of their duties, having other parishes to attend to, and not being able to be present at the Sabbath School or afford it any personal superintendence, every effort heretofore has proved a failure. The parish being now not in connexion with any other, and enjoying exclusively the services of a clergyman, the prospects of the young in reference to a Sabbath School, are much more encouraging; and it is hoped that with the Divine blessing upon the exertions of his servants a regular system of instruction for the young, on the Lord's day, will be established and perpetuated. Indeed we have already in part realized our hopes, as the children now meet their Minister for an hour and a half before the Morning Service, in the Parish Church, and then are catechised and instructed in the Word of God. Their knowledge of the Bible has so far not only been satisfactory but surprising; and I was not a little astonished to find, on the first day I met with them, that it was hardly possible to think of a question in the historical Scriptures for which they had not a prompt and correct reply. This was the more encouraging because it showed that the parents had been doing their duty at home around the domestic altar; and with such auxiliaries as these the work of the clergyman becomes comparatively light and abundantly happy. It is the desire of our hearts and the subject of our constant prayers, that through the presence and aid of God's good Spirit, the efforts of His servants and people may be rendered efficient, and the cause of true religion and the interests of our Zion may steadily advance upon this Parish."

PRINCE WILLIAM, DUMFRIES, & CO.—Rev. C. F. Street reports that at a meeting of this Local Committee, resolutions were passed expressive of great interest in the Society, cheerfulness in contributing towards its objects, and a

desire that the Society may be appreciated by all in this Mission, who desire to spread and establish the truths of the Gospel.

The Committee also expressed themselves most earnestly in favor of the Endowment Fund, which had been so strongly advocated in the late Charge of the Lord Bishop,—more especially as the present aid from the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel is likely to be greatly diminished in a short time.

Mr. Street writes, that he took charge of this Mission last autumn, and that his residence is too short to allow him to see much change from his ministrations. "I perceive, however," he says, "that much is to be done in order that the progress of the church, so ably promoted by my predecessor, may be continued. Many persons who have been confirmed are yet to be led to become partakers of the Lord's Supper; many prejudices are to be overcome, and much spiritual sloth to be removed.

"The attendance in the Churches at Prince William and Dumfries is small, and the buildings themselves require much outlay for repairs and alterations.

"At the Maguadavio Settlement, Divine Service has been hitherto performed in a School house, although there is always a large and attentive congregation. It is necessary that means should be obtained to build a church in this place.

"In Dumfries a Sunday School has lately been established, in which, when the Missionary is absent, valuable aid is afforded by the Teacher of the Government School. The Sunday School is held in the Parish School room, and parents of all denominations seem inclined to encourage it.

"The visitation of the sick has been constantly required during the last two months, within which period I have officiated at ten funerals."

An abstract of the report of the Missionary work, which is only for the period of nine months, will be found in the usual place.

The contributions to the Society are about \$66 70.

PORTLAND.—Rev. W. Harrison has forwarded a list of contributions amounting to \$181 10.

QUEENSBURY.—Rev. W. H. Tippet regrets that the contributions from this Mission will be very small, viz., about \$26 85. This is caused, not by any reluctance to subscribe, but from the want of means. "Things are much depressed," Mr. Tippet adds, "and our prospects very gloomy, owing to the terrible destruction made on the meadows and pastures by last winter's frost.

"The spiritual affairs of the Mission are much as usual; not much fruit of my ministration is manifest, yet I am not without gleams of encouragement from time to time, and I labor in the hope that if I am not permitted to see the fruit of my humble efforts, my successor will."

RICHIBUCTO.—Mr. N. A. Coster has inclosed the following report:—"Since the Parish of Weldford was placed under my charge, my utter incompetency to fulfil my duty has been a weight upon my mind, and my plans have had to be changed several times. One Sunday in a month was as much as I thought myself justified in taking from my charge at Richibucto. And I learned by the experience of one year, that week day services at the church were of little benefit to the people there. The church is nearly in the centre of the parish, containing perhaps 150 square miles. The population entirely agricultural or lumbering—none of whom live within miles of the church.

"The last year I therefore adopted the plan of spending two or three

days previous to the Sunday in Weldford, riding through the various bye roads, and holding a service wherever I found two or three children to be christened. By this course I believe I have visited even the most distant parts of the parish; and in the year from July 1st, 1862, to June 20th, 1863, I baptized in Weldford, 27 children, besides affording a little religious instruction to many to whom the church was inaccessible. I thus became acquainted with all the church people, and although I always returned home dissatisfied with my success, I still believe that the result has been what the Church Society designs.

"The number of church people thus found by me, justified me to appeal in behalf of Weldford; and two months ago, Mr. Sheraton, a student of the college, awaiting holy orders, was licensed by the Bishop as lay reader. By his assiduity all these scattered people are being gathered into congregations, which could not have been effected by a non-resident clergyman.

"Mr. Sheraton's zeal has made a wonderful change in the parish. Besides the church he has several fixed stations, and at them I now meet, not only the communicants, but the children to be baptized. My only fear is that Mr. Sheraton may have undertaken more than a man's strength will enable him to go through. Besides the duties above named I have, in the past year, been sent for to administer the Lord's Supper to the sick several times; and twice I have gone to bury the dead. Last month, during Mr. Sheraton's absence, I went to bury Mr. John Sowerby, who was accidentally torn to pieces in his own mill. He was a young man of such extraordinary promise, that though I doubt not death was a gain to him, it certainly was a very grievous loss to our church. The number of miles I have travelled I would not venture to reckon; but the church is twenty miles from my residence, and nearly all the church people live beyond it."

Mr. Coester has also forwarded a list of subscribers for 1862, from Richibucto, amounting to \$117 24.

St. ANDREWS.—Mr. G. D. Street, Secretary of this Committee, is happy to report a small increase in the contributions this year, which amount to \$172 12.

Rev. Ranald E. Smith, Assistant Minister in the Parish, has forwarded a report, of which an abstract will be found among the returns of the Missionaries.

"During the past year," Mr. Smith writes, "I have regularly assisted in the public services and other ministrations of the church, when required. By this means the Mission at Chamook, in which the church is evidently gaining ground, receives that attention to which, by its importance, it is entitled. Among the 13 baptisms in that part of the Mission during the past year, 7 were in the case of adults, and there were 13 confirmed, the greater part of whom have since become communicants."

