The Grand Master read his report for the past year.

*To the Grand Lodge of British Columbia, I. O. O. F. :*

**OFFICERS AND REPRESENTATIVES.**—I have the honor and pleasure to extend to you my fraternal greetings, and to present my report at this our twenty-second annual session, and the thirty-second year of the introduction of our Order into British Columbia.

Although the membership has not increased, still considering the severe depression we have recently passed through, we have done as well as could reasonably be expected. During my term of office two Subordinate Lodges and four Rebekah Lodges have been instituted.

I have endeavored to visit as many lodges in the jurisdiction as possible, and have succeeded in visiting all either separately or jointly, except about six, which I found almost impossible to reach. This visiting has been a source of sincere gratification, and I assure the Brethren, I never knew what an amount of fraternal feeling there was in the jurisdiction until holding this office. I would liked to have visited every Lodge but I could not afford the time, and I hope those whom I have failed to meet will excuse me.

I now beg to submit a report of my official acts during the past year.

## INSTITUTIONS.

Granted a dispensation to institute a Subordinate Lodge at Rossland, to be known as Rossland Lodge, No. 36, which was instituted by Bro. E. C. Arthur, M. D., D. D. G. M., District No. 11, on 11th May, 1896. Bro. Arthur speaks hopefully of the prospects of the Lodge.

Granted dispensation to institute a Subordinate Lodge at Carson, in Okanagan District, the petition was forwarded by Bro. Jacques, D. D. G. M., District No. 13. Bro. Jacques reports that he instituted Carson Lodge, No. 37, on the 16th May, 1896.

A Petition for a Charter for a Subordinate Lodge to be located at Vancouver with the cards of five Petitioners, and Charter Fee was received on the 14th May, 1896. I have received communications from Vancouver Lodge, No. 8, Mount Pleasant Lodge, No. 19, and Pacific Lodge, No. 26, asking that a dispensation be not issued in this case, but that the matter be deferred until the meeting of the Grand Lodge. In deference to these Lodges, and in view of the nearness of the Session, I decided to comply with the request and refer the matter to you for consideration; but I have since received a communication from Bro. A. Parker, D. D. G. M., District No. 6, stating that the petitioners wished to withdraw the petition and to have their cards and amount paid for charter fee returned, under the circumstances of the case I decided this course was the best to be adopted and the request has been complied with.

Instituted Naomi Rebekah Lodge, No. 8, at Kamloops on 8th Oct. 1895, assisted by Bro. Bloomer, P. G., and several others, a petition for the same duly signed having been received. A Charter was ordered to be granted the Lodge by the Grand Lodge last Session but I have not been satisfied with reports I have received respecting this Lodge since its institution and have therefore withheld the charter. It now appears from a communication received by the Grand Secretary from Bro. Bird P. G. who was elected Secretary of the Lodge, that the application for the Charter was not properly considered, that the members do not anticipate that the Lodge will be a success and they therefore wish to withdraw the Petition and return the supplies sent them.

Accompanied by Sisters Mrs. Dempster, Mrs. Walker, Mrs. Carne, Mrs. Grant, Mrs. Dickenson, Mrs. Hutchinson, Mrs. Hooson and several other sisters of "Colfax" Rebekah Lodge, No. 1, of Victoria, also by Bro. J. H. Meldram, P. G. M. instituted "Laurel" Rebekah Lodge, No. 9, on 7th November, 1895, at Wellington. After the institution they initiated over 70 new members with the team work in a most creditable manner.

Visited Ladners to institute "Fidelity" Rebekah Lodge, No. 10, and on arrival I found Sisters Mrs. Turnbull, Mrs. Baker, Mrs. Murchie, Mrs. May, Miss Murchie and two other sisters of New Westminster who

kindly came and assisted me to institute the above Lodge on 12th February, 1896. I also thank Bro. and Sister Stainton for the kindness shown me on this occasion.

Assisted by Sister Gourlay, D. D. G. M., Miss Kilpatrick, and Bro. Morton, Grand Warden, of Nanaimo, instituted "Esther" Rebekah Lodge, No. 11, at Union on 16th April, 1896.

Appointed Bro. A. York, P. G., Mission City Lodge, No. 82, D.D.G.  
 M., District No. 19, in place of Bro. R. S. Cunningham resigned.

Appointed Bro. H. T. Thrift, P. G., Cloverdale Lodge, No. 15, D. D. G. M., District No. 10, in place of Bro. J. McCallum, moved out of the jurisdiction.

PERMISSIONS

Refused permission to Mechanics Lodge, No. 8, Warrington, Florida, to solicit aid in this jurisdiction to build a new hall.

Granted permission to Excelsior Lodge, No. 7, to solicit financial assistance from Lodges of this jurisdiction to enable it to rebuild its hall destroyed by fire on 4th December, 1894.

Granted permission to Geneva Lodge, No. 65, Geneva, Neb., to solicit aid in this jurisdiction to wipe off liabilities on its hall.

Granted permission to New Westminster Lodge, No. 3, to solicit assistance from Lodges of this Jurisdiction and also to appeal to other Jurisdictions to endeavor to retain the property in which it has so much Lodge funds invested

Received a petition from Colombo Lodge, No. 1, Naples, Italy, for permission to solicit aid from the Subordinate Lodges in this Jurisdiction on behalf of the widows and orphans of the Italian Soldiers who recently fell in the war between Italy and Abyssinia. Although this may be a very worthy object for individual charity I do not think it is one to which our Lodges can contribute from their funds, which must be confined to the legitimate objects of the Order. This Lodge is under the immediate Jurisdiction of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, but there was nothing to show that the appeal had received the sanction of that Grand Body. The members of the Lodge are, I have no doubt, liberal and philanthropic gentlemen and conceive that any worthy object should receive the assistance of Odd Fellows Lodges. It was with reluctance therefore that I was compelled to refuse their request

Granted permission to Mount Baker Lodge, No. 9, Port Townsend to reinstate Bro. L. Lossman a resident of this Jurisdiction, such permission being necessary by the Constitution of Subordinate Lodges Grand Lodge of Washington.

APPEALS.

BRO. GEO. SMITH  
*vs.*  
 VERNON VALLEY LODGE, No. 18 }

This case was reported on by my predecessor, Bro. T. C. Gray at the last Session of the Grand Lodge, to the effect that the brother who claimed sick benefits was not entitled to them, and this decision was endorsed by the Grand Lodge. Bro. H. Rose, Deputy G. M., G. L. Manitoba wrote me on 20th July, 1895, forwarding letter from Bro. Smith stating that he had been sick but could not obtain benefits from



his Lodge. On reference to Vernon Valley Lodge, I found that this sickness was subsequent to that on which Bro. Gray gave his decision, and that at the time of being taken sick, Bro. Smith was not in good standing. I therefore declined to take any action in the matter.

BRO. H. PROCTOR  
*vs.*  
 FRIENDSHIP LODGE, No. 30. }

In this case Bro. Proctor a member of Friendship Lodge, but residing in Ontario, claims sick benefits which are refused by the Lodge, on the ground, that prior to the date of Bro. Proctor being taken sick, a withdrawal card had been granted him by the Lodge. Bro. Proctor avers that he did not apply for a withdrawal but for a visiting card.

To this the Lodge answers, that application was made by a brother who represented, that he did so, at Bro. Proctor's request and that the same was granted in good faith. From my investigation of the case, I am led to the conclusion, that Bro. Proctor must be held liable for the actions of his agent, and being satisfied of the *bona fides* of the Lodge, I declined to interfere.

BRO. F. MILLS  
*vs.*  
 MISSION CITY LODGE, No. 32. }

Bro. Mills, for some reason, tendered his written resignation as a member of Mission City Lodge on 4th January, 1896, which was laid over by the Lodge for two weeks. Bro. Mills was not in good standing on the 4th of January, but prior to the 18th, he paid up his arrears. On the 18th January, Bro. Mills wrote to the Lodge withdrawing his resignation. On the 18th January, the Lodge unanimously accepted the resignation, Bro. Mills being present, and subsequently at the same meeting, his communication withdrawing the resignation, was read and ordered to be received and filed. From this action, Bro. Mills appeals on the grounds that at the time the resignation was offered he was not in good standing, and further, that the letter withdrawing the resignation, should have been read and dealt with prior to considering the resignation itself.

Bro. Mills by placing himself in good standing, disposes of his first contention, and with respect to the second, it appears the members present on the 18th January, were fully aware that Bro. Mills wished to withdraw his resignation, yet they unanimously accepted it. The conclusion is obvious. Bro. Mills' action appears to have been hasty and ill considered, and he has only himself to blame for the consequences. I cannot see that the Lodge acted illegally in accepting the resignation, and I therefore refused to interfere.



ASHCROFT LODGE, No 23, }  
*vs.*  
 D. D. G. M. MUNRO. }

This was an appeal to me from the decision of my District Deputy, who ruled that members who were permitted to go into the ante-room during recess, should also be allowed to return during the recess, and not be compelled to remain until the Lodge resumes work, and then work their way into the Lodge. In this case the inner door was opened, and the Secretary, amongst others, went into the ante-room to procure a book he required, whilst there the I. G. locked the door and would not allow any one to re-enter until the Lodge resumed work. I sustained the decision of my deputy for the reason, that when a recess is declared, all work is suspended and all the officers vacate their positions, if therefore the door is allowed to be opened the I. G. should not resume his station and secure the door, until the Lodge is again called to order.

