REAL WINTER PORT DEVELOPMENT HAS BEGUN

HOW EDITOR MACDONALD OF THE TORONTO GLOBE HANDLED GEO. E. FOSTER

Foster's Record Held Up to the Gaze of All Honest Canadians—"A Discredited Financier, an Intriguer and a Political Suicide" Says Mr. MacDonald.

(Toronto News, Conservative.) The feast of Mr. W. H. Shaw's inaugural campaign meeting last night in Wardell's Hall was the attack made by Mr. J. A. Macdonald, editor of The Globe, on Hon. George E. Foster. Mr. Macdonald impugned Mr. Foster's honesty and veracity in the plainest terms stated that he was wholly incapable of showing any gratitude to those who had befriended him, referred to Mr. Foster's connection with the affairs of the Union Trust Co., and concluded with a statement that all of the statements which he and his colleagues had written in The Globe about the member for North Toronto, and which had been characterized by that man as lies, were true, every one of them were prepared to stick by what they had said. "Mr. Foster and Mr. Shaw," he said, "are men both of whom are well-known to you, and it is not necessary for me to make any comparison between them to keep personalities out of this campaign, but the Conservatives have chosen to make the campaign one of slander and a dealing in personalities, and this has caused a change in my plans. Mr. Foster has seen fit to address his attack to me, and it would be very neglectful on my part if I ignored him. A few nights ago Mr. Wright said that I would not fight Mr. Foster on his dung-hill. Now, that is all very elegant and very savory, but it describes reasonably well the situation. The words are true. I will not fight Mr. Foster on his dung-hill so long as he chooses that as his chosen ground for the fight. And that is his chosen ground in the present election campaign. It is his chosen ground, and he has had legal aid and the politics of the land, and he and his companions have spent their time in gathering together the muck and the scandal that they could lay their hands on, and under the muck heap Mr. Foster has hoped to hide his own damaged reputation. BALKAN WAR CLOUD IS PASSING OVER

This is the Opinion of British Officialdom—At the Same Time Servian Minister of War Says Hostilities can Hardly be Avoided.

Belgrade, Oct. 10.—Even in official circles it is now believed that war is unavoidable. M. Pasic, minister of war, in an interview with the Associated Press correspondent, declared the situation most critical, adding: "Hostilities can hardly be avoided." A big mass meeting was held this morning, after which the demonstrators marched to the Skupstina, the members of which are assembling, clamoring for the feeling among the members of the assembly is apparently warlike. The news that the Austrian monitors, which are coming down the Danube, are beginning to alarm the people. Kestine, Montenegro, Oct. 10.—Prince Nicholas yesterday issued a manifesto, stating that "As today the terms of the treaty of Belgrade are infringed, and the obligations of Bosnia and Herzegovina are being violated, the Serbian government, in accordance with article 20 of this treaty, feels itself bound to force upon the Austro-Hungarian government the fulfilment of its obligations, and that she is prepared for eventualities should the Skupstina today declare war or make an aggressive move. The fifteenth Austro-Hungarian Army Corps occupied the frontier along the Danube and a fleet of river gunboats is concentrating at Semlin. Semlin is a Hungarian town on the Danube directly opposite Belgrade and connected with the Serbian capital by a bridge. France is using her utmost endeavor at Belgrade to restrain King Peter and the Servian Government. Further advice received at the foreign office indicate that the excitement among the population of Montenegro also is at fever heat, but there is no confirmation of the many alarming rumors published in the Paris newspapers this morning.

BERLIN GREETED MR. MACKENZIE KING Four Thousand People Heard his Spirit Address Last Night. Berlin, Oct. 10 (Special).—Four thousand people greeted Mr. Mackenzie King here last night, where he spoke to workmen. Mr. King pointed out at length what the government had done for labor and prophesied that the department of labor would become one of the most important in the government.

MR. FIELDING BACK FROM ONTARIO WITH THE NEWS OF BG LIBERAL VICTORY

Minister of Finance in St. John Today Says Everything Looks Like Success for Laurier.

