

At Chemiel the enemy was repulsed with heavy losses, but along the left bank of the Vieprz, lafter a stubborn fight, he succeeded in advancing in this district. One division which captured Travniki and subsequently got beyond there, crossing to the right bank of the Vieprz. "On the Bug in the Sokal region, the enemy was repulsed from two lines of trenches. We captured 1,000 prisoners and four maxims. "At Kamionka, an Austrian attack was repulsed. It may even be some days before the Teutons occupy the Polish capital, for the Russians are fighting more than a rear guard action. In fact they are still delivering very heavy blows at their opponents, and are gaining some local successes, particularly on the Narew and southeast of Choim, where they are opposing the efforts of the Austrians to get across the Bug river. However, military critics say that these local successes will not affect the Russian-plan of falling back to a shorter and stronger front. Rome, July 30, via Paris, 5.45 a.m.—An attempt was made by a squadron of Austrian cruisers and a flotilla of torpede boat destroyers resterday to recapture the Austrian island of Pelagosa, in the Adviraitc, which was toccupied by Italian naval forces last Monday, according to an official communication isued today by the Italian ministry of marine. The attack was repulsed, the statement adds, and some members of the Austrian landing party were forced to swim to their ships.

Geneva, July 30-A telegram to the Tribune from Liabach in Carniola, says:

"The Austrians attacked the Italians at Gorizia with 170,000 men, including 30,000 Bavarians, on the night of July 28, with disastrous results. The Aus trian losses numbered 12,000.

London, July 20—(Correspondence)—Officers casualty lists for the fortnight ended July 19, show that the British army lost 196 killed, 407 wounded, and 46 missing, a total of 649. Since the beginning of the war, the total officers' casual-ties amount to 13,291 of whom 4,061 have been killed or died of wounds, 8,069 ties amount to 13,291 of whom 4,061 have been killed or died of wounds, 8,069 wounded, and 1,161 are reported to be missing. During the fortnight officers casualties have been heaviest amongst those regiments participating in the Dardanelles fighting, the Cameronians (Territor-ials), having four killed, 18 wounded, and 20 missing; Royal Scots, (Territorials), 20 killed, 24 wounded, nine missing; Australians, 15 killed, 24 wounded; New Zealands, three killed, 19 wounded, and Royal Engineers, five killed and 18

wounded. The Indian contingent suffered to the extent of 20 killed and 46 wounded the Lancashire regiments lost 12 killed and 20 wounded, and the Royal Field Artillery had three killed and 15 wounded.

Gold does not tarnish and the fixtures will not, therefore, need to be polished, but simply to be wiped with a dry soft cloth. This prevents the marring or discoloring of the wood in which the fixture is set. For the side lights in many of the rooms the brack-ets are of solid brass, gold plated. In the dining room they are silver plated on white metal. All radiators are con-cealed inside the panched sections below he windows, the he scaping through grated openings. Ou ide the paneling there is a little button at the end of a iny brass handle not more than an inch long. This turns in a circle from one to another of four diminutive brass knobs no larger than shoe buttons. This ittle brass handle makes it possible to regulate the valve which admits steam to the radiator so that on can have four different amounts of heat. The casement window above the radi-stor is another feature. In the wooden frame next to the casing there is a gold plated lever. When the lever is turned upward, the entire window moves up an inch, which brings it clear of the window sill. The usual knobs, also gold plated, are then turned and the casement opens quite according to the poetic tradition. In the dining room, mersuring about twenty by twenty-eight fee, the walls are solid paneled with five-ply veneer wood to prevent warp-ing or splitting, the walls are painted with nine coals of paint as carefully as the work of finishing an automobile body is done.
