JACKSONTOWN, Monday, 5th July, 1847.

Introductory Sermon preached by Elder Samuel Robinson, from the 9th chapter of Ecclesiastes, 10th verse,—"Whatsoever thy hand findeth to do, do it with thy might," &c.

After which, upon motion of Elder J. Francis, seconded by Elder J. Marsters, it was

RESOLVED, That the time has arrived when it appears to be expedient, in the opinion of this Body, that the New Brunswick Baptist Association should be divided.

After a long and friendly discussion, the Resolution was passed by a large majority, whereupon it was

RESOLVED, That all the Delegates who can assemble at 8 o'clock to-morrow morning, form a Committee to take the necessary preliminary steps for carrying the above Resolution into effect.

The Report and Accounts of the General Missionary Board and the various Local Boards were then read, and the Committee on Domestic Missions reported as follows:—

That this Committee recommend, that a special effort be made to station a Missionary at the Grand Falls of the River Saint John, for one year; And further, if possible, that two Missionaries be sustained in the Northern Counties of the Province for the same time.

RESOLVED, That the Reports be received, and the following Local Boards be appointed for the ensuing year:—

Saint John Board.—John Smith, Thomas Lockey, George A. Garrison, N. S. Demill, James Brayley, Moses Lawrence, Alex. McL. Scely, Robert Stevens, C. D. Everitt, Samuel Spillard, J. P. Wills, W. Buchanan, W. Hayward,—with all the Pastors in Saint John and its vicinity.

Fredericton Board.—Elders Charles Spurden, Samuel Elder; Brethren W. S. Estey, Z. G. Gabel, S. W. Babbit, James F. Gale, W. F. Barker, James P. A. Phillips, James C. Watson, and David Richards.

Charlotte Board.—Brethren P. Seely, J. McLeod, J. Walker, J. Russel, G. Hopps, R. Brockway, B. Williams, J. Davidson, and M. Young,—with all the Ministers who attend the Quarterly Meetings in the County.

Pledges were made for the support of a Missionary during one year at the Grand Falls, with the understanding that the nomination of the person be approved by the parties contributing, each one paying one-tenth of the deficiency.—Elder S. Robinson, Very, McDonald, G. Miles, J. H. Tupper, E. J. Harris, Duval, W. H. Beckwith.

The following persons pledge themselves to meet the deficiency in sustaining a Missionary at the Bay de Chaleur—Brethren Francis, Miles, and Fitch, one-fifth each; Brethren John Magee, D. Crandal, and W. Caldwell, one-twentieth; Brother Hayward, £3.

The following Brethren were nominated to meet the Committee on the Christian Messenger, to consider the expediency of commencing a cheap Religious Periodical in the Province:—J. Ring, Phillips, Beckwith, Bunting, and E. Stronach.

TUESDAY.

Met pursuant to adjournment.

After discussion, in Committee, respecting the most eligible line of division, it was

RESOLVED, That the line of division run from the Harbor of St. John up the River to the Jemseg, through the Grand Lake and along Salmon River to Richibucto; and that the Churches in the City of St. John and its suburbs be included in the Association on the Western bank of the River St. John.

That the Churches comprised in the section along the shore of the

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Bay of Fundy to Nova Scotia, be called the Eastern New Bruns-wick Baptist Association; and that the Churches comprised in the other section of the Province, comprising the St. John Churches, those in Charlotte County, and the other Churches in the West and North-West of the line, be called the Western New Brunswick Baptist Association.

A Committee of nomination was then appointed, who advised that the Western Association meet in St. George on the first Saturday in September, 1848; that Brother Samuel Elder preach the Sermon, and in case of failure, Brother E. J. Harris; that Elder A. McDonald write the Circular Letter; and that Brethren Thompson, Hall, and Thomas Magee, be appointed to nominate Committees and make all necessary preparation for the orderly meeting of the Body.

A similar Committee recommended, that the Eastern Association be held at Moncton on the third Monday after the 20th June; that Brother Francis preach the Introductory Sermon, and in case of failure, Brother Blakeney; and that Brother Parker write the Circular Letter.—Committee of Arrangement, Elder J. Crandal and J. Francis.

The Committee to examine the Circular Letter gave in their Report; the Letter was then read, and it was unanimously resolved, that it be adopted, and printed in the Minutes.

Elder W. G. Parker then preached from 3d chapter, 1st Epistle of John, 3d verse. Adjourned till 2 c'clock, P. M.

Met pursuant to adjournment.

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Prayer by Elder McDonald.

The Committee on special business reported, that they have considered the request of the Church of Simonds, and advise that the Church obtain Ministers to attend to the Ordination of Brother G. Estabrooks, at their own place.