St. PAUL.—Rev. W. H. DeVeber regrets that owing to the removal from the Parish of some of the subscribers to the Society, and the diminution in the contribution of others, the amount does not quite equal that reported last year. Contributions amount to \$213 66, of which the sum of \$8 is limited to the 9th object of the Society.

St. GEORGE.—Rev. J. McGivern writes that at a meeting of this Local Branch, the contributions were reported as follows:—Saint George, \$108 16; Pennfield and Pope Logan, \$19 85; Bourke Settlement, \$37 37. Total, \$165 88. The report of the Committee is as follows:—

"In presenting our annual offerings to this sacred cause, we desire to renew our thanksgiving to the Author of all Good, for the measure of success which he has hitherto vouchsafed and still continues to vouchsafe upon the labors of this Society. As respects this Mission it will be seen that there is a small increase in the amount of our contributions over the past year. We learn with satisfaction from the Chairman, who volunteered his services in the work of collection in this the largest section of the Mission, that only in one case has he met with a refusal; some have doubled or increased their subscriptions for the present year, while the majority seemed disposed to act upon their *old* rule of doing as they always did. Even this we regard as an indication of good, especially in times of embarrassment in our principal branch of trade, and distracted state of the currency. In the late visitation of the Bishop, the plain practical statement of facts which his Lordship deemed it to be his duty to address to the people on the past state of the Church, its connection with the venerable Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, its present and future prospects, and the personal duties of its members one and all. We indulge the hope, under the blessing of Almighty God, that the counsel of the Right Rev. Prelate may be productive of lasting good.

"We desire to thank the Society for the last year's grant of Books to the Church Libraries of this Mission, and to request that we may be remembered in the same amount for the present year. Upon this subject the Chairman informs the Committee that he cannot always obtain from the Depository a suitable supply of books to the amount granted by the Society to the Mission. That on his last application he was informed by the manager of the St. John Depository that he had orders to sell these books promiscuously to the people of the city, &c., to the prejudice of the Country Missions. And it was resolved, that it be an instruction from this Branch to the General Committee to take order that in future no such sales be permitted until the Country Missions shall have been supplied to the amount of their respective grants."

St. James.—Mr. Hurd Peters writes that the contributions from this Parish are less than last year, owing to the fact that the people here are called upon to make up a considerable amount to defray arrearages due by the Church, and for necessary repairs. It is probable that some now unable to contribute to the Society may do so during the Summer, which will add somewhat to the amount. "I can assure you," Mr. Peters concludes, "that considering the other calls made on the Parish, the decrease this year cannot be attributed to any backwardness or want of interest felt in aiding the aims and objects of the Society."

The contributions amount to \$284 75.

St. Mark.—Mr. C. H. Fairweather, Secretary of this Committee, writes as follows:—

"I hand you herewith the list of subscriptions and collections from St. Mark's Parish, in the city of St. John, amounting to \$502 83, which sum has been paid to the Treasurer.

"In remarking that this is the largest sum ever yet contributed by this Parish for this object, I gladly take the opportunity of bearing witness to the liberal spirit with which the members of this Church came forward in support of the Diocesan Church Society. With many other calls upon their liberality, and while generously meeting them all, the annual subscriptions to the funds of this Society are paid with a readiness and cheerfulness most marked and gratifying. No better proof can be desired that the objects which this Association was formed to pro-

mote hold a high place in the affections and esteem of the members of our Church in this Parish."

ST. MARY'S, STANLEY, &c.—Rev. Mr. Jaffrey writes as follows:—"The Society may form some idea of the extent of my mission, and the work therein performed, by my giving a list of the different churches and stations at which I do duty, and the highest number attending each of those stations at any one time during the past year:—

"The above churches and stations, as may be supposed, are scattered over a large extent of country—the two most distant, that is, Stanley and Ironbound Cove, being distant one from the other about 65 miles.

"During the past year I have given some considerable attention to the parties occupying lumber camps in the backwoods of my Mission, and I believe that good has resulted therefrom.

"Should the Society's funds permit, I would make application for \$40, towards paying the expenses of a catechist, whose services seem absolutely necessary for keeping the Church alive in many parts of my extensive Mission.

"The amount of subscriptions this year, when all collected, will be equal to that of former years, namely, about \$60."

ST. STEPHEN.—Rev. S. Thomson, LL. D., reports that at a late meeting of this local Committee, there was a warm regard expressed for the welfare of the Society. The interest in the promotion of its objects is very much in the hearts of many of the Churchmen of this Parish, but the present derangement in the currency, and the great expense of the proposed Church enlargement, will somewhat lessen the amount of contributions for the present year.

ST. JOHN.—H. W. Frith, Esq., Secretary of this Association, reports contributions to the amount of \$690 45. The great decrease, compared with last year, is owing to the loss of the annual donation of the late S. Wiggins, Esq.

SHEDIAC.—Rev. G. S. Jarvis, D. D., reports in all from this Mission, \$48 30, of which the sum of \$9 30 was collected by the Rev. A. H. Weeks, in Cocaigne and Buctouche.

SIMONDS.—Rev. G. Schofield reports \$41, as the present amount of contributions. A further sum is expected.

SPRINGFIELD.—Rev. George Rogers was so lately appointed to this Mission, that he is unprepared to make a full report. Meetings of the local Committees have been held both in Springfield and Johnston, in which the work of the Society appeared to be appreciated.

Mr. Rogers brings before the Society the state of one of the Church buildings in the upper part of Springfield, about seven miles from the Parish, where is a poor settlement of hard-working, industrious Irish settlers, who some few years ago commenced the erection of a Church. The frame is enclosed, and the people desire to finish it. At present,

Divine Service is held in a private house. About \$180 have been subscribed, and persons are now working at the Church. It will require double that amount to finish it.

Mr. Rogers has since forwarded his returns, showing the total amount of contributions to be \$59 80. There are still several additional subscriptions, which he hopes may still be paid. With respect to Johnston, he is happy to say that in no previous year has the amount been so large.

STUDHOLM.—Rev. R. Simonds has enclosed returns of the missionary work done in this Parish, which will be found in the usual place, and a list of subscriptions amounting to \$43 44.

SUSSEX.—Rev. C. P. Bliss reports the amount of contributions to be \$67 25. A further sum is anticipated, which will make the amount as much as, if not more than, that of last year.

UPHAM.—Rev. S. J. Hanford reports contributions to the amount of \$110 87 for the general purposes of the Society.

