





#### JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS, 5884.

#### ANNUAL.

On motion duly seconded the Proceedings of the Thirteenth Annual Communication were accepted as presented in printed form, and adopted.

#### ADMITTED TO SEATS.

The R.:. W.:. Deputy Grand Master then announced that all Master Masons in good standing were invited to seats in the Grand Lodge during the present session.

#### REGRETS.

A letter was read by the V. W. Grand Secretary from W. Bro. Jas. Reid, Grand Representative of the Grand Lodge of Quebec, regretting that business engagements would not permit of his being present. Upon motion the letter was ordered to be spread upon the minutes.

The V.: W.: Grand Secretary then read the following address by M.: W.: Grand Master Edgar Crow Baker, forwarded from Ottawa.

**OTTAWA, 7th, June, 1885.** 

TO THE R.'. W.'., V.'. W.'., and W.'. Brethren of the M.'. W.'. Grand Lodge of British Columbia:

Brethren:—Circumstances over which I have no possible control, and such as you will fully appreciate and readily recognize, will preclude the possibility of my personal attendance at the Fourteenth Session of our Grand Lodge, and much as I deplore the fact that duty compels me to remain at my post in the Federal Parliament owing to its unexpected and generally unappreciated prolongation by the majority of those who participate in its legislation. I rejoice in the knowledge that you have among you so many who are equally as capable, if not more competent, than myself to occupy the Oriental Chair of King Solomon and preside over your deliberations at the approaching Session. I desire, however, that you should thoroughly understand that although "absent in the flesh" I shall "be with you in spirit," on Saturday the 20th inst., and following days, and that a silent prayer will go forth from the absent one to the Great Architect of the Universe that Peace and Harmony may prevail, and that your legislation will lead to such results as may be best calculated to strengthen the Brotherly ties between us, and promote the usefulness of Freemasonry in a Province so richly endowed by Nature.

To be "forewarned is to be forearmed," and having in mind this motto, some weeks ago, I could plainly see that an attendance far in excess of the average time would be entailed upon me at the Federal Capital in the performance of those duties for which I am here (and for which responsibility and evidence of their confidence many of my Brethren in Victoria are, in a measure, the innocent though well-intentioned sponsors); that I took occasion to so inform the Deputy Grand Master and Grand Secretary that they, "having had due and

timel" notice" might govern themselves accordingly and make up for the deficit in these few humble remarks of mine (which must be regarded more in the light of a letter claiming the indulgence of the Brethren for absence under the already explained exceptional circumstances, than an attempt at an address founded upon facts and figures usually emanating from the Office of Grand Master, when present in the jurisdiction) by being even more precisely accurate and exhaustive in laying before the Brethren such dates and details of matters more intimately bearing upon, and associated with Masons and Masonry as come within their respective cognisance and which, from absence of data, I am unable to touch upon, as affecting British Columbia more particularly; to these zealous officers, therefore, I must refer you for such detailed information as is customary to be given, and which I doubt not will be found in the reports of Brothers Trounce and Neufelder.

I desire to thank the members composing the Board of General Purposes for their unremitting exertions to place before you a workable Constitution—if the majority of the Brethren had the faintest conception of the number of meetings that have been convened during the past year-the number of stormy nights the members of that Board, both old and young, have had to wend their way to the silent chambers of our Masonic Temple, and spend hour after hour considering its various clauses in the interests of the Fraternity generally, they would at least "accept the will for the deed" and grant them further respite to reach that much to be desired end. I am still in hopes, however, that their efforts will have reached the long looked for completion of their labors and that intelligent legislation this Session will be the means of presenting to the Brethren of our jurisdiction a Revised Constitution embracing every necessary provision for its good government, and containing clauses so free from ambiguity that "he who runs may read."

There be many who say, why all this bother? What is the necessity for it? And why not adopt the "Book of Constitutions" of England, Scotland, Ireland or select one of the best from the Grand Lodges of the United States? Simply because we desire and must necessarily have a work of our own which contains not only the "Ancient Charges and Regulations" of our Order but a detailed exposition of the duties of Officers, the rights of members, the details of ceremonies to be used on various cecasions, (such as consecrations, installations, and funerals), and, in short, a "Code of By-Laws" for Grand Lodge applicable more particularly to the pressing emergencies of our own jurisdiction, and upon which "general rules," and