They also recommend, respecting the request of the Church at Woodstock, that the Association appoint a number of Ministers to sit with them in Council immediately on leaving the Association, and would recommend the following Brethren:—J. Francis, A. D. Thompson, J. Walker, A. McDonald, and Saunders.

Respecting the case of Brother Matthew Smith, they advise that his Ordination be postponed for the present.

They further recommend, that when Edward McGinnis shall be licensed to preach the Gospel by the Church to which he belongs, with the advice and concurrence of three ordained Ministers, this Association will receive him as a licenced Minister into the Body.

IT WAS RESOLVED, That the above report be adopted.

The Committee on the Christian Messenger, and the publication of a cheap periodical in New Brunswick, after hearing a communication from the Editors of the Christian Messenger, report as follows:

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That this Association gratefully acknowledge the obligations of the Denomination to the Editors of the Christian Messenger, for their long continued and highly useful labors in conducting that excellent Periodical; but at the same time this Committee are impressed with the necessity which exists in this Province for a cheap Periodical to meet the wants of the Province, and recommend, that a Committee be appointed to correspond with the Editors of the Christian Messenger, on the best possible way to effect that object without injury to that Paper, and gain all the information they can by the time of the meeting of the Convention; and they further recommend, that Brethren Robinson, Very, and McDonald, form that Committee.

The Committee on Foreign Missions report, That they recommend the Board to follow out the suggestions in reference to an additional Missionary, contained in the Minutes of last year, and report to the Convention.

And further, That the Churches be recommended to make it a subject of earnest prayer to the Lord, that He would direct the minds of the officers of the Foreign Missionary Society in their search after a suitable man.

The above Reports were severally received.

After the Education Society had held its meeting, it was

RESOLVED, That the Report, Accounts, and Resolutions, be received and printed in the Minutes.

The Report of the General Union Society having been read, it was

RESOLVED, That the Report and Accounts be received and printed in the Minutes.

That the following persons be the Board for the ensuing year:—S. Hersey, Treasurer; J. T. Smith, Secretary; S. Gerow, E. Barteau, H. Vaughan, J. Marsters, Joseph Read, J. S. Clark, and A. McL. Seely, with the Ministers and Deacons of the Churches in St. John and Portland, and any Ministers present during the Meetings of the Board.

That this Association earnestly recommend to our Churches, the necessity of supporting our Union Society, believing it admirably adapted to meet the wants of our benevolent institutions, and being convinced that a failure in our Union Society would be ruinous to our denominational interests.

The Committee on Sabbath Schools report, That the Churches and friends of Sabbath Schools be earnestly recommended to carry out the principles and spirit of the Report adopted last year and published in the Minutes of 1846.

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The Committee of Management of the New Brunswick Sabbath School Union, report, That they obtained the services of Elder John Francis, last Fall, in the upper part of the Province, for several weeks. He was engaged as Agent for the New Brunswick Baptist Union Society; and that Society instructed their Agent to form Sabbath Schools where there were none, and to visit and encourage them where they existed. Brother Francis attended to their instructions, and we have reason to believe he rendered much useful service to the Sabbath School Society.

This Spring the Committee employed Brother Richard Crabb, a Colporteur, about to travel through the Province, to sell religious books and tracts, to act as Agent for the Sablath School Union. He has spent many months in travelling through King's, Queen's, and Westmorland Counties. All this amount of labor your Committee obtained gratuitously from the above named Brethren, no funds having been put into their hands to remunerate an Agent.

Your Committee would recommend, that the Agent of the Union Society do continue at all times to act in behalf of the Sabbath School Union, in forming Schools where none exist, collecting monies to supply such Schools with Books, and attend to matters connected with Sabbath Schools generally. And also that a Depository be provided for our Churches, Ministers, and Sabbath Schools.

RESOLVED, That the 1st day of January be recommended to the Churches to be set apart as a day of humiliation, fasting and prayer.

ORDERED, That the expences for correspondence to promote the

interest of the Body be paid for out of the general Fund.

That Elder E. D. Very be appointed to represent this Association in the next Washington Association, and that three pounds be allowed to defray expences.

That this Association, rejoicing in the facilities for obtaining books, afforded by Brethren Very and Spaulding, who will continue to furnish them at the publishing price in Boston, would strongly recommend the Ministers to promote a spirit of reading among the members of the Churches.

ORDERED, That Elder Samuel Robinson be the Delegate to the Eastern New Brunswick Association, and in case of failure, Elder G. F. Miles.

A Committee to prepare a correct list of Ministers and Licentiates, was appointed, consisting of Elders J. Magee, W. D. Fitch, and G. F. Miles.

The Delegation to attend the Conference of the Free-Will Baptist Body, report, That there was a mutual manifestation of kindly feeling, but the Committee appointed by that Body, to confer with the Brethren, thought a Union was at present impracticable.