Hon. W. S. Fielding, minister of finance, passed through the city at noon today, from Ontario, en route to Halifax. The outlook in Canada as a whole was very gratifying to the minister, who predicted that the government victory would be a sweeping one. Every day brought more encouraging reports from all over the country. The conservative slander campaign was fast petering out. One after another of their yarns was punctured and as a whole the people were disgusted with the opposition warfare. Thinking people were taking little stock in Conservative yarns, and the success attending Liberal rule, resulting in the wonderful prosperity and development of Canada, would continue Laurier in power by fully as large a majority as formerly. The efforts of Roblin and his kin were doing more than anything else to assist the Liberal cause. The result in his own constituency, where he was opposed by A. B. Morine, evidently gives the minister small concern, as he treated the matter in a laughing manner.

NEW YORK FISHERMEN MAKE GRUESOME FIND

Bodies of Well Dressed Man and Woman Bound Together With Wire Found Floating in Jamaica Bay, N. Y.

New York, Oct. 10.—A tragic mystery came to light today when the bodies of a well-dressed man and woman, bound together with wire, were found floating in Jamaica Bay. The bodies have not been identified. They were found by two fishermen. Their little motor boat bumped them as they were crossing the bay. Both victims had their valuables intact, the woman's chasteletum being absent from the ship with her, but there was nothing in the possession of either one to aid the police in identification. The bodies are believed to have been in the water about six hours. The man was apparently 45 years old. He was six feet tall and weighs about 200 pounds. The woman apparently was about 35 years of age, and exceptionally good looking. From the manner in which the bodies were bound together and the fact taken, the police are inclined to the belief that the couple committed suicide. To a term of four years in the reformatory the magistrate remanded the prisoner Monday in order to inquire into the lad's surroundings and to notify his father to attend court. In the meanwhile the boy will be confined to a separate cell.

TEN YEAR OLD BOY IS CHARGED WITH THEFT

Frank Keeffe Arraigned on Suspicion of Stealing Money and Cigars.

In the juvenile court this morning before Magistrate Ritchie, Frank Keeffe a ten year old boy was arraigned on suspicion of stealing \$1.00 and a quantity of cigars from a shop at Adelaide Road, occupied by Mrs. James Magee and also pilfering a bronze watch from William White. The young criminal tearfully admitted committing the thefts. He stated that he had attended school for one week only since the opening of the autumn term having absented himself without permission. His mother is confined to the Provincial Hospital for nervous disease and the boy boards with his father, who by occupation is a bartender. Yesterday he entered the store while the proprietor was engaged in the rear and pilfered 75 cents from the till and 14 cigars from a box on the counter and eluding Mrs. Magee, who appeared on the scene, he escaped from the shop with the booty. White was a roommate of his father's in a boarding house and when both were absent the lad extracted the tin-pieces from some wearing apparel. NORTH END YOUNG WOMAN IS STRANGELY AFFLICTED

Miss Godard at 20 Douglas Avenue Suffering From Acromegaly or Bone Swelling has not Tasted Food for 38 Days.

Without food for thirty-eight days and still able to be about and in apparently strong condition, is the record of a St. John lady, Miss Godard, daughter of John V. Godard, 20 Douglas Avenue. Miss Godard is not fasting as the result of a water bug is compelled to do so on account of being afflicted with an ailment that is very rare and which is baffling to the best physicians in the world today. The name given for it is Acromegaly or a swelling of the bones. Miss Godard has been afflicted for the last three years and it was on the advice of Philadelphia specialists whom she consulted that she has been abstaining from food and she has yet two days to go before she will eat again, having started to fast September 1. All that has passed Miss Godard's lips is a few spoonfuls of water. A person afflicted with Acromegaly feels it by the sudden apparent tightening of the boots or gloves. Then the lips and nose become larger, the eyebrows protrude and the features become large. Miss Godard is able to be out and walks as briskly as if she were in perfect health.

DR. PUGSLEY WILL HAVE MAJORITY OF 1,000 OVER MACRAE IN THIS COUNTY

Evidences of What the Minister of Public Works is Doing for His Constituents Show why He Should be Returned.