regulations are either silent or not sufficiently explicit-more essentially is this necessary in defining the powers of Subordinate Lodges. and Board of General Purposes (which after all is a "Committee of Grand Lodge"), and regulations for Charity Funds, and other matters of local importance. We are strictly enjoined to preserve the "Ancient Landmarks" and to discountenance imposters and all dissenters from the Original Plan of F-eemasonry-it behooves us therefore to be exceedingly careful how we tread upon dangerous ground in our desire to remove what may appear to us to be vicious or ambiguous—herein I have reference to an intended elucidation of Section 15 of the "Summary of Ancient Charges," though I am certainly of opinion that said clause can be amended without trespassing upon the Ancient Landmarks, sufficiently to relieve the Master of a Lodge from violating an obligation entered into in the matter of "Visitors producing proper vouchers" and soforth—and thus remove an oft engendered perplexity to Masters. I should recommend, therefore, that older and wiser heads than mine should look well into the right to change the charges as they read, as perchance a separate clause in the revised regulations explaining rouchers would suffice. I think I have already shewn the necessity for having a good Code of By-Laws applied le to the "nearer home" requirements; though when most intelligent people understand clearly that we as Masons agree to be good men and true and strictly to obey the Moral Law. To be peaceable subjects and cheerfully to conform to the laws of the country in which we reside. Not to be concerned in plots or conspiracies against Governments but patiently submit to the decisions of the Supreme Legislature; to pay proper respect to the Civil Magistrate, to work diligently, live creditably, and act honorably by all men; to avoid private piques, quarrels, and guard against intemperance and excess; to promote the general good of society, to cultivate the social virtues, and propogate the knowledge of the Mystic Art as far as our influences and abilities can extend—they would most naturally exclaim what better Co le of Rules could any one follow? More than this (and 'tis no secret) a Mason is obliged, by his tenure, to believe essentially in the Deity, and to obey the moral law; and if he rightly understands the Art he will never be a stupid Atheist nor an irreligious libertine; he is particularly bound never to act against the dictates of his conscience; we are further taught in the Ancient Charges that whatever may be a man's religion or mode of worship he is not excluded from our Order, provided he believes in the glorious Architect of Heaven and Earth, and practises the sacred duties of morality; and that true Masons meet with the virtuous of every persuasion in the firm and pleasing bond of fraternal love, and are taught to view the errors of mankind with

compassion, and to strive, by the purity of our own conduct, to demonstrate the superior excellence of our faith which we ourselves profess so much to admire, so that Masonry may be in reality what we allege it to be "the centre of union between good men and true, and the happy means of conciliating friendship among those who must otherwise have remained at a perpetual distance. So much then for the moral obligations of Masons-let us now refresh our memories as to our history. The history of the world begins with a legend, and so does the history of Masonry, for what Anderson, in the very commencement of his "Book of Constitutions" relates as history, is in point of fact, nothing more than the traditional "legend of the Guilds," contained in the ancient constitutions, its legendary character being beyond a doubt. Some enthusiastic craftsmen are bold enough to assert that Masonry had its beginning when the world was created—others again are content to date it back to the building of King Solomon's Temple, and others are even content to ascertain how and when Masonic ceremonies were first introduced into our present system, and take the foundation of the Grand Lodge of England as ample for all practical purposes of the present day. It is I think sufficient for most of us, in our generation, to look more to results than to the means of effecting any particular end—and therefore, perhaps, it is all sufficing to know that our Craft is "Ancient and Honorable" irrespective of what precise age it really sprang from. That from its very first existence the Society of Freemasons has attracted the observation of the world, and has been thought worthy of the attention of many of our best and most able men, and has recured to itself the sympathy of well cultivated minds of all ranks and conditions; without protection either from Church or State, scarcely tolerated in many countries, sometimes even cruelly persecuted and oppressed, it has, notwithstanding all these grawbacks, (in the course of say 185 years) increased from an inconsiderable number of true and sincere followers, to an Association extending over the whole civilized world. Although much has been done (and much more attempted) to bring Masonry into dispute, and to cast unworthy suspicions upon its tendency and its efficiency, yet it not only still exists, but has in the course of two centuries enlarged its sphere and developed its resources, and has in no small degree eontributed to raise the tone of social, and assisted very materially in the moral improvement and general culture of the people; being based upon eternal truth and the unchangeable requirements of our nature. It has, notwithstanding its manifold errors faithfully fulfilled its pacific and exalted mission, inclining its members to love and charity, to moral courage and fortitude, to truth and the conscientious discharge of known duties; it has comforted the afflicted,

brought back the erring to the path of virtue, dried the tears of widows and orphans, and is the parent of many an institution for benevolent purposes.