At 10 o'clock, according to the arrangement of a special Committee, the recognition of the Rev. J. Read, as a Minister of the Body, was attended to, and as the service was one of more than ordinary interest, a slight sketch of the proceedings will be found in the Appendix.

The Ordination of Brother Gideon Estabrooks, as Pastor of the Church at Simonds, was attended to, according to the request of that Church, and in conformity with a vote of the Association passed subsequently to the reception of the Report of the Committee on special business.

The Committee appointed last year to take steps in order to excite more extensively a taste for useful reading, &c., report, That they consider the Colporteur system the one best adapted to accomplish that object, and have procured the services of a good Brother, named Richard Crabb, who has been provided with a suitable establishment and large quantities of Bibles, Testaments, Tracts, Books, &c., for supplying Sabbath Schools and families, and would recommend this Body to adopt him as their Colporteur, and to appoint a Committee for the purpose of carrying this resolution into effect.

The Report was received, and Elders Very, McDonald, and Francis, with Brethren Seely and Demill, were nominated as that Committee.

ORDERED, That the Minutes for 1846, which are on hand, be given to the Colporteur for sale at three pence each.

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That the Board of the Union Society apply to the American and Foreign Bible Society for whatever number of English Bibles and Testaments their constitution will allow them to send.

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That Brethren E. D. Very, and N. S. Demill, be a Committee of correspondence with the Rev. Mr. Cramp, of Montreal, respecting the Swiss Mission.

That a Ministerial Meeting be held at the First Church, St. John, on Thursday the 16th September.

The Harvey Church having applied for a Council, Elders Francis and McDonald were appointed, with power to add to their number; and it was

RESOLVED, That when all parties concur in summoning a Council, and agree to abide by their decision, that decision shall be decisive, and it is expected that the expences of the Delegation be paid by the parties.

The Committee, on request of Convention, to consider the subject of more united action in relation to Domestic Missions and Education, recommend that the subject be allowed to remain in its present position. Recommendation adopted.

ORDERED, That the balance in the hands of the Treasurer of the General Missionary Board, £4 4s. 1d., together with that in the hands of the Treasurer of the Westmorland Board, £6 19s. 10½d., and also the funds unexpended by the Charlotte Board, £17 17s. 1d., be all added to the funds collected at this Association, and after the payment of the various sums voted by this Association, that the remainder be divided among the St. John, Fredericton, Westmorland, and Charlotte Boards.

RESOLVED UNANIMOUSLY, That the thanks of this Association are due, and are hereby tendered, to the members of the Church and friends in Jacksontown, and to the Brethren and friends in Woodstock, generally, for their hospitality and kindness to the Ministers and Messengers of the Churches.

The Association then adjourned to meet, respectively, at Moncton on the Third Monday after the 20th of June, and at Saint George on the First Monday in September, 1848.

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CIRCULAR LETTER,

To the New Brunswick Baptist Association, convened at Jac :sontown, on the 5th July, 1847.

DEAR BRETHREN,—The subject to which we would call your attention in this Letter, is, the present spiritual condition of our Churches, the manifest declension of piety which so generally prevails, and which demands our serious consideration. The reflections we purpose to make on this subject will lead us to mention the causes of this declension, and to suggest

the employment of such means as may result in the revival of religion.

It is a lamentable fact that a decline of religion has spread, during the few past years, over the Churches of Christ, both in Europe and America. Our own Province mourns under its influence, and we cannot shut our eyes to the melancholy truth that the most of our Churches have declined very far from their former state of piety and prosperity. How strongly was this painful fact written in the letters which were read at the last annual meeting of this Association! How general was the complaint they uttered of the decay of religious feeling, the prevalence of a worldly spirit among professions of religion, the defection of many from the truth, and the absence of those gracious and heavenly influences which are essential to the preservation and revival of godliness, and to the conversion of sinners! Alas! how mournfully evident is it that the glory has departed from many of our Churches, and that coldness, indifference, and the want of spiritual comfort, have succeeded, in too many instances, to the zeal, the love, and joy of former years!

But is there not a cause—rather, are there not many causes—to which this sad declension may be attributed? In enumerating the principal of these causes, we are aware, brethren, that our remarks will not wear the garb of novelty; we do but remind you of truths already well known, and often discussed; but we wish "to stir up your pure minds by way of remember the strength of the st brance,"—to recal to mind duties too often forgotten and departed from in practice, and the neglect of which involves the greater guilt, inasmuch as we have professed to be well

acquainted with their nature.

1. The disuse of prayer, especially of private prayer, is doubtless one of the most evident causes of the decay of piety.