To a further question from the same Lodge. I decided that the matter of directing the inner door to be kept locked during recess, was a subject that should be controlled by the Noble Grand.

#### DECISIONS

(1) A Brother elected to Membership in a Lodge by deposit of card, should be considered a member from the date the withdrawal card is deposited with the Lodge, although the Brother did not sign the constitution on that date.

(2) A District Deputy Grand Master may hold the office of Permanent Secretary of his Lodge

(3) A Brother should not be deprived of benefits through a clerical error made in his account by the Lodge Secretary two years ago, and which had never been brought to his notice.

(4) A Brother who had been expelled from the Order, but whose expulsion had been set aside on appeal by the Grand Lodge and a new trial ordered, should pay all dues and other charges that had been levied on other members of his Lodge during the period he was under suspension, the Lodge having dropped all proceedings against him

(5) A receipt given by a Secretary, in error, showing a Brother's dues paid three months beyond the date to which the amount paid would entitle him, does not absolve the Brother from his indebtedness for the three months in question.

(6) Rebekah Lodges cannot pay stated benefits fixed by their By-laws. This construction of the Code of Laws governing Rebekah Lodges became operative from 20th September, 1894, the date of its adoption by the Sovereign Grand Lodge.

(7) The action of the Grand Lodge, Session 1895, *re* Odd Fellows' Insurance Associations, does not affect members at present insured in these Associations, but simply prohibits such Associations from doing fresh business in this Jurisdiction.

(8) The only dispensations which D. D. G. M.'s are authorized to issue are: (1st.), to confer the three Degrees of the Order at one meeting, or in less time than otherwise permitted by law, and, (2nd.), to empower Lodges to elect a Scarlet Degree member to the office of N. G. or V. G. when all other qualified members decline to serve.

(9) That sick benefits are rights personal to a member, his family, or dependent relatives, and are not payable to the legal representatives of a member's estate. The sick benefits due to a member who is an inmate of the Provincial Asylum for the Insane, should not be paid to the Local Government, but to the member's wife, for the maintenance of herself and family.

(10) Members cannot be kept out of the Lodge-room during the reading of the minutes, or of a communication, nor whilst a brother is speaking.

(11) A lady legally divorced from her husband, possessing all the other qualifications prescribed by law, is eligible for membership in a Rebekah Lodge.

(12) The constitution of Rebekah Lodges, (Sec. 4, Art. 4) provides that all officers may hold their offices for six months or one year, the by-laws of each Lodge should provide which of these periods apply to that particular Lodge. If the by-laws provide for six months, and the Lodge wishes to retain the officers services for a longer period, they must be re-elected and installed at the end of six months

(13) Charges should be preferred against a member who misrepresented his age at the time of initiation into the order. If, however, the fact of his being under 21 years of age was known to the members of the Lodge at the time of his admission, such a knowledge would preclude the Lodge from subsequently proceeding against the brother and punishing him.

(14) The record of the attendance of officers at Roll Call, should not be altered on account of the presence of officers who come after the Roll has been called. One of the principal objects of calling the Roll is to secure the punctual attendance of officers at the opening of the Lodge, and this would be defeated if the Roll is afterwards altered

(15) The fee to be paid by members on reinstatement in a Rebekah Lodge should be provided for in the By-laws of the Lodge, but if the By-laws are silent on this point, the amount should not be less than twelve months dues

(16) *Question.* "Can elective officers be chosen as Trustees, if other members of the Lodge refuse to act" ?

*Answer.* The holding of two offices except Recording and Permanent Secretary by any member of the Lodge is objectionable in principle. As a rule, Trustees give bonds to the N. G., V. G. and J. P. G., it follows therefore, that neither of these officers can hold the office of Trustee. Further, the Treasurer gives Bond to the Trustees, therefore the Treasurer cannot hold that office, and it appears to me, that as the duties of Secretary and those of Trustee are liable to conflict, it is not desirable that this officer should hold both offices. I am therefore compelled to answer the question in the negative.

(17) A Lodge cannot legally change its location, except by permission of the Grand Master, or change its name without permission from the Grand Lodge.

(18) Where charges are preferred against a member who has been convicted of a crime, and who is suffering the penalty in prison, in pursuance of resolution No. 155, Page 14580, Proceedings Sovereign Grand Lodge, 1895, the trial must be conducted in conformity with the Code of Procedure laid down in the Constitution for Subordinate Lodges.

## PROCLAMATIONS.

Issued the usual Proclamations for the observance of the Anniversary of our Order on the 26th April last, also for Memorial Day on the 9th of June.

Issued a circular letter on the 16th November last, (copy attached) notifying the Subordinate Lodges, of the amendment made at the last Session of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, adding another qualification for membership, whereby saloon-keepers, bartenders and professional gamblers are not eligible for admission into our Order.

The Sovereign Grand Lodge having sustained the action of this Grand Lodge, at its last Session, in declining to grant certificates to any Odd Fellows' Insurance Association to do business in the Jurisdiction, and further, in affirming that the Odd Fellows' Insurance Association of B. C. need not take out such certificate, I issued a Proclamation, at the request of the last named Association, copy of which is appended hereto, calling the attention of the Subordinate Lodges to this legislation, and warning any who may disregard it, of the penalties provided by law for such conduct. I may state, that my attention has been called to the fact, that parties have been violating this law and I have written calling on them to desist from such illegal acts.

I attach hereto, copy of a Proclamation received from the Grand Sire, respecting the printing of any forms or ceremonies that constitute a source of revenue of the Sovereign Grand Lodge.

## REPORTS OF DISTRICT DEPUTIES.

The reports of my District Deputies, as far as received, are submitted herewith. They all speak cheeringly of the prospects of the Order in their respective districts.

I agree with the actions reported by my Deputies, with the exception of that of the Deputy for District No. 2, Rebekah Lodges, in granting a Dispensation to ballot for and initiate a candidate on the same evening, such power being conferred on the Grand Master alone.

I have noticed, not only this year, but also in preceding ones, cases where Deputies report, that, when they have been unable to perform the duties of their office, they have deputized other brothers to act for them. This appears to me an error, they cannot transfer powers which are delegated to them. If they are unable to be present and install the officers of a Lodge, and the Lodge will not postpone it until they are able to attend, the duty may be performed in their absence by any Past Grand.

## RECOMMENDATIONS.

Enquiries have been made during the year, as to the procedure to be followed in consolidating two or more Lodges. I have replied that in the event of such a contingency arising, I would direct what course should be pursued with reference to the name to be borne by the consolidated Lodge, the custody of the records of the absorbed Lodges, and the Charters, etc., if these matters were not mutually agreed on by the interested parties. The law is silent on this subject, but I think this Grand Lodge should legislate on this point.

The Constitution of the Grand Lodge is defective in many respects, and the Constitution for Rebekah Lodges needs revising to conform to the recent legislation by the Sovereign Grand Lodge. I would therefore recommend that a special committee of three be appointed to suggest what legislation is needed in these particulars and report at our next session.

I have been requested by several ladies, members of Rebekah Lodges, to point out to this Grand Lodge that the organization of a Rebekah Assembly would be beneficial to that branch in this Jurisdiction. The proper course to approach the Grand Lodge on this subject is by a petition from the Rebekah Lodges, but I am not aware that any steps in that direction are being taken. However, perhaps it would be as well, if my above suggestion is entertained, to empower the committee to submit a draft of a Constitution to govern a Rebekah Assembly in case one should be applied for.

I would further recommend that our representatives to the Sovereign Grand Lodge be instructed to continue to support the proposed amendment to the Constitution, lowering the age at which persons may be admitted into the Order to 18 years.

BRETHREN:—I must again thank you—one and all—for the great honor you have conferred upon me in placing me in this position, and also to the members at large, for the many kindnesses which it has been my good fortune to receive at their hands wherever I have visited. I also wish to thank our Grand Secretary, Bro. Fred Davey, for the valuable assistance with which he has favored me during the past year; I am sure at times I hardly know what I would have done without his counsel; we have truly a good officer in our Grand Secretary. I also wish to thank my District Deputies for the able manner in which they have performed their duties.

In conclusion, I hope we may have a profitable and harmonious session, so that when our labors have been completed, we shall have the satisfaction of knowing we have done our duty to the noble Order we represent. Again I thank all the Brothers and Lodges in the Juris-

diction for the many courtesies and valuable assistance I have received during my term of office.

Holmes, Grand Master, do hereby notify you that “The Odd Fellows' Insurance Association of British Columbia,” is the only Odd Fellows' Insurance Association entitled to do business as such in this province, and that any member of the I.O.O.F. who shall, in any capacity, directly or indirectly, solicit or attempt to solicit from any other member of this Order, in this Jurisdiction, any life or accident insurance for any association or company using the name of the Order or claiming to be an Odd Fellows' Insurance Company, excepting



"The Odd Fellows' Insurance Association of British Columbia," before mentioned, shall be liable, on trial and conviction, to be suspended or expelled from the Order (vide Proceedings Sov. Grand Lodge, 1892, p.p. 13077-13191.)