The history of Freemasonry-long veiled in mystery interwoven with legends, purposely distorted by misrepresentations, has through the profound and conscientious researches of some few solitary and unprejudiced Brethren, acquired of late years a sure foundation upon scientific principles. I refer more especially to the origin of the Fraternity, concerning which, even to this day, the most confused ridiculous and discordant opinions prevail; blended by absurd selfconceit, and an eccentric desire to prove the extreme antiquity of the Institutions. Many Masons have combated, most strenuously, the idea that the Fraternity originated in the "Operative Masons;" or, seeing that the ancient symbolical marks and ceremonials in our Lodges bear a very striking resemblance to those of the "Mysteries of the Ancients," have allowed themselves to be deceived and led astray, imagining they can trace back the history of the "craft" into the cloudy mists of antiquity; they have, in fact, allowed their zeal to over-ride their discretion which not unfrequently involves entanglement in unessential particulars and the main object is lost. The actual *idea* of Freemasonry is unquestionably as old as human civilization, having its source in the human heart as language has its in the spirits, and therefore it is that we find the idea of Freemasonry al: eady existing in the remotest ages as a shadowy presentiment. Rev. Bro. Oliver in his "Antiquities of Freemasonry," with all gravity, places the origin of Masonry even prior to the Creation, tracing its germs back to the very honeymoon of Paradise, and also informs us that Moses was Grand Master, and Joshua his Deputy. Another Masonic writer attributes it to the followers of Pythagoras, another to the Essenes and first Christians; many to the building of King Solomon's Temple. Thomas Payne and others ascribe it to the Druids, others again to the time of the Crusades, and so on down to the seventeenth Century. In comparing the social organization customs, doctrines of Freemasonry with those of the "Medieval Building Associations" we find many indications of a close historical connection existing between the two institutions-taking the various surrounding circumstances into consideration, and combining with them the results of historical investigation already arrived at, it appears to me to be now placed beyond successful contradiction that our modern Society is the direct descendent and successor, in an unbroken line, of the Operative Fraternity of Masons of the Middle Ages; the present form of Constitution which we at present enjoy is evidently the outcome of the four London Lodges in the year 1717 at which time they bestowed upon the Fraternity of Freemasons (Operative and Accepted) the legal statutes forming the base of our establishment. We have every reason to know that Masonry was originally a secret Society and was governed by laws known only to its members; we read of old manuscript being in the hands of private members, at an early day, but we have no evidence tending to show that they had reference alone to the fundar ental laws; in 1719, however, they were all (or nearly all) gathered in and sent to Grand Lodge.

An eminent American writer tells us that Freemasonry was strictly a secret Society for more than two thousand years; that its members were forbidden to publish anything either in relation to its origin or teachings, and yet throughout all that period, its history was transmitted from generation to generation, unspotted by time, and undulterated by the sacriligious hand of the innovator. The distinguished Chester says: "From the commencement of the world we may trace the foundation of Masonry; ever since Symmetry began and harmony displayed her charms, our Order has had a being." May it, Brethren, be our pride and pleasure to guard with zealous care this Ancient History, and hand it down to the generations that are to follow us without a blot upon its pages of our individual or collective ereation. Last year I was twitted in a friendly way by some of my Masonic friends in being a little too lengthy in my address-this year I think I have guarded against a repetition of such allusions, partly on account of absence from my field of Masonic labor, and partly from the effects incident to what is known here as "Franchise Fever" which has a tendency to exclude the necessary matter generally embodied in a letter of this tenure.

In again surrendering the Gavel of Supreme Masonic authorty into your hands, I do so with a full consciousness of my inability to do justice to the position, owing to my absence from the Province for nearly half the year. Let us do so in thankful acknowledgment, and humble gratitude to Him for his preserving care, and for the many blessings he has confered upon us in the year now past, and trust Him to guide us by Wisdom, in all our deliberations, in the performance of the work now before us, that all business brought forward for our consideration, in relation to this our beloved Order, may be so decided as to work the most good to our Ancient and Honorable Institution.

In entering upon our business, let us divest our minds of all selfish considerations, and as true Masons enter into the performance of our labors, with a steady purpose to promote the good of our Order, so that the work of this session may be completed in such a manner that it may redound to our "Supreme Grand Master," who is above all; whose judgments are always perfect, and to whose guidance and approval all true Masons look.

I congratulate you, Brethren, that the past year has not been disturbed by dissention in our Order; that peace, harmony and good fellowship have truly been the guide of all our actions; t' at no perplexing questions have been propounded for our consideration, and that Brotherly Love and Charity have guided us in all our proceedings.

