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City Inspector Robert Awde freely admits that his duties are too numerous to allow him to carry out proper inspection, which, by the statement of F. C. Letts, business agent of the Meat Cutters' and Butchers' Union, who was also interviewed by The World, would seem to be very necessary. Mr. Letts.who has had experience for many years in cities of the United States and Canada, and is thereby in touch and Canada, and is thereby in touch with the details of the packing industry, asserts that he has personally seen dead cattle and hogs, on arrival in Toronto, dressed and disposed of with the rest. He also declares the existence of a considerable trade in immature or "slink" calves.

Inspector Awde's Duties.

Mr. Awde remarked that his first Mr. Awde remarked that his first duty each day was to go to the cattle market to look out for cattle afflicted with tuberculosis, lump jaw or ther complaints. If an affected animal were found at an abattoir it was con-demned to be placed in a tank along with refuse to be converted into fertizer. In this form no contagion of disease could be carried. If in a slaughter house, the outer fat of the mned animal was made into tal-

Butchers were allowed to purchase lump-jawed cattle at the cattle mar-ket. These were killed under inspection, and if the disease was found to purely local, the head only was aside, the remainder being de-

Alleged Surplus of \$23,000 in March Is Now a Deficit of \$9000.

A meeting of creditors of John Ward, wholesale and retail tobacconist, of 37 Yonge-street, and 139 Yongewhen what is declared to be a most unsatisfactory state of affairs was disclosed. Ward was not present, and it is thought he has left the city.

He came to Toronto about the first of December of last year and entered into business. Three months ago he furnished the mercantile agencies with a signed statement representing his assets at about \$38,685.85, and liabilities \$15,770.34, or over \$23,000 in excess of liabilities.

Yesterday the figures which the creditors received showed nominal assets of about \$17,000, with liabilities some \$10,000 above that amount. In other words a surplus of \$23,000

In other words a surplus of \$23,000 less than three months ago is converted into a deficit of \$9000.

The liabilities were divided: To the trade, about \$15,000; to banks, about \$6000; loans, about \$7000. The creditors include: The Sovereign Bank, about \$5000 (secured); F. J. Walsh (loans) about \$4000; Edwin Marshall (loans), \$2500; Richard Lane, \$1100; J. Horrocks, \$2000; Miller and Lockwell of Quebec, \$4500; Grvais & Co., Montreal, \$1000; Rothschild of Chicago, \$800; the Grandas Co., \$700.

It seemed from the statement that nearly all the assets were "secured" It seemed from the statement that nearly all the assets were "secured" and on behalf of Miller and Lockwell, Parker & Black, barristers, gave notice that proceedings would be taken to attack these secured claims on the ground that they are preferential.