There is a divinely established relation between the faithful discharge of the duty of prayer, and the enjoyment of spiritual blessings. They stand and fall together, so that if the duty is sincerely performed, the blessings certainly follow, according to the unchangeable law and promise of God; while, on the other hand, if prayer is restrained, the life and power of religion is sure to decline. God has taught us that he "will be enquired of by his people to do those things which he has promised;" and it would be presumptuous to expect him to be you when we fail to solicit them. "Ask and it shall be given upon us the gifts of his grace, when we fail to solicit them. "Ask, and it shall be given you; seek, and ye shall find; knock, and it shall be opened; for every one that asketh receiveth; and he that seeketh findeth; and to him that knocketh, it shall be opened." "If ye, then, being evil, know how to give good gifts unto your children, how much more shall your Father which is in Harvey give good gifts unto your children, how much more shall your Father which is in Harvey give good gifts unto your children, how much more shall your Father which is in Heaven give good things to them that ask him ?" Such is the doctrine taught us by the Saviour, in reference to the connection between prayer and the reception of heavenly blessings. Many other passages of scripture might be cited in confirmation of it, but we have only space to advance one more: "But thou, when thou prayest, enter into the closet, and when thou hast shut thy door, pray to the Father which is in secret, and the Father which seeth in secret shall reward thee openly."

After reflecting on the meaning of these words, can we doubt that there exists, and has existed for some time, in our Churches, a deplorable neglect of prayer—especially of secret prayer? When God has promised to answer the requests of his people by conferring on them the richest gifts, when the Lord Jesus Christ has solemnly given us the same promise, saying, the Variety Lord way whatever we shall sele the Father in my name, he will give it you. "Verily I say unto you, whatsoever ye shall ask the Father in my name, he will give it you, why is it that we mourn the absence of revivals among the people of God, and of conversions among sinners? There is but one answer to the question, and we may give it in the words of the Lord to his ancient people, "But thou hast not called upon me, O Jacob; but thou hast been weary of me, O Israel." Yes, brethren, too much of the lukewarmness, the worldliness, the departures from God, which mark the present state of the greater number of our Churches, is attributable to the prevalence of a prayerless spirit. The closet, the cecret sanctuary, where communion with Heaven has been enjoyed in other days, is now forsaken. The voice of prayer, the breathings of holy desire, have ceased to ascend to "the throne of the heavenly grace;" and the consequences have been that fervent love, and hope, and peace, have deserted the hearts of multitudes of professed Christians, and they have proceeded step by step in the path of the backslider, till they are at a great distance from the Cross of Christ. To the abandonment of closet devotion has succeeded the neglect of the family altar, and of the social prayer meeting, and in too many cases the disuse of all the means of Grace.

2. But another cause of spiritual declension is the neglect of watchfulness.

"Watch and pray, that ye enter not into temptation," was the Saviour's command to his disciples on that solemn and awful occasion when he was about to enter upon his own fiery trial. The injunction must be regarded as addressed to all his disciples; for they are always exposed to temptation, and need the support of the strongest preservatives. "Be sober, be vigi-

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you," sair iniquity. affecting, lant; because your adversary the Devil, as a roaring lion, walketh about, seeking whom he may devour." Now, it is manifest that, together with the decay of "the spirit of grace and supplication," the spirit of sobriety and vigilance will decline; there is a beautiful and lasting union between them by which they are strengthened, and form an efficient means of guarding the believer; they co-operate in his preservation, and they cannot be disunited, nor can the one be maintained in its power if the other is left to disuse.

It is not surprising that the Christian should overcome when he lays aside his armour, and goes into the presence of the foe without precaution, or trusting in his own strength. He thus exposes himself to the shafts of the enemy; he falls into sin; his own strength is weakened; his religious profession is dishonored; and the cause of Christ is wounded. Thus it has happened to multitudes of Christian professors, whose lives and deportment testify that they have yielded to the tempter, and wandered far from the fold of the good Shepherd.

3. The neglect of the Word of God may be mentioned as another cause of that spiritual

declension which we deplore.

How seldom do the disciples of Christ "search the Scriptures" with diligence, and with an earnest desire to derive the benefit which they are designed to convey to the soul! How few study them, in order to imbibe the sanctifying influence of the truth, to understand their obligations, and to grow wise unto salvation. Beyond the occasional task of reading a brief chapter of Holy Writ, as a customary preface to family prayer, it is to be feared that the Bible is, even in families professedly religious, a neglected book. Many seem to regard their own feelings, and the impulses of their own minds, as a better rule of life than the doctrines and precepts of Christ, forgetting the language of the Apostle, that all Scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in rightconspess; that the man of God may be perfect, throughly furnished unto all good works." righteonsness: that the man of God may be perfect, throughly furnished unto all good works." They forget also the precepts which enjoins them to "receive with meekness the engrafted word which is able to save their souls;" nor do they remember that the sons of God are said to "be born again, not of corruptible seed, but of incorruptible, by the word of God, which iveth and abideth forever;" nor that the Saviour's memorable prayer for his Church contains this prominent petition, "Sanctify them through the truth: they word is truth."