VICTORIA.—Rev. J. Armstrong has forwarded contributions to the amount of \$15 50.

WESTFIELD.—Rev. E. S. Woodman reports contributions to the amount of \$32 68. The decrease in the amount this year, Mr. Woodman writes, arises from the calls made upon the people to aid in finishing one of the churches in time for consecration, at the proposed visit of the Bishop.

WOODSTOCK.—Rev. S. D. Lee Street writes as follows:—“I send herewith the Resolutions passed at the meeting of the Woodstock Local Committee, by which it will appear that the importance of the Parish of Richmond being made a separate Mission is again strongly urged. There are good and substantial reasons why this is so desirable. There are a large number of Church families residing in that Parish, very many of whom are settled in remote parts of it, and too far from the Church to enable them to attend at the stated services; but if a Missionary were in charge of that Parish alone, those remote districts could be more regularly attended to, and a Sunday service afforded them. But if they continue to be neglected, it will necessarily follow that those who are now attached to the Church will become estranged, and ultimately unite with the Dissenting congregations which are continually assembling around them. They have a residence for a clergyman erected, and the exterior partly completed, and they would at once proceed to its completion if a prospect were afforded them of the Parish being shortly made a separate Mission. They would also readily contribute to the utmost of their ability towards the support of a Missionary. There is ample work for the Curate of Woodstock, independently of Richmond. But while that Parish continues a part of the Mission of Woodstock, it is impossible that the whole work can be effectually or satisfactorily performed, and many portions are necessarily altogether neglected, or so partially attended to that but little good can be effected. And believing as I do that there are few Parishes in the Diocese that stand more in need of a resident clergyman, I trust the Society will therefore take the matter into serious consideration, and make the necessary provision towards carrying out this most desirable object.

“I regret much that the amount contributed this year towards the funds of the Society from this Mission will fall so much short of that of

former years ; but I beg to assure the Society that this arises from no lack of interest in the welfare of the Society, but solely on account of the utter impossibility on the part of many to obtain the means of continuing their contributions, and it has been by great labor and perseverance that even the amount reported has been obtained. Never, since my residence here, have I known such an absolute scarcity of money. Many have expressed their regret at not giving as they would wish, and live in hopes of being in circumstances another year to enable them to make up for the present deficiency. A large amount has been expended for local purposes during the past year ; and I have succeeded, after much trouble, in accomplishing a great improvement to St. Luke's Church, by the addition of a good sized chancel, which affords accommodation for the choir and organ ; and by this change and addition, fifty free sittings have been added to the body of the Church, which were much needed. The work of the Mission continues to be performed as heretofore with the aid of the Rev. Robert C. Nelson, who now fills the situation of Curate of Woodstock, in the place of the Rev. George Rogers, removed to another Mission. I am happy to say that Mr. Nelson seems in earnest in the work, and I hope will prove an able and useful assistant."

The substance of the Resolutions passed by the Local Committee is embodied in the foregoing letter.

Contributions amount to \$149 18.

From the foregoing statements it will be seen that the exact amount of contributions for the current year has not been as yet fully reported ; but from a careful computation there is reason to trust that the sum total will not fall far short of that of last year.

It cannot be denied that the means, placed at the disposal of this Society, do not keep pace with the increasing spiritual destitution which we would seek to relieve. The yearly increase is sadly out of proportion to the wealth with which God has entrusted the members of the Church in this Province, and to that portion of it which He Himself has so plainly declared should be devoted to objects like those contemplated by this Society. The population of the country goes on gradually increasing—there is also a certain amount of emigration—children are born, they are growing into men, vice is constantly extending itself, most rapidly where, in so many places, alas ! it is unchecked by any ministrations of religion ; meanwhile the income of this Society does not increase with any thing like the same ratio. Then there is that long threatened reduction in the support of Missionaries by the venerable Society for the Propagation of the Gospel ; this reduction has already begun, and may increase too rapidly. It has taken place this year in the case of the extensive and important Missions of Mangerville, Lancaster, and Sackville. The Church in the Province loses thereby the sum of £50 sterling annually. This, it is to be

expected, is only the prelude to further reductions. Unless, therefore, means are otherwise provided, or the income of this Society at once largely increased, it is evident that difficulty will soon be found in providing the very limited stipends for the present staff of Missionaries, and all hope of extending the ministrations of the Church must be abandoned.

This is the plain state of the case. Startling indeed and sad it must be to every thoughtful mind. It should, however, come up before every member of the Church in the Diocese. To them God has given the means of doing His work, if they only ask of Him to give them a "willing mind." Let all support from without be withdrawn, and there is sufficient in the hands of Churchmen in the Province to maintain not only the present establishment of clergy, but also to provide for the additional number which is required, were they to give that proportion of their goods to God which his express command enjoins. This is the right way to do, according to the revealed will of Heaven—the way in which an abundant blessing may be looked for, both upon the work itself and upon all those who earnestly and heartily engage therein.

To the Rev. J. S. Williams, in aid of a Church School at Campobello, \$40.

On motion of Mr. Carman, it was resolved that there be granted to the Rev. Philip Wood Loosemore, \$25, being the balance of a quarter's salary up to the 1st July, 1862.

The Honorable Mr. Justice Parker brought under the consideration of the Committee the necessity of an Endowment Fund, or of increased contributions to this Society, and alluded to the proposed change in the mode of presentation to parishes; whereupon, on motion of the Hon. Mr. Justice Parker, seconded by the Rev. G. M. Armstrong, it was resolved that the Lord Bishop be requested to call a special general meeting of the Society, sometime before the meeting of the Legislature, to discuss the question of endowment and patronage, and that in the meantime the clergy be requested to ascertain the sentiments of their parishioners upon these subjects.

—takes this, the earliest opportunity, to express its sense of the loss it has sustained, and to record its grateful remembrance of his liberality, manifested not only by his generous contributions while living, but also by his liberal testamentary bequest of \$2,000 to its funds; and the Society tenders its respectful sympathy to the members of his family in the bereavement they have sustained.

REPORT OF THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE EXECUTIVE
COMMITTEE OF THE DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY
FOR THE PAST YEAR.

The Minutes of the Meeting of this Committee, held at St. John, on 4th July, 1862, will be found in full in the 27th Report, pages 38 and 39.

The next Meeting of this Committee was held at Fredericton on the 8th October, when the account of Barnes & Co., for printing the Annual Report, amounting to \$124 69, was presented, and ordered to be paid in full of all demands.

