



The interest in the nickel situation srows because of the efforts to side-track investigation of it. When Mr. Maclean introduced a bill to regulate the export of mickel, the government asked the Speaker to rule that it should be preceded by a resolution, as the legislation pro-bosed affected "trade and commerce." The Speaker so ruled. Mr. Maclean knew all about this rule, which, as he showed, was not lived up to when the export of fuel-gas and electricity was regulated. The Speaker replied that it must have been by "inadvertence" in these instances. Mr. Maclean also knew that if he had to bring in a resolution which could be held up by a dilibustering debate he might never get in his bill, or would get it so low down on the order paper that discus-sion would not be reached this session. Now he will have to discuss the question of going into supply at the first chances.