You will I am sure unite with me in sympathy for our esteemed Right Worshipful Grand Senior Warden, Brother Robert Beaven, who is not able to be present with us on this occ. sion. A severe attack of illness has for the past ten months prevented our Brother from attending to business; I am glad to say that he is very much improved, and hope that he may soon be restored to perfect health and be again able to attend to those duties in life for which he is so eminently qualified.

#### FRATERNAL DEAD.

During the year just past six of our Brethren have paid the Tribate that all Nature owes. Let us hope they have been admitted into the Grand Lodge above, there to enjoy that Rest and Refreshment which is the reward of regular and well spent lives. I would recommend that memorial pages be inserted in our proceedings, and refer you to the report of Bro. Grand Secretary for the list of their names.

#### FUND OF BENEVOLENCE.

Experience proves the great utility of this Charitable Fund in the assistance of transient Brethren and the relief of ws and orphans of our own jurisdiction, especially in cases where appropriations made by Subordinate Lodges have been insufficient to meet the several requirements without material injury to their finances. I look forward to the future in anticipation that, as our means increase, many eases of distress may be alleviated that at present the fund is inadequate to meet.

#### RECOGNITIONS.

Grand Lodge of South Australia.

Grand Lodge of Peru.

Grand Lodge Symbolica Independienta Mexicana, Vera Cruz.

In regard to the second named Grand Lodge I find by refering to the Masonic History of Peru, that, notwithstanding the very great opposition Masonry has had to contend with in consequence of internecine wars and factious opposition, the Brethren have proved themselves to be actuated by true Masonic Zeal, and in 1883 were reorganized with twelve Subordinate Lodges, as a basis of their Grand Lodge.

I would direct your attention to the report of the Board of General Purposes and Sub-Committee on Foreign Correspondence upon this subject, with whose recommendations I am thoroughly in accord.

#### REVISION OF THE CONSTITUTION.

I am sorry to be compelled to say that the work of revising the Constitution of our Grand Lodge is not completed. The Board of General Purposes have devoted considerable time to the consideration of this work, having held several meetings of emergency for that purpose, and made considerable progress with the revision; there are, however, some very important matters yet to consider, which need further time. This will, I doubt not, be placed in such

a forward condition before the new Board of General Purposes at their first meeting, as will enable them to complete the same with little delay.

As our very Worshipful Grand Secretary "whose privilege it is" will, I doubt not, fully report the standing of our Lodges, giving a full statement of membership, also of the financial and other matters in detail connected therewith, it only remains for me to express my regret at the absence of our Most Worshipful Grand Master from the Province, and to thank you for the kind assistance rendered to me in the performance of those duties which devolve on me in consequence of his absence, and while I am aware that you will find but little worthy of your approval, I do hope you will lightly pass over any errors which you may discover, which I assure you are not of the heart.

Now Brethren, as the time is at hand for me to surrender this Gavel into your hands, in doing so my prayer is, that he whom you honor with your choice as Grand Master for the coming year, may be guided with wisdom to rule in love for the Brethren, and may the Grand Architect of the Universe comfort you with all Peace.

# REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN CORRESPONDENCE.

In reference to the Grand–Lodge of Peru, in the year 1825 there were eight–Lodges and three Chapters–Rose Croix under the Grand-Orient of Columbia.

A Suprem: Council 33° A. A. S. R. was founded in Lima on the 2nd Nov., 1830 and a Consistory of the 32nd Degree was opened in the same year.

Civil wars and religious intolerance have done much to returd progress. In 1883 there were twelve Lodges on the roll of the Grand Lodge of Peru. Our Grand Lodge has been in communication with the Brethren of that jurisdiction since 1875.

Extract from a very excellent article to the Voice of Masonry by Venerable Grand Commander Bro. Albert Pike, in connection with Masonic affairs in Pern and Mexico: "We have therefore in like cases heretofore advised Supreme Councils in alliance with us to frenkly offer the option to all Symbolic Lodges of their obedience of continuing so or of withdrawing from that obedience and creating an independent Symbolic Grand Lodge for the State, Kingdom, Empire or Republic between which and the Supreme Council relations of amity should exist."

We therefore recommend that this Grand Lodge recognize the Grand Lodge of Peru and extend them a fraternal welcome by rendering them every courtesy and assistance in our power.

Your Committee would suggest that the Grand Lodge Symbolica Independiente Mexicana, Vera Cruz, be not recognized by this Grand Lodge at the present session, as our Committee are not satisfied with the legality of their proceedings.