With nomination day only about one week away and election in a fortnight the Liberal workers are feeling very confident of rolling up a big majority for their ticket. In all the city wards there are reports of gains being made of former conservative supporters. In Wellington ward a former staunch conservative who has always taken a prominent part in the work of the ward for the opposition has announced his intention to support Messrs. Pugsley and Pender. He says he feels that they are the men who can do the most good for St. John and he feels it his duty to give them his vote. He also tells of some ten or twelve friends, likewise opposition voters in the past, who will support the government standard-bearers in the coming election. An indication of the feeling toward the county situation is illustrated in a bet that was made yesterday, \$40 being wagered against \$2 that Dr. Pugsley would be returned. The conservatives will not bet against Dr. Pugsley unless they get big odds. From every parish in the county come reports of big liberal gains and the prediction is made that the minister will come out of the county with at least 600 of a lead over Dr. MacRae. The vote in the city will increase this to about 1000. An announcement that will be of great interest to fishermen in the county is that shad hatcheries are likely to be established at Lorneville, Gardner's Creek and St. Martins. The shad fisheries commission which is meeting here this afternoon will be in Lorneville Monday night and it is understood that among the recommendations which they will make to the government will be that hatcheries be built at the places mentioned. It will be of interest to fishermen also to know that on the representation of the minister of public works, the minister of marine and fisheries has changed the legal size limit of lobsters in St. John county to the same size as in Charlotte county. The size limit in this county has heretofore been 10 inches while Charlotte county it has been 9 inches. This has caused a good deal of dissatisfaction among the fishermen and they will be pleased to learn that the change has been made to legalize the taking of lobsters of 9 inches in length. It has also been arranged on Hon. Mr. Pugsley's recommendation that a new post office be established at Red Head. The name of the present post office there has been changed to Little River and the new one will be designated Red Head. John Wilson has been appointed postmaster of the new office. The minister returned last evening from his trip to St. Martins and Great Salmon River and he feels much gratified with the magnificent reception accorded him. Next week the minister will address a meeting in the Opera House on Tuesday evening when Hon. Charles Macrae will also be a speaker. On Wednesday the 14th, Dr. Pugsley will speak in Campbellton. On Thursday the 15th he will address a meeting in Fairville, along with Hon. H. A. McKewen and James Lowell and on Friday the 17th he will be in Lorneville and will discuss the issues of the campaign before the electors in that district. James Lowell, M.P.P., and W. B. Wallace will also speak. Later the minister will probably address meetings in Gardner's Creek and Ditter Harbour.

ROAD RACES WILL FINISH ABOUT 4.30

The contestants in both races finish the run by going three laps on the athletic grounds. A large crowd is present watching the other events.

RECORD CROWDS TO SEE BIG BALL GAME

Enthusiastic Baseball Fans Own Detroit—Many Men Went Breakfastless to Secure Seats for the First Championship Game With Chicago Today.

Detroit, Mich., Oct. 10.—Incoming trains today brought crowds of baseball enthusiasts bent on witnessing the first of the struggles between the Detroit and Chicago teams for the championship of the world. They were a brave and confident minority, which flaunted "Cub" banners amidst the multitude of "Tiger" emblems displayed by a no less confident majority. Before daylight the enthusiasts began forming in line before the ticket windows at Bennett Park, waiting for the sale of general admission tickets to open up at 9 o'clock. Many who had no breakfast at home, munched sandwiches and still had enough left to carry for luncheon at noon. They were taking no chances. All of the reserved seats for today's game were sold within two hours yesterday, leaving hundreds of would-be purchasers unsatisfied. Many of these were to be found in the less ambitious line today. Expressions of gratification were heard on every hand that both teams were in excellent condition, and fit to play the best baseball of their individual careers. The list of injured is fortunately short. Catcher Schmidt, of Detroit, donned his uniform despite a finger, the condition of which would have kept a less plucky player from playing. No less sporty was the conduct of shortstop O'Leary, who injured a badly bruised thumb. Capt. Chance showed no effects of the blow which he received in the neck at New York, except in the kindness and faithfulness of his voice. Shortstop Bush, whose sensational work as a vital factor in Detroit's final dash for the pennant, was unhappy. He was ineligible to play, having joined the club too late in the season. 



ELECT PENDER TO STRENGTHEN PUGSLEY'S HANDS

BAXTER'S DREDGING CHARGES ARE COMPLETELY SHATTERED BY MR. PUGSLEY IN GREAT SPEECH

ALL INDICATIONS ARE THAT THE LIBERALS WILL SWEEP THE WHOLE DOMINION ON THE ELECTION DAY

Minister of Public Works Attends Launching of a Barge at Great Salmon River and Comes Away Assured of the Solid Support of the Whole Community—A Splendid Meeting.