PROCLAMATION.

*To whom it may concern :*

WHEREAS many reports have been received at this office, stating that Subordinate Bodies and individual members of the Order are printing and offering for sale, various of the supplies published in the "List of Supplies" furnished by the S.G.L. and appearing on the last leaf of the Revised Journal, and

WHEREAS, All such printing and offering for sale of any of such supplies is in violation of the law of the S. G. L. as found on page 6278 of the R. J. of 1874; which reads as follows:

"All Grand and Subordinate Bodies and individual members thereof of this Order are hereby directed to refrain from printing, publishing and issuing *any* article *entered* upon the list of *supplies* that form a part of the source of revenue of this Grand Lodge."

Also the sharp reiteration of the law to be found on pp. 6657 and 6704 of the Journal of 1875, which reads as follows:

"Grand and Subordinate Bodies and individuals, who shall print and circulate *any forms* or ceremonies of this Grand Lodge that constitute a source of revenue to its treasury, will be deemed guilty of an offence against the laws of this Grand Lodge"; they standing as the General Law of the S. G. L.

Therefore, it is hereby ordered and directed that all such illegal printing and sale of each and every of the supplies published in said "List of Supplies" at once cease; and all Grand Lodges, Grand Encampments, Grand Assemblies of the Rebekah Branch, and Departments of the Patriarchs Militant, and their respective Grand Officers are directed to notify their Subordinates, and to see that all such illegal printing and sale ceases immediately, under penalty of the law as above declared.

The Grand Secretary read his report which was on motion received and referred to the Committee on Distribution.

*To the Grand Lodge of B. C., I. O. O. F.*

In submitting my report of the transactions of this Office and of the work of the Order in this Jurisdiction during the past year, I am sorry to state that for the first time during twelve years there has been a slight decrease in the number of members. There is no doubt that this falling off is owing to the financial depression which has affected this Province in common with other portions of this Continent for some time past. I sincerely hope that the worst has been past, that business and trade will revive and that the Order during next year will more than recover what it has lost.

During the past year two Subordinate Lodges and four Rebekah Lodges have been instituted, but it is to be regretted that the applicants for a Charter for a Rebekah Lodge at Kamloops did not properly consider the matter or were very lukewarm on the subject, for, without, it would appear, making scarcely an effort to work the Lodge, they have returned the Dispensation granted them and the goods supplied, so that the Lodge may now be regarded as defunct.

The instructions of last Session have been complied with as follows:—

Bonds for the fidelity of the Grand Secretary and Grand Treasurer in the sum of \$2000 each were obtained from the London Guarantee and Accident Co.

The Grand Lodge has been incorporated under the Provincial Benevolent Societies Act, 1861. The requisite Declaration to obtain incorporation signed by the Elective Officers of the Grand Lodge is attached hereto. It would appear from the provisions of this Act, that Subordinate Lodges must now obtain permission from the Grand Lodge at its Annual Session in order to secure incorporation.

An "Odd Fellows Home" account has been opened in the books of the Grand Lodge and the sum collected in Victoria at the Anniversary Celebration 1894 amounting to \$96 has been credited to the same. This money is deposited in the Dominion Government Savings Bank and has been augmented by \$1.96 interest to 30th June, 1895. I would suggest that a small assessment, say 5 cents per member, be included in the Per Capita Tax for the coming year and repeated in succeeding years, to assist this fund. Such a trifle would not distress our Lodges and would in time accumulate a fund which would be of use for the purpose in view. There is no doubt that before long an Odd Fellows Home will become a necessity, and even at the present time one could be utilized if it were in existence.

A statement of the Grand Lodge's case in the appeal of Bro. T. C. Gray, P. G. M. to the Sovereign Grand Lodge was prepared and submitted. The appeal was dismissed and the action of the Grand Lodge

in refusing to grant permission to outside Insurance Associations to do business in this Jurisdiction, and in deciding that the Odd Fellow's Insurance Association of B. C. need not take out Certificates in order to do business, was sustained.

All documents procurable in the Petition of David Green vs. Dominion Lodge, No. 4, were forwarded to the Sovereign Grand Lodge and the refusal of this Grand Lodge last Session to re-open this case, was also affirmed.

No report has been received from the Special Committee appointed last Session respecting the desirability of establishing an Odd Fellows Hospital and Convalescent Home, nor has there been a meeting of the Committee as far as I am aware.

I beg to submit a tabulated statement of the work of the Subordinate Lodges in this Jurisdiction last year, compiled from their Reports, also a Financial Statement of the Grand Lodge for that period.

Applications are being constantly received for copies of the Grand Lodge Constitution, but I am unable to comply owing to the fact that there are no spare copies in stock. As the Constitution is in need of revision in many respects I would suggest that a Committee be appointed to perform this work and report next Session.

It has been customary of late years to get 500 copies of the Proceedings of the Grand Lodge printed and they have been distributed as follows: 4 copies to each Subordinate and one to each Rebekah Lodge, 1 copy each to the N. G. and V. G. of each Subordinate Lodge and one copy to each Past Grand in the Jurisdiction besides a number given to the Grand Representatives to exchange with the Representatives of other Jurisdictions. Owing to the increase in the number of Lodges and Past Grands 500 copies are not now sufficient and instructions are asked as to the number to be printed and the method of distribution. It is feared that a number of copies sent to Lodges for Past Grands never reach those brothers on account of their not attending the Lodge.

Notification has been received from the Grand Master of North Dakota that Northern Light Lodge, Fargo, has been suspended from the Order for non-compliance with the commands of the Sovereign Grand Lodge to refund monies collected from other Jurisdictions for the relief of sufferers from the fire in that city and misappropriated.

I am pleased to state that no appeals have been received during the year, a fact which speaks well for the harmony and peace of the brotherhood in the Jurisdiction.

Only one member of this Grand Lodge as far as I am aware has been removed by death during the year, viz: Bro. H. Elliott, P. G. of New Westminster Lodge, No. 3. I would recommend that a memorial page containing his name be inserted in the printed Proceedings of this Session.

I cannot refrain from referring here to the dreadful disaster that so recently occurred in the City of Victoria on the occasion of the celebration of her Majesty's Birthday, when by the falling of a portion of Point Ellice Bridge a tram car crowded with merry pleasure seekers was suddenly precipitated into Victoria Arm and 55 human beings perished. As might be expected in such a calamity, some Odd Fellows were included in the number. I deeply regret to state that the following brothers lost their lives in that awful catastrophe: Bro. F. T. James, V. G. and N. G. elect of Victoria Lodge, No. 1; Bro. S. R. Holmes of Dominion Lodge, No. 4, and Bro. Fred Adams, (with his Mother) Acme Lodge, No. 14. Bro. E. Hooson P. G. of Victoria Lodge, No. 1, mourns the loss of his wife and child, Bro. E. C. Sheppard, Columbia Lodge, No. 2, is bereaved of his wife and two children, Bro. G. W. Biggar of Acme



Lodge, No. 14, lost two children and is himself severely injured, and Bro. J. Jackson of the same Lodge sustained the loss of a daughter and is himself still suffering from the accident

Several Odd Fellows had miraculous escapes, amongst them our esteemed Grand Representative, Bro J. E. Phillips, P.G.M., who is still suffering from the accident. I am sure you will all join in congratulating him on his escape, and that you will accord your fullest and deepest sympathy with the bereaved and sorrowing relatives of the deceased.

b) For establishing and maintaining homes and asylums for members of the Society and its branches, and for the orphans of deceased members:

c) For raising sufficient money from its branches to meet the necessary expenses of the Society.

3. The present managing officers of the Society, who are to be the first officers thereof, are William Edward Holmes, Grand Master; Peter J. Foulds, Deputy Grand Master; William Henry Morton, Grand Warden; Frederick Davey, Grand Secretary, and H. B. Gilmour, Grand Treasurer, and their successors shall be elected by ballot on the first day of the session of the said Grand Lodge held annually on the second Wednesday in June in each and every year.

Report read from the Grand Representatives which was on motion received and ordered to be printed in the proceedings of the session; further, that the portion relating to the proposed Legislation respecting Sick Benefits be referred to the Committee on Legislation.

*To the Grand Lodge, I. O. O. F. of British Columbia. :*

Your Representatives to the Sovereign Grand Lodge beg to submit the following report, which they trust will meet with your approval.

The Sovereign Grand Lodge assembled in its 71st Annual Communication on September 16th, 1895, at Atlantic City, N. J.

From the Grand Sire's report we select the following extracts and decisions bearing on the Subordinate and Rebekah branches of the Order, leaving out the Canton Millitant decisions, as they do not interest this Grand Lodge.