Were the inspired oracles studied as they ought to be, with meditation and prayer, there could not be an open and repeated violation of the holy commands of Him who gave us his word as the transcript of his divine perfections, and the revelation of his will. Were they thus studied, believers would not "forget the assembling of themselves together" for holy worship, nor "be carried about with every wind of doctrine," nor act according to the suggestions of an ill-regulated imagination, and the caprices of variable feelings.

4. The last cause of the decline of piety which we shall mention, is the unholy fellowship which Christians have formed with the world.

which Christians have formed with the world.

ere is a real and manifest "difference between the righteous and the wicked-between him that serveth God, and him that serveth him not;" and much of the worldly-mindedness, conspicuous amongst the professed followers of Christ, has undoubtedly arisen from their not having been careful to preserve this distinction. The servant of God should be known by the contrast which his spirit, his pursuits, his character, present to those of the servants of sin. And so long as he continues to serve God faithfully, he will be recognized as belonging to Christ, as being his living epistle read and known of all men. He will not be "conformed to this world, but transformed by the renewing of his mind;" the moral standard by which his life is fashioned will be that which is despised and set at nought by men of corrupt minds; he will have no fellowship with the unfruitful works of darkness, but reprove them both by his words and by his actions. Alas: dear brethren, how few of those who are numbered as members of our Churches present this pleasing picture of spiritual-mindedness, and of crucifixion to the world by the Cross of Christ! Have we not to mourn that many are found "walking in to the world by the Cross of Christ! Have we not to mourn that many are found "walking in the counsel of the ungodly, standing in the way of sinners, and sitting in the seat of the scornful," and instead of bringing forth the fruits of righteousness, exhibit the aspect of almost perfect barrenness. How many are pursuing the paths of unholy pleasures, in companionship with those who are enemies of the Cross of Christ, and displaying great eagerness to enjoy carnal happiness. This mingling in the amusements and pursuits of the world, has benumbed conscience, destroyed communion with God, and divested Zion of that purity and glory which once made her so attractive.

Having thus briefly touched on some of the causes which have conspired to blight the growth of so considerable a portion of the Christian world, permit us, dear brethren, to urge upon you the adoption of such means as may, with the blessing of God, effect the revival of his cause amongst us.

1. It is our duty to humble ourselves before God, sincerely confess our backslidings, and

to return to God.

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He summons us to the performance of this duty. "Return unto me, and I will return unto ou," saith the Lord. "O Israel, return unto the Lord thy God, for thou hast fallen by thine and receive us graciously." The motives by which we are urged to do this are solemn and affecting, and should be efficient. "I will go and return to my place, till they acknowledge their offence and seek my face." And if we sincerely seek his face, he will be found of us, according to his gracious promise: "I will heal their backsliding—I will love them freely." O that it may be our united desire to hearken to his voice, and accept his forgiveness. "Come, and let us return unto the Lord: for he hath torn, and he will heal us; he hath smitten, and he will bind us up." If we humble ourselves beneath his mighty hard, he will exalt us in due time.

2. In order that we may be disposed to repent of our sins, and to forsake them, it is

necessary to reflect on the guilt with which we are chargeable.

It was when Peter thought on his denial of Christ that he wept; and it is manifest that serious reflection is essential to a just perception and sense of our transgressions. If we view our backslidings as they affect our character, our happiness, and usefulness; if we consider how much injury they have done to the cause of religion, and to the souls of our fellow-men; above all, if we remember the obligations we owe to Him who hath bought us with a price, and how we have broken those obligations, we will not be without a deep and painful conviction of our guilt. This conviction will be accompanied with unfeigned contrition, and followed by a renewed consecration of our hearts to the service of God.

3. It is solemnly incumbent on us to resume the use of those means of grace which we

We must again call on the name of the Lord with fervent prayer and supplication; we must We must again call on the name of the Lord with fervent prayer and supplication; we must be sober and watch unto prayer. If we have failed to devote attention to the perusal of the Scriptures, and to religious meditation, we must be no longer guilty of this sinful neglect; we must be seech our Heavenly Father to forgive our disregard of his Word, and to lead our mind to the renewed and profitable study of its truths. Some have, perhaps, neglected family prayer, to the great scandal of their profession, and the injury of their own souls and those of their families; such are reminded that God has threatened "to pour out his fury on the families that call not an his carre." that call not on his name," and they are affectionately besought to resume the performance of this most important duty. Others have forsaken the house of God, and forgotten the assembling of themselves together for his worship; we call upon them to confess this sin before Him whose temple and ordinances they have despised, and again to enter the gates of the Lord's house. All, whatever may have been the most striking feature of their backslidings, are exhorted, yea, entreated by the mercies of God to acknowledge and forsake their transgressions. 4. Finally, dear brethren, let us remember that our dependence is in God; that we must