It was resolved, That the grant made in aid of the Church at St. George, amounting to \$40, be paid by the Treasurer, the conditions attached to the same having been complied with.

It was also resolved, That the grant of \$50, in aid of the Parsonage at Greenwich, be paid, so soon as the certificate now furnished has appended to it one from the Registrar of the County that the Deed conveying the land on which the Parsonage stands, has been recorded.

Read a statement from the Committee of Accounts respecting certain Parishes in arrears regarding their contributions for the past year. It was resolved, That the said Committee be requested to write to the respective Parishes, informing them of their deficiencies, and requesting immediate payment.

At the meeting of this Committee at St. John, January 7th, 1863, an account was presented by Barnes & Co., for printing notices and packing the Reports, and forwarding them by mail, amounting to \$9 40, which was, on motion, ordered to be paid.

A statement of the Treasurer's Account, up to 31st Dec., 1862, was read, and it was ordered that the same be received and placed on file.

It was, on motion, resolved, That the Treasurer be requested to call upon the Central Bank for the payment of the balance due the Society, before the 1st of May next.

The Secretary was requested to procure certain blank forms for the use of the Society.

An account of the Secretary for postage and travelling expenses, amounting to \$18 40, from 4th July to this date, was read and ordered to be paid.

The Committee met at Fredericton on the 4th March, 1863.

The Treasurer reported that he had called upon the Central Bank for the payment of the amount due the Society; since May last \$350 have been paid, and it has been promised that the balance shall be paid before the 1st of May next.

Read a statement of deficiencies in certain Parishes, regarding the amount of contributions reported for the past year—when it was resolved, That the Committee on Accounts be requested to write to the several Local Committees, and to secure (if possible), the payment of the deficiencies before the close of the fiscal year.

Resolved, That Mr. Carman, Mr. Simonds, Mr. Miller, and Mr. Hugh Moore, be a committee for making arrangements for holding the Anniversary meeting in July next.

The next meeting of this Committee was held in St. John on the 3d June, 1863, when the Secretary laid before the meeting the Treasurer's Account made up to the close of the fiscal year, which, on motion, was ordered to be received.

Mr. W. Wright presented the following report of the Loan Committee, which, on motion, was ordered to be received, and entered upon the minutes:

The Loan Committee of the Diocesan Church Society have to report, that during the past fiscal year they have collected interest monies to the amount in all of four hundred and forty-four dollars and thirty-five cents, which sum they have paid over to the Treasurer of the Society, as will appear by his accounts, but the funds of the institution have not enabled them to make any new investments.

That since the last meeting of the Executive Committee, the munificent bequest of the late Stephen Wiggins, Esquire, to this Society, having been paid by his Executors, the Loan Committee have invested the same in Carleton Water Scrip, issued by the Corporation of the City of Saint John, by virtue of certain Acts of Assembly; such Scrip being in the nature of coupon bonds, bearing interest at the rate of six per cent. per annum, payable half yearly. Tenders were called for by public advertisement, pursuant to Law, and your Committee considering the stock nearly if not equal in value to the St. John Water Stock, which has, in some instances, attained a premium of 5 or 6 per cent., and that no better investment could be found for the fund at their disposal, did not hesitate to exercise the discretionary power granted, by offering a premium of $\frac{1}{2}$ per cent.—making in all sixteen pounds five shillings in addition to the £500 invested; which tender was accepted, and the Scrip is now in the hands of your Committee, bearing interest from this date.

And whereas, from an accidental omission the said Report did not appear in the Society's Report of 1861, therefore resolved, That the same be published in an Appendix to the Report of the present year, with a notice of the omission.

Frith, be a Committee to act with the Secretary in the performance of that duty. And further Resolved, That the speeches delivered at the Anniversary Meeting, at the discretion of the Committee, be added as an Appendix to the Report.

On motion—Resolved, That the Rev. C. Lee, Rev. C. S. Medley, the Hon. the Master of the Rolls, Mr. J. Wilkinson, Mr. W. Carman, and Mr. E. Simonds, do compose the Fredericton Book Depository Committee for the ensuing year.

And further Resolved, That Mr. W. Wright, Mr. F. A. Wiggins, and Mr. W. Jack, do compose the Loan Committee for the ensuing year.

On motion—Resolved, That the Treasurer's Accounts be from time to time referred for examination to a Committee, to report thereon to the Executive Committee; and that

the Rev. Canon Coster, Mr. C. H. Fairweather, and Mr. L. H. DeVeber, do compose the said Committee.

ST. DAVID AND ST. PATRICK.—Rev. J. S. Thomson writes as follows :
 " I have to report for the present year, baptisms, 7 adults, 33 infants ; marriages, 5 ; burials, 27 ; my communicants number, as usual, nearly 70, losing many by death and removal, but still by new additions keeping up the number. We were much favoured by the visit of the Lord Bishop in June last, when the new Church was consecrated at St. Patrick, and fourteen confirmed—the Bishop and other clergy being much pleased with the devout behaviour of the candidates and of the large congregation assembled.

" We were unfortunate in having a wet and most unpleasant day for the Bishop's visit to St. David. Nevertheless, a large and attentive congregation assembled, and hearkened with delight to his Lordship's godly counsel and instruction. Eleven candidates were confirmed—chiefly adults ; about half the number on my list, the remainder being detained by the weather, and the long distance they had to travel.

" My subscription this year will fall short of last year—the depressed state of the American currency being the chief cause. This, of course, affects us upon the lines more than elsewhere."

APPENDIX—No. 3.

ANNIVERSARY MEETING OF THE DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY.

