FLOUR MERCHANTS ARE PROTESTING

Rebates on Flour Shipments Through Halifax have been

(Halifax Chronicle)

The flour merchants of Halifax are up in arms over a recent action by the Intercolonial. A few days ago they received a circular stating that the furtherance rates on shipments of flour through Halifax to Louisburg, Port Morien, Glace Bay and the Sydneys had been cancelled. These rates have been in force some years to meet the competition via Boston. The withdrawal, they state, practically makes it impossible to handle shipments of flour for these Cape Breton ports through Halifax, and will have the tendency of diventing the traffic through the port of Boston. The merchants feel that they are unjustly dealt with, as furtherance rates are in force from Sydney, Pictou, St. John and other ports, and they argue that the L. C. R. in withdrawing the furtherance rates is discriminating against the trade here. There has been no action taken as yet, but the merchants directly concerned propose taking vigorous measures to have the rates restored.

The Chronicle learned from a gentleman interested in the matter, that the furtherance rate is really the simple question of rebate. For instance, the rate from Chatham, Ont. to Halifax, would be 21 cents per hundredweight. This the consignee pays when he receives the goods. He can hold these goods over in Halifax for a period, and then send them to Sydney. He will then receive—under the furtherance and rebate system—what may be called a discount of 5 1-2 cents. If this arrangement is cancelled, the inconvenience, those interested say, is obvious.





FAST ATLANTIC MAILS

(Halifax Chronicle).

Now that public opinion is apparently beginning to appreciate the important of maintaining Canada's prestige in this matter of trans-Atlantic mail carisge, we trust that the agitation will be continued until a service that will fairly meet the requirements of the country is provided. That the present arrangement is—very far from adequate, or even satisfactory to the port which derives the most benefit therefron, is quite apparent. The Allan line has monopolized the British mail contract for many years, and, until quite recently, the service given by that company was not worth the money expended upon it. During the present season the two turbine steamers of the Allan line in conjunction with the Emprese boats of the C. P. R., have been carrying the mails, and delivery has been much more regular and quicker than hitherto. The recent request of the Montreal produce merchants that an additional mail be sent on Saturday by the Dominion Line has called attention to the desirability of a change in the present method of subsidizing mail steamers. The suggestion has been made that instead of giving one company, as at present, an exclusive contract, the subsidy should be givsuggestion has been made that instead of giving one company, as at present, an exclusive contract, the subsidy should be given to the fastest and best steamers available. This is the plan adopted with the boats sailing from New York, and we have no doubt that a similar arrangement for the payment of our trans-Atlantic mail subsidies would result in a distinct improvement in the service. This is not, as the Montreal Star claims, a "new proposal." The Chronicle has more than once pointed out the undoubted advantage of such an arrangement and, if we mistake rot, recommendations along that line bave been made by members of the Halifax rot, recommendations along that line have been made by members of the Halifax Board of Trade. Be that as it may, the proposal, we think, is feasible and reasonable. If the subsidy were given to the fastest boats available, with the option of using the shortest practicable ocean route. Canada, we believe, would very soon obtain a mail service equal in point of quickness of delivery to that via New York.