seek his aid and blessing as absolutely necessary to the renewal of our hearts in righteousness. The work of revival is, in the most absolute sense, God's work; it owes to him its origin, its progress, and its completion. He is the Father of lights, from whom comet's down every good and every perfect gift. It is he who worketh in us both to will and to do of his good pleasure. But it is to be feared that this great truth has been too much lost sight of among us, both by ministers and people; that we have trusted to the arm of flesh rather than to the sovereign agency of God; and that, in consequence he has left us to feel how weak is human strength, and how impotent all means are without his blessing. "I have planted, Apollas watered, but God gave the increase." Such is the devout and humble acknowledgment of the Apostle of the Gentiles; may his spirit be manifested more generally in our Churches, and then we may cherish the most lively hopes of a revival of religion. We are drooping and dying for want of the gifts of the Holy Spirit, without which all our labors, and the whole machinery of means employed will be utterly unproductive of saving results. If ever there machinery of means employed, will be utterly unproductive of saving results. If ever there was a time when the Churches of Christ were required to fast and pray, that time has come; and if ever the progress of iniquity and decline of piety were peculiarly calculated to impress Christians with a conviction that their help cometh from God who made the heavens and the earth, we should now feel this conviction solemnly pressing upon our minds. Every Minister of the Denomination is a Member of the Board.

The studies are conducted under the inspection of the Principal, and comprise the usual branches of an English, Commercial, Classical, and Mathematical Education.

TUITION FEES.

Under ten years of age, ten shillings for each term of 11 weeks. Between ten and fourteen, fifteen shillings, ditto ditto.

Above fourteen years, twenty shillings, ditto ditto.

Two shillings and sixpence for fuel each spring, winter, and autumn term.

Accommodations in the Seminary are provided for Students at the rate of eight shillings and sixpence per week. This includes board, the washing of six articles, and necessary attendance. Each Student brings his own bed and bedding. Every attention is paid to the moral behaviour and correct deportment of the Students.

At the Thirteenth Meeting of the Society, held at Jacksontown on the 6th July, 1847, the following Report was presented to the Committee, and Resolutions adopted:

REPORT.

In presenting to the Society the Annual Report of their proceedings, the Committee have much pleasure in being able to give a favorable account of the state of the School. The Principal reports that the diligence and good conduct of the Students during the past year have afforded him much satisfaction. Several young men, sons of Ministers, Licentiates and others, have distinguished themselves by their persevering application and proficiency in various branches of learning, and the general deportment of all the Scholars has been such as to merit approbation. The number of Students

enrolled during the year that is past, has been 53, and the weekly attendance has ranged from 28 to 28. The plan of half-yearly 33 examinations has been adopted this year, and with beneficial effects; that in the winter was attended by the Rev. J. M. Brooke, and John Gregory, Esquire, as Examiners, and several other friends; and the Students were examined in the summer by the Rev. Mr. Ketchum, who was present the first day, and the Rev. J. M. Brooke, who attended the second day as Commissioner appointed by his Excellency the Lieutenant Governor; two days being devoted to this object, in order to allow sufficient time for a full examination of the acquirements of the Pupils in English, Classical studies, and Mathematics. The usual Legislative grant of £250 has been received this year, and the finances of the Society would be free from embarrassment, were it not for the large amount annually required to pay the interest upon the debt. The Committee would earnestly direct the attention of their friends to this subject, and would rejoice in any well directed effort for liquidating the debt, especially as the dilapidated state of the fences and parts of the building will require a larger expenditure than usual for the next year. They have not been able to succeed in their efforts to secure a competent delegation to collect for the Society in Nova Scotia, and must again refer this important matter to the decision of the Society.

The Committee regret to state, that owing to the occurrence of a fire in the dwelling house where the records of the Society were deposited, all the documents pertaining to the Institution have been burnt, with the exception of the Account Books, which happened to

be in another place, and have been preserved.

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Two Licentiates, Brothers W. Coleman and J. Todd, have been pursuing their studies at the Seminary during the past year, the former from the commencement until the end of September, and the latter through the whole year. Some unexpected pecuniary losses compelled Mr. Todd to avail himself of the liberality of others, in order to continue his studies, and the Principal did not hesitate to devote to this object the funds which were placed at his disposal by some friends in England for this purpose, as stated in the last year's report; the statement of this Account, together with the current receipts and expenditure for the year, and a schedule of the debts owing by the Society, will be found annexed.

The Committee cannot abstain from adverting to the fluctuating character of the attendance at the School—changes are perpetually taking place. At the close of each term several Students leave, and those who come fresh do but fill up without augmenting the number; they would earnestly press upon parents and guardians the importance of securing for their children all the advantages of education, by allowing them to remain a sufficient time for the formation of habits of study and the full development of the mental powers.