Last Thursday evening (July 2d), the Annual Meeting of the Diocesan Church Society was held in the Legislative Council Chamber. The Lieutenant Governor presided. There was a fuller attendance than usual on such occasions of those interested in the welfare of the Church. Among the strangers present, was Bishop Burgess, of Maine, who had, as was stated, travelled out of his way to be present at the meeting. We are happy to say that we are enabled to give a verbatim report of the Bishop's very pleasing and eloquent address, which was listened to with much interest by the audience, and are sure it will be read with equal profit and delight by those who were not so fortunate as to hear it, though they will lose much—the impressive delivery. This speech—if we may so speak—was the main feature of the evening; and with due respect for the other speakers, we have taken the liberty of condensing their remarks very considerably, giving merely the principal heads as briefly (and we hope correctly) as possible. After prayer, and singing of the Doxology—

His Excellency opened the proceedings by observing that it was the usual custom to preface the reading of the Report by some remarks; but as the speakers on whom devolved the duty, had, year after year, to go over the same ground, he would best consult the interest of the Society and the comfort of the audience, by confining what he had to say to as short a compass as possible. All that could be said to enforce on the audience the benefits of the Society—the importance of keeping it together—the necessity of greater exertions to increase its usefulness, would come with greater effect from those who had been longer amongst them than he had been, and were more intimately acquainted with the facts than he was. One fact, however, he would notice as encouraging—the general receipts were not inferior to those of any former time. They had not only not fallen off, but they had relatively increased. And yet, although that fact showed that the Church was becoming more alive to the benefits of the Society, when they considered what the whole of those receipts amounted to, and looked to their ability to give, and at what was required, the result seemed but small. From the circumstances of the Church in the Province—that had hitherto been dependent on home charity for support—it was the bounden duty of her people to make a secure and permanent endowment for their clergymen; and from the character of the times, it was inexpedient that the clergy should be dependent on the people; for, in the present day, when religion obtained the external respect of almost every one, it was more than ever necessary that the clergyman should be perfectly free to utter the truth, as there was the danger that otherwise he might be deterred from stating what might be distasteful to the ears of the respectable portion of his congregation—a restraint that could not but have a most baneful effect upon him. Moreover, the effect of an Endowment Fund was always good and strengthening to a Church. They might learn this lesson, and profit by the example, from what had been at the time of the disruption of the Presbyterian Church in Scotland, when the first thing that was done by the party that seceded, was to raise a Sustentation Fund; and this, which amounted to a large sum, was chiefly made up of contributions from the poorer classes of the people. His Excellency concluded by saying, that the chief purpose the speakers at such a meeting had in view, was to ask for money. What they had to say, was—"We want money; will you give us money? The more money you can give us the better."

The Rev. W. Q. Ketchum then read the Annual Report.

The Bishop of Fredericton, in moving that the Report be received in full, adopted, and ordered to be printed, said—It gave him great pleasure to address so full an audience in the convenient room that the authorities had kindly permitted them to occupy. In former years, people had been chiefly kept back from attending the annual meetings from want of accommodation. They were there to promote their own objects, free from all political feeling, or thought of political strife. And His Excellency (whom he heartily thanked for attending the meeting), in according his support, did not do so in his capacity as Lieutenant Governor, but as a hearty and earnest member of the Church, and who wished to stand on the same ground there as her humblest member. He congratulated the meeting on the presence amongst them of the Bishop of Maine, who, he might tell them, had put off important business, and had travelled two days and two nights, in order to be present with them impelled solely by the spirit of one who feared God and loved his Redeemer, and by zeal for the Church, although he could not hope to be benefited by any thing he heard, or by any thing that was done there. Another reason why they should greet their friend warmly—and of him he would say, the oftener he met him, the more eager he was to avail himself of his services—was their close neighborhood. They had only to cross a small bridge in order to get into the Diocese of Maine. His Excellency had observed that the principal object of that meeting was to get money. But in his (the Bishop's) view, that was not the only or the principal object. He did not ask them solely for their money; he begged their sympathy as well. The poor man who gave five shillings, with his prayers, did more than the rich man who gave five pounds with a grudging spirit. In considering the object they had in view, he would especially entreat them to look at the plain facts of the case that could not be gainsaid. From his position, that caused him to travel over the whole Province, he naturally knew more (though particular clergymen might know more about particular Parishes) of the Parishes generally than any other clergyman. Several facts had forced themselves on his attention. The growth of the Church must be slow, because the growth of the Province was slow; from their position, while the stream of emigration was directed to more favored countries, they must necessarily be a very slow growing people. He would, however, be content if the Church continued to grow at the same rate it had during the last year. But they must struggle hard to maintain its growth; and they had this difficulty to contend against—whilst the amount of support they received from home was yearly diminishing, they had to keep on adding to the number of their Churches, to provide for the wants of the scattered population of their Parishes. His Lordship then proceeded to contrast the difference in the position and spirit of many of the Church people in St. John and Fredericton, compared with those in the remote settlements. In the cities they had more services within their easy reach than they cared to avail themselves of, if many of them did not think it a trouble to attend Church at all; while in the country many poor persons, and many aged, walked many miles—in some cases, five and ten miles—in order to enjoy the privilege of worshipping in the Church. These were the quiet and noiseless Christians of whom they of St. John and Fredericton knew nothing, and who were a strength to the Church, and for whom it should be their duty to provide the frequent services of clergymen, and access to convenient places of worship. He could not help thinking that the last census was a deluding document (he did not mean to say that those who had compiled it had not done their duty); it was a mistake to put down the number of Churchmen at forty-two thousand. Among that number there were many Nothingarians, who were neither Roman Catholics, Presbyterians, Methodists, or Baptists; and the fact seemed to be that the Church got the benefit of all these worthy people, who belonged to no sect or denomination.

His Lordship then proceeded to remark upon the Endowment Fund; to show how the Church in the Province had been endowed from England for the last sixty years; that the reliance the Church people had in that support, had tended to weaken their efforts to make themselves independent of

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home aid; that they were in error who supposed that the aid granted them came from the Imperial Government, when, in fact, it was made up from the charitable contributions of the very poorest people in England. Would they, when they knew that fact, allow those poor people to save them from contributing to their own Church? Would it not be a sin so to allow them? Experience had shown them that they had been too sanguine. They had been wrong in saying that they could easily raise £40,000 amongst themselves for an Endowment Fund. People seemingly withheld their contributions because they could not give much, or because the wealthy amongst them did not contribute according to their means, or at all. But why should any one, if he could only afford a sixpence or a shilling, not give it? Or why, because the rich man did not contribute according to his wealth, should the poor man do nothing? It was not the wealthy noblemen and persons in high position in England who contribute to the missionary fund, from which their Church was endowed—it was the poor people. Let them imitate the example set them at home; let the poor people here take hold of the scheme heartily, and there was no fear of it. At the present time, it was utterly impossible that all the Parishes could be made self-supporting. His Lordship then read a statement (as we understood), to show that several Parishes were in a way, in a short time, to become self-supporting, such as St. Stephen; that several more in St. John and Portland were partly self-supporting, and others entirely; that Fredericton was now on its own resources. It had been said that an Endowment Fund would make the clergyman independent. Some people actually harbored the thought that it would be well, for fear the clergyman might do or say something disagreeable to them, to keep them dependent. Was it not absurd to talk of a clergyman, with perhaps a family of seven or eight children, and a salary of £150, as independent. How would any man in any situation or office like to be dependent on the caprice or whims of any number of people? How would he like to undertake it on the condition that he should please every one in the performance of his duties—would such a state be tolerated? If subjected to it, would he not soon be heart-broken? And yet they would bind the clergyman so that he should not receive his miserable pittance unless he pleased every man, woman, and child in the Parish. The voluntary system, without some permanent endowment, could not be maintained; and he was convinced that an Endowment Fund would be a permanent benefit to the Church and to the people.

