
Tom Moore Brings Home Word of Labor and Living Conditions in England.

Ottawa, April 8-Bolshevism is slowly but surely dying in England. Free speech is killing it. The old country labor man is learning the unsoundness of the doctrine, not from those who seek to discredit the movement but from the radicals themselves. Labor is becoming disgusted with the Reds and is showing that disgust by repudiating the movement.