On the morning of the 6th of August, being duly authorized by

the M. W. Grand Master, I convened a Lodge of the officers and members of Union Lodge, No. 9, A. F. and A. M., for the purpose of laying the corner stone of an Episcopal Church in Surrey.

After making arrangements for the proper performance of the work, the Lodge was called off, and a pleasant drive of ten miles brought the Brethren to the place of destination.

The Secretary then stepping forward deposited the following articles in the receptacle under the stone: a copy of the Constitution of the Grand Lodge of British Columbia, a Masonic scroll recording various data appertaining to the laying of the corner stone, the church records, the Churchman's Gazette for August, copies of the morning papers, coins of the realm, and various mementoes contributed by persons present.

The stone, a block of granite, was then placed in position and adjusted in the usual manner, and being tried by plumb, level and square, was adjudged "Well made, truly laid, well proved, true and trusty." Corn, wine and oil being successively supplied by the proper officers, were poured upon the stone, and suitable invocations made during the several stages of the ceremony, the whole being concluded with prayer by the Chaplain. A collection plate was then placed upon the stone, and contributions made by those present.

The Brethren returned in their original order to the room, and the Lodge was called off.

His Lordship the Bishop, Bro. Sillitoe, then photographed the whole assembly.

We then repaired to the Town Hail of Surrey where a bountiful repast awaited us.

Here Bro. J. S. Wade presided in such a manner as to make it truly enjoyable to all present.

### MASONIC SERMON.

PREACHED IN ST. JOHN'S CHURCH, VICTORIA, B. C., AT ST. JOHN'S FESTIVAL, BEFORE THE MASONIC BRETHREN, JUNE, 1885.

Preacher-Rev. Canon Dwyer, P. M., Grand Chaplain.

"Charity never fulleth."-1 Corinthians, Ch. 13, vs. 8.

Somethings there are, only temporary in their nature and intro-

ductory in their use. Such were faith and hope in their bearing upon charity. These were the seaffoldings, to be taken down, when the temple shall be erected and stand forth in beauty and endurance, a joy for ever. And accordingly on an occasion such as this, I would not detain you with speculations that might be doubtful, or in groping after the origin of Masonic traditions and its legendary lore, however useful and approved these may be in the practice of our ritual and in the symbolic teachings of the system. Whether these originated with the old world giant minds of the Aryan race, or were due to the Hebrew fathers, or else (being laid upon the broader, deeper and earlier foundations of natural needs addressed to manly natures) did only take their special forms and shapes, as they became developed in Patriarchal Jewish, Pagan, or Christian lands during the progress of successive ages. All these and such-like questions, I leave to the learned to decide and for the studious to investigate.

What Masonry is and does and with what allied, will more than suffice for our immediate thought, befitting alike the requirements of a Christian assembly and a high festal celebration of the Masonic order.

Let me lay it down then, once for all, that Masonry is but a human institution, and makes no pretensions as a system of religion and least of all proffers herself as a substitute for Revelation. All she does is simply this: She humbly walks by the side of Revelation in strict alliance, so far as she goes. Thus, then, we must clearly perceive that revealed religion and the Masonic Institution are in many respects identified, although in some they differ. The points of identity are mainly these: Both radiate from one common centre, even God, the Supreme Architect of the universe and the sole fountain of life and light. An open Bible is recognized to be quite as indispense he in the one as in the other system. This is made the actual deputy and the silent witness for God on the most solemn occasion. And on all occasions, great and small alike, the Bible open upon her altars, is the Mason's first great light. But, further, not only in the way of significant ceremony, but of individual guidance, is God's written word exalted. For, the earliest recommendation to each newly made Mason urges upon him "the most serious contemplation of the sacred law and that he must consider it the unerring standard of truth and justice by which he regulates his actions according to the divine precepts it contains." The two systems also cover the same ground and occupy an identical area of eternal practice, namely, duty to God in piety, duty to men in charity, duty to self in purity. If you pass in review the internal principles and cardinal virtues common to both, you will find the former to be Brotherly Love, Charity, Truth and the latter, Temperance, Fortitude, Prudence and Justice. And all these are to be cultivated and kept in vital activity, through meditation and prayer and the study of God's revealed will. Of course there are points of difference of various kinds.