The Hon. J. A. Street, in seconding the resolution, briefly excused himself from speaking at length, as he was laboring under a severe cold.

The Bishop of Maine then, on being introduced by His Excellency, rose, and addressed the meeting as follows:

The very cordial manner in which the Bishop of Fredericton has alluded to my presence, and in which Your Excellency has been pleased to mention me, demands from me an equally cordial acknowledgment. In commencing my remarks, I must say that I thought his Lordship was mistaken on one point, when he said that I had no interest in this meeting, till he made an exception of the sympathy which I might carry away, and the benefit which might be conveyed to my own heart and my own charge from what I might witness here. That, ladies and gentlemen, is a benefit I so deeply appreciate, that I would conceive myself more than abundantly recompensed for vastly greater exertions than any I have made. New Brunswick and Maine lie side by side. The Church in New Brunswick cannot grow in strength, stability, and piety without communicating to the eastern part of Maine a blessed influence. We are largely indebted to the Diocese of Fredericton for the introduction of the Church into that portion of my diocese; and I am sure that if you prosper here, we shall feel the benefit of your prosperity, and on that account I am exceedingly glad to be here. One more motive prompted me, which ought to have its effect upon every thinking Christian. I reflected, as I often do, when some public duty draws me from my special path, when asked to preach on this or that subject, for objects here or there,

with which I have no very direct connection, that the time will soon come, even if my life is spared, when no man will care for my presence. The days are hastening away for any man like me to expend his efforts in this work of God. If any one should think, at any time, that any assistance of mine can have any effect, I feel that *now* is the time, and that it is my duty to be there to render it. The Report which has been read by my valued friend, the Secretary, has set forth, without any special terms of praise, the labors of the clergy during the past year, which attracted my attention and admiration; and, I believe, were they more widely known, not only here, but elsewhere, in the United States and in England, they would be found to furnish a stimulus to exertion such as has been thought not likely to proceed from this quarter. The number of stations, the distances travelled, the labors undergone, the positive toil thus expended, with the hardships endured—all this presents, as I verily believe, such a scene as is presented in no other portion of the Church on this Continent or in Great Britain. It is a peculiar kind of labor, carried on through a long cold winter, in so many places, at such distances that nobody but he who has tried it can appreciate it. Consider that the sympathy is often very slight, the response feeble, the services conducted with very little to aid the imagination or kindle the feelings, where the man comes to his work cold, tired, I might almost say, hardly welcome, and goes away with nothing but the consciousness that he has done his duty. This is a spectacle, I say, that excites my admiration; and I am glad to carry away its influence, and make it tell, if I can, upon those committed to my supervision.

But to hasten to the subject. My attention has been called to the special aid given by this Society to supply the deficiency occasioned by the withdrawal of the assistance that has been heretofore granted by the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, and particularly to the effort for raising an Endowment Fund. With reference to this matter, I feel that one is confronted at the first by a reply which men of right and honorable feeling think quite sufficient to disarm them at any time—when I urge a gentleman to contribute, and he tells me he has not any thing to give, I have no more to say. "God loveth a cheerful giver." I take it to be true, and there is no use to inquire further. I content myself in such case with laying before him the blessed motive for doing that which our hand findeth to do, and doing even beyond our ability, and there I must leave the objector. But though this may be done with reference to objects of mere benevolence, charity, kindness, and generosity, you cannot pursue the same course when you come to those who are within the sphere of conscience as connected with the claims upon us for the support of the institutions of religion. Then you come to matters in which all have an equal interest, and the case is entirely changed. *There* the inquiry ought to be pushed—is this excuse, you are not able, exactly enough? You, sir, have had some experience such as we now have in our Republic. An inquiry is made, and an answer is required, with regard to our income. We must say what our income is, and must give to the State what it requires for its great purposes in proportion to what our neighbors are giving. And, therefore, we come to this point. It is a mean and dastardly thing, utterly contemptible, for any man to withhold from the State that which it requires from his neighbors, because this compels his neighbors to do that which is his part. So with respect to religion. It is not an act of benevolence or charity to pay a minister who gives his services to you. They may not be able to give much in some of the Parishes; but in many others you have the ability to contribute more largely. The establishment of a minister in a Parish is a matter that concerns the whole community. When he is once settled among you, your temporal, nay, your everlasting interests, all are connected with the presence and work of that clergyman. It is not fair and honorable for men to say that they are not able to do their proportion of that which must be done in order that he may remain, that is, without necessity to refuse their contributions. It is right and fair that men should pay in proportion to that which is required of their neighbors. But there are

many communities both here and in Maine, and in many other parts of this Christian Continent, where a large part of society is proved to consist of persons who cannot be expected to provide adequately for the support of their clergyman. It is not possible that they should be able to sustain an educated, intelligent, faithful minister among themselves, for the simple reason, they are scattered, and their resources small. One, however, cannot confine his spiritual necessities to the different communities. *Then* clergymen must be sustained—and if sustained at all, by funds either from a parochial endowment, or which are collected in a missionary way, or, as the Endowment Fund provided, from the combined resources of the whole body. My own experience has completely proved this; and if you desire further evidence, you may go through the length and breadth of our States, and the Provinces, and see what kind of services they have where there is no efficient body of clergymen; see how precarious every thing is—how one religious body and another is going down under the influence of such neglect, and you will be satisfied that there needs to be a broad system to supply the religious wants of the whole land. The Bishop of Fredericton has adverted to the mischief of the too great dependence of the minister upon the prejudices and caprices of his people. I am free to say, that in large cities I do not much fear the influence of the laity over the minister, but in little communities. The right feeling of a large body of Christian men, will support and sustain him honorably; but when we go outside of places where there is a great abundance of wealth, then we come to the difficulty. It is in our small, struggling Parishes, where a man takes offence at his minister, and I am sure he often does not know for what, perhaps he does not like his looks, or wants somebody else. He finds no fault with his doctrine, but he does not like him. He, therefore, cuts off his subscription, or stays away from Church, and there ends the matter. This must be so until a certain amount of independence is secured. I would gladly have every where, except in the largest and wealthiest Parishes, something of the nature of an endowment, not sufficient to entirely sustain the clergyman without any sympathy from his Parish, but sufficient to place him above this miserable annoyance and this exposure of his independence to temptation.