Great Salmon River, St. John county, Oct. 9.—The mills of the Bay Shore Lumber Company here, were closed today and a general holiday was observed to celebrate the launching of a barge. Hon. William Pugsley, minister of public works, drove from St. Martins in the morning, and was present at the ceremony. In the afternoon an open air meeting was held and the minister delivered an eloquent and telling address on the issues of the campaign. The meeting was attended not only by the employees of the company, but by many farmers and residents of the surrounding country, and the greatest enthusiasm prevailed.

A striking feature of the gathering was a speech by Daniel S. Cowles, of Brunswick (Me.), president of the company, who, after paying a tribute to the ability and high reputation of Dr. Pugsley, asked his men to give the minister their hearty support. Ora P. King, of Sussex, also made a stirring speech in which he exposed the false canvases of the opposition. A significant incident occurred last evening at a meeting held by Dr. A. W. MacRae, the opposition candidate. After he had spent the day in canvassing, he was given the use of the hall where he proposed to deliver an address. On his arrival he found a fair sized audience prepared to listen to him, but no chairman. Despite all his efforts he failed to discover a supporter who would introduce him to the audience. At length Capt. David Tutts, who is well known as a strong supporter of Dr. Pugsley and Liberal principles, in order to relieve Dr. MacRae's embarrassment, consented to take the chair, and the meeting proceeded. It is almost needless to say it was devoid of enthusiasm. The settlement can be counted on to vote Liberal almost to a man.

The launch of the large tug took place at 10.45 and in the presence of a large crowd. Dr. Pugsley, who was accompanied by W. G. Scott and Councillor F. M. Cochran, arrived a few minutes before the time, and was an interested spectator. As the barge slid gracefully down the ways, both the Liberal and the Tory supporters, who were present, broke a bottle of champagne over the bows and the trim looking craft went the water amid hearty cheers. The building of the barge was begun last fall, and when launched this morning was ready to join the company's fleet in transporting pulp wood to Bath (Me.). She is 180 feet over all with 38 feet beam, and a 12 foot hold.

The barge was designed by W. R. Huntley, of Parrisboro (N. S.), and was constructed under the superintendence of Albert Paterson, of St. Martins. She is classed twelve years in the Bureau Veritas and is the second barge which has been successfully launched from the company's ways here.


After inspecting the plant, Dr. Pugsley and his friends were entertained at a lunch and then returned to the hall where an address was given by the minister. He was well received and his speech was listened to with interest. He was then taken to the open air and tables and chairs were placed for the speakers on the rising ground outside the building.

Mr. Connelly briefly introduced Dr. Pugsley, referring, amid laughter, to the unfortunate predicament of Dr. MacRae on the previous evening.

Dr. Pugsley, on rising, was given round after round of applause. He was glad, he said, to hear that his opponent had been courteously received and given a good hearing and that his good friends, Capt. Tutts, had come to his rescue and taken the chair. He had been endeavoring to find out since his arrival among them what policy Dr. MacRae had told them the Conservatives would bring into force if they came into power but no one seemed able to tell him. (Much laughter.)

He then went on to refer to his appointment as minister of public works and said so far in this campaign he had observed no criticism of whatever he had done in connection with his department. He had to deal with upwards of a thous-

PREPARING ST. JOHN FOR GREAT INCREASE OF TRADE; NEW DOCKS IN HARBOR AND COURTENAY BAY



As will be seen by the accompanying cut, big improvements and extensions of St. John harbor facilities for handling the traffic of the Dominion are to be made and not only is it planned to enlarge the wharf accommodation in St. John harbor proper, but Courtenay Bay is to be equipped and before long it may be expected that here will be the terminus of the G. T. P. Railway.

The matter has been actively forwarded by Hon. William Pugsley, minister of public works and tenders for the dredging necessary have already been called for by him.

In speaking of the plan, Dr. Pugsley said "The plan shows pretty clearly what is proposed. The plan was prepared by Louis Coste, C.E., one of the engineers of my department.