The boundary lines, which mark the development of revealed religion in its modern aspects of expansion, present the rugged and too often rash features of sectarian animosity, party spirit and political violence, as well as the acute angles of nationalism and social caste. These novel features, these unloveable lines, are obliterated from the circumference of Masonry, which is drawn deep, broad and even and thus affords an ample and firm platform, on which men may stand and learn to know and love one another better and to work for good in many ways, even though they may widely differ in opinion upon politics, religion and many matters.

In all this you will not mistake me I do feel sure. I mean not to assert that all that is revealed by God for man to follow is contained in and inculcated by Masonry. But what I do maintain and will stand to is this: That a good man (as good as ever passed from earth to heaven) may be a Mason and become not the less good and godly for being one, nor restricted in his field of usefulness, and capacity for service of God, but rather very much the other way.

And now, having dealt with Masonry in its abstract or ideal, we will glance briefly at it in its concrete formand actual working. And thus a fair decision may be arrived at, as to how far she may have gone off the right track, also (if not gone) but still on the right road, how much more of this is to be traversed that she may fulfil her glorious mission to the full.

One of the evils into which Masonry has fallen in times past and in other lands is excess in convivial potations. Now, in your admirable arrangements there is nothing of the kind possible. On the contrary, a model Blue Ribbon society might almost take a leaf out of your book. I feel it a solemn duty thus to bear my public testimony to the abstinent character of your refreshments. And I do this all 'he more because a lingering suspicion may rest with some, that things are differently conducted and not for the good of Masonry. Another thing is that your order has not plunged into politics and become the instrument of revolutionary movements, as in the unification of Italy and as under the action taken in other lands. We thank God that there is no temptation to this in our favored country. We have as much liberty as we are well able to use, and whoever may rise up against Queen Victoria it will not be the Masonic Brotherhood, among whom every male child of her Most Gracious Majesty who has come

A third and very serious evil once and again assailing our Order is Atheism. This was so in Germany about a hundred years ago, and it is the case in the France of to-day. Now, let me remind you of the terms in which an ancient charge runs, in dealing with this point: "A Mason is bound to obey the moral law, and if he righty understand the Craft, he will never be a stupid Atheist, an irreligious libertine or not against his conscience." But let me now read the solemn resolution of the Grand Lodge of Ireland on the subject. On Nov 1st, 1877, the following resolution was unanimously passed:

"Whereas, the Grand Lodge of Ireland has received official notification that the Grand Orient of France has altered the first article of its constitution from its previous form and omitted therefrom as one of the fundamental principles, a belief in the existence of God and the immortality of the soul, the Grand Lodge of Ireland hereby resolves, That the Grand Orient of France, having by such altera ion rendered admissible individuals who do not believe in the existence of a Personal Deity, has thereby caused a breach in the foundations of Ancient Masonry, and acted in violation of the first great principle of the Order, and therefore the Grand Lodge of Ireland hereby declares, that it cannot continue to recognize the Grand Orient of France as a Masonic body, and directs all Lodges working under the Irish constitution, to decline receiving as Masons any person hailing from the Grand Orient of France or any subordinate Lodge under its jurisdiction." In like manner the Grand Lodge of England and the American Grand Lodges passed resolutions strongly reprobating this violation of the fundamental principles of the Craft, and forbidding communion with Masons hailing from the Grand Orient of France. And this daring subversion of first principles is no less repulsive and odious in the judgment of the Masonic Brotherhood of British Columbia.

Thus, then, having demonstrated your perfect exemption from those great evils and abuses, which have disfigured or weakened the Order or brought it into deserved ill-repute elsewhere, one thing more remains for us to determine, and it is this: That as you are on the right road; we must ascertain how much farther you may have to proceed and what advances are yet to be made in order that the Masonic Order may be conspicuous in British Columbia as elsewhere, not only for the absence of what is evil but for the presence of what is excellent, lovely and of good report. so well one may, that your internal arrangements and the actual workings of your Order are in a highly creditable condition, what is there that is to be found elsewhere, that is not found here of things external, visible to the publiceye and affording unanswerable demonstration of the noble characteristics and splendid charities of the "Masonry (to quote the words of an address recently delivered) has wiped the tear from the scalding eyes of the distressed, has relieved the wants of the suffering, has cheered the sad chamber of sickness, and kindly smoothed the pathway to the tomb, and when the immortal spirit has quitted it tenement of clay, reverently deposits the body in its mother earth and finds a burial for the poor as well as the rich, then hastens to pour consolation into the bosom of his sorrowing relations. The green turf which covers the mortal remains of the departed brother does not hide him and his, Masonry's arms embrace his bereaved relict and kindly encircle his orphans; its hand directs their education and guides their infant footsteps in paths of usefulness and honor." May I add that in response to this appeal the Masonic Brethren of Ireland built two noble Orphan Homes and when some \$25,000 more were yet needed to complete the work, contributed in three days at a grand sale in the city of Dublin to meet this requirement, the sum of nearly \$40,000.