With regard to the responsibility of raising an Endowment Fund, I would observe that *time* is one of the most important elements to be taken into consideration. Begin your fund as well as you can, and *time* will do a marvellous deal towards its progress and increase. Rich men are dying every year. We read of men who have given away large estates to purposes which they knew would do some good; and it is not unfrequent, as they go down the vale of years, that they wish an object suggested to them, towards which their wealth unquestionably might be beneficially appropriated when they are gone. The sum required, large as it may seem, to create an endowment for this diocese, is not really beyond the possibilities and probabilities of contingencies like those referred to, united with the faithful and combined efforts of the present generation. We think the mere endowment of a single Parish is not so great a difficulty. A Church is often built which costs a third more than is absolutely necessary. If the whole sum be raised, and the Church built with the remaining two-thirds, the interest of the people is increased through the nature of the effort, and the Church in due time becomes beautified and improved, and the fund allowed to grow, also places the Parish in a state of comparative ease and independence. But I dwell too much on these matters of detail.

Now let me say a few words as to the right use of wealth. My Christian friends, what is the value of wealth at all? If it had been appointed in God's wondrous providence, that no good could be done with wealth—that it could not contribute directly or indirectly in the slightest degree to the everlasting benefit of souls, what would have been our natural exclamation? We know wealth is a dangerous thing. We are told how hard it is for a rich man to enter into the kingdom of God, because he is so likely to grasp his riches, and trust in them. If we had left us that text, and no more; if the Scripture

had assured us of *no* benefit to the souls of men which could possibly be drawn from this source, how should we have longed that it *might* have done so. Each of us would have exclaimed, how gladly would I have given one-half, three-fourths, nine-tenths, or all I possessed for my own and the salvation of my fellow men, for the spiritual and everlasting benefit of my family and those who come after me. Now the Lord *has* provided that wealth may contribute to the spiritual and everlasting benefit of men, so provided and promised that they may "lay up in store for themselves a good foundation against the time to come." We know perfectly well that he who makes provision for the present generation, for the support of religion, does of necessity confer the greatest spiritual benefit upon multitudes to come; and here is the very thing we have been supposing we *should* have prayed for with such interest. I should like to have this feeling rest upon the minds not only of the rich, but of all, because the same blessing rests upon all; and they who give according to their ability, be it less or more, have all their part in that immense store-house of promises comprised in that one blessing of treasure laid up in heaven.

May it please Your Excellency, before closing, I wish to draw the attention of the meeting to another point to which it is natural that a citizen, and especially of New England, and most especially of the State of Maine, should be led to draw the attention of Churchmen in a Province like this. Your work would seem to consist very largely in *keeping* what has been placed in your hands. *Here* has been an endowment hitherto, and you are now not to suffer it to slip away, but to hold it fast. You have a large body of Churchmen. His Lordship the Bishop, in speaking of the estimates, treated thirty two, or even forty-two thousand, as a small proportion of the inhabitants. Oh, if I could say that there were thirty or forty thousand Churchmen in my diocese, with its population of two or three times that of New Brunswick, how should I rejoice for such a record. You have the Churchmen, and you have rather to keep them than to increase their number. We in the United States have the work of *making* Churchmen to begin with. Our labors run in that direction, and not unsuccessfully. We have such success as constrains us to glorify God; for, believing as we do, the cause of the Church to be the cause of the blessed Saviour, and the salvation of souls, and knowing the result of not having the Church, we think when we lead a man to the Church, and bring him truly, heartily, and devoutly into its communion, we have conferred upon him the greatest of human and eternal benefits. Why, sir, half the clergy of Maine, and more, during my Episcopate, have been persons not educated as Churchmen. I apprehend half of our Bishops in the United States were not brought up in the Episcopal Church, and I dare say half of the whole body of our clergy. Our work is different from yours. *Yours* is easier than ours; if not easier, it ought to have been, and there must be something or other wanting in the present generation of Churchmen here, or wanting in the Church itself (which God forbid), if you do not leave the Church in the Province stronger than you found it, if you allow it to lose any ground. But I have found that many who have been brought up in the Church, and never dreamed of any other state, but have enjoyed its privileges from their birth, and expect to enjoy them to their death, are the very persons who least appreciate the necessity of missionary efforts for the Church; that these are precisely the persons who are most indifferent to this work, and even Bishops, too, very excellent men, who have gloried in the fact that they and their families, for generations, never knew any thing else, were the persons who looked with coolness upon the whole subject of making accessions to the Church. I hope the Churchmen of this Province will not be so indifferent to the practical work given them to do.

If we believe the Church of which we are members to be the Church of God, the best and truest way, we owe it to the praise of the religion of the Saviour to make every exertion for the extension of that Church, to contribute freely and labor diligently for its support, to employ every effort in its cause, and to preserve its unity, harmony and love. We must do this or

prove ourselves unfaithful to the talent committed to our trust. We of the Church of England (for it is all one) as members of the great Protestant and Episcopal community, whether of England or America, must, if we would please God, do the work of the Church in our generation, endeavor honestly and strive faithfully that the blessings which we so deeply appreciate should be given to all around us, and sustained to the utmost extent of our power. For, in doing this we sustain the soundest Christian doctrine, the true faith once delivered to the saints, the old creeds come down from the Apostles, the simplest and purest belief to be found upon the earth, and we sustain and give in connection with it the noblest form of worship, the holiest words of christian piety employed in public devotion. We give and sustain the regular transmission of all the authority belonging to the Ministry of Christ. All these we sustain and bestow, when we uphold the Church we love, and which we love, I trust, not merely because we were brought up in it, not because we delight in its services as a matter of taste, not because of its beautiful structures or its graceful and refined or even able and vigorous preachers, but we love it, I trust, because it is the Church and cause of our blessed Redeemer, and because we hope by it to come to His Eternal Kingdom. Let us not be Churchmen of that class who simply desire to maintain things as we found them, or even as they always have been before us, but of that class who desire to make the *most* of these things, who believe the Kingdom of God is like leaven or the mustard seed, like everything which grows and expands, and becomes more and more perfect. Let us go forth not only in faith, but in charity and love for all men, and offer to them, as freely as we have received, whatever our Lord has bestowed upon us.