In conclusion, while the Committee rejoice in the progress already

made, and are thankful for the cheering prospects which the future presents, they would impress upon the minds of their friends the necessity which still exists for the most vigorous and unremitting exertions, that the Institution may advance with accelerated rapidity, for they are convinced that it is impossible to remain stationary; not to advance is to recede, and knowing the requirements of the age, and the laudable efforts which are being made by other literary institutions to meet the exigencies of the times, they would stimulate the friends of the Society to an honorable rivalry in this department of labor; nor is there any reason to doubt but that in such an increasing country as this, the Baptist Education Society, if at all adequately supported by pecuniary and friendly assistance, cannot fail to occupy an important position among the various Seminaries of learning in the country.

RESOLUTIONS.

1st. That the Report now read be adopted, and this Society rejoices in the cheering prospects which, through the blessing of God, lie before them in their educational efforts, and pledge themselves to use redoubled energy in advocating the claims and extending the usefulness of the Institution.

2d. That in order to secure a visitation of the Province of Nova Scotia for the purpose of obtaining contributions from the friends of Education there, Elder J. Francis be requested to undertake the delegation, under such regulations as may be mutually agreed upon by him and the Executive Committee.

3d. That the Executive Committee for the ensuing year consist of C. Spurden, S. Elder, Hon. W. B. Kinnear, Z. G. Gabel, S. W. Babbit, Aaron Hartt, and W. Sewell.

SECOND ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE GENERAL UNION OF THE BAPTIST DENOMINATION OF NEW BRUNSWICK.

The Board have deferred their Report beyond the usual period, hoping to hear from a greater number of the Local Societies, but regret to state that notwithstanding this delay, no report or remittances have come to hand from the Local Societies at Hopewell, Hillsborough, Coverdale, 1st Salisbury, Hampton, Nashwaak, New Canaan, Douglas, Cardigan, Ten Mile Creek, African Church, Saint Davids, 1st Saint Patricks, 1st Saint Andrews, Saint Andrews Town, and Pennfield. Sixteen Societies from which

upwards of seventy pounds were received last year.

The Board have received returns from twenty-four Local Societies, five of them are new Societies, from which nothing was received last year; the sums contributed vary from twelve shillings and sixpence, to thirty pounds fourteen shillings and eight pence halfpenny, each, amounting to about one hundred and forty pounds, including some donations from individuals, but exclusive of donations from members of the General Union and collections. About one hundred and eighty pounds have been paid into the funds of the Union, from the various sources, during the past year. More than a fourth part of this sum has been paid by a single Society and members of the General Union connected with that Society; and even this Society, by a little additional effort, might have collected double that amount. The Board feel confident, if the assistance of all the Churches could be secured, that, with increased vigilance on the part of the whole, the various objects of the Denomination would be efficiently sustained, through the medium of the Union; but no plan however well devised, can prove successful if neglected in its execution by at least two-thirds of the number of our Churches.

The sum of thirty-two pounds, six shillings and a halfpenny, has been expended on agencies the past year. Two pounds six shillings and a halfpenny of this amount was collected by the Rev. Mr. Francis, towards the expence of the Agency, leaving a balance of twenty-two pounds chargeable upon the ordinary funds of the Union.

The Board have been anxious to avoid, as far as possible, the expence of Agencies, hoping, as so large a number of Societies were organized last year, that the interests of the Union would be attended to by the several Societies, and others throughout the Province, without the assistance of Agents; it is, however, probable had an efficient Agent been employed for the year, that twice or three times the amount now reported, would have been collected, and an amount of good otherwise affected, more than adequate to the additional expence incurred.

The qualification of membership to the Local Unions was fixed at the low rate of 6s. 2d. per annum, to be applied to the support of

the five objects embraced in the Union, in order that persons of the most limited means might be able to become members, and enjoy the satisfaction of contributing to all those objects by the payment of this small sum. But it is hoped that the magnitude and importance of our Domestic and Foreign Missions, the circulation of the Scriptures in heathen lands, the support of our aged or destitute Ministers and families, in all cases where such assistance may be required, and the dissemination of sound and useful education, combined as they are in the Union plan, will induce persons who have the means to contribute a much larger sum than that required to constitute membership. The Treasurer's account shows the receipt of a few sums of this description, and the Board venture to express the hope that a much greater number will be received during the coming year.

The Board tender their acknowledgments to the Societies and individuals who have contributed to the funds the past year, and solicit their continued and increased aid. They also request those Societies that contributed last year, but have failed to do so this year, to commence in earnest and remedy their neglect, by collecting and forwarding their subscriptions to the Treasurer, without further delay; the monies, when received, will be divided at once, and all

accounted for in the next year's account.