If there is, or is to be occasion for such an institution or one for widows either, I do feel assured that you will be just as ready to contribute to this as you are now ready to aid any brother overtaken by distress or to take up any other work of kindred nature. And this you do and will do, even though our country is a new one, our members are limited, and that benefit societies attract many away who might otherwise desire membership in your Order, which is a far nobler institution, because a beneficent society. Anyhow, even if so congenial a movement may not appear urgent and advisable at the present time, you will not on this account forsake or forget even a single orphan or widow of a deceased brother, but place each one in some affiliated institution, if not (even as not seldom already done) take them to your own homes, and thus prove to outsiders what are the mighty compulsions strong as death, aye, and even stronger which the "Mystic tie" is able to exert upon your "hearts, your pockets and your hands."

And, now, I have done this task, and only ask of you each one (whether Masonic Brethren or not) to cultivate above all things that "Charity which never faileth." Here in life and time, this will not "fail" among those at least of an Order which for duration goes back to the days, when sorrow first appeared to challenge sympathy—which in respect of its extension envelops the world as its Diocese,

which in respect of membership, includes allke the King who ascends the throne and the sweep who climbs a chimney—which in respect of its objects has left behind as a golden clue unn istakeable traces of the glory and beauty of piety, benevolence and virtuous self-control, which above all, erects her altars fast by the oracles of God. These are our jewels, and the decorations and insignia that we prize above all else are the orphans we rear and the widows we cheer.

And what shall I say of or how laud, worthily of its lofty future, this "Charity that never faileth" outwards and onwards past the confines of death and our victory over the grave, when the redeemed of God, landed in the world to come, and the life everlasting shall claim the New Jerusalem, the Paradise of God and the tree of Life as all their own domain. And it shall stand too, in the judgment day before the Great White Throne, an assuring evidence and acceptable proof of a vital relationship established with its Father and God, through the atoning blood of God's own Lamb, and sealed by the Holy Spirit of promise. And it shall also sing amidst the high felicities and the happy choirs of the glorified, where there shall be no need of candle or light of the sun or moon or other intervening medium of communication or reflection. Yes, indeed, "Charity never faileth," and accordingly, the soul that is stamped with these divine lineaments as practical characteristics inwrought in life and time, just as it is capacitated to out last the universe, so shall it become a sharer in the Immortality of God. Yours be, then, meanwhile, an anticipated beatitude, a sanctity which even now breathes of Paradise, a grace already tinged with the richer hues of glory—a charity stamped with the very likeness of Deity in the noblest of all his perfection-befitting you at once for the companionship of Angels, yea even of the Lord of Angels.

And now to God the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost, three persons and one God, be all honor and glory and might and majesty and dominion, now and forever more. Amen.

#### REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE MASONIC TEMPLE.

Your Trustees have received a communication from Vancouver-Quadra Lodge, No. 2, dated 30th December, 1884, calling their attention to the want of water for the lavatory and water closet; also a similar communication from Victoria-Columbia Lodge, No. 1, dated 24th March, 1885. Your Trustees have noticed that there has been a defect in this portion of the building since the first winter it was occupied, also that the roof has been leaky and a continual expense without properly overcoming the fault.

Your Trustees have undertaken to have the following work done in a proper manner: point the brick work where required, cement chimney tops, and have the tin work repaired, as well as such other repairs as were needed; also all the exterior work, roof deek, gutters, tower windows, doors, cornices, etc., properly stopped and repainted, and the walls of the reception room cleaned and oil painted, together with a variety of work which your Trustees knew required to be done to protect the property and give the Lodges the conveniences that it was originally intended they should enjoy.

Since the dedication of the Temple, in October, 1878, there has been expended on the roof deck about one hundred and seventy-five dollars up to 1884, and it was still defective. During the same period there has been expended on plumbing and damage caused by the bursting of pipes, two hundred and sixty-two dollars and fifty-five cents, with the causes in existence for further damages; therefore your Trustees deemed it advisable to put the plumbing work in proper order. This has been done by easing the pipes, tank, service box, etc., and filling up the space round them with saw-dust, also placing waste taps, with an iron rod from the upper floor going down below the foundation, so that the water can be turned off or on at the main supply without going outside the building. A new soil pipe has been placed outside the building and the soil trap ventilated and placed so that the frost will not affect it. The walls of the cesspool have been rebuilt and cemented and properly protected by earth from the frost; the eesspool has also been well ventilated and good drains

made to carry off the surplus water from the building. A stop valve and pull have been placed in connection with the lavatory, so that no water will be retained in the pipes to be affected by frost, and making it almost impossible for any damage by water to be done to goods in the store below.