#### GRAND SIRE'S REPORT.

OFFICERS AND REPRESENTATIVES,—Another twelve months has closed its record and I find us again convened in Annual Communication. The Reaper has gathered his usual harvest from our ranks, and in doing so, has stricken down some of our brightest ornaments. Of them, in proper place, due mention will be made. To us who survive their call is a voice of warning. Let us strive to write our names on the Tablet of the Good, the Merciful and True.

We have reason for thankfulness that so great prosperity has crowned our labors in the midst of financial depression and great stagnation of business. The Order has steadily advanced with somewhat retarded steps in numbers, but not in wealth and influence.

We have reached that period in our history when no adverse criticism, no unfriendly assaults, or bigoted anathemas can have any effect, and when we can afford to pass by in silence naught disturbed or harmed by their utterances looking forward with hope to the day-dawn of their higher enlightenment.

#### CONDITION OF THE ORDER.

Every branch of the Order is flourishing, exhibiting an increase in the number of its subordinates as follows :

Subordinates increase.....	297
Subordinate Encampment.....	53
Rebekah Lodge increase.....	335

#### GRAND SIRE'S DECISIONS AS APPROVED. SUBORDINATE LODGES, ETC.

60. Decision.—The floor work is not obligatory, but recommended. Wherein it may differ from the ritual, it must be disregarded.

62. Decision.—Sec. 1120 of the Digest is not repealed by Sec. 131 of the P. M. Code, and at installation of Lodge Officers the P. M. uniforms cannot be worn.

63. Grand Lodges cannot delegate to Rebekah Assemblies power to charter Rebekah Lodges.

64. Attentive and pecuniary benefits must be distinguished. One depends upon "good standing," the other does not.

65. A By-Law of a Lodge depriving a member of benefits after reaching the age of 65, is illegal and void.

66. A member guilty of conduct unbecoming an Odd Fellow in a Rebekah Lodge may be tried in that Lodge, or in his Subordinate Lodge. If tried in his Lodge, Rebekahs may appear before the committee of trial and give testimony.

67. Question.—After the time for correcting and approving the minutes of a Lodge has gone by, and a mistake or error is discovered, can it be corrected?

Answer.—Yes.

68. By parliamentary law no motion can be reconsidered but once. If the motion is made and indefinitely postponed, and the rules of the Lodge provide that indefinite postponement cannot be reconsidered, that ends the power of the body to reconsider.

69. Question.—Has a committee examining a visiting Brother the right to examine him in the address to the Chairs?

Answer.—Yes, in everything up to the highest degree of the Subordinate Lodge to which he has attained.

70. Decision.—In the absence of local law, three years does not bar the right to prosecute a member for an offence.

71. Decision.—A visiting card need not be returned to the Lodge issuing it, when it is deposited with another Lodge, upon which to make membership. If elected a certificate of election from that Lodge entitles a Brother to a Withdrawal Card, if the member is free from all charges on the books of his Lodge.—Sec. 672.

72. Decision.—A Brother out of the Order by Withdrawal Card for one year, nine months and twenty-six days, working to get up a Lodge, and becoming a charter member, is not entitled to the Honorary Veteran Jewel after fifty years of service covering the above period.

73. Decision.—No Past Grand or member can legally vote in any other than his own Lodge.

74. Decision.—The general law does not permit a Lodge to remit dues. They must be paid.

75. Question.—Can a Grand Lodge pay out of its funds, or assess the Subordinates to raise a fund to support aged members of defunct Lodges?

Answer.—No. (Decision 33, Journal, 1894.)

76. Question.—If acting as Trustee for such members of defunct Lodges and receiving and disbursing for their benefit as they shall direct, can a quasi visiting card, stating their relation to the Order and giving them the right of visitation, be legally issued by the Grand officers, under the authority of the Grand Lodge ?

Answer.—No.

77. Decision.—The offices of Grand Sire and Deputy Grand Sire, being in many respects incompatible with that of Grand Representative, an election to and installation in either vacates the office of Grand Representative.

78. Decision.—There can be no average of benefits paid, making the total paid the first year amount to \$104, without a violation of the "Minimum Benefit Law."

The precise question, in the form of an amendment, was proposed in 1892, and voted down, which, by implication, gives that law a construction and removes the ambiguity in the words, "one full year's benefits."

79. Decision.—A brother holding an unexpired visiting card, and having the A. T. P. W., has a right to visit Lodges in his own Jurisdiction, though he has not the term password.

80. Question.—If at the session of the Grand Lodge, upon the returns from Subordinates then made, the Grand Lodge is entitled to but one representative, and elects him, and before the session of the S. G. L., the membership actually increases, so that if the Grand Lodge were to convene it could elect a second representative, but there being no session until after that of the S. G. L., has the Grand Master power to appoint a representative ?

Answer.—He has not under Section 1, Article 9, of the Constitution of this Grand Body. Representatives must be elected by the Grand Lodge in every case except in filling vacancies. To make a vacancy, the place vacated must have been occupied. The case stated in the question is not therefore a vacancy. It is a new official right, conferred by the law upon the Grand Lodge, and can only be filled as provided in the Constitution. This question was so decided in 1888.

82. Decision.—The act of this Grand Body in "attaching" the Territory of Alaska to the Grand Jurisdiction of Washington, is not in conflict with the decision of 1873, nor with Section 7, Article 1, of the Constitution. That Section gives the immediate jurisdiction over all subordinates in outlying territory to the S. G. L. But, it having supreme control, may attach portions of such outlying territory to adjacent Jurisdictions, in its discretion.

83. Decision.—In canvassing the votes for Grand Officers cast by the Past Grands, if in some Lodges P. G.'s are allowed to vote who are disqualified, and such illegal votes charged to the successful candidate and deducted from his vote, would change the result, the entire vote of such Lodges should be thrown out, and the result declared on the remainder.

84. Decision.—The "Special" Committee, so-called, but in correct parliamentary phrase, "select." (See Cushing, Sections 259 and 263,) appointed on Grand Secretary's office in 1892, (Journal, p. 13,071,) was continued and authorized to purchase an office upon its report, in 1893, by the adoption of the resolution appended to the report (Journal, p. 13,548) That resolution continued the committee for another year. But for that resolution, being a select and not a standing committee, it had been dissolved (Cushing, Sections 262 and 293). The committee in 1894 (Journal, p. 14,014) reported, and after some discussion it was laid on the table, and no further action taken or instructions given. The committee was thereby dissolved and no further action can be taken by it on the premises.

85. Decision.—Grand Officers and Grand Representatives are not authorized to introduce members of their own Grand Jurisdiction—only members of other Jurisdictions. The only authority for such introduction is given by Article XIV. of the By-Laws of the S. G. L. Some of the decisions on that subject are loosely worded and misleading.

86. Decision.—The right of a widow to after-death benefits does not depend upon color or any other embarrassment under which she may labor at the time of her husband's death. If she was his lawful wife at the time of his death, and he died in good standing, she is entitled to the funeral benefits. (See Section 106, Digest.)

87. Decision.—A Subordinate Lodge, by general law, has no authority to receive applications for membership, refer, elect, initiate and confer the three degrees the same night for the purpose of qualifying them to form a Lodge.

2nd. The Grand Officers as such, cannot, after institution initiate, candidates nor confer the degrees.

88. Decision.—A. D. D. G. S. may be appointed, though not a P. C. P., except "where Grand Encampments may be established." He cannot install the officers of a Subordinate Encampment unless he be a P. C. P., but he can appoint some one that is qualified to do so.

89. Decision.—In the absence of any local prohibition a Lodge may elect any one qualified member in its jurisdiction as its Representative to the Grand Lodge.

90. Decision.—It is not legal for a Lodge to pass a By-Law making a part of its membership beneficial after three months' membership, and another part not beneficial until after six months' membership. The six months' clause is null and void. (Section 123, Digest.)

91. Question.—Can members in the ante-room be compelled to vote, unless excused, it being a part of the Lodge room ?

Answer.—They cannot, nor can they vote from the ante-room. To be entitled to take part in the business of the Lodge they must come into the lodge room proper. The ante-room is a part of the lodge room only for certain purposes.

92. Decision.—Holding a live Withdrawal Card, i.e., one that has not expired, gives the holder a quasi-membership, and if the card is deposited within the year with a petition for full membership, and such membership is made upon it, the continuity of his yearly membership is not destroyed so as to deprive him of the Honorable Veteran Jewel.

93. Where the By-Laws of the Lodge provide that the penalty for a specific offense shall be either suspension or expulsion, and the Constitution provides that the Lodge shall fix the penalty by vote, unless it be a single penalty, and that it shall require a two-thirds vote for expulsion, the Lodge must vote; and if two-thirds be not cast against the brother, the penalty to be inflicted must be suspension, no vote for that purpose being required.

94. The general law of the Order requires only night nurses or watchers to be furnished as "attentive benefits," not day nurses.

95. Public installations may be held in other than the regular lodge room (Section 1026, Digest), and may be joint installations, the lodges being legally convened.

96. If a candidate is black-balled by a Lodge, that had no legal right to receive and act upon the application, the candidate being ignorant of the fact, he need not wait six months before applying for membership in a proper Lodge, and such Lodge has a right to receive and act upon his application, the former action being illegal and null and void.