"It will be seen that Mr. Coste has adopted the plan of Mr. Sheehan, the resident engineer at St. John, for the development of the West Side. As to the channel entrance, however, he thinks that it should be dredged to a width of 800 feet. This plan, which, when fully carried out, give thirty additional berths for ocean steamers south of Sand Point. Mr. Coste is of this opinion that we should look forward to exceeding the breakwater to Partridge Island, in order to prevent the dredged channel being filled in by silt. In answer to the objection that the extension of this breakwater would increase the rapidly at the current, he states that if the channel is dredged out to a width of 800 feet the extension of the breakwater would not have this effect.

"The plan shows the proposed dredged channel to Courtenay Bay, and the opportunity on the city side for eleven berths, each 700 feet in length, which would of course accommodate the largest ocean steamers, while in Mr. Coste's opinion there is opportunity in Courtenay Bay for almost indefinite expansion.

"The providing of these facilities will necessarily cost a good deal of money, and the furnishing of them will take considerable time, but with the great development of the west, the early completion of the Grand Trunk Pacific and the avowed determination of that company, as well as the Canadian Pacific, to bring the traffic of the west to Canadian ports, it will not be long before the most extensive terminal facilities which can be provided at St. John and other maritime province ports will be taxed to their capacity in the winter season."

Cheering News From All the Provinces Shows That the Conservatives are Thoroughly Disheartened—People of Canada Will Stand by the Party That is Building Up the Country.

Fredericton, N. B., Oct. 9.—The political campaign in this county is warming up and is certain to reach the boiling point before polling day. X. W. Brown, the Liberal candidate, is gaining ground daily and already has his opponents thoroughly frightened. He is being assisted by a corps of active campaigners and by the political veterans J. D. Phinney, K.C., and Alexander Gibson, C.M.R., and they are perfecting an organization the equal of which the Liberals of the county have not known in recent years.

A pleasant feature of the campaign is the great activity being shown by the young Liberals of the city and adjacent districts. Two weeks ago they organized a club and it already has a membership of 130 with bright prospects of a further increase. Liberals, old and young, are working with enthusiasm and determined to achieve victory.

The Tory leaders of the constituency are at sixes and sevens and there is danger of an open rupture. James K. Pinder, M.P.P., for some reason, will not appear on the same platform with Solicitor-General McLeod, nor will he travel in the same wagon with Dr. Mullin, another Tory stump speaker. As for the political history of the county and it is not much wonder that the Tories are awaiting the outcome of this election with fear and trembling.

Very successful meetings in the Liberal interest were held this evening at Nashuak village and at the Mouth of Keswick. Candidate and Coun. Goodspeed spoke at Nashuak village and J. D. Phinney and J. W. Osborne at Mouth of Keswick.

Tomorrow evening the candidates will hold a joint meeting at Stanley, hitherto the stronghold of Toryism in York, it being looked forward to with great interest by both parties and a number of people from the city will attend.

Woodstock, Oct. 9 (Special).—F. B. Carvell, K.C., has spent the greater part of the week up river and has met with a hearty welcome from the Liberal party as well as receiving many unexpected offers of support from former Conservatives, who on account of Mr. Carvell's splendid record in parliament, his acknowledged ability and undoubted superior qualifications will vote for him on the 29th.

Never in recent years has the Liberal party been so united and confident, while the Conservatives, who went into the campaign at a lively clip, are now decidedly gloomy, their candidate being badly frightened, so much so that he is using all sorts of arguments in the vain efforts to stave off the impending disaster.

One of the most encouraging signs from a Liberal standpoint, is the wonderful enthusiasm on the part of the young men, who in every parish are working with a will.

Tomorrow night the Liberal candidate and County Warden Shaw will speak at Bath. Monday night Mr. Carvell will be at Benton; Wednesday at Mount Pleasant; Thursday at East Florenceville; Friday at Foreston and Saturday at Centreville.

Despite the silly stories in the opposition papers, at which everyone here laughs, Carleton County will surely return Mr. Carvell by the largest majority he has ever received. Everywhere it is the same, scores of recruits are coming into the Liberal ranks, and good judges of the situation predict a veritable landslide. The people in this county are utterly disgusted with the Hazen government's measures, particularly the new road law, and Smith will be sadly handicapped by reason of the record of the government he supported at Fredericton.