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The Board would likewise urge upon such of our Churches as have not yet formed Union Societies, the importance of engaging in the work, that the next Annual Report may contain the pleasing intelligence that every Church in the Province has united in a systematic plan for the support of the great objects of the Denomination.

The Treasurer paid the sum of ten pounds to the late Rev. John Mills, during his protracted illness, from the fund for the support of superannuated Ministers, &c., by order of the Board appointed to take charge of that department, being the only call as yet made upon that fund. The Board congratulate the Denomination upon the establishment of a fund for this purpose, and trust it will always be found sufficient for the object designed. The Board having gone pretty fully into the plans, objects, &c., of the Union in their former Report, consider it unnecessary to do so at this time, but would refer those who wish for information to that Report, as published in the Minutes of the Association last year. The balance now in the Treasurer's hands will be forthwith apportioned, agreeably to the rules of the Union.

In conclusion, the Board again solicit the co-operation of the Ministers, Churches throughout the Province, and all other persons friendly to the cause, to secure the objects contemplated by the Union, to their fullest extent.

EXTRACTS

FROM THE REPORTS OF THE DOMESTIC MISSIONARY BOARDS.

The Westmorland Board has employed Missionaries for a period, in all, of about fifteen and a half weeks, who have met with a most cordial reception from the people residing upon the shores remote from opportunities of hearing the truths of God proclaimed. Three Quarterly Meetings have been held, at which the sum of £7 8 8 was collected, in all.

The Fredericton Board report the formation of a new Church in the Upsalquitch, far up the Restigouche River, by Elder James Blakeney, in conjunction with Brother Mutch, a Licentiate of the Saint John Board. The little company of disciples was composed of twenty-three, of whom twenty were baptized at the same time, by Brother Blakeney. The infant cause was subsequently visited by the same missionary, in company with Elder Joshua Bunting, who was sent out by the Church at Norton, when fourteen more were added by baptism. At the Black Lands on the Bay de Chaleur, our missionaries met with a most gratifying reception from the residents, who are emigrants from one of the islands of Scotland, and connected with one of the Presbyterian Bodies. The baptism of two persons, who gave evidence of conversion to God, in the Bay de Chaleur, was witnessed by a large concourse of persons assembled from the adjacent country; a deep solemnity pervaded the multitude during the service and the administration of the ordinance.

At Ruslagonish a Church has been re-organized by Elder James Walker, whose faithful labours there were attended with the Divine blessing, and thirteen were added by baptism. The revival of religion extended through the settlement, and was participated in by the Free-Will Brethren.

A mission of fifteen weeks was performed by Elder Bancroft, at the Grand Falls, with pleasing prospects of usefulness. Nearly 86 weeks of Missionary Labour, by Ordained Ministers, and 8 weeks by Licentiates, have been performed during the last year; 277 sermons have been preached, 136 other meetings attended, 39 persons baptized, 1200 gospel tracts distributed, and 3435 miles travelled by the missionaries.

NOTES

OF THE RECOGNITION SERVICE OF THE REV. J. READ.

It had been arranged that Mr. Read should preach a sermon, but as the time was limited, he simply announced the subject on which he had intended to speak, in 73rd Psalm and 25th verse. After offering a few observations, he proceeded to describe the process by which he had been led, at an early age, to trust in the Lord Jesus Christ for salvation. The workings of his mind, in relation to the Christian Ministry, were then detailed, after various attempts to stifle the breathings of his soul, and to engage in some secular employment. He at length yielded himself to this service, and under the guidance and sanction of several Ministers in Nova Scotia, he entered the Academy at Pictou, where he attended the collegiate classes four years, and the Theological classes three years, in addition to the last year of his collegiate course, also in part devoted to Theology.

Having received a licence to preach from the Presbytery, he proceeded to Sheffield, in accordance with the desire of the Congregational Church there, until they could meet with a Minister of their own denomination; and after a residence of one year he was ordained as a Minister of Christ by the Presbytery at Truro. This connexion was afterwards dissolved in consequence of difference of opinion respecting the invitations of the Gospel, but he still continued to discharge the duties of the pastoral office at Sheffield. After ministering four years at that place, he was invited to Richmond, where he had now resided for about four years. While disconnected with the Presbyterian Body, and before joining any other denomination of Christians, his examination of the Scriptures led to a change of views respecting the ordinance of Baptism. He thereupon stated to the Church at Richmond that he could not administer the rite to their infants, as he did not think there was Scriptural authority for it; they however requested him to remain, but being determined to follow out his own convictions of duty, whatever the loss and inconvenience to which it would subject him, he had been baptized, and expressed a desire to devote himself to the Saviour's service in any department that might be opened before him. The Moderator then gave the right hand of fellowship, and Elder W. Harris offered prayer. A charge was delivered by Elder Samuel Robinson, and Elder Charles Tupper concluded the impressive service with a few faithful observations to the members of the Association.