97. Suspension for cause terminates "good standing," and not being restored until after the expiration of one year, breaks the continuity of years so that the member, though restored, is not entitled to the twenty-five years Veteran Jewel, if the twenty-five years embrace the year of suspension.

98. Where permission is given by the proper authorities for the admission of a non-resident candidate to membership in a Lodge out of the jurisdiction in which he resides, and the fees for admission are less than are charged by the Lodge nearest his residence, he must pay the

amount charged by the Lodge at his residence, and the Lodge receiving him must pay the difference to the Grand Lodge of the Jurisdiction where he resides.

DECISIONS ON REBEKAH LAWS.

1. Question.—In the institution of a Rebekah Lodge in which there is no Past N. Grand, can any one except the N. G. deliver the P. N. G. charge?

Answer.—The chair of the P. N. G. is not an office, nor is the P. N. G. an officer. Under the beautified work it is very incongruous, and would mar the effect of the ceremony for the N. G. to change robes and situation. The law of 1890, by Section 34, is repealed, and as no official instructions are connected with the charge, as in the case of the first officers of a new Lodge, previous service in office is not required as a qualification, and any qualified member may deliver it. (Decided to three jurisdictions.)

2. Question.—Which is the law by which we are to be governed, the decision of Grand Sire Busbee, p. 12,785, Journal of 1892; approved p. 13,064, or the law as reported by the Legislative Committee, same Journal, p. 13,035, which report was adopted, p. 13,058. They seem to be in direct conflict?

Answer.—The decision of the Grand Sire was the law when it was made. The Legislative Committee reported a change in the law, which was adopted, and is the law of the Order now, though the decision of the Grand Sire was approved after its adoption.

3. Question.—Under Sections 2 and 18 of the Rebekah Code, can a Rebekah Lodge pay stated benefits, fixed by its By-Laws?

Answer.—It cannot. All payments must be paid by the Lodges at each meeting, as a majority of the members present shall by vote determine. (Decided to six different Jurisdictions.)

4. Question.—Is a widow—an unmarried woman—entitled to be admitted into a Rebekah Lodge under the new Code, unless her husband was an Odd Fellow in good standing at the time of his death?

Answer.—Yes. (Decided to four different Jurisdictions.)

5. Question.—The By-Laws of the Rebekah Lodges adopted for their government in this Grand Jurisdiction are in many particulars in conflict with the new Code. Is that Code operative in this Jurisdiction until after the Grand Lodge meets and takes action upon it?

Answer. It is from the time of its adoption. (Decided to three different Jurisdictions.)

6. Question.—Can a suspended Rebekah, after marrying a non-Odd Fellow, be reinstated in a Rebekah Lodge?



Answer.—Under the first clause of Section 6 she can. (Decided to four different Jurisdictions.)

7. Question.—Under the Rebekah Code, Section 12, is a member who has served in an elective, but never in an appointive office, eligible to an elective office?

Answer.—According to the wording of that section, it would seem to exclude all, after the first term, from eligibility to any elective office who had not previously filled an appointive office. That, however, can hardly have been the intention of the section, since service in an elective office is a better qualification for promotion than in an appointive. It being of higher rank, as the greater always includes the less, I decide that such a member is eligible. (Decided to two Jurisdictions.)

8. Question.—Under Section 13 of the Rebekah Code, is an officer serving a majority of the nights of a term, but not to the end of the term, entitled to the honors of the term?

Answer.—By that section she is.

9. Question.—Does Section 34 of the Rebekah Code repeal Section 1,235 in regard to returns of Rebekah Lodges?

Answer.—It does not. That is not a "Rebekah law for the government of Rebekah Lodges," but for the government of Grand Lodges.

10. Question.—Can a Grand Lodge confer on Rebekah Assemblies power to institute and Charter Rebekah Lodges?

Answer.—They have no such power. They are clothed by Section 2 with a special power, the time and place for exercising which is left to their judgment. Such a power cannot be delegated. (Decided to five different Jurisdictions.)

11. Question.—Does a D. D. Grand Sire require to be a member of a Rebekah Lodge in order to receive the Rebekah A. P. W., or to have any other qualifications than those specified in the 8th division of Art. XV. of the By-Laws of the S. G. L.?

Answer.—Yes.

12. Question.—Who are members of Rebekah Assemblies when convened for organization?

Answer.—Such as the Grand Lodge shall provide for.

13. Question.—Shall the Grand Officers, in instituting Rebekah Lodges before the Grand Lodge meets, conform the Rebekah Lodge Constitution to the new Code, it being now in direct conflict with it, and instruct them according to the provisions of the Code, or the Constitution as it is?

Answer.—According to the new Code.

14. Question.—Can the wife of a husband, both of whom once belonged to a Rebekah Lodge, but took withdrawal cards, now out of date, join a Rebekah Lodge?

Answer.—Yes.

15. Question.—Under the new Rebekah Code, can the Grand Secretary furnish supplies direct to Rebekah Assemblies?

Answer.—The Grand Secretary of the Sovereign Lodge cannot. Section 26, by the strongest application, affirms the general law.

16. Question.—Can the T. P. W. be given openly in a Rebekah Lodge?

Answer.—It cannot.

17. Question.—Is an initiatory member eligible to membership in a Rebekah Lodge?

Answer.—He is.

18. Decision.—Good moral character and belief in a Supreme Being, though not specified as conditions of membership in sub-divisions 1 and 2, of Section 6 of the Code, are pre-requisite to membership, as much as under sub-division 3.

These conditions are "ancient landmarks," and are not repealed by Section 34.

19. Decision.—The regalia prescribed for Rebekahs cannot be dispensed with in Rebekah Assemblies and a pin badge substituted in its place.

20. Question.—Under Section 6 sub-division 1, of the Rebekah Code, is a woman that is of mixed blood (Indian or Negro), who is the wife of an Odd Fellow in good standing, eligible to membership?

Answer.—No.

21. Decision.—A Sister may furnish marches to be used in Rebekah Lodges if not issued in the name of the Order, and do not supplant any required by the S. G. L. to be used.

22. Decision.—A Grand Lodge cannot delegate the entire Rebekah Branch to the control of Rebekah Assemblies.

23. Sections 124 and 126, of the Digest, do not apply to Rebekah Assemblies. The only prescribed regalia for them is found in Section 27 of the new Code.

24. Decision.—The first clause of Section 6, "All persons who have had the Degree," does not embrace an expelled Odd Fellow, who once had the Degree, nor his wife, if she has been expelled, though she may have had the Degree.

25. Decision.—Under Section 30 of the Rebekah Code, the petition of an existing State Convention, for a Rebekah Assembly, stating that there were ten or more Rebekah Lodges, would be sufficient to authorize a Grand Lodge to charter a Rebekah Assembly.

26. Decision.—Under Section 26 no vote is necessary upon application for a withdrawal card. Should objection be made for cause, that would suspend the issuance until after investigation.

27. Decision.—Other than the officers of a Rebekah Assembly, may wear the badge prescribed in Section 25.

28. Decision.—The President of a Rebekah Assembly doubtless may appoint other than those officers named in Section 31, e. g., Supporters, but they would not rank as officers, only assistants.

29. Decision.—Rebekah Lodges may provide in their By-Laws the terms of reinstatement.

30. Decision.—There is nothing prohibiting additional robes to those prescribed in the Ritual, but others cannot be substituted in place of those prescribed.

31. Decision.—Both under the new Code and the old law, the place of meeting of Rebekah Lodges is left with State Grand Bodies. The new Code makes no change in that respect.

32. Decision.—Rebekah Lodges are now charged with the duty of rendering "attentive benefits," the same as Subordinate Lodges.

33. Question.—A member of a Rebekah Lodge has taken a withdrawal card that has expired. Her husband has also taken one from his Lodge that has expired. Can she regain membership in a Rebekah Lodge without her husband first joining the Subordinate Lodge, and if so, how?

Answer.—Yes. Under first sub-division of Section 6, by depositing her card with her application for membership.

## AMENDMENTS AND RESOLUTIONS.

The following amendment to Article 16, of the Constitution of the S. G. L., was adopted:

Sec. 5.—No saloon-keeper, bartender or professional gambler shall be eligible to membership in this Order.

Also the following resolutions were adopted:

*Resolved further*,—That Grand Lodges and Grand Encampments shall require their Subordinates to make annual reports in relation to the property owned by the Order, including the name, number and location of Lodge or Encampment; the size of lot, the height, size and material of building, date of erection, cost of property, present value, indebtedness, amount of insurance, net annual income, size of Lodge room, character of title, whether in fee, under lease or otherwise, and if owned jointly with others, what part owned by the Order, if owned by a corporation, the amount and market value of the stock owned by the Order, amount of money or securities not included in stock above given, also cemetery or cemetery lot, and shall report a tabulated statement thereof to the Grand Secretary of this Grand Lodge;

*Resolved further*,—That the Grand Secretary be instructed to furnish Subordinate Grand Secretaries with a blank form to be a guide for uniformity in procuring said statistics.