St. George, N. B., Oct. 9 (Special).—The enthusiastic meetings held by the Liberals are causing alarm in the Tory camp. Word reached here today that the leaders of the Tory party have instructed the local leaders to use every means to stop the Liberal wave now sweeping over the town and adjoining parishes. Agents have been sent out, evidently with instructions to adopt the Colchester tactics. The Liberals are on the alert and will wait every move.

At the Tory meeting to be held Wednesday night, the local M.P.P. will have a chance to explain to the granite workers his attitude on the compensation act.












TO HOLD POULTRY SHOW

FIRE IN THE WEST SIDE

House on Ludlow St. Owned by William Morrish and Occupied by Geo. W. Pollock Guttered This Morning.

The firemen on the west side were called out about 4 o'clock this morning to fight a rather serious blaze in a two story wooden house on Ludlow street, owned by William Morrish and occupied by George W. Pollock. The house was almost completely gutted, and the firemen, who battled with the flames for about two hours, had much difficulty in preventing adjoining houses from catching fire.

Though it is not definitely known, it is thought the fire was started by hot ashes. The discovery of the blaze was made by Mrs. J. W. Gigger, who lives next. She heard a crackling noise, and on looking out of a window saw the woodshed back of Mr. Pollock's house in a blaze. She immediately aroused Mr. Pollock, who sent in an alarm from box 112 and the firemen quickly responded.

The flames by this time had gotten on the ell of the house and the fire was making great headway. The firemen fought it, from both front and rear, and kept it from spreading to the adjoining houses.

After about two hours' hard work the flames were subdued, but not until the building was about half consumed. It was almost impossible to save any of the furniture and what was not burned was destroyed by the water.

AN INTERESTING GLOBE TROTTER

An Eighteen Year Old Spanish Youth who is Making the World Tour.

An interesting visitor arrived in St. John yesterday on the maritime express, the person of Luis Fernando, of Madrid, Spain. Mr. Fernando is on a tour of the world for a wager and he has almost completed his journey.

Talking with a Times man last evening he said the Spanish government encourages a number of well educated young men to travel extensively each year and to observe what is being done in other countries that they may report on ways in which the Spanish nation may improve.

Mr. Fernando says he made a wager of \$5,000 against \$25,000 that he would make the world tour inside a period of two and a half years, calling at such places as were designated. He will also receive a gold medal from the Spanish government if he is successful and he has no doubt what ever on that point.

He left Madrid on January 20, 1897, going via the Mediterranean to North and South Africa, Australia, Asia, Europe, South America, the United States and a part of Canada. From here he will go to New York and from there via Washington to British Columbia, and thence to California, sailing from San Francisco for Madrid on February 23. He has about ten months yet before his time expires, but a portion of the time will be taken up on his arrival in Spain in getting a very voluminous report prepared in order that he can qualify for the winning of the wager.

He has in his possession 2,500 letters which he has received from consuls and majors in different cities of 10,000 or over, of a population.

A brother and a cousin of Mr. Fernando started out previous to his departure, to make the same kind of a trip but both died in Russia. Mr. Fernando says his father and a number of friends tried to persuade him not to attempt the trip but he was determined to go.

He confesses to being only 18 years of age and will celebrate his 19th birthday on the 25th of the present month. He is rather short, of a swarthy complexion and a very pleasant and genial disposition. He talks six or seven languages and has a very good mastery of English. His father holds the title of colonel in the Spanish army and fought in the Spanish-American war.

While in Rome Mr. Fernando was received in audience by His Holiness the Pope, and was allowed to kiss the papal ring and received a rosary from the pontiff.

While in the United States he met Taft and Bryan the rival presidential candidates. He thought from what he could gather that Taft would be selected, but says Bryan is one of the greatest talkers he ever heard.

He says he feels a little homesick sometimes but he is determined to complete his trip as mapped out. He is stopping while in the city at the Edward Hotel.

TREED BY A MOOSE

Howard Lingley, of Lingley station, had a very exciting experience yesterday while out moose hunting near his home. He secured a fine big bull, weighing 800 pounds, with an antler spread of 54 inches. The exciting part of the sport was when the animal charged on the hunter and forced him to take to a tree for safety. From his place of vantage in the tree, Mr. Lingley was enabled to put a shot into the moose that finished his playful antics.
