New York, Feb. 22.—The rapid drop in the temperature has greatly increased sickness among the poor. At the Bellevue Hospital free dispensary, 882 persons received treatment yesterday and 908 prescriptions were filled.

WOMAN DIED IN AGONY. While Putting Coal in the Furnace Her Clothing Took Fire and the Result Was Death.

New York, Feb. 22.—Mrs. Christiana Stephens of 103 West 44th-street lost her life, and her husband was seriously injured, at their residence last night. Mr. Stephens started toward the rear of the basement to put some coal on the furnace fire. His wife stopped him, saying she would fix the fire for the night. She was about to throw a piece of coal on the fire when the back draught blew the flame out of the furnace door and her clothing became ignited.

SEVENTY GIVEN UP AS LOST. Scottish Fishermen Who Went Out Before the Recent Gale.

Aberdeen, Feb. 22.—Fifty Aberdeen trawlers, which started for the fishing grounds before the recent gale, have not returned, and all hope of their safety has been abandoned. Their crews number about 70 men and boys.

Italian Murderer Surrendered. Dunkirk, N.Y., Feb. 22.—Roselias Borsellero, an Italian, wanted for the murder of his father-in-law, Salvatore Lascia, at Fredonia, surrendered himself to the sheriff this morning. The evidence taken by the coroner indicates self-defense on the part of Borsellero.

Swedish Mail Steamer Stranded. Sussatz, Germany, Feb. 22.—The Swedish mail steamer Rex has stranded off Lohme Rügen Island during a fog. Five stewardesses were drowned in attempting to leave the ship. The rest of the crew and passengers and mail are still aboard.

Coldest of the Winter. Plattsburgh, N.Y., Feb. 22.—Last night was probably the coldest of the winter. The thermometer registered 12 below zero at daybreak and 10 below at Malone and 32 below at Saranac Lake.

After the adoption of the reports of the executive committee, a vote of thanks to the Ontario Government was passed for its grant.

Resolutions Adopted. In view of the confusion occurring at camps last year through the absence of a full establishment of wagons, this meeting requests the militia authorities to furnish for future camps an increased number of horses to enable our batteries to parade with the proper establishment of guns and forage wagons.

Regret at Hutton's Departure. This meeting desires to express its sincere regret at the departure of Major-General Herbert from Canada prior to the continuation of the much-needed reforms in the Canadian militia, which this meeting believes would have been carried out under his regime, and that a copy of this resolution be sent to Col. Hutton.

Sympathy for Those Lost. This meeting begs to record its regret at the loss of life sustained by the Second Battalion, R.C.I., in South Africa, and to extend to the families of those who died in the line of duty its sincere sympathy, and it also desires to record its sympathy with those who have been wounded, and prays for their safe and speedy recovery.

No Helmets Wanted. This association has heard with regret that the Militia Department intends issuing helmets to the artillery, and, establishing the helmet the most unsuitable headgear for such services.

ASSOCIATED CHARITIES. Their Claim is to "Oversee" the Charitable Work that is Being Done in Toronto.

The regular monthly meeting of the Associated Charities was held yesterday afternoon in the Confederation Life Building. Most of the time was taken up in the consideration of the constitution. This was finally adopted. According to this constitution, the society will not directly disburse funds, but will operate through some of the recognized charitable organizations.

These will forward their returns, of all the work done, to the Associated Charities, and thus there will be a complete record of all persons receiving assistance from any source. Information concerning an applicant may be obtained by telephoning the secretary at 100 Queen-st. West. The health officer, the chief of police and the City Relief officer are made ex-officio members of the society.

The report of the secretary drew attention to the large number who are receiving assistance from several sources. Many coming for half a score of years, and some being invited as to the best means of dealing with their cases. The opinion was that something must be done to encourage thrift when work is plentiful so that alms would not need to be sought.

OLGA NETHERSOLE IN COURT. New York Authorities Are Trying to Find Out Whether or Not "Sapho" is Immoral.

New York, Feb. 22.—Olga Nethersole, the actress, appeared to-day in the Centre-st. Court, where the examination was resumed as to whether Sapho was an immoral play. She came in with Hamilton Berville, her leading man; Marcus Meyer, her manager, and Abe Hummel, her attorney. The case was in the private examination room.

The first witness of the session was Mrs. Almon Hensley, president of the Society for the Study of Life. Mrs. Hensley described as such a one as might be seen at the play French ball, she thought, who she had never seen before. She described the staircase scene, and repeated the conversation between Jean and Sapho.

After some further testimony the case was adjourned until Thursday morning.

CABMEN WANT A SHOW. Their Rights in a Test Case Will Be Settled by a Police Test Case.

The Police Commissioners, at a meeting held yesterday afternoon, decided to enter a test case under the bylaw which was drawn up to prevent cabmen from soliciting passengers at the Union-st. station. The matter was brought up by several cabbies, who complained that Constable Pogue had acted on many occasions to their disadvantage.

In the interests of the Vernal Cab and Baggage Transfer Co., the policeman claimed he thought under a recent judgment of the Divisional Court only officials of the company were allowed to solicit passengers. The cabbies, however, in reviewing the court's ruling, Judge Douglas said he had referred to runners on the train, and the cabmen went away satisfied that the policeman had been misled.

VERY SLICK BUSINESS. Sherlock Charged with Blackmail Over the New City Hall Building, Sent Up for Trial.

Charged with having attempted to steal \$3000 from Joseph Wright of the Bennett & Wright Co., James Sherlock, 72 Dundas-st. E., appeared in the Police Court yesterday, and was committed for trial. Wright told in detail the story of Sherlock's alleged attempt at blackmail. Sherlock claimed he was in possession of certain information regarding alleged departures from the city hall by the planning in North York City Hall, and wanted \$5000 as the price of his silence. The magistrate asked Wright how he knew the information. Sherlock testified he had holes cut in the wall of the building which was attached to a tube, with a short-handled clerk at the other end.

MARRIED IN SWELL CHURCH. Miss Edie Dunsmuir of British Columbia Wedded to a Naval Officer.

London, Feb. 22.—Naval Commander Arthur Gough-Cathorpe and Miss Edie Dunsmuir, daughter of the late Hon. Robert Dunsmuir of Victoria, B. C., were married to-day at St. George's, Hanover Square. The Bishop of British Columbia officiated at the ceremony.