*Resolved*,—When a member of the Order is convicted of a crime, and is sentenced and is serving a term in a State prison, charges shall be preferred against him in the Lodge of which he is a member, and upon the facts being established and the member fully identified, he must be expelled.

Other legislation was enacted with which it is unnecessary to encumber this report, as it will all appear in the Revised Journal, S.G.L., soon to be published.

Amendments and additions were made to the Rebekah Code of Laws, of more or less importance, useless to mention here, as, in accordance with a resolution adopted by the S. G. L., provision is made to furnish immediately each Rebekah Lodge with a printed copy of the Code as amended at this session. The following is the resolution, viz:

*Resolved*,—That the Code of Laws for the Rebekah Degree, as amended at this session, be immediately printed, and three copies thereof sent to each Representative, and a sufficient number to each Grand Lodge to furnish each Lodge in its Jurisdiction with one copy.

The following is the Report of the Committee on Appeals on the appeal of Past Grand Master, Thomas C. Gray against the Grand Lodge of British Columbia:—

*To the Sovereign Grand Lodge of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows:*

Your Committee on Appeals have had under consideration the appeal of Past Grand Master Thomas C. Gray from the action of the Grand Lodge of British Columbia, and submit the following report thereon:

The case is this. In May, 1895, application was made by the Secretary of the Odd Fellows' Relief Association of Canada for a Certificate as provided by the sixth clause, page 13,083, Journal of Proceedings Sovereign Grand Lodge for 1892, said Association having complied with all the requirements for such application, and having had a Certificate for the year soon to expire. This application was not acted on by the Grand Master and Grand Secretary, but was by them referred to the Grand Lodge for directions at the Session held in June, 1895.

At this Session of the Grand Lodge a petition was presented from the Board of Management of the Odd Fellows' Insurance Association of British Columbia, showing its organization and work, and referring to its competitor, the Odd Fellows' Relief Association of Canada, and asking that no license be issued by the Grand Lodge of British Columbia to "any insurance association or company to do business in this Jurisdiction" (B. C.), and further claiming for petitioner company exemption from requirement to take out Certificate under decisions Nos. 32 and 33 of Grand Sire of 1893, approved by Sovereign Grand Lodge.

The application for Certificate by the one association and the petition against granting it, by the other association, were referred to the Committee on Legislation, who reported in favor of granting the Certificate to the applicant, and holding that the petitioner was also required to have license. The reports and action thereon were as follows:

ODD FELLOWS' RELIEF ASSOCIATION OF CANADA.

Regarding the communication from the Odd Fellows' Relief Association of Canada asking permission to do business within the Jurisdiction of the Grand Lodge of B. C. We would say that as the above Association has complied with the legislation of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, Sessions 1892 and 1893, permission must be granted by this Grand Lodge to permit the Odd Fellows' Relief Association of Canada to operate in this Province for one year, commencing July 1st, 1895, and ending June 30th, 1896.

B. C. ODD FELLOWS' INSURANCE ASSOCIATION.

In reference to the petition of the Board or Management of the Odd Fellows' Insurance Association of B. C., we would say that it is absolutely

necessary for this Association to take out the necessary Insurance Certificate through the Sovereign Grand Lodge in order to do legitimate business in this Province. See page 13645, 13648 Journal of Proceedings, S. G. Lodge, 1893.

This report was received by the said Grand Lodge and considered seriatim, and the following proceedings were taken and resolutions adopted thereon :

It was moved, seconded and carried—That the report be received and considered seriatim.

By consent Section IV. was considered before Section III.

It was moved and seconded that the section be adopted as read.

Moved and seconded as an amendment :

“That the section be amended by striking out all the words after the words ‘B. C.’ in second line, and substituting the following :

“We recommend that the prayer of the petition be granted, and that this Grand Lodge decline to grant licenses to any Odd Fellows’ Insurance Association to do business in this Jurisdiction in future. Further, that in view of the decisions of the Grand Sire referred to in this petition, we do not consider it necessary for this Association to take out licenses.”

The amendment was carried.

The Grand Master asked permission to appeal to the Sovereign Grand Lodge against the action of the Grand Lodge and on motion the request was granted.

Section III. of the report of the Committee on Legislation was next considered, and the following amendment to the same was carried : Strike out all the words of the section after the words “B. C.” in the third line, and substituting the following :

“Although we have every reason to believe that this Association is an excellent institution, yet we conceive it the duty of this Grand Lodge to protect our own home institution, and therefore recommend that the permission asked for to enable the Odd Fellows’ Relief Association of Canada to do business in this jurisdiction be refused.”

The said Thomas C. Gray appeals from said decisions of the said Grand Lodge of British Columbia, Independent Order of Odd Fellows, on the 13th June, 1895, upon the following grounds :

1. That it was the duty of the Grand Master and Grand Secretary of the said Grand Lodge of British Columbia, Independent Order of Odd Fellows, to issue a certificate to the said Odd Fellows’ Relief Association of Canada in the form therein provided under said sixth clause, which is as follows :



"Upon filing with any Grand Secretary of any Grand Lodge the certificate and reports, hereinbefore provided for, together with the above mentioned certificate from the Grand Sire and Grand Secretary of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, it shall be the duty of the Grand Master and Grand Secretary of such Jurisdiction to issue to such company or association a certificate substantially in the form hereinbefore provided for, to be issued by the Grand Sire and Grand Secretary of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, and containing the same reservation, namely, that neither the Sovereign Grand Lodge, nor Grand or Subordinate Lodges, are in any way responsible for the engagements or contracts of such company or association, nor shall the certificate be considered or assumed to be an indorsement or recommendation of such association nor of its solvency or responsibility.

"Such certificate shall entitle such company to transact its business in the territorial limits of such Grand Lodge; provided, however, that the Grand Lodge of any Jurisdiction may, by resolution, prohibit the granting of certificate of permission as herein provided for, to be issued by its Grand Master or Grand Secretary to all insurance associations. Any action heretofore had by any Grand Lodge prohibiting insurance associations from doing business within its Jurisdiction shall remain unaffected by these resolutions."

2. That the said Grand Lodge had no authority nor power to refuse to issue the said certificates.

3. The said Odd Fellows' Insurance Association of British Columbia having ceased to operate through the officers of the said Grand Lodge of Independent Order of Odd Fellows, had not complied with the requirements of the said Sovereign Grand Lodge, and were therefore not entitled to do business within the said Province of British Columbia or elsewhere.

4. It was the duty of the said Grand Lodge of British Columbia to have refused to license the said Odd Fellows' Insurance Association of British Columbia to do business in the Province of British Columbia.

An answer to this appeal was filed by Fred Davey, Grand Secretary, claiming that the Odd Fellows' Insurance Association of British Columbia confined its operations to the Province of British Columbia, is local in its character and does not seek to do general insurance business, and claiming in behalf of the Grand Lodge of British Columbia, the power to do business without license or certificate and citing in support of that claim, Journal, Sovereign Grand Lodge of 1892, Section 2, clause 6, page 13081; Decisions 32 and 33 of Grand Sire 1893, pages 13258 and 13259, session 1893; also report of Judiciary Committee, No. 185, pages 13660 and 13661, Sovereign Grand Lodge Journal, 1893.

It does not clearly appear whether the Odd Fellows' Relief Association of Canada does a general business, or whether it is also a British Columbia institution, confining its operations to that Province only, but it is fairly inferable from the whole case that it does business outside of British Columbia and desires, also, to continue its work in that Province. It is equally as clearly inferable that the Odd Fellows' Insurance Association of British Columbia does business only in that Province. We have no concern with the competition between the two Associations which may have occasioned the action taken by the Grand Lodge of British Columbia above recited, but only to ascertain, if we can, the law bearing upon the question, and this appears to be settled for the present, at least, by the action of the Sovereign Grand Lodge in 1893, in adopting the report of the Judiciary Committee on pages 13660 and 13661 of Journal, which report is as follows :

"Whereas, a number of voluntary associations or small corporations have been organized in the various Jurisdictions for the purpose of aiding members thereof in sickness, or of providing for families of deceased members, such associations confining their operations to towns, cities or Jurisdictions in which they are located, and not seeking to do general insurance business.

*Resolved*,—That the Committee on the Judiciary be requested to report whether or not the resolutions relating to insurance companies and requiring reports to be filed in manner therein provided, adopted at the last session of the Grand Lodge, are applicable to such associations," introduced by Representative Pickerton, have duly considered the same, and respectfully report that in the opinion of the committee the resolutions relating to insurance adopted at the session of the Sovereign Grand Lodge in 1892 (Journal 13,077-13,084), were not intended to, and, in fact, do not apply to associations of the character named in the resolutions introduced by the Representatives from Massachusetts, and above recited. Decision No. 33 of the Grand Sire, submitted and approved at this session, is decisive of the question here presented. The committee, therefore, find that the resolutions referred to, adopted in 1892, are not applicable

to associations similar to those named, and essentially local in their character, and that such associations need not, by virtue of the resolutions of last session, make or file any report to, or in the Sovereign Grand Lodge.