Your Trustees commenced this work before the apportloning and adjustment of the funds in our care, and withdrew from the Savings Bank five hundred and fifty-eight dollars to pay the accounts which, after adjustment, proved to belong to the Benevolent and Widows' & Orphans' Funds; the above will therefore be charged to the building account, and arrangements made to refund the same. They have also drawn one hundred dollars from the revenue of the Temple.

Your Trustees have full confidence that there will be no necessity for a large expenditure for a long time to come, and would recommend that a portion of the land, which is now unproductive, be leased or sold, believing that large vacant lots of land adjoining our Temple are injurious to the renting of the stores in the building, and keeps those who are interested from reaping the benefits that can and should be realized. There are seventy-one feet on Douglas street and fifty-three feet on Fisguard street; if we keep from twenty-five to thirty feet on each street we shall have all the land we want for our own purposes, and by selling the remainder we can realize several thousand dollars, which will give the Order and shareholders a very good yearly dividend and in a short time enable the Lodges and Benevolent Fund to own every share.

## REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND AND THE BENEVOLEN FUND.

Your Trustees received a communication from the Grand Secretary, dated 30th December, 1884, requesting that the funds of the Grand Lodge and Benevolent funds be apportioned and adjusted, and returned the following answer:—

E. C. NEUFELDER, Esq.,

V. W. Grand Secretary:

Dear Sir and Brother,—Your communication of the 30th Dec., from the Board of General Purposes, requesting the Trustees of the Grand Lodge and Benevolent Fund to properly apportion and adjust the same, is at hand.

All monies paid to the Trustees have been in lump sum sums to the credit of the Grand Lodge and Benevolent Fund; the books of the Grand Secretary and Grand Treasurer we have no doubt will show the amounts that have been received on each separate account, and how they have been disbursed.

The Trustees have no better opportunity of giving an account of the funds than any other member of the Board, except those placed in our care, and they have been invested and entered in the stock book and shares issued for the same with the consent and by resolution of the Board. All the above accounts are audited every year by the Board and printed in the Proceedings. The Trustees would prefer that others should audit and adjust these accounts, believing that it would be more satisfactory to all concerned, and will be pleased to render every assistance in their power.

The Trustees beg to remind the Board that they have not received any monies from the Grand Treasurer since July, 1881, the only monies received by the Trustees during this period has been interest from the accumulated and invested funds in the Temple.

Having been appointed by the Grand Lodge in 1879, the first Trustees of the said fund, it gives us pleasure to report that all just claims for relief have been promptly paid and that the funds are steadily increasing. Although the proportion to the Benevolent Funds is only one dollar and twenty-five cents from each Brother's dues per annum, or a little over ten cents per month, there has been added to the funds during this period over two thousand dollars. These funds are invested in the Masonic Temple and lands adjoining, and are a secure investment. Although these shares have only paid

about five per cent., the property has increased in value and can be made to pay a much better dividend by leasing or selling a part of the vacant land, as suggested in the Temple Report. Your Trustees would suggest that these funds be kept separate from the Grand Lodge funds, and that one Trustee be elected from each Lodge contributing to these funds; that all monies collected by the Grand Secretary from the Lodges, or that may be given or bequeathed to these funds, shall be paid direct to the Trustees, who shall present their accounts to the Board of General Purposes one month before the regular convocation of the Grand Lodge for audit, and at the regular convocation of the Grand Lodge the Trustees shall make a full report of their accounts and such information in connection with their official duties as they may deem important for the wellfare of the Order and the information of the Brethren.

Your Trustees, with the consent of the Board of General Purposes, appointed Brother Sargison to audit, adjust and apportion the funds, and his report will be found on page 34.

In conclusion, your Trustees would recommend that a note be given by the Trustees of the Temple to the Trustees of the Benevolent and Widows' and Orphans' Fund for \$557 90 (the amount of the money the Trustees of the Temple have borrowed from the Benevolent and Widows' and Orphans' Fund) bearing interest at 5 per cent. per annum, to be repaid out of next and future years revenue, unless the adjoining ground is sold.
