INDIANS ARE DOING WELL

Col. Herchmer's Report Shows That Northwest Red Men Are Good Farmers.

Ottawa, June 14.—(Special).—The annual report of the Northwest Mounted Police Department was laid on the table this afternoon by Sir Wilfrid Laurier. The report of Col. Herchmer is dated Dec. 20, 1898, and gives some interesting details of the work of the force during the year. With respect to the Indians the commissioner says: "We have had no trouble with the Indians this year." A growing inclination to make money, fostered by the Indian Department, which has given them every opportunity, has kept the able-bodied men of most bands at work and between freighting and hay-making and the gathering of crops, most of their time has been fully occupied. They have sold a great deal of hay at good prices and have also, particularly in the north, sold a number of splendid steers, besides supplying their reserves with beef. They pay great attention to their cattle, and their steers are probably as good as those disposed of by the best farmers in the country; and if the department only continue in this wise policy of frequently changing the bulls, they will be very rich in good cattle. FIVE MILLIONS ARE STARVING

The Famine in East European Russia is Worse Than it Was During That of 1891-92.

RELIEF AGENTS GET RELIEF MONEY

And the Prices for Seed Grain Are So High That the Peasants Cannot Sow Their Crops.

London, June 14.—While famine is now threatening the southern province of Russia, the correspondent of The Times at St. Petersburg writes that the condition of the seven provinces of East European Russia is worse than it was during the famine of 1891 and 1892.

"Quite half a population of 11,000,000," he says, "are undergoing terrible suffering and starvation and disease and the authorities everywhere appear incapable and unprepared to deal with the calamity. Money is squandered in a mad race to get relief agents, and owing to the high prices which the Government charges for seed corn, no encouragement is given to peasants to till the ground.

"It is unnecessary to quote the harrowing details received from the relief agents. These could add nothing to the stern significance of the statement made by a Russian of authority in one district in the Government of Kazan, that not one child born there this year is now alive."

ENGINEERING COMPANY WINS.

Justice Burbridge Decides That the Patent of the Toronto Company Holds Good.

Ottawa, June 14.—(Special.)—Judgment was given this morning by Mr. Justice Burbridge in the patent case of the General Engineering Company of Toronto v. the Dominion Cotton Mills Company and the American Cotton Company. The plaintiff claims that the defendants had infringed their patent, No. 40,721, for improvements in furnaces, etc., by making and erecting for use in the Dominion Cotton Mills furnaces with a system of fuel supply the same as that covered by the plaintiff's patent. The defendants resisted the action on the ground that the plaintiff's patent was void for want of novelty and other reasons. Judge Burbridge upheld the validity of the patent and gave judgment for plaintiff.