By this action your Committee must be governed, and if the law, as solemnly declared in 1893, is not satisfactory, it can only be amended or repealed by the Sovereign Grand Lodge which enacted it, but while of force it must be respected and obeyed. Under this law no license or certificate is required for an Odd Fellows' Insurance Association a Jurisdiction doing business only in such Jurisdiction. Under the general law of the Sovereign Grand Lodge with respect to such Insurance Associations, a Grand Lodge can refuse license or certificate to all companies or associations requiring the same as a pre-requisite to transacting business. Assuming as we feel authorized by the record to do, that the Odd Fellows' Insurance Association of British Columbia does business only in that province, we submit the following:

*Resolved*,—That the appeal of Past Grand Master Thomas C. Gray be dismissed, and the action of the Grand Lodge of British Columbia in both questions, made in said appeal, be sustained.

The petition of David Green, formerly a member of Dominion Lodge, No. 4, of this Jurisdiction, was reported from Committee on Petitions, of which G. R. Bro. J. E. Phillips was a member, but abstained from taking a part in the decision of this case.

*To the Sovereign Grand Lodge of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows:*

Your Committee on Petitions, to whom was again referred the Memorial of David Green, formerly a member of Dominion Lodge, No. 4, of Victoria, British Columbia, beg leave to offer the following report:

This Memorial was referred to the Committee on Petitions at the Session of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, held at Milwaukee in 1893, and complained of an injustice having been done by Dominion Lodge, No. 4, in expelling the said David Green from membership in said Lodge, but your Committee not having before them any evidence from the Lodge, showing cause for their action, the case was referred to the Grand Lodge of British Columbia, asking that an investigation be made and particulars furnished this Grand Body, so that your Committee might act understandingly.

We now find that an exhaustive examination of the case has been duly made by a special committee of five, duly appointed by the Grand Lodge of British Columbia, confirming the action of Dominion Lodge, No. 4, B. C., in expelling the said David Green from the Lodge, and your Committee, finding the action of the said Lodge legal and in regular form, believe that no injustice has been done to the said David Green, and now recommend that the action of the Grand Lodge of British Columbia in sustaining the action of Dominion Lodge, No. 4, be approved, and the Memorial and Petition of the said David Green dismissed.

The following important amendment to the Constitution, of which notice of motion was given at the Session held at Chattanooga, 1894, was taken up and postponed until next Session in order to give the various Jurisdictions time to discuss the question and instruct their Representatives in the matter :

*To the Sovereign Grand Lodge of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows:*

Your Committee on Legislation, to whom was referred the resolution of Rep. Humphrey, of Illinois, which reads as follows:

*Resolved*,—That the resolution of Rep. Conway, of Illinois, on the subject of minimum benefits, presented at last session, and laid over for one year, be referred to the Committee on Legislation.

Beg leave to report as follows:

The resolution of Rep. Conway is found on page 14,020, Journal of Proceedings 1894, and reads as follows:

“ WHEREAS, The payment of weekly benefits to sick and disabled members is a fundamental principle of our Order; and

“ WHEREAS, The object for which weekly benefits are paid is the relief of distress incident to such sickness or disability; and

“ WHEREAS, Under the present laws of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, a minimum sum of \$2.00 per week for the first year, and \$1.00 per week thereafter, is made the foundation for the regulation of the benefit system in Subordinate Lodges; and

“ WHEREAS, A much larger percentage of members is paid benefits for periods of three weeks, and less, than those who are paid benefits for periods in excess of that time, the exact figures in the Grand Jurisdiction of Illinois for the six months ending March 31st, 1894, being: Number of Brothers paid three weeks' benefits, and under, during a continuous sickness, 2,341. Number of Brothers paid benefits for over three weeks' continuous sickness, 1,012; and

“ WHEREAS, Subordinate Lodges, being governed by the enactment of the Sovereign Grand Lodge regulating minimum benefits, are largely influenced in the direction of paying a larger weekly benefit for the first few months' sickness, reducing the same thereafter (in many instances to the minimum); and

“ WHEREAS, The effect of such a system is that the longer a member is unable to provide for himself and family, the less his weekly benefits become; in other words, the greater his necessity, the less his

relief; while on the other hand, the member who only is disabled for one, two, or three weeks, and consequently should not be in need of pecuniary relief, is made the recipient of the very benefits that should be held in the treasury for his less fortunate Brother, who may be laid up for many months, and even years; and

"WHEREAS, The question of dues and benefits (looking to a sound financial policy), for the protection of our Subordinate Lodge treasuries, is one that has caused much serious discussion and legislation by this Grand Body, as well as by the various Grand and Subordinate Lodges; and

"WHEREAS, A solution of the whole problem may be found in Subordinate Lodges paying a minimum weekly benefit for the first three or four weeks' continuous sickness (which may be considered largely in the light of accident insurance, rather than the relief of a Brother in distress), and thus accumulate in the Lodge treasury, sufficient funds to at all times properly care for Brothers during any long continued illness, the latter being one of the most sacred obligations imposed upon the Brotherhood. Therefore, for the purpose of suggesting legislation in the above direction, in both Grand and Subordinate Lodges, be it

"Resolved,—That Subordinate Lodges of the Order may not pay any benefits for the first week, and that a minimum benefit of \$1.00 per week shall be paid, commencing with the second week's sickness, during a period of six weeks' continuous sickness, and a minimum benefit of \$2.00 per week thereafter during the continuance of such sickness."

Your Committee having given careful consideration to the subject matter of this resolution are of the opinion that inasmuch as the proposed legislation involves a question of great importance and deserving of the most serious consideration, it should not be acted upon at the present session.

We therefore recommend that the Grand Representatives be requested to report to their respective Jurisdictions the subject matter of the preamble and resolution and seek their expression of opinion upon the same.

We also recommend that the said resolution be laid over, for consideration at the next annual session of the Sovereign Grand Lodge.

The following Cipher Code and Key was adopted for the purpose of enabling Lodges and Relief Committees to communicate with one another by telegraph, in an economic manner :

## TELEGRAPH CIPHER AND KEY.

House.—Is in our city, holding a Visiting Card from your Lodge, and asking of us financial assistance.

Funds.—Shall we aid him, and draw on you to the extent of——?

Cash.—Is in our city asking financial assistance, and claims membership in your lodge in good standing.

River.—Has your Lodge a member in good standing by the name of——?

Boat.—He is an expelled member and has not been in good standing for——.

White.—We don't know any such party, and he does not belong to our Lodge.

Grip.—Draw on us for the amount of expenses incurred.

Caution.—Look out for a fraud named——.

Secretary.—He has a fraudulent card.

Final.—A member of your Lodge died here.

Black.—He is a fraud, and if he has a card or other papers from this Lodge they are forgeries.

Red.—Holding a Visiting Card from your Lodge died here.

Green.—Wire instructions to us at once as to the disposition of his remains.

Yellow.—Is in our city and very sick. Claims membership in your Lodge. Shall we give him attendance on your account?

Purple.—We think best to bury him there.

Lodge.—Forward remains to this place by——.

Regalin.—Assist him and we will honor draft to the extent of——.

Help.—Will your Lodge pay nurse hire, and how much per day?

---

The question of prohibiting the admission of saloon-keepers, bartenders, or professional gamblers into the Order in future was adopted, after a spirited discussion, as has already been reported to you through the Grand Lodge officers.

The resignation of Bro. Isaac A. Sheppard as Grand Treasurer of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, through ill-health, after holding that office for eleven years, was accepted with reluctance. Bro. M. R. Muckle, of Pennsylvania, was elected to fill the vacancy.

It was decided to hold the next session of the Sovereign Grand Lodge at Dallas, Texas, September, 1896.

In conclusion, allow us to return our sincere thanks and acknowledgement for the honor conferred.

The Committee on Statistics, *re* Dues and Benefits, presented the following report, which was adopted :

*To the Grand Lodge of British Columbia, I.O.O.F.:*

Your Committee on Statistics, *re* Dues and Benefits, beg to submit herewith an Abstract of the Reports of Subordinate Lodges in this Jurisdiction for the past ten years, showing the averages under the following heads, viz: "Sickness per member," "Cost per member for total relief," "Cost per member for working expenses," and "Total cost per member for all Lodge expenditures."

In reviewing these figures we are pleased to note a reduction under all these heads, with the exception of "Working expenses," when compared with our Report of last year. The averages under the latter head

last year \$6.00, however, is the lowest for the past ten years, but is still larger, in our opinion, than it should be, as it represents one-half of the amount received for dues, being expended for other purposes than relief. We are in doubt whether the returns from the Lodges under this head are absolutely correct, as it has been discovered, on enquiry, that sums paid for the erection and enlargement of halls and other Lodge property, have been included, whereas these expenditures should be regarded as Investments of Lodge Funds, and not classified as "Working Expenses." We would impress on Lodges the necessity of exercising care in compiling these reports, as from the data furnished by them the legislation of the future on vital questions affecting the Order should be based.

We do not feel justified, at present, in recommending any action by this Grand Lodge on the question of Dues and Benefits, but we think that when such action becomes imperative it should be in the direction of curtailing these expenses of management. In order to effect this economy it might be advisable to require all Lodges to keep a separate and distinct account of management expenses, and to restrict the amount to be appropriated for this purpose which, in the opinion of your Committee, should be limited to 50 per cent. of the sum received for dues alone.