We regret that we are obliged to omit the speech on the second resolution, by the Rev. Mr. Armstrong, on the power and duty of prayer; as well as the remarks of the Hon. Mr. Justice Parker on the Endowment Fund and the Presentation difficulty. With regard to the latter, he observed that the only thing in the way of a settlement, was the mode by which the people should act. They were all perfectly agreed that no clergyman should be inducted into a Church without the voice or consent of the people.

Mr. Fairweather (St. John) proposed a resolution recording an acknowledgment of the munificence of the late Stephen Wiggins, Esquire, to the Church, which was carried.

W. Carman, Esquire, proposed a vote of thanks to the executive officers of the Society. A motion was carried that they be requested to undertake the duties of their offices for the ensuing year.

A vote of thanks was passed to His Excellency for his able conduct in the chair. The meeting acknowledged the presence amongst them and the address of the Bishop of Maine, in the same way.

After singing the Doxology, and the pronouncement of the blessing by the Bishop of Maine, the meeting separated.

APPENDIX—No. 4.

CLERGY ENDOWMENT FUND.

The following report, which was unintentionally omitted in the Annual Report of 1862, is now given in accordance with a resolution of the Executive Committee, page 28.

REPORT OF THE SUB-COMMITTEE TO THE COMMITTEE OF THE DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY.

WHEREAS at a Meeting of the Committee appointed at the last Annual Meeting of the Diocesan Church Society, held at Saint John, on the twenty-eighth day of August, 1860, it was resolved as follows, viz.:—"That all monies which may be collected for the purpose of an Endowment Fund be held by the Diocesan Church Society *in trust*, in accordance with a prospectus to be prepared and reported to the Society by this Committee, and that a Sub-Committee be now appointed to prepare such scheme, and report to this Committee at a future day;" and Mr. Justice Parker, Rev. Dr. Gray, Rev. Frederick Coster, and Messrs. F. A. Wiggins, William Wright, and John M. Robinson, were appointed the members of such Sub-Committee; They the said members whose names are subscribed hereto, having taken the matter into consideration, have prepared a prospectus or scheme by way of constitution for the Endowment Fund, and contained in the following Rules, which they recommend to the adoption of the Committee, to be reported to the Diocesan Church Society.

1st. It being resolved that the capital of the Endowment Fund shall be *Twenty Thousand Pounds*, Currency; the Fund when raised is not to be reduced below that sum.

2nd. The Fund is to be held by the Diocesan Church Society, separate and distinct from its other Funds, in trust, to be invested, managed and applied as provided for by these regulations.

3rd. The receipt and investment of the monies collected for the Fund, and the management of the Fund, to be by a Committee of five persons, members of the Diocesan Church Society, to be styled *The Clergy Endowment Trust Committee*, to be annually elected by the General Committee of the Diocesan Church Society, three of whom shall be a quorum for the transaction of business.

4th. It shall be a general instruction to the Clergy Endowment Trust Committee, to invest the Fund in public securities or in securities of a public nature, in preference to more private securities; and in case *coupons* are attached to any of the securities whereby the interest is made payable to bearer, the said Committee shall in order to avoid all risk of the payment of such interest being made to a person not duly accredited, take measures to have the securities enrolled and the payment of interest limited to an authorized person.

5th. Subscriptions for annual payments, as well as for contributions to the capital shall be received; and the Clergy throughout the Diocese shall be requested to make one annual collection in aid of the Fund, in each of the Churches, on such Sunday preceding the first of May as shall be deemed most convenient for that purpose.

6th. The annual sum to be paid out of the income of this Fund to any incumbent shall be fixed by the General Committee of the Diocesan Church Society, who shall be enjoined to have due regard to the particular circumstances and means of the Parish, the sum however, not to exceed One hundred pounds, currency, *per annum*, and to be subject to any condition or stipulation which may be prescribed by the General Committee as to the amount to be contributed by the parish to the support of each incumbent. Every parish to be required, as a condition to its participating in the benefit of the Fund, to

furnish annually to the General Committee of the Diocesan Church Society a full and correct statement of all its income arising from lands, &c., and of the nature and probable prospective value of such lands, and whether it would be expedient to sell the same and invest the proceeds.

7th. After the annual sum to be paid out of the income of the Fund to any incumbent shall have been so fixed, it shall not be withdrawn or reduced during the incumbency of such Clergyman: but it shall be competent, on the death, resignation or removal of any Clergyman, for the General Committee to suspend the making any allowance to his successor out of this Fund until all arrears of salary due to such Clergyman from the Parish shall have been satisfactorily paid.

8th. The subscriptions and contributions to the Endowment Fund are to be considered as bearing interest from the time stipulated for payment if then in arrear; and where no time is specified the contributions are to be considered payable in three months, and subject to interest thereafter if not then paid. The annual subscription to be deemed payable in like manner for the first year, and for subsequent years at a corresponding period in each year. Annual subscriptions unless expressed to be in aid of the capital of the Fund, to be considered as part of the annual income.

9th. The Schedule for Contributions and Subscriptions may be in the form following, or to that effect.

10th. The accounts of the Clergy Endowment Trust Committee shall be made up every year to the first day of May; and an Annual Report shall be made by the Committee of their proceedings, with details of their investments and payments, and of expenses incurred, &c., made up to the first of May, and sent to the Auditors of the Diocesan Church Society, who shall report on the same to the General Committee; and the Sub-Committee shall produce and exhibit to the Auditors the several securities and vouchers, and other papers relative to the Fund, and give such information and explanations as may be required by the Auditors.

11th. The Clergy Endowment Trust Committee shall deposit in such one of the Banks of the City of Saint John as may be selected, with the approval of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Church Society, any monies received by them, until the same shall be invested or paid. And for that purpose an account shall be opened with such Bank, in the name of the Clergy Endowment Trust Committee, under the distinct understanding with such Bank, that the cheques to be drawn against such Fund shall be signed by at least two members of the Committee. All which is respectfully submitted to the Endowment Committee of the Church Society, by the undersigned.