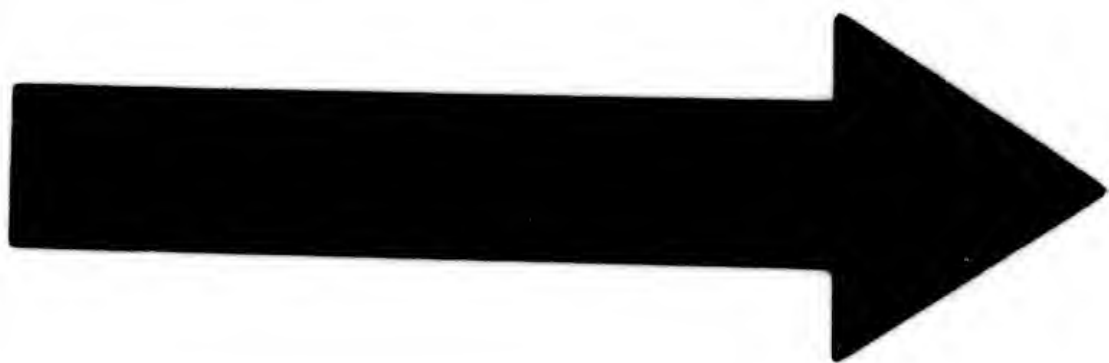

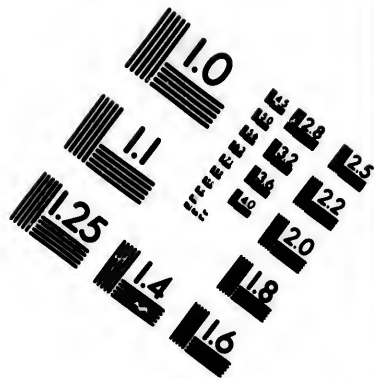
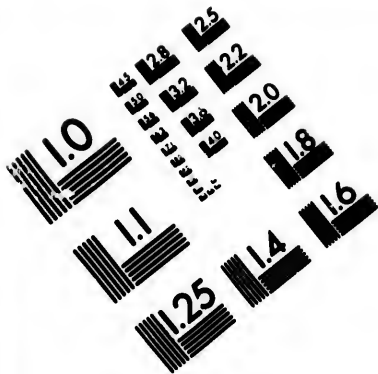
I am pleased to report that I have not been called on to decide any questions which shows that peace and harmony have reigned supreme among the membership under my jurisdiction.

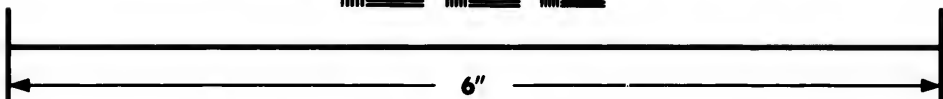
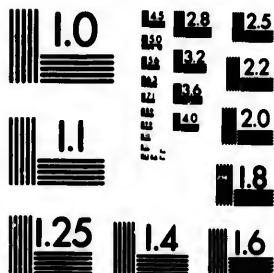

The question you desire me to answer, viz: "Is Bro. Simpson entitled to benefits prior to the six months limit under the decision of the Grand Lodge on the appeal of Bro. W. A. Johnston;" in the first place you should have given me the date of his initiation and whether he was a member of old Loyal Pacific Lodge and also sent me a copy of your By-laws; however, I will endeavor to give you my opinion as I understand the question to the best of my ability. In the first place, I presume Bro. Simpson was initiated some time in March by the six months limit being up in September, if this is correct, you had at that time a clause in your By-laws making a discrimination between new members joining and members of Loyal Pacific Lodge, which had been sanctioned by the Committee on Laws of Subordinates and was therefore law as far as your Lodge was concerned, and was afterwards so decided by the Grand Lodge in session at Victoria in June last, at the same time the Grand Lodge said that this was a discrimination and contrary to the principles of Odd Fellowship and recommended that the three months

clause should be struck out. Your Representatives informed the Grand Lodge that there was already a notice of motion before the Lodge to strike out the same, and as the matter became a dead issue after six months, the affair was allowed to drop. So it just amounts to this, when Bro. Simpson joined the Lodge this clause was in force, and when he signed the By-laws, he agreed and promised obedience to the same, which said new members joining the Lodge were not entitled to benefits until they had been a member six months; but members of Loyal Pacific Lodge were entitled to benefits after three months membership, so unless Bro. Simpson was a member of Loyal Pacific Lodge, he certainly was not entitled to benefits until he had been a member six months and I so decide.

The decision of the Grand Sire at the last Session of the Sovereign Grand Lodge on this point in which he says, Lodges cannot pass a By-law making a part of its members beneficial after three months membership and another part not beneficial until after six months membership, and where the Lodge had paid benefits under the three months clause the six months clause becomes null and void. Now as the Sovereign Grand Lodge gives all state Grand Bodies power to say when benefits shall commence, our Grand Body had already decided on this point as I have shown above I cannot see how this decision of the Grand Sire has any bearing on your question as it was given months after Bro. Simpson joined the Lodge, so I hold that the Grand Sires decision can only be enforced in any case that might come after.

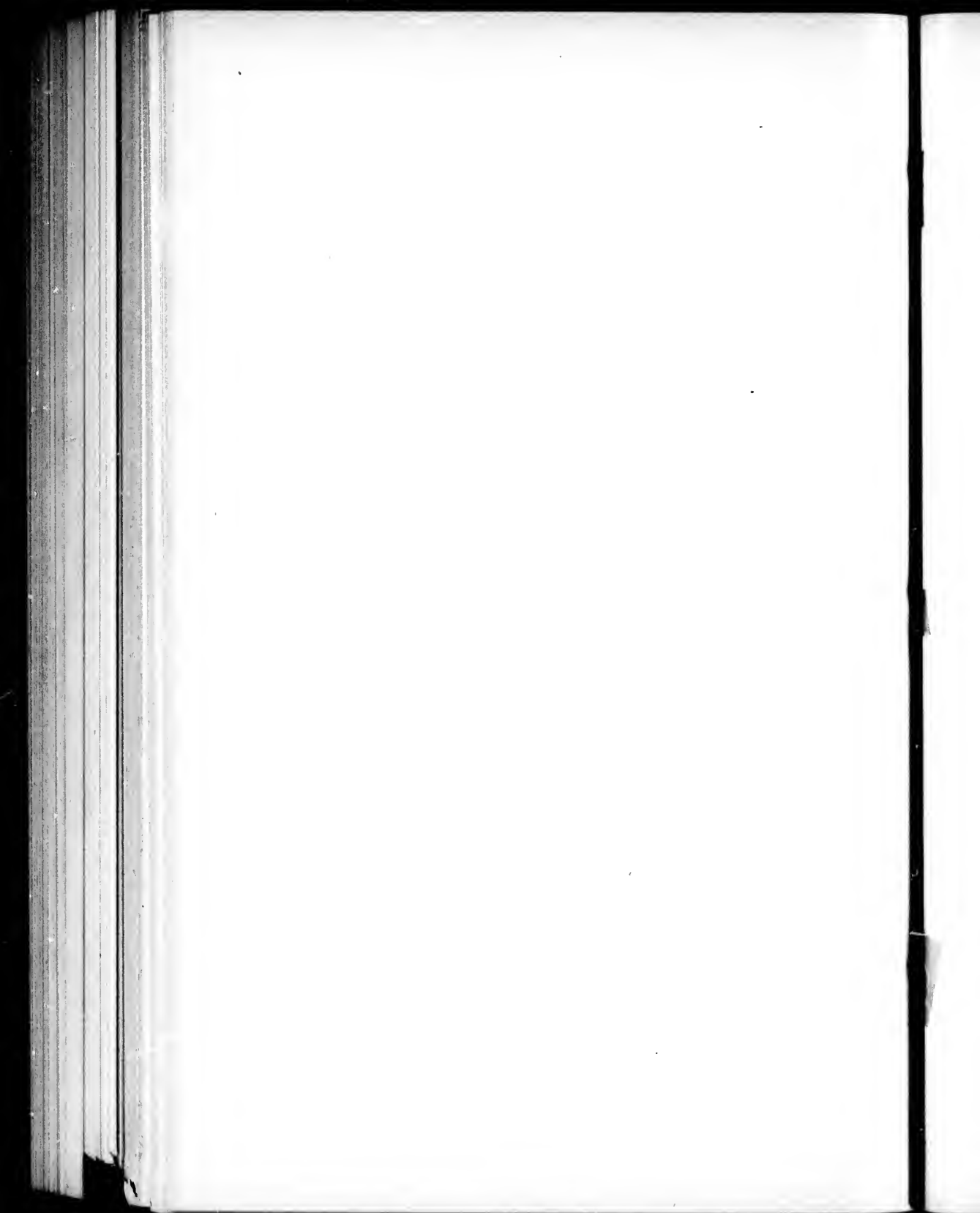
